There are other free family activities in Calgary. There are many interesting self-guided historical walking tours for which brochures are available to download from the City of Calgary website. If gardens interest you, visit the Reader Rock Gardens, Central Memorial Park, Beaulieu Gardens at Lougheed House, Stanley Park or Riley Park.

Calgary's bike and pedestrian pathway system is among the most extensive in North America. Scenic destinations that can only be reached by pathways include the top of Nose Hill and much of the shoreline of the Bow River, Elbow River and Glenmore Reservoir. Download a map from the City website and off you go!



# Brentwood News **Adieu to Cheri Macaulay**

talked to Cheri the day after she and her husband, Rob, took the first walk-through of their brand new 27<sup>th</sup> floor East Village condo. which was also practically the eve of their cross-country road trip. They purchased their home on Bulyea Road in 1987, embracing the 70's décor and the "fort" in the rafters of the garage with the belief that a "good house chooses you, you don't choose the house." In the same way. it seems Brentwood chose Cheri for its own as well.

After a few years away from home. Cheri became very actively involved in the community. Around 1997 and for thee years, she organized a Calgary Food Bank fundraiser, "Host for Hunger" barbecue, which served up hot dogs while neighbours brought cash or food donations.

Cheri realized that "a community needs gathering places to bring people together", so when she, Lee Hunt and Polly Lee Knowlton Cockett formed the Brentwood Mural Committee in 2004, the projects were not only meant to deter graf-

fiti on community buildings, but also to bring residents together to create lasting connections. The murals were completed in 2004 at Northmount and Brisebois, 2005 at Northmount and Charleswood and 2006 at the Nose Hill Library. The completion of each project was celebrated with a street party to which the entire neighbourhood was invited. These celebrations lead to several annual fall street parties all held in the parking lot between the Nose Hill Library and Sir Winston Churchill Recreation Centre. The murals began as a solution to a problem. Not only was the problem solved, but the project turned into a catalyst for community development, resulting in connections to different groups and leading to other projects such as the Whispering Woods signs, the Community Garden and the Garden Party. "It's like sourdough starter, you feed it, and it keeps growing and giving", says Cheri.

Cheri hosted the Jane's Walk in Brentwood in 2009. At the time, she stated her mission for Calgary: "People are coming together in Brentwood and communities across the city, hungry to connect with each other and eager to engage in the building of stronger communities and ultimately a more caring, sustainable and vibrant city for our future."

A few years later, Cheri brought the concept of the Little Free Library to Calgary. She says the two best things she and Rob ever did at their Bulyea home were put up the Little Free Library and build a deck in the front yard. Both present a friendly invitation to stop, meet people and chat. This leads to a sense of community and develops resiliency in a neighbourhood. In the same vein, Cheri and Kirsten Horel brought MONdays (Meet Our Neighbours Day) to Brentwood, where people head out for a walk on MONday evenings at 7:00 to meet and chat. Cheri wanted to "give people any excuse to stop and talk to each other because they are starving for contact." Along the way Cheri also served as the Editor of the Brentwood Bugle for many years and started a Facebook page and a Twitter account to keep Brentwood residents connected.

In 2008. Cheri became involved in the Brentwood Transit Oriented Development Plan. It was a mammoth undertaking, and Cheri realized the potential to revitalize the community and bring in new people. "Change is hard and emotional, but it is inevitable. You can work with it, but you can't stop it. Use your energy wisely to create the best possible change." With this in mind, Cheri devoted several years and many hours working toward the best possible outcome for our community.

The latest project for Cheri was the Blakiston Park Redevelopment. She is "beyond excited" about this project, for which planning began seven years ago. The park improvement shows "a tangible benefit of increased density in Brentwood, and is the perfect spot to knit together the new and old" areas of the community.

As Cheri says, "Brentwood has it all—people should want to be here. There are numerous benefits for everyone." Thanks to Cheri and dedicated community-minded people like her, we can keep Brentwood beautiful, vibrant and resilient for the future. Cheri, we appreciate all your work, your vision for our future, and for showing us many ways to keep connected to each other as friends and neighbours. Best wishes in your new digs--any neighbourhood that chooses you is lucky to have vou. We know vou will be back to Blakiston Park, so see you there!

### **NORTHMOUNT DRIVE** IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

At least 150 people poured into the Brentwood Sportsplex Banquet Hall on Thursday, June 23 to participate in a City sponsored public workshop. This meeting was regarding the bike lanes scheduled to begin on Northmount Drive in 2017. The street is already slated to be re-paved in 2017, so the bike lanes will be established at that time.

