At the Annual General Meeting on May 30 at 7 p.m. a Special Resolution to update the organization's bylaws will be put forward to the membership of Winston Heights-Mountview Community Association.

The last update to our bylaws was made in May 2010 and over the past seven years Directors have, from time to time, recommended changes which this Special Resolution aims to address. These recommended edits are proposed in order to:

- 1. Update Membership sections to reflect the current practice of Memberships being by household rather than by individual.
- 2. Expand Associate Membership to include businesses and not just individuals who live outside the community.
- 3. Allow a limited number of Associate Members to serve as Directors.
- 4. Expand Conflict of Interest to include more than "tender or contract to be submitted to the Association."
- 5. Improve consistency of language throughout the document.

Also, the apple and cherry trees around the perimeter will soon be blooming and the bulbs in the garden might already be flowering. The picnic table is always a pretty spot to have lunch.

This year, our garden is participating in a bee box study. There are a couple of extra bee houses in the garden already. Jenna, a student at St. Mary's University, is hoping to document the ways in which the solitary bees are affected by elements of their environment such as the surrounding plant varieties, and human and animal traffic patterns. We're thrilled to be a part of the study. We rely on bees for pollination and the solitary bees are favourites because they have a feeble sting and only exercise it if they are rudely treated. So please be kind to the bees.

## Helping Your Children with Social and **Emotional Skills for Kindergarten**

Age 5 is a "big" age as these kids are getting ready for school! Now we have to focus on getting ready for Kindergarten and learning new skills.

Social emotional milestones at age 5 are:

- most concerned about family but are reaching out and making friends
- they are starting to learn about rules and behaviours outside of the home; they like rules as rules provide order
- · becoming more independent and in control of their behaviour
- they better understand logic which leads to less tantrums and arguments
- sharing is better and they are starting to develop empathy
- they play mostly with the same gender, but are noticing more differences between genders
- may become clingy, bossy or show mixed emotions when tired
- · can state family values and know that families have different values

• understanding the world around them better

Working with your child to reach these milestones is critical to a great start to school. Don't worry if your child reaches these milestones after his/her peers. Children develop differently; a guideline is that you should see these milestones be reached before they are 6 years old.

The Calgary NW ECD Coalitions consist of three coalitions who have joined forces with parents, community members, organizations and professionals, who are all working together to better the lives of young children and their families. We work hard to support five important developmental areas for children - Social Competence, Emotional Maturity, Language & Thinking Skills, Physical Health & Well-being, and Communication Skills & General Knowledge. ## EMS

National Paramedic Services Week is May 28 – June 3, 2017.

National Paramedic Services Week honors the Emergency Medical Services (EMS) profession and recognizes the men and women providing this key public service. It is also an opportunity for the public to better understand the important role EMS has within both the health care system and our communities.

The year's national theme is, Paramedics: Always In Service.

Whether directly or indirectly, every Albertan has felt the importance of the service paramedics provide. Paramedics are trained health care professionals who stabilize and treat patents before and during transport to hospital. In some areas of the province, paramedics are now working side-by-side their health care colleagues in hospitals and community care facilities.

- There are over 4,000 EMS practitioners and 550 ambulances in the Alberta Health Services system provincewide;
- Approximately 5,500 patients will be transferred by fixed wing aircraft through contracted air ambulance providers in Alberta this year;
- EMS dispatch receives over 500,000 ground ambulance calls each year.

EMS practitioners across the Alberta and Canada will be celebrating National Paramedic Services Week in a variety of ways. Watch for information in your local media as well as AHS EMS Twitter and Facebook about events in your community.

## IN & AROUND CALGARY

### Your May Safety Tip from Your **Calgary Fire Department** Prevent potting soil fires

Today's potting soils contain large volumes of peat moss. When peat moss gets too dry, it becomes highly flammable. On top of that, you'll often find shredded wood, bark, Styrofoam and vermiculite in potting mix. Like peat moss, all of these ingredients ignite easily under dry conditions.

Over the past number of years we have received numerous 911 calls from citizens who, while walking their dog late at night, see the outside of a home on fire. These fires are typically attributed a cigarette before they go to bed. After finishing the cigarette, it is put out in the porch plant pot...because "that is where I've always put it out and there has never been a problem" then as they sleep the still burning cigarette lights the dry peat moss on fire, and voila! After a period of time, the outside of the house is on fire while the residents sleep inside!

A few simple precautions will help to keep your home safe:

- Make sure the soil around your potted plants stays moist. Keep in mind that the soil in pots dries out more quickly than soil in garden beds, so plan on more frequent watering.
- While regular garden soil may extinguish a cigarette, the same isn't true for potting soil. Make sure smokers have a safe place to dispose of their butts, indoors and outdoors, so they aren't tempted to use your pot of geraniums instead.

Keep potting soil away from combustible materials. Keep potting soil and potted plants away from things that ignite and burn easily, such as firewood, stacks of old newspapers, aerosols, paint solvents, gasoline and cleaning products.

DID YOU KNOW? The MALTESE CROSS had its beginning during the Crusades, and it's shape adopted to the shields of the knights of Malta who were also known to wear red capes. When assisting armies who had been doused with Naptha and lit on fire, the knights would pull off their red capes and put the flames out. It has since been adopted as a symbol of fire departments.

