



DEVELOPMENT AND TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE (DTC)

Brentwood Co-op Redevelopment

The response from Brentwood residents throughout the City of Calgary public engagement program has been incredible! The City reported that 525 people participated directly, and 1486 ideas and comments were submitted. The DTC group also sent in our community response which you can read on our website.

From the City of Calgary website on this application: "The City is now working with the applicant to negotiate changes to the proposal based on The City's review and feedback from the public. Once a decision has been made, we will be sharing the final application, the results of public engagement and how we made our decision in an information session.

The application will then proceed to Calgary Planning Commission and then to City Council for a decision with an anticipated date sometime in Winter 2017/18.

All input gathered through all phases of engagement will also be used in reports provided to Calgary Planning Commission and City Council. You can still get involved by submitting your written comments to City Administration or members of Council, and by attending the Public Hearing of Council."

If you sign up with the City of Calgary, you will be kept informed of the latest updates on the proposal.

Northland Village Mall

The redevelopment of Northland Village mall will see the existing mall structure remaining in place throughout the initial phases of redevelopment as a number of smaller buildings are built around the perimeter of the mall. At present, the McDonald's and the A & W are the only developments that have commenced.

Northmount Drive Improvement Project

Phase 1, the 14th Street intersection area between Carol Drive (near C.B. Drive Inn) and Cambrian Drive. is complete. Curb extensions have also been placed along Northmount to improve pedestrian safety by reducing crossing distances, improving visibility and reducing vehicle speeds.

Future phases will be completed as the budget allows. There will be another meeting in the Spring (TBA) so watch for that date if you wish to comment on the current changes and future plans.

Secondary Suites

Applications for secondary suites will be posted on our website and the City of Calgary places signs in front of the applicant's property for about a two-week period. If you wish to comment on a proposed secondary suite near your property, the contact information will be available on our website. It is important that you comment within the allotted time period. Our website also has some information about suites under the FAQ section, including a link to the City of Calgary website.









We'll Miss That Smile!

"We miss her and her great smile". This sentiment was voiced repeatedly as I interviewed the family and neighbours of Joan Schauerte who passed away on September 1, 2017 at Dulcina Hospice.

Joan and her husband Lawrence (who died in 2015) moved into their Benson Road home in 1964. They borrowed money from Joan's dad to help with the down payment on their \$20,000 mortgage. Here they would raise their four much loved daughters—Pam, Patty, Sue, and Lorri.

The Schauerte home and yard guickly became the "hub" for neighbourhood children playing "Kick the Can", "Hide and Seek", and numerous other games. Joan was always welcoming and full of energy. Growing up, the girls recall Joan making Halloween costumes for them, always welcoming their friends (especially with food!), or later on coming to drive them home from a party if they or a designated driver had over imbibed.

Joan and Lawrence were equally involved when their seven grandchildren came along. They tried to attend all of the grandchildren's activities—be it sports, camping, art shows, concerts, even an African Violet show!

Joan was also active in our Brentwood Community Association. Initially, she was on the committee established to determine the boundaries between Brentwood and Charleswood. She was a Director on the BCA Board and for many years worked with Brownies and Girl Guides. Needless to say, all four of Joan's daughters were Brownies and Guides! (As an aside—next summer. the Girl Guides organization will honour Joan by adding her name to their plaque in Cochrane's Memorial Park.)

This sense of community was further exemplified when Joan and Lawrence purchased a \$100 debenture to help the fundraising effort to build our Brentwood Sportsplex in the 1970s.

Joan was also an active teacher having taught and subbed for some 55 years! She taught at Corpus Christi, St. Margaret's, St. Paul's, and St. Peter's. She "loved the kids" and was well loved in return. Joan's daughters recall that one former student who, when dying of cancer, made a special request to see his favourite teacher again. Needless to say, Joan paid him a visit. Likewise, when Joan became a patient at Dulcina Hospice, a group of her former students went to visit. Over 30 messages have been entered on The Calgary Herald condolences website—with many being from Joan's former students. One writer exemplified many when he observed, "My son started school yesterday. If, over the course of his entire school career, he has even one teacher as gifted as Joan Schauerte, he will be blessed."

