



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

"The goal of Nose Hill Park is to perpetuate the natural character of the landscape while providing compatible, quality recreational opportunities" (Nose Hill Natural Area Management Plan 1994). Some of these opportunities are hiking, cycling, running and dog-walking. However, there is work to do in protecting this precious natural grassland through conservation of its ecologically significant areas.

A restoration plan was proposed to close park trails with damaged vegetation for rehabilitation and reseeding, remove priority areas of brome and replace with native grasses. This restoration is now underway so there will be the potential for repopulating ground-nesting birds such as the sharp-tailed grouse.

Nose Hill is a source of wildlife study, an historical resource, as well as a green space for people to experience nature. It is important for wellness, where people can experience outdoor activities, especially during times of economic stress. The Hill is a winter birding location for certain species, particularly raptors. In summer the prairie habitat attracts 14 species of sparrow. It is an accessible native grassland area. Some species are no longer present due to changing vegetation, human impact, and the overall decline in grasslands.

On another note, the Biodiversity Policy was approved by Calgary City Council in March, 2015. There are four principles: ecological literacy, resilience, collaboration, and integration. The first is to support biodiversity by knowledge and understanding about ecology, personal stewardship, and Calgary's natural heritage.

The Advisory Committee on Biodiversity meets monthly

and one subcommittee fosters ecological literacy, which means to promote public understanding of biodiversity and ecology to encourage positive actions that support environmental conservation.

Some commitments are:

Develop volunteer initiatives and education programs to support stewardship and conservation with schools, communities, and citizens.

City staff, Council, businesses, and communities access training and information to promote the goals of biodiversity conservation, through buying practices, building and site design, open space planning and management. This includes an awareness of invasive species (weeds), habitat fragments and loss, and indirect pressures on biodiversity which cause ecological disruption.

Set objectives and targets for conservation across appropriate initiatives. Three new-on-the ground initiatives will be implemented within the ten years of the program.

Make biodiversity common in City decision-making. The aim is to restore degraded habitats and manage biodiversity of Calgary's open space and neighbourhoods.

Marie asked me to be certain that I mention how much she "appreciates how so many people help with Playgroup". Every special occasion - Valentine's, Easter, Halloween, Christmas - warrants a potluck luncheon which Marie coordinates. These themed events generally include some kind of special treat or gift for each child. (As an aside - Playgroup runs each Wednesday from September through June from 9:30 to 11:00 at the BCA Sportsplex Hall and costs \$65 per year per child. Children from birth to age 5 are welcome. Should you wish to try out one free session with your child, please contact Marie at mweninger100@hotmail.com).

Have I mentioned that in addition to raising 3 children and carrying two BCA portfolios, Marie also works as an R.N. at the Peter Lougheed Hospital Maternity Ward? Add to that the fact that Marie is currently working on her Master's Degree in Nursing. Where does she find the time and stamina?

Marie also volunteers at Dr. Coffin School which her daughters attend. At Coffin, Marie is a Room Parent, an assignment which includes finding volunteers to read with the children. She also helps out with the "Fun Lunches".

Marie commented that she and Paul (who coaches Brentwood Community soccer plus helps out with many "one time" activities) feel that their family has "benefitted so much from the Brentwood community". Both daughters play soccer and participate in Canskate. Rory can hardly wait to start soccer this spring. The family regularly visits the three nearby playgrounds, the indoor and outdoor ice rinks, and the Community Garden. All of the children take swim lessons at the SWC Fitness Centre, go sledding on the "community hill", and are at the Nose Hill Library "all the time".

Asked why she thinks it is so important to volunteer, Marie responded, "In order to have great programs and a great community, you first need keen volunteers." She added, "It is important because our family benefits and thus we need to give back".

Marie's energy and dedication are impressive! We at The Bugle thank Marie and all other volunteers for their dedication in contributing so much to our community. They enrich our lives plus their own.

We at the Brentwood Community Garden Group are already thinking about gardening...in the middle of winter! If you are also considering a place to grow veggies as well as 'grow' friendships, consider joining this friendly and enthusiastic group of gardeners. Contact Cheryl Moller at: cm.checky@gmail.com Having survived the January/February 'blues' by poring over seed catalogues, attending gardening workshops and designing our garden beds, by March we dedicated gardeners have a zillion ideas about what to plant. We may search for seeds at gardening places or attend "Seedy Saturday" for inspiration (which this year is held on March 19 from 10am to 3pm at the HillhurstSunnyside Community Centre).

Even with all this excitement brewing to grow food, you may think that it is too early to start planting. Well, think again! Here is an idea that my grandson and I have actually tried with great success. It will inspire youngsters to get excited about gardening. You will need a few simple tools (4 L milk jug, paring or utility knife, duct tape, scissors, and perhaps a cheap soldering iron). The link below will give exact instructions:

When I first heard this idea of putting seeds out in a snow drift I was skeptical. However, last March my grandson and I faithfully collected milk jugs, planted seeds and stuck the jugs out in a snow drift in a sheltered area. I merrily went off on a holiday. When I arrived back in April, we had this profusion of seedlings. I was hooked and so was my grandson. The next year he saved milk jugs all winter starting in January! Some advantages to winter sowing are that you can grow plants for the price of a seed package, put plants out earlier as



they are hardened already and clip off seedlings to eat. The bonus is to inspire the children. (Keep in mind that seeds that like cooler weather such as spinach, Swiss chard, peas, etc. work best).

So start saving milk jugs and get going early with your winter sowing!

This month we celebrated a number of remarkable birthday milestones in Varsity - including one resident who celebrated her 102nd Birthday in January. I have long been an advocate for managing the cost of Calgary's growth. After a decade of debate and billions of dollars added to The City's debt, City Council unanimously agreed to end the "sprawl subsidy" to ensure that growth pays for itself. I am extremely proud of this work.

Over the last year, The City worked closely with the urban and suburban development industries to establish an offsite levy to apply to all new developments. An important partnership emerged, one in which the industry agreed to become an enhanced steward of a growing City. The new rates took effect on February 1st of this year and will provide the City with a lot more financial flexibility.

As a result, levies paid by developers to The City will now cover the cost of infrastructure needed for new communities, as well as upgrades to infrastructure for established communities. Those costs have to be paid one way or another. With the new levy, the cost of necessary infrastructure is included in the purchase price, rather than hidden through property taxes or utility fees.

The key elements of the new off-site levy are:

Developers will pay for water and wastewater treatment in new and established communities city-wide;

Developer levies will cover the full cost of water distribution, wastewater collection, drainage, transportation (roads, intersections, traffic signals, bridges), and community services (libraries, police stations, fire halls) in new communities;

With this important policy established, the stage is set for the next steps. New development in established communities means real change for the residents who live there, and added wear and tear on public amenities. Increased density can also mean a dramatic increase in property tax revenue. As part of the levy discussion, The City agreed to work with the urban developers, and the communities experiencing redevelopment, to find ways to reinvest in aging infrastructure. Communities experiencing significant change will see a direct benefit, with improvements to valued amenities like parks, sidewalks, recreation centres, and libraries.

Over the next year, I will be meeting with Ward 7 communities to talk more about community improvements resulting from redevelopment.


