

The Rosemont Community is happy to announce that it will be affiliating with "Family Matters", who will be offering a series of family-orientated programs out of our Community Hall.

Families Matter Society was created in 2003 with the amalgamation of three agencies that served a variety of parenting needs.

Vision: A connected community in which children and families are empowered and supported to be happy, healthy and productive

Mission: Promote optimal child development by empowering families to be resilient and fostering positive family relationships.

Our services include the following programs:

HUB programs – Three family serving centres that offer a variety of services and programming, encourages parents of children to come together for formal and informal learning opportunities that reduce isolation, build social resiliencies in families and connect communities.

PLC Centre – One of our Hubs is a Parent Link Centre (Bowcroft). Presently the Huntington Hills Community Centre has a Parent Link Centre in their space. Parent Link addresses universal (free access) to all parents seeking play groups, parenting information, supports, and services.

Family Life Education – Educational programs delivered throughout the city by FM and in partnership with agencies. Our programs are designed to help parents learn reflective thinking, address topics around healthy ages and stages of development, and support parents in making changes in their behavior. Some of classes are: Be a Great Dad, Circle of Security, Terrific Toddlers, How to Talk so Kids Will Listen and Listen So Kids Will Talk, Positive Discipline in Everyday Parenting, and many more.

Individualized Support Program – for families requiring a higher degree of individualized service and are not ready for formal classes. Includes a separate stream of classes and supports for younger parents.

Postpartum Depression – includes support groups for mothers, education/support classes for fathers, phone support, volunteer peer support and In-home visitation support.

Fathering Programming – Including the five-week Be a Great Dad program (delivered 22 times in 2016 at agencies and libraries throughout the city), Dad and the Law, Papa Bears (singing, literacy and early attachment for fathers and their small children), Terrific Toddlers for Dads.

We are very excited for the opportunity to work with Family Matters in offering a variety of Programs for residents around Rosemont.








Calgary Confederation Len Webber, MP 2020 10 St NW, T2M3M2

As part of the efforts to strengthen consumer protection and ensure a level playing field for Alberta businesses, the government has already taken the following steps:


- Payday lending: Put an end to 600 per cent predatory interest rates on payday loans to prevent Albertans from spiralling into poverty. Alberta now has the country's strongest protections and lowest interest rates for borrowers.
- Door-to-door sales: Put an end to misleading, aggressive sales tactics by banning door-to-door sales of energy products and services. The ban includes furnaces, hot water tanks, air conditioners, windows, energy audits, and electricity and natural gas contracts.

- Electricity price cap: Introduced a price cap to make life more affordable and ensure electricity bills are fair.
- New home buyer protection: Introduced a builder licensing framework to protect consumers as well as the reputation of good builders.

Your participation will help Albertans increase trust and build confidence between businesses and consumers.

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Pedestrian Safety

Pedestrian safety and cut-through traffic are top issues for Ward 7 communities. Most older neighbourhoods were built on grid networks, where streets connect at right angles with frequent intersections. The grid makes our communities easy to navigate by foot and by bike, but it also makes them easier to shortcut through, given that multiple routes can be taken to reach a destination. While communities that have "loop and lollypop" streets experience less cut-through traffic, they work poorly for walking and cycling. Both types of Calgary communities have their challenges, which is why we need a wide-reaching approach to make Calgary a better city for walking.

The City's new **Step Forward** pedestrian strategy is a long-term plan to improve the safety, accessibility, and desirability of walking in Calgary. The strategy includes 49 actions which were shaped by input from thousands
