

SAFE & SOUND

Backyard Play Safety

Emergency Medical Services (EMS) would like to encourage parents and caregivers to ensure their backyard play areas are made safe for children. Although direct supervision is the best method to reduce the chance of injury, ensure your play equipment in your yard is in good repair and is suitable for the age and skill of the children using it. Check play equipment often; replace or repair any worn or broken parts. Set up play equipment over top a 9-inch layer of shock-absorbing material such as sand, wood chips, or pea gravel which extends 6 feet out in all directions from the play area.

Water hazards

- Drowning contributes to unintentional injury-related death among children ages one to four;
- · Children can drown in just a few centimetres of water if it covers their mouth and nose;
- Ensure all backyard swimming pools are fenced. The fence must be at least 1.8 metres (*) high and have a self-latching, self-closing, lockable gate. (*Alberta Building Code)

Lawn and garden tools

- Keep young children away from outdoor power equipment;
- Serious burns may result from touching hot engine surfaces:
- Ensure that all sharp tools, fuel, chemicals, and other hazardous substances are stored in a secure, locked area. A simple latch may not be sufficient.

Insect bites and stings

- Minimize the risk of attracting insects by not wearing strong perfumes or scented lotions;
- · Avoid wearing brightly coloured clothing outdoors;
- Consider destroying or relocating hives and nests situated near your home;
- To avoid injury through inadvertently stepping on a stinging insect always wear footwear outdoors;
- If your child has received an 'EpiPen, Junior' prescription from your physician (for anaphylactic reactions only) ensure they understand when and how to use it;
- If your child experiences a severe reaction to an insect sting, or other environmental cause, seek medical attention, or call 9-1-1.

Lake Reminders

It's Summer!

The lake is open for fishing, boats and swimming! See our website for information on the lake status or call the office if you have any questions. A reminder that flagpoles are located around the lake and at the Front Entrance. RED: full closure (stay off and far away from the ice or water). YELLOW: partial closure (contact the lake office or check the website for updates). GREEN: the lake is open for all activities.

Water Safety

As a reminder, here are some safety tips:

- ARBOUR LAKE IS AN UNSUPERVISED LAKE. USE OF THE LAKE AND ITS AMMENITIES IS AT YOUR OWN RISK
- There is NO lifeguard on duty
- Please watch children at all times
- Keep your small children within arms' length at all
- We highly recommend children wear a PFD at all times
- Children must remain in the buoyed swim area
- Swim aids and toys must remain in swim area
- Swimming with a buddy is safer and way more fun
- No diving
- No swimming or boating during lightning storms
- Parents: If your children are under the age of 12, you must remain at the Lake with them at all times. They cannot be left unsupervised.

Remember the Lake Rules:

Summer is here and we are all very excited to have fun at the lake, but there are some very important rules to remember!





Members

- Presentation of a membership card is mandatory to gain access to the lake
- Members 11 years or younger must be accompanied by a responsible member 12 years of age or older
- Residents under 18 who are not yet registered as a member must be registered by the homeowner
- Replacement membership cards may be purchased for \$25.00
- A Valid drivers license with the Arbour Lake address is required for lake cards to be printed for any member over the age of 16.
- Arbour Lake staff reserves the right to restrict entry to anvone
- ALRA has the right to make further reasonable rules and regulations

Guests

- Adult members are permitted a maximum of five (5) quests per household per day.
- Any requests for more than 5 guests (up to a maximum of 16 quests) must be made through, and approved by ALRA management a minimum of 7 days in advance via info@arbourlake.com. This is a

request only and bookings are not guaranteed until confirmed. The ALRA may at any time limit the number of guest bookings per day.

- Members under the age of 16 are permitted a maximum of two quests at any time and quests must provide photo ID.
- Members are responsible for the actions of their
- All guests must be accompanied by a Member at all times and can never be left in the lake alone
- · Members may not check in guests without a current lake card
- · Members under 18 years of age who bring guests, must leave their lake card at the office and guests must leave a piece of picture ID with the member's lake card. Members and guests may retrieve their ID upon departure.

Prohibitions

- any personal outside inflatable water toys or equipment, as per Provincial Regulations
- any glass bottles, glass containers, glass cups, etc.
- any alcohol, drugs, cigarettes or similar substance
- any animal
- any bicycle, skateboard, or other vehicle
- any open fires or portable BBQ
- any motor boat or snowmobile
- personal watercraft equipment
- Taking sand off the beach
- Digging deep holes in the beach

There is NO SMOKING inside the park, or parking lot. No person shall at any time discharge, deposit, throw, dump or place any trash or debris of any kind whatsoever in the lake, or on the lake property or dumpsters.