Neighbours have fond memories of Joan. Jan and Ted Stewart recall attending many dances, parties, and fundraisers with Joan and Lawrence. The Stewarts considered Joan and Lawrence "the best of neighbours." Young neighbour Alasdair told me, "Grandma Joan was so nice. She let her grandson Carson and me dig a big hole in her back yard. She just smiled." Alasdair's sister, Sarah, remembers, "We made a bird house with Grandma Joan and Papa Lawrence. Papa Lawrence showed me how to use a hammer and Grandma Joan let us paint the houses. 'Good job', she said to me and smiled."

Likewise, Annmarie Millius has special memories of Joan. Annmarie particularly remembers the year she attended morning kindergarten in Brentwood's "Old Hall". On occasion, Joan (whom she referred to as "Mrs. Joan") would invite Annmarie over for afternoon tea. Annmarie would don her special red velvet dress and join Mrs. Joan for afternoon tea served in **real** cups and saucers. She also remembers being about age 11 when she received an autograph book as a gift from Joan. Joan had written the first entry, "May your life be like a rose—ever unfolding to reveal the beauty within".

Yes, Joan will be greatly missed. She was incredibly dedicated over her 53 years in Brentwood—to her family, her teaching, her neighbours, her community. That great dedication all carried out with her amazing smile.

We at The Bugle extend our condolences to Joan's family and friends in the loss of a special person.

DINNER IS ON THE TABLE



Pork Lo Mein

The leftover recipes continue because I am certain you have some sort of leftover meat in your fridge right now.

This month's focus is on leftover pork, which I had some trouble with simply because leftover pork is not something I find myself with often. Typically, when I cook pork chops or pork tenderloin there is usually not enough left over for me to create a new meal. If I do happen to have a little leftover pork, I usually turn it into pork fried rice, tacos, or I shred it up and toss it with sautéed onions and BBO sauce and serve it on a fresh bun, for a nice, guick lunch.

Every month I cook the recipe that I am going to submit for this article. "Why?", you ask. First of all, so you can see the meal you are getting yourself into. Second, to make sure the recipe is accessible to everyone and doesn't need any changes like less spice or salt.

Last night, we deliberately made an extra pork chop, so I could turn the leftovers into this Pork Lo Mein. The reason I picked this recipe was because I wanted something authentic in flavour but somewhat simple to make. It's a little extra work to get the sauce together, but it is worth the end result. Feel free to use whatever vegetables you have on hand or buy a bag of pre-cut stir fry vegetables sold in the produce section at your grocery store. Either way I think you will enjoy it.

Ingredients

Leftover Pork Lo Mein (Serves 3) double recipe to serve 6

½ pound lo mein noodles or spaghetti

½ pound leftover pork

1 ½ tablespoons sugar

1 ½ tablespoons soy sauce

1 ½ tablespoons oyster sauce

1 tablespoon balsamic vinegar

2 teaspoons toasted sesame oil

1 tablespoon rice vinegar

2 teaspoons fish sauce

2 teaspoons cornstarch

3 or 4 tablespoons canola oil

1 knob fresh ginger, peeled and minced (about 1 tablespoon)

2 medium garlic cloves, minced

2 scallions, white parts cut in 1-inch pieces, light green parts very thinly sliced

34 cup mushrooms quartered

³/₄ cup small broccoli florets

1 cup julienned or grated carrots

34 cup red or orange peppers thinly sliced

Directions:

In a medium bowl, whisk together the sugar, soy sauce, oyster sauce, vinegar, sesame oil, wine, fish sauce and cornstarch until sugar is dissolved. Set sauce aside.

Bring a pot of salted water to a boil and cook noodles according to package directions.

Drain noodles. Pour and mix in a small amount of canola oil in so the noodles do not stick together. Set aside.

Slice or shred leftover pork into thin strips and stir with 2 tablespoons of sauce until covered. Set aside.

If using fresh pork, slice into thin strips and season with salt and pepper and 2 tablespoons of sauce. Set aside.

In large skillet, heat 1 tablespoon canola oil over medium-high heat until shimmering. Add ginger, garlic and white scallion pieces and stir-fry for 30 seconds. Increase heat to high and add mushrooms. Fry until golden, add broccoli and carrots and stir fry until just starting to soften—3 to 5 minutes. Lastly, toss in peppers and fry for 1 minute. Transfer to a plate.