Attendees were seated at tables of 8 to 10 along with 1 or 2 City reps. Here we were asked to discuss such topics as effects on parking, congestion at intersections, plus bus stop locations – both City buses and school buses.

The small groups then reported their findings to the full group.

The City of Calgary staff will use participant comments to identify the concerns and problems which the bike lanes might create for area residents. There will be a follow up meeting for our community in the fall.



While picking the haskap berries in mid-June, I remembered how the bushes had looked in April when they were in full bloom and covered with bees. In two short months, the berries were ready for harvesting. The haskap's only rival in April was the flowering Mayday tree whose fragrance enveloped the entire garden. Watching the changes in the rest of the garden during that time reminds us of the life cycle of so many different plants – the apple trees, cherry bushes and cranberry bushes moving from delicate white flowers to early cherries, apples and cranberries; the rhubarb plants growing vigorously; the strawberries beginning to flower; herbs sprouting; raspberries trying to claim the entire perimeter bed; the perennial flowers - clematis, iris, lupine, columbine, globeflower, coral bells, potentilla – adding splashes of brilliant colour while emerging vegetables in the garden beds show varying shades of green. A few colourful annual flowers, including pansies and marigolds, are also peppered throughout the perimeter bed and in several of the garden beds.

A microcosm of this cycle is beautifully displayed in an area on the south side of our perimeter bed dedicated to native wild flowers. This area was established in 2013 by Pat and Alvin Fedkenheuer, with a donation from the Innes family and input from Margaret Russell and Linda Rands, two of our most experienced gardeners. All strong advocates for preserving Alberta's native wild flowers, they selected plants that would provide blooms for the entire season. The tiny, delicate shooting stars emerge early (photo) and are largely gone by mid-June; the reddish-purple three flowered aven (old man's whiskers) overlaps with the shooting stars and blooms well into June; Jacob's ladder produces masses of beautiful blue flowers in May and June and is followed quickly by the wild blue flax with its delicate pale blue flowers. At the time of writing in late June, the pink flowers of the mountain hollyhock are open, enticing the bees to return. Next to flower may be the Canadian anemone, perhaps in time for Canada Day!



### From Emerald to Edinburgh: **Golden Local Youth**

On Friday, June 24, 2016, two Brentwood youth mixed with royalty when receiving their Gold Awards directly from HRH The Prince Edward, Earl of Wessex at The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award ceremony. Both Mark Dumaine and Audrey Lane Cockett independently completed their Gold levels during their Grade 12 years at Sir Winston Churchill High School (SWC), in 2016 and 2010 respectively. Both also attended local Simon Fraser (SF) and Dr. Coffin (Dr C) Schools, as did Audrey Lane's brothers, Grayson and Rowan Cockett, who also received their Gold Awards from Prince Edward the last time he was in Calgary, in June 2009. Mark's sister Kate may see HRH for her Gold the next time, as she has completed her Bronze, and is working on her Silver. The Bronze, Silver, and Gold levels each involve sustained community service, skill development, and physical recreation, as well as an adventurous journey; the Gold level also requires a residential project.

Opportunities through the Brentwood community and schools were pivotal in successfully completing the demanding program. For example, at age 14, Mark started his D of E at the Bronze level through SF, and was involved in their Grade 9 SALTS West Coast sailing program, as was Audrey Lane. Mark also volunteered for three years at Millennium Kidz Out of School Care program at Dr C, through the ongoing support and encouragement of neighbour, Director and Co-Owner, Wendy Haskayne. Audrey Lane – who was once a babysitter for Mark and Kate - developed her Skill component through both the Sports Medicine program at SWC, and through opportunities provided by the Brentwood community soccer program encouraging the training and hiring of youth as referees. Mark also volunteered for the Calgary Food Bank, and Audrey Lane volunteered for Habitat for Humanity in Guatemala – generously supported by many neighbours.

Mark's adventurous journeys and residential project took him further afield: to the Yukon with Muktuk Adventures for winter dog sledding along the Takhini River and summer volunteering, caring for the dog teams in remote locations; and to Okanagan Wildbrush Honey to learn about bee husbandry in support of local agriculture and food sustainability. Along the way, Mark developed his Skill through his guitar playing. These creative and practical experiences within diverse settings in three provinces will also serve Mark well as he heads to the University of Calgary in September to study Commerce. Audrey Lane's





adventurous canoe journeys and residential project were undertaken in the nearby Rockies, primarily through leadership programs at Camp Chief Hector, a follow on from the Outdoor School program through DrC, which Mark also attended.