Boating

- · Boating activities will not be supervised
- · Lifejackets are mandatory, and must be fully fastened
- Paddle Boats, Kayaks, Canoes: 16+ Kids may take out a children's kayak if a responsible adult also takes out a kayak and is within reach and/ or a parental consent waiver is signed.
- · Row Boats: 16+
- Paddle Boards: 12+ (Residents 12-15 years will only be allowed on with a signed waiver from their parents.

- NO GUESTS CAN SIGN OUT EQUIPMENT. Residents must be of age (18+) and have a lake access card present to take out guests on equipment.
- GUESTS CAN NEVER BE ON EQUIPMENT ALONE
- · All boats and other equipment will be called in 30 minutes prior to closing
- No boat rentals permitted within half an hour of closing
- All equipment other than row boats has a usage limit of 30 minutes during busy times

Fishing is Catch and Release ONLY!

At this time, only catch and release fishing will be permitted at Arbour Lake, until further notice, THERE WILL BE NO KEEPING OF ANY FISH OF ANY SIZE OR KIND! This is a result of Alberta Environment and Parks shutting down all fish stocking within the Bow River drainage area, of which Arbour Lake is included. Due to whirling disease found in the Bow River and commercial fish culture operations, the lake will not be stocked indefinitely, and as such, no fish may be kept indefinitely. Any fish that cannot be returned to the water, must be surrendered to a staff member.

Fishing

May only be done from designated fishing docks Hooks must be Barbless and egg hooks are not permitted. No Triple hooks are to be used. This ensures the survival of released fish.

WHAT'S UP AT THE LAKE

No live bait, corn, bread, minnows, smelts, fish or nets may be used to catch fish.

Only one rod per resident may be cast at any one time and fishing lines must be attended to at all times.


Random tackle box, bag and hook checks will be performed to ensure all Rules and Regulations are being followed.

Clothing Donation Bin

Have your kids grown out of their new clothes before actually wearing them? Do you have clothes in your closet taking up space that you don't really wear? Arbour Lake Residents Association has a clothing donation bin in front of the lake office, close to the fire lane. Drop off your gently used clothing to help clear up the clutter in your closet. Clothing will only be accepted in bags, dropped inside the container. Please do not leave bags next to the donation bin. Bags or items left next to the donation bin will be sent to the landfill. NO HOUSEHOLD **GOODS PLEASE!**

No Person shall: (a) dig, disturb or remove any mineral substance including soil, sand, gravel or rock from a Park; (b) damage, dig, cut, disturb or destroy any Park Vegetation, whether alive or dead; (c) damage, dig, disturb, deface, destroy or remove any fossils, bones or historical artifacts from a Park; (d) damage or destroy any wildlife habitat; or (e) pester, feed or otherwise interfere with any animal in a

District Dig Tree Planting

I wanted to give a big thanks to all of the families that came out to help and make this event a big success.

We had 47 people come out to help and we planted a total of 15 trees and 37 shrubs and bushes.

The girls have been anticipating this event since December when we applied to the TD Friends of the Environment Foundation Tree Planting Grant Program. This is provided via the Girl Guides of Canada program and allows for both individual and multiple units to work together and apply. Individual units are eligible to receive grants of \$500 and Units working together can qualify grants of up to \$2,500.

Luckily, we were eligible for the \$2,500 grant where the girls from 6 units came out to help plant all the trees that were purchased with the grant.

The TD FEF Tree Planting Grant Program offers girls and young women a hands-on way to raise their awareness of environmental issues while supporting them to transform green spaces in their communities. Through

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grants of up to \$2,500 for girl-led tree planting and greening projects, this environmental initiative helps to bring girls and nature closer together as they make their communities greener and more livable.

By participating in the program, girls learned:

- About the trees and shrubs native to their community and how they support the local ecosystem
- How to plant trees and remove invasive species
- The issues around climate change and how tree planting combats those issues
- The importance of environmental stewardship
- · To connect with the earth through its most natural resources
- How to plan a successful community event

And how Grow Calgary helps local vulnerable Calgarians obtain fresh fruit and vegetables.