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#### **Visit our National Parks**

This year Canada marks its 150th birthday and there are many ways to celebrate.

Canada is known for its natural beauty and one of the best ways to experience Canada is to visit our National Parks -- for free.

By visiting www.parkscanada.gc.ca or by calling 1-888-773-8888, you can order your free Canada 150 pass and this will allow you to have unlimited daily visits to all national parks and historical sites across Canada. You can also request a free Visitors Guide for each region of the country.

Alberta is home to Canada's first national park. Banff National Park of Canada was created in 1885 and is a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Alberta is also home to four other national parks too; Elk Island, Jasper, Waterton Lakes and Wood Buffalo -- as well as many national historical sites.

The special Canada 150 pass is only good for free daily visits but you may want to consider extending your experience by staying overnight for a very reasonable cost.

If you do not have access to camping equipment, you may want to consider some of the more innovative solutions offered by Parks Canada. There are oTENTik, teepees and Equipped Campsites available at most Alberta parks, but space is limited. Accommodation options are much more limited in other provinces.

oTENTik sites are a cross between a tent and a rustic cabin, similar to what early settlers and gold rush pioneers lived in. They accommodate up to six and are both dry and spacious and include the beds. The kids will love the bunk beds!

The teepee equipped sites are only available at Waterton Lakes Park and Rocky Mountain House National Historical Site.

The Equipped Campsites are perfect for those who do not own any camping equipment or do not have the space to transport camping equipment (cyclists and motorcyclists). These sites come equipped with the basics for up to six people.

Please remember that many parts of our national parks are remote, not well monitored and rely on park users to know their own limits. 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#### Investing in Albertans

Occasionally, constituents tell me they're concerned about the state of Alberta's finances. The fact is that Alberta is set to lead the country in economic growth this year, and has the lowest debt-to-GDP ratio of all Canadian provinces. Given this outlook, there are several important arguments for maintaining the state of our front-line services.

The moral argument is the one I find most compelling: Albertans shouldn't be made to pay or suffer for fluctuations in the price of oil and the lack of foresight of previous governments. Since oil was discovered in Alberta, governments have used non-renewable resource revenues to fund schools, hospitals, roads and infrastructure. When oil prices were high, previous governments pretended to be wise fiscal managers, and when oil prices were low, they slashed and burned front-line services Albertans rely on. This isn't fair to Albertans. People shouldn't be made to line up for hospital care, or put their child in a classroom with 50 others, just because the price of oil fluctuates.

There's also a strong economic argument to be made for maintaining funding levels for health and education while investing in infrastructure. As Alberta's economy recovers, we want to be an attractive place to move to, start a business, and invest. This means building the infrastructure we need while prices are relatively low, and maintaining the state of our front-line services. Companies rarely start new branches or move employees to places that throw their health and education systems into crisis. Maintaining stable funding to services helps Alberta remain competitive on the world stage.

The role of any government should be to make life better for Albertans, and that's the role I see myself and my New Democrat colleagues accomplishing. Yes, serious conversations need to happen regarding the responsible management of revenues in Alberta. 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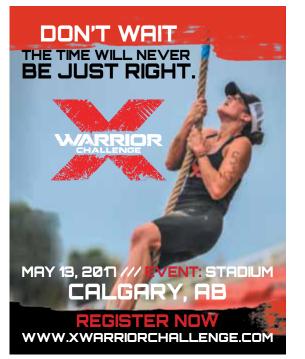

#### **Indigenous Policy Framework**

Over the last several years there has been a significant focus on the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) and how the recommendations coming out this challenging and important work impact us all. Many people mistakenly believe this to be an Aboriginal issue when, in fact, it is a Canadian issue, a Calgarian issue and a community-building issue.

Understanding that we all have a responsibility to heal our relationship with our indigenous brothers and sisters, your City Council has taken meaningful and lasting steps forward in a shared process of truth and reconciliation. These steps include: the publication of the White Goose Flying Report (2016) that looks at the local adaptation for the TRC's 18 calls to action, the renaming of the Langevin Bridge to Reconciliation Bridge in January 2017, the permanent raising of the Treaty 7 flag in March 2017 and, most recently, the Indigenous Policy Framework presented at the Standing Policy Committee on Community and Protective Services in April 2017.

The Indigenous Policy Framework is intended to establish the necessary policies and practices for the City of Calgary to move forward by understanding our shared history and how, as a municipality, we can be an active partner in the process of reconciliation. This incredible document is, in all honesty, one of the best reports I have ever seen come out of the City of Calgary and the first of its kind in Canada. It is something that I encourage all Calgarians to take the time to thoughtfully read.

The Indigenous Policy Framework is, in essence, Calgary's creation story. Using the incredible expertise of our traditional knowledge keepers from the Treaty 7 First Nations, it describes how, since the beginning of time, this land has been a shared land. It has welcomed people from different backgrounds to live and prosper here and build communities that celebrate our diversity and thrive because of it.

This is the story of Treaty 7 people and we are all Treaty 7 people.

In honouring the creation story of our city we begin to recognize its contemporary significance and how it dovetails with the idea of great neighbourhoods. Great neighbourhoods are built on diverse people coming together, sharing the land and building community. This is still everything we are still working toward today.

In June we will be hosting the official renaming ceremony for the Langevin Bridge. I encourage all of you to come out and celebrate this historic moment.