While 'awaiting' her opportunity for a royal Gold Award ceremony, Audrey Lane continued in the spirit of the D of E suite of holistic challenges while completing her BSc in Geography and Environmental Studies at the University of Victoria, volunteering and working for three summers with the Heltsiuk Nation Qgs Projects Society: Supporting Youth, Culture, and Environment on the Central Coast of BC. While in Victoria, Audrey Lane also became deeply involved in Spoken Word poetry, an art and skill she has brought back with her to Calgary. Currently she is working as a Naturalist in The Weaselhead, will participate as a poet in the Canadian Wilderness Artist Residency in the Yukon this summer, and will compete as part of Calgary's Poetry Slam Team at the upcoming Nationals in Winnipeg.

This is not the first time that Mark and Audrey Lane have been to an awards ceremony together. In 2005, both were part of the school-community-city group that received an Alberta Emerald Award for Environmental Excellence for the Centennial Natureground prairie reclamation project and a decade of ecoinitiatives at DrC. Both have schoolwork featured on Whispering Signs in Brentwood Heights. Mark's Grade 2 artwork - part of an early literacy project with teacher Donna Hamby - appears on the Dd is for dark red dogwood dye sign in the Centennial Natureground. Although the sign was placed right by a lovely red osier dogwood bush, the resident northern pocket gopher decided its roots were rather tasty and alas, it disappeared! With new native shrub plantings being planned for the Natureground soon, we are hoping a new clump of dogwoods will honour Mark's sign once again. Audrey Lane's early interest in poetry can also be traced to Donna Hamby's Grade 1/2 class, and a subsequent Grade 6 science fair poem appears on the Aliens Amongst Us! sign in Whispering Woods, a still relevant statement of the problem of invasive plant management in our remnant rough fescue grassland:

Nose Hill has many features, such as free parking, hiking, off-leash area, washrooms, wildlife spotting, interpretive signs, native grasslands, larger mammals such as deer and coyotes. You can also find geocaches, tipi rings and a medicine wheel.

At Nose Hill the City of Calgary also offers Agents of Discovery, through which kids learn more, have more fun and feel more connected to nature. The program encourages outdoor discovery through interactive fun. Children can become "agents of nature" and solve challenges. Access to Nose Hill and the codes for the app can be accessed from the parking lot off Berkley Gate. Then the whole family can unlock some mysteries of nature. Speaking of city parks and other green spaces, after the City decided to end the Adopt-a-Park program, there were a few complaints about the adopted areas. The residents involved were proud of how beautiful and green their neighborhoods were through the help of this volunteer program. If this program has been replaced due to more stringent water management, how can we keep the neighbourhoods looking green and nice so the residents continue to be proud of them?

The General Manager of Community Services responded that the Adopt-a-Park program came into effect in 1984 and was discontinued in 2015. It served a very good purpose and encouraged pride in community, but there were several issues with the program, such as the possible wasteful use of water, safety, collective agreements, and some centralized pieces of the services that the City provides.

So the program was replaced with two new programs. The Green Leaders Program for community volunteers provides oversight for enhancement projects in the community, such as painting park benches or weeding. The second project, Water Stewards, will have volunteers focus mostly on keeping the city's many high-use playing fields watered.

Both programs are trying to address some of the issues that had emerged, but also respond to the community desire to continue to care for and have pride in, their community with a more focused, targeted, and supportive approach. The General Manager noted that the programs will be evaluated over the course of 2016.

#### **Alberta Health Services**

With the return of summer weather, Alberta Health Services EMS would like to remind everyone to stay safe in the heat and sun this season. While children and the elderly may be more susceptible to the effects of heat and sun, basic prevention measures should be taken by all to avoid a heat related illness during periods of hot and humid weather.

#### Heat exhaustion

- · Heat exhaustion can occur due to excessive fluid loss during periods of prolonged sweating in a hot and/or humid environment (indoors or outdoors).
- Patients may suffer headaches, weakness, fatigue, nausea/ vomiting, thirst, chills and profuse sweating.
- The patient is usually cold and damp to the touch and the skin may appear pale or dusky gray.