The girls spent the beautiful day digging holes, filling them with dirt and trees, watering all the plants on the acreage and planting some other things such as squash and potatoes. The girls came out of there with a sense of pride and accomplishment.

It was inspiring to see the girls getting dirty, having fun learning new skills, and using those skills to give back to their communities.

Thank you so much to 122nd Sparks, 142nd Sparks, 201st Brownies, 66th Guides, 60th Guides, and 278th Guides of the Wichewakn District for making this event a huge success. Thank you to Grow Calgary, TD FEF, and our parents for all their support.

City Council continues to be busy over the summer months making important decisions that will impact Calgarians for many years to come. One of these major decisions has been the approval of the Green Line LRT. On June 26, 2017 Council approved the recommended alignment and station locations for the Green Line LRT from 160th Avenue in the North to Seton in the South. However, with the revised plan to only build the Green Line LRT to 16th Avenue in the North, I voted against this alignment. I would have liked Council to look at alternatives that could have been less costly so that the Green Line LRT could be built further North to at least North Pointe where it could serve the communities of Ward 2.

Council also approved a motion to direct city administration to complete a risk assessment and to evaluate the merits of testing autonomous vehicles on Calgary's roadways. As technology advances in this area, I want to ensure that our roadways are safe for all drivers and pedestrians.

Fines for unsafe fire pits and burning prohibited materials have recently been increased. The regulations for fire pits include:

- Using a mesh screen or spark guard to reduce the spread of embers and sparks
- Extinguishing the flame by midnight on weekdays and 1 a.m. on weekends
- Restricting the height of the flame to one metre
- Ensuring the fire pit is at least two metres from other structures and is not under a tree or overhanging branches
- Ensuring you have a means of extinguishing the fire on hand and that you put it out before you leave it unattended

HOME GARDENING WITH BARBARA

Spring Flowering Bulbs

Gardeners have vision. All gardeners, not just the ones we admire and envy. You, me, the neighbour next door. What else would you call it when an ordinary person buys a bag of bulbs in the fall, buries them in the ground, and believes they will produce amazing blooms in 7 or 8 months?

The garden centres will have an abundance of bulbs in stock soon and your biggest decision is what to choose. There are literally thousands of bulbs on the shelves and most of us have limited garden space. The most common hardy spring-flowering bulbs for a Calgary garden are tulip, narcissus/daffodil, allium, iris, crocus, grape hyacinth and squill. The last three are petite and bloom early in the spring, the others show up later, and the irises finish their display in June. Technically, iris grows from a rhizome, but you can treat it like a bulb when planting in the fall. In addition to this list, you can find many more exotic bulbs, just don't expect them to return year after year in our climate.

There are two kinds of tulips that survive here: species (or native) and hybridized. The species tulips should spread into established colonies, returning every year. The large hybrids are more showy and popular with gardeners, but often are best only their first year. My wonderful show of huge pink tulips a few years ago has never been repeated and I fondly remember them as annuals.

If you wish to have a show of continuous color throughout the spring (of course you do) read the labels carefully, and choose from early, mid and late spring varieties. Then check the labels again for height, as they come in 6" all the way to 28" sizes. How silly to put the tall ones in the front and the short ones behind out of sight. Then there are singles, doubles, lily-flowered, fringed and parrot types, to mention only a few. There are actually 15 divisions of tulip classifications, so it is no wonder the casual gardener gets a bit bewildered. Alliums, likewise, have many varieties, and provide colour between tulips and daffodils and later blooming summer flowers.


Bulbs of all varieties look best in mass plantings of solid colors or two complementary colors. No nice tidy



rows, please, unless they are being used for cut flowers; a block of color has far more impact. What colors you choose is strictly personal - plant what looks beautiful to your eye. A sunny spot is best, although some varieties are forgiving and will bloom later in partial shade. Because they are among the earliest color in our Chinook gardens, tulips partner nicely with other bulbs like Muscari (Grape Hyacinth), Scilla (Squill) and dwarf Narcissus.

Get your bulbs in the ground in Sept or October; they need some time to root before the ground freezes. If you share your garden with squirrels, cover the new planting with wire mesh secured by stakes or rocks to keep those little paws from digging them up. Squirrels are particularly fond of tulip bulbs. And while you are at it, be sure to add some new ones in your front yard for the pleasure of your friends and neighbours.


