A reminder that flagpoles are located around the lake and at the Front Entrance. RED: full closure (stay off and far away from the ice). YELLOW: partial closure (contact the lake office or check the website for updates). GREEN: the lake is open for all activities

Water Safety

As a reminder, here are some safety tips: ARBOUR LAKE IS AN UNSUPERVISED LAKE. USE OF THE LAKE AND ITS AMMENITIES IS AT YOUR OWN RISK

- There is NO lifeguard on duty
- Please watch children at all times
- Keep your small children within arms' length at all times
- We highly recommend children wear a PFD at all times
- Children must remain in the buoyed swim area
- Swim aids and toys must remain in swim area
- Swimming with a buddy is safer and way more fun No diving
- No swimming or boating during lightning storms
- Parents: If your children are under the age of 12, you must remain at the Lake with them at all times. They cannot be left unsupervised

Remember the Lake Rules:

Summer is here and we are all very excited to have fun at the lake, but there are some very important rules to remember!

Members

- Presentation of a membership card is mandatory to gain access to the lake
- Members 11 years or younger must be accompanied by a responsible member 12 years of age or older
- Residents under 18 who are not yet registered as a member must be registered by the homeowner
- Replacement membership cards may be purchased for \$25.00
- Arbour Lake staff reserves the right to restrict entry to anyone
- ALRA has the right to make further reasonable rules and regulations

Guests

• Members are permitted a maximum of five guests per household per day.

- Any requests for more than 5 guests must be made through and approved by ALRA management at least 14 days in advance
- Members under the age of 16 are permitted a maximum of two guests at any time and guests must provide photo ID.
- Members are responsible for the actions of their auests
- All guests must be accompanied by a Member at all times and can never be left in the lake alone
- · Members may not check in guests without a current lake card

· Members under 18 years of age who bring guests, must leave their lake card at the office and guests must leave a piece of picture ID with the members lake card. Members and quests may retrieve their ID upon departure.

Prohibitions

- Glass bottles
- Liquor/drugs
- Bicycle's, Skateboards or other vehicle Open fires or BBO's

Boating

- Boating activities will not be supervised • Lifejackets are mandatory
- Paddle Boats, Kayaks, Canoes: 16+ Kids may take out a children's kayak if a responsible adult also takes out a kayak and is within reach.
- Row Boats: 16+
- Paddle Boards: 12+ (Residents 12-15 years will only be allowed on with a signed waiver from their parents
- All boats and other equipment must be returned at least 30 minutes prior to closing
- All equipment other than row boats has a usage limit of 30 minutes during busy times



Fishing

· May only be done from designated fishing areas

- Hooks must be Barbless
- No live bait, corn, bread, minnows, smelts or fish or nets may be used to catch fish
- Fish must be killed immediately and are not to be kept on a stringer in the lake No cleaning of fish is permitted at
- Arbour Lake
- 2 fish per day/household, 4 fish per month/household, 20 fish per year/ household

Fishy Business

This April, Arbour Lake was proud to stock the waters with 600 young brook trout! This is the very first time that Arbour Lake has been able to receive a full shipment of brook trout. Before this shipment, the only brook trout in the lake were a result of a few being mixed in coincidentally with other shipments of fish. Fishermen are not to keep brook trout so that they can grow and survive in the lake.

The Lake was also stocked with two separate shipments of rainbow trout. We received 1000 young rainbow trout that were less than 8 inches long (fish these sizes are sometimes referred to as "fingerlings"). These fish are kept separate from the larger fish in the lake, and are fed multiple times in the day until they are big enough to be released into the larger lake area. Our other shipment of rainbow trout was comprised of 350 trout that ranged in size from 3-5 pounds.

We are quite happy with all of the "fishy"

business surrounding stocking the lake, but we would also like to remind residents that there are many people who fish at the lake over the year, and so to follow the limits per household for keeping any fish. Happy Fishing!





The scoop on dog poop

With 150 public off-leash areas and over 100,000 dogs in our city, it's clear Calgarians love their canine companions. What isn't to love is the stinky situation left behind when owners don't pick up after their pets.

Cleaning up your dog's waste helps keep our yards, parks and off-leash areas safe and healthy, and is part of being a responsible pet owner.