#### Heat stroke

- · Heat stroke is a medical emergency which, without prompt treatment, could be fatal.
- It occurs when the body can't cool itself naturally (e.g. perspiration). The body's temperature will continue to rise to dangerous levels.
- Due to severe dehydration and the inability to sweat, the patient may appear flushed and skin may be hot and dry to the touch.

#### First aid

- First aid for all heat related illnesses begins with removing or sheltering the patient from the hot environment.
- · Remove excess or tight fitting clothing and allow the patient to rest in a cool environment.
- If the patient is conscious and alert, provide suitable fluids such as water, juice or a sports drink.
- If you are concerned, seek medical attention or call 9-1-1.

#### Prevention

- Stay well-hydrated by drinking plenty of water.
- Be aware that excessive alcohol consumption will **promote** dehydration.
- Always wear a broad brimmed hat to keep the sun off your face and neck.
- Apply waterproof sunscreen with an SPF of 50+, especially for children. The sun's UV rays peak between 10 am-4 pm even on cloudy days.

### **Property Tax Assistance Program**

Property Tax Assistance Program: Help is available. The City of Calgary may provide a grant/credit of the increase in residential property taxes from 2015 to 2016.

To be eligible, the applicant must:

- Experience an increase in property taxes from 2015 to 2016.
- Live in the principal residence for a minimum of one year.
- Own no other property.
- Must meet low income guidelines of the Fair Entry Program. Visit calgary.ca/FairEntry or call 311.
- Provide an acceptable proof of household income for all members 18 years of age and older. Visit calgary.ca/ **FairEntry** or call 311.
- · Apply for the grant/credit by Dec. 1, 2016. Visit calgary.ca/FairEntry or call 311.
- Even if you are not eligible for the Property Tax Assistance Program, we may be able to help you access

other community resources.

Please note: Even though an application has been made to the Property Tax Assistance Program, all property taxes must be paid in full by the due date, June 30, 2016, to avoid a seven per cent penalty.

# The scoop on dog poop

With 150 public off-leash areas and over 100,000 dogs in our city, it's clear Calgarians love their canine companions. What isn't to love is the stinky situation left behind when owners don't pick up after their pets.

Cleaning up your dog's waste helps keep our yards, parks and off-leash areas safe and healthy, and is part of being a responsible pet owner.

Here are five facts you may not know about doggy doodoo:

- 1. It's classified as a hazardous pollutant. It's in the same category as toxic chemicals!
- 2. It's crawling with E. coli and often contains roundworm larvae which, if ingested by humans or dogs, can lead to brain, eye and other organ damage.
- 3. It's not a good fertilizer. Its high nutrient content is toxic to lawns and will create "hot spots" causing the grass to burn and discolour.
- 4. It doesn't absorb into the soil, so the risk of spreading its harmful effects can linger for years!
- 5. It attracts mice, covotes and other wildlife that consider it a delicious snack.

Keeping our city pet-waste free is easy, if we all do our part. Always carry pet waste bags with you when you walk your dog, and pick up and properly dispose of your pet's waste as soon as possible.

# **Backyard Fire Safety tips** from your Calgary Fire **Department**


Enjoying a recreational fire in your backyard can be a great way to spend a summer's evening. Here are some Safety and bylaw considerations for you.

- · Always confirm that a Fire Ban is not in effect before starting a fire for recreational purposes.
- Fires may only be burned in fire pits between 10 a.m. and 1 a.m.

#### Rules for fire pits

- 1. Backyard fire pits should be built into the ground, on brick or stone, or in a fire-proof container. Portable fire pits may be used on a deck as long as they sit on brick or stone, and not directly on your wooden deck. Always refer to the Fire pit manufacturer for approved fir pit locations.
- 2. Fire pits must be at least two metres away from your property line, house, garage, or fence.
- 3. Fire pits must **NOT** be under any trees, branches, plants or other materials that can catch fire.
- 4. All fires in your fire pit must be kept to a reasonable size; 1 metre high and wide. This helps to ensure embers, sparks or smoke don't harm anyone or cause a nuisance to your neighbours.
- 5. Only burn clean, dry firewood. **Do NOT burn:**
- Wood that is painted, treated or contains glue or
- Wet or green/fresh cut wood
- Yard waste (cut grass or leaves)
- Garbage
- Rubber or plastic
- Furniture
- 6. Always have a way to extinguish the fire in the event of an emergency. Easy options are having your watering hose or a bucket of water nearby.
- 7. All fires in your fire pit must never be left unattend-

Aside from safety considerations, not following these rules can lead to fines of \$500, \$1000 or even \$5000. For more information, go to Calgary.ca/fire.