Add 1 tablespoon oil to wok or skillet and heat over high heat until smoking. Add pork, spreading it out in a single layer and let cook until crispy and brown, 1 to 2 minutes or 3 to 4 minutes if using fresh pork. Continue to cook, stirring and tossing for about 1 minute longer. Transfer to plate with vegetables.

Wipe out wok or skillet, then add remaining 1 tablespoon oil and heat over high heat until smoking. Add noodles and cook, tossing and stirring, until hot.

Add remaining sauce, vegetables, and pork to noodles and toss well over heat to combine. Transfer lo mien to a platter or serve right out of the pan and sprinkle sliced green scallions all over. Serve right away.

Late October is upon us again and Thanksgiving celebrations are giving way to pumpkins, ghosts and goblins as Hallowe'en comes closer. Activity at the garden has lessened. Fall plantings of garlic and spring bulbs have been completed and we are now waiting for the winter season. There is very little colour left at the garden, except for the persistent high bush cranberries (see photo) which will last long into the winter months. The compost bins are still being fed with left over garden plants and autumn leaves and should yield some lovely compost in the spring. After the end of October, we also hope to see the bins augmented by pumpkin remnants as they break down very quickly and provide a good source of food for our composting bacteria. Although the composting process slows down during the winter months, it does continue at a reduced rate and the freeze/thaw cycle assists in breaking down any food or plant scraps.

Our Harvest potluck dinner was held at the Brentwood Sportsplex on September 30th and was very well attended. A huge thanks goes to Larysa Hart, who is one of our gardeners as well as the current BCA Playgroup Coordinator, who did an amazing job arranging the activities for all of the children. In addition, we were grateful for the generous door prize donations we received from Brentwood Coop, Brentwood Safeway, Starbucks and Prairie Mill Bread Company.



The students at Dr. Coffin School have been enjoying all the new line games painted on their freshly paved playground. After the schoolyard was resurfaced this summer, the students brainstormed a variety of things they wanted to see added to this fresh canvas. Snakes and ladders, four square, a swirling alphabet, animal tracks, as well as a basketball court are a few of the many things students can now enjoy at recess. Thankfully, the nice autumn weather permitted students to reap the benefits of this rejuvenation effort in the form of physical activity.

Our school community is growing, and we have experienced an increase in our Grade 1 and 2 student populations. As a result of additional Classroom Improvement Funding, we are now able to reorganize our Grade 1 and 2 students into three classrooms for the remainder of this year. This extra funding means the school is welcoming back Mrs. Heather Armour, who will be the third member of our Grade 1 and 2 teaching team.

Students continue to enjoy great outdoor learning opportunities on Fresh Air Fridays. Our Grade 5 and 6 classes have been up to Nose Hill Park to investigate the wetlands and will compare this wetland with others they will be visiting this year. The Grade 3 and 4 classes have been in Whispering Woods to adopt a plant. Students have been observing, identifying, and sketching their various plants weekly and taking note of the changes in their plants. Our Grade 1 and 2 classes have harvested the outdoor gardens and prepared them for the winter months.

Each month I hope to highlight a grade team and provide a bit more detail about its learning experiences. This month we will focus on the Grade 5 and 6 team. With the municipal election that took place in October, students have been focusing on the topic of local government. Utilizing the resource 'Student Vote', the Grade 5 and 6 classes learned all about their democratic rights and responsibilities. As they read about the local candidates, the students formed their own opinions of who they thought should be mayor. Students even had the opportunity to vote in a mock election. This engaging activity helped students prepare for their current and future democratic responsibilities.

In early November, the Grade 6 students from the 'WE Club' attended 'WE Day' at the Saddledome. This celebration, focused on young people committed to making a difference in the world, was one component of a yearlong 'WE Schools' initiative. This program is intended to nurture compassion and provide students with the tools needed to create positive change in local and global communities. The group of Grade 6 students came back to 'WE Club' with rejuvenated energy. They shared with the rest of the club members and moved forward with making a positive change in our local community.

We trust that the students in Grades 5 and 6 will keep up with the social change initiatives and continue to be good role models for the younger students.

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

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