Here are five facts you may not know about doggy doo-doo:

- 1. It's classified as a hazardous pollutant. It's in the same category as toxic chemicals!
- It's crawling with E. coli and often contains roundworm larvae which, if ingested by humans or dogs, can lead to brain, eye and other organ damage.
- 3. It's not a good fertilizer. Its high nutrient content is toxic to lawns and will create "hot spots" causing the grass to burn and discolour.
- 4. It doesn't absorb into the soil, so the risk of spreading its harmful effects can linger for years!
- 5. It attracts mice, coyotes and other wildlife that consider it a delicious snack.

Keeping our city pet-waste free is easy, if we all do our part. Always carry pet waste bags with you when you walk your dog, and pick up and properly dispose of your pet's waste as soon as possible.

Gliding to the left and right, the American Kestrel, keeps a sharp eye on the earth below for flickering blades of grass or the rustling of bushes. A member of the raptor family, the American Kestrel is easy to identify because it is the smallest of the North American falcons and the most colourful. Male and female Kestrels are dressed in a rusty red but only the males are garnished with a brilliant slate blue on their head and wings. They are easily spotted in open grassland areas, such as meadows and farmer's fields. They also can be seen in city areas and suburbs. Unlike songbirds, they will not be seen foraging for items for their nests, instead, they rely on abandoned Woodpecker holes, tree hollows and other empty cavities that are found in the environment. Kestrels may even take up residence in your backyard.

Your backyard could become a suitable home for the Kestrel, provided that you don't just set up any old birdhouse. A nesting box, nailed to a tree, high above the yard and away from sources of noise, could provide a suitable home for a feathered family. They may repay you by keeping pesky rodents out of your yard.

Like many raptors, the American Kestrel hunts for insects such as grasshoppers, beetles and spiders. They also enjoy munching on small vertebrate prey such as mice, voles, shrews, songbirds and occasionally, frogs, snakes and small lizards. Some brave Kestrels have been spotted preying on larger creatures, such as red squirrels. One characteristic that gives the American Kestrel the upper hand on small prey is their ability to see ultraviolet light. This feature gives them the power to see urine trails created by small rodents and other creatures, leading them to their next meal.

When the Kestrel finds itself with a surplus of food they store their food for later use. Like a storage box, they will hide their food in grass clumps, tree roots and other cavities along the ground. These food items will come in handy when food is difficult to find.

Hunting all day and sleeping all night isn't as easy as it may sound. The American Kestrel must always on the lookout for predators. As the smallest falcon, they become easy prey to other raptors, such as Barn Owls, Goshawks and Red-tailed Hawks. Large reptiles such as rat snakes and corn snakes will also take Kestrels as prey.

When you are out on your next walk, keep an eye to the sky, you may just see the Kestrel gliding through the air or perched on a light post or telephone post. If you come across an injured American Kestrel, or any other wildlife in distress, please contact Calgary Wildlife Rehabilitation Society wildlife hotline at 403-239-2488.



Calgarians are not ATM machines

Over the past few months, I've been consulting with the residents of Ward 2 on their priorities for our community and our city. Ward 2 residents are almost unanimous in their opposition to increased property taxes, and I agree. That is why on April 25, 2016, I took a stand and voted against the 6.1% increase to property taxes.

The last thing Calgarians need during an economic downturn is to be paying significantly more in property tax. Unfortunately, largely due to the provincial Budget 2016, taxes are going to be increasing and it will impact everyone, including The City of Calgary.

The 6.1% property tax increase was derived from the increased provincial education portion of property taxes. What is even more concerning is the fact that the 6.1% property tax increase does not take into account the new carbon tax that is being implemented by the provincial government. This carbon tax will not only tax each and every Albertan individually, but it will also be applied to our public transit system and almost every aspect of The City of Calgary's operations. This will significantly impact property tax rates in future years.

I voted against this 6.1% property tax increase because Calgarians are not an ATM machine. I believe that The City of Calgary will need to continue doing its part by looking at every aspect of spending to see what can be done to reduce the tax burden on Calgarians. However, I will admit that this task will be increasingly difficult due to the higher taxes being imposed on The City by the provincial government.

I believe that tax dollars are best kept in the pockets of taxpayers so that they can choose to spend their money as they see fit. This is particularly important in the context of our challenging economic climate. Many Calgarians have lost their jobs and have seen their incomes decline. The last thing these Calgarians need is to have their taxes increased which will make it even more difficult for them to pay their bills.