Canadians love to grill.

And rightfully so – there's nothing quite like a summer barbecue with family and friends.

So I know being told to limit barbecuing meat can be tough to hear. But studies have shown that eating a lot of well-done and charred meat cooked at high temperatures may increase your risk of developing certain cancers, such as colorectal cancer.

That's because cooking meat, poultry and fish at high temperatures – including barbecuing, broiling and frying - creates chemicals that are associated with an increased risk of developing cancer.

I'm not telling you to stop grilling outright - instead, cut back on how much barbecued meat you eat.

And when you do fire up the barbecue, follow these Canadian Cancer Society tips to safely prepare your grilled food:

- Marinate meat, poultry and fish in vinegar or lemon juice and your favourite herbs before cooking. This will reduce the formation of the chemicals that increase the risk of cancer.
- · Choose lean cuts of meat, poultry and seafood over higher-fat meat, and trim off any visible fat (including the skin from poultry). This will reduce the amount of harmful chemicals from the smoke created by burning
- Barbecue slowly and prevent charring by keeping the food away from the hot coals so that flames are less likely to engulf the food.
- Skewer a kebab. Smaller cuts of meat cook faster. which means there is less time for chemicals to form.
- Partially cook your meat before throwing it on the grill. The less time your meat is on the grill, the less it will be exposed to chemicals.

Bonus tip: Learn to enjoy slow cooking. Choose to cook your meats at lower temperatures by braising, stewing, steaming or roasting more often. Then serve with a side of barbecued vegetables - most experts agree plant-based foods do not form cancer-causing chemicals when cooked at high temperatures. Grilled fruit is also delicious for dessert.





#### **Biodiversity**

The dog days of summer are the perfect time to think about critters. While Calgary is home to 1.2 million humans, we rarely think about the countless other species of flora and fauna that far outnumber us.

"Biodiversity" is the term we use to describe the variety and richness of living organisms and habitats. With 80% of Canadians now living in urban areas, reasonable protection of biodiversity is becoming increasingly important for municipal governments to ensure that we maintain a healthy ecology.

Last year, Calgary City Council approved Our Biodiversity, Calgary's 10-year biodiversity strategic plan. The plan is based on principles for the protection, development, and management of Calgary parks and ecosystems in support of biodiversity.

Biodiversity project goals:

- 1. Evaluate landscapes in Calgary and set targets for conservation measures to identify, protect, and manage ecological cores and corridors:
- 2. Restore 20 per cent of Calgary's current open space to increase biodiversity;
- 3. Identify and manage invasive species in Calgary's open space.

The City will implement the plan through a variety of initiatives. This summer, Calgary Parks launched a pilot project using a herd of goats to manage invasive plant species in Confluence Park. This creative approach to weed control not only reduced the need for pesticides, but also improved the health of native ecosystems by reducing overgrowth and encouraging the growth of non-invasive plants.

The City is also working to turn back the progress that invasive species have made over the years. Efforts to combat smooth brome, a highly competitive grass that smothers native species, and Canada thistle are underway. We are also re-introducing native species into our parks and landscaping projects. Native species are naturally suited to the local climate and require less care over time.

For Calgarians interested in enhancing biodiversity closer to home, the City has numerous resources to help enhance biodiversity in your own yard. A good place to start is www.calgary. ca/yardsmart. There, you can find tips on how to transform your garden into an inviting landscape that will inspire both your neighbours and wildlife.

# The Over-achieving **Swainson's Hawk**

Swainson's Hawks are commonly seen raptors that live in southern Alberta from May – October. They are a medium sized hawk (50 centimetres long) that can be identified by a distinctive dark reddish bib on their chest, pointed wingtips (in flight) and dark bars on the underside of their tails. Swainson's Hawks live in prairie and grasslands, including crop and grazing lands.

#### **Fun Facts:**

- Swainson's Hawks have one of the longest migratory routes of any North American raptor.
- These hawks can travel over 20,000 km annually between their breeding grounds in Alberta and their wintering grounds in South America (Uruguay, Paraguay and Argentina).
- The diet of a Swainson's Hawk changes depending on the time of year.
- · When nesting in the summer months, they eat rodents but Swainson's Hawks switch to grasshoppers in September and October (about 100 per day!) in order to transition to their largely insectivore diet in South America.
- · Look out for these hawks in farmer's fields in the au-
