

Development at Brisebois and Northmount Drives

An estimated 200 people attended the November 25th Development Open House held at the Brentwood Elementary School gym. The gym was decidedly lively as Brentwoodians took the opportunity to view displays and ask questions regarding the proposed re-zoning and development on the NW corner of Northmount and Brisebois (the former service station site).

Displays were provided by Norr Architects and Lupi Construction who have asked The City to re-zone the site from CN2 to CCOR1 which would allow a development to the height of 50 feet (15 meters) which is the equivalent of 5 storeys. A second display was arranged by a neighbourhood group opposed to the re-zoning. This group is asking that The City keep the zoning as it is currently which allows a maximum of 32 feet (10 meters), the equivalent to 3 storeys.

Members of THE CITY OF CALGARY PLANNING DEPART-MENT were also present to speak with attendees, as were Councillors Druh Farrell and Sean Chu. Reporters from Ch. 3 and Ch. 6 were also on hand.

This matter has now gone to The City of Calgary Planning Department and it is estimated that it will proceed to Council in February 2016.



Philharmonic Violinists Delight at Nose Hill Library

WOW! It was standing room only at the Nose Hill Library on November 13 as a large crowd gathered to enjoy a concert performed by two violinists from the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra (CPO).

The sun was shining through the large skylight, folks were sitting, standing, and leaning, as Steven Lubiarz and David Lakirovish launched immediately into their music. They played music by classical composers Bach, Pleyel, Bartok, Dancla, and Mozart, then wrapped up with two show tunes – "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" and "New York, New York".

During a guestion period, Steven told the audience that he had started playing the violin at age 5 and has been a member of the CPO since 2003. He gave a wonderfully detailed description of the shape of a violin – comparing it to the human body with its neck, ears, back, ribs, belly, and fingers. David spoke of the "heart and soul of a violin". He also told us that he has been playing the violin since he was 3 years old!

Asked about purchase costs, Steven observed that, "a bow can cost more than a violin", while David added that, "a violin can cost more than a house".

Ouestioned as to the work schedule for a member of the CPO, both violinists outlined a typical week as consisting of Sunday and Monday – off, Tuesday – one rehearsal, Wednesday and Thursday – two rehearsals per day, Friday – dress rehearsal (and often times also a performance), Saturday – performance. The week that David and Steven were at Nose Hill Library, the schedule was even more complicated as the CPO was rehearsing music for four totally different performances.

Being a CPO musician is a demanding way of life, but both Steven and David obviously thrive on it. Their enthusiasm – in both playing and speaking – was clearly conveyed to the SRO audience!

As Calgary continues to grow, its transportation system needs to grow along with it. Work on two major transportation projects continues through the consultation process.

The Green Line: More than just a train

With key decisions on the Green Line expected in Fall 2016, crucial public engagement sessions are being planned. I am doing a lot of homework as well. In August, I joined City staff and two Council colleagues on a brief tour of Vancouver, Seattle, and Portland, to meet their rail experts and learn from their experiences. From each city, we learned about key elements of successful projects and how to avoid pitfalls.

I boiled down all the information from our trip into eight essential lessons and presented them at the Central Library Dutton Theatre in November and again in December. Here are the top three lessons:

Consult, consult, and consult: All three cities stressed the need for, and benefits of, meaningful consultation with the neighbouring businesses and communities. Their ideas will be critical in order to maximize benefits and avoid costly mistakes. The Green Line will be the largest infrastructure project in Calgary's history by three times! While we are excited to get started on the Green Line, it is important that we make thoughtful decisions.

Leverage opportunities: The Green Line is more than just a rail project. It will forever change how Calgarians move about their city and the very nature of the communities along side. From affordable housing, to high environmental standards, how can the advantages of this massive project extend beyond simple transportation?

Take care of business: Construction of the Green Line will take many years and cause major disruption. Taking an example in Portland, Council enthusiastically supported my request for a Business Support Program.



Answer: In late September, 2015, members of the Blood Tribe built a traditional medicine wheel of rocks in the shape of a circle (Siksikaitsitapi logo) of all 4 tribes: Siksika, Blood, Northern and Southern Peigan. It represents the north, south, east, and west, a spiritual location.

This landmark project was part of the annual Siksikaitsitapi Blackfoot Confederacy Conference. The Native Heritage Site is a sacred place. The wheel provides for physical, emotional, mental, and spiritual dimensions.

Nose Hill was chosen for the site of the medicine wheel because of its cultural significance to the Blackfoot. Because it provides a view of the valley, Nose Hill was used as a lookout used for observing other tribes and hunting game during the summer and winter. Celestial or astronomical events (such as vision quests, stars, sunrises, solstices, and sun dances) inspired ceremonies in nature for large social groups.

Most known medicine wheels are in Alberta, but they have also been found across the northern plains of North America and date back some 4500 years. The wheel on Nose Hill is divided into four to represent the 4 Blackfoot tribes. A rock cairn is located at the centre, where suitable offerings may be placed. Spokes go out from the centre; "4" is a sacred number, whether for directions, seasons, elements, life states; kingdoms, or medicines such as sweetgrass, cedar, willow, and sage.

Whether you walk or bike, remember the wheel is for everybody to enjoy, to count our blessings, for the circle of life; many people offer thoughts, prayers or songs when they visit. Remember the intention is to be thankful.
