

# **Edelweiss Preparatory School**

Well Spring has sprung, and we are excited about our new Children's Garden. The children are growing seeds indoors now and will be transplanting them into our new raised garden beds on the south wall of the building once weather permits. The raised garden beds were built locally, and we will be making use of the new rain barrel recently installed.

Christopher Cool the Magician will be delighting the children with a fun and educational Magic Show about Recycling and the children will be planting bulbs in pots to take home in celebration of Earth Day.

The Jr Kindergarten children will be attending an exciting field trip to The Glenbow Museum for the program *My First Museum Trip* and of course the chartered school bus ride is always a big hit!

The Under the Sea theme for April will keep the children interested while they learn all about sea creatures and their environment, how saving our water is important and how to protect the oceans. We have a Tropical Beach Day where all uniforms are left at home and children come dressed to school in clothing for the beach. ## **CAMBRIAN HEIGHTS PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE**

With the arrival of Spring on March 20th we look back on a very snowy winter in Calgary. Hats must go off the Rink Rats led by Scott Jacobson who have done yeoman's work keeping the Cambrian outdoor ice rinks clear and in excellent condition. In addition, the beginning of 2018 has witnessed changes within our community development. City Council is turning administration of secondary suite applications over to Administration and this has resulted in a large number of submissions questioning the enforcement of illegal suites, the regulation of newly approved suites and the use of backvard lane suites as opposed to basement style suites. We encourage owners to be vigilant towards new applications as they impact your residence and make your concerns known to the City authorities. Similarly, there has been an increase in new development applications and you have a definite right to see the details of new construction and evaluate the impact on your residence and privacy. We encourage you to visit our website for guidelines especially our publication "Lessons Learned" for a practical guide to development issues.

A joint February **Rustic Sign Handicraft Workshop** involving the Cambrian School Parents and the Community Association was a great first success as the enclosed picture demonstrates with some of the participants. This was run as a fundraiser for the benefit of the school children.

In April there are three main events. On April 3 from 6:30 to 7:30 there will be a free registration session with a door prize and refreshments entitled **Fun and Fearless Fitness.** This will kick off four weekly evening sessions involving different disciplines for exercising designed as new programs to complement our existing yoga and Jazzercise programs.

This will be followed by a **Red Cross sponsored "Be Ready"** evening program on April 10 at 7PM designed to prepare your family for any personal disaster.

A highlight of the month will be the Wine Tasting Evening on April 14 at 7:30 featuring **Spanish** wines and specialty cheeses supplied by Springbank Cheese. 

# **Cemetery** Expansion

The Queen's Park Cemetery has been serving Calgarians for nearly 80 years, and it is nearing capacity. Queen's Park is currently the only active City-operated cemetery, and the only northwest burial option for Calgarians.

To continue to meet the needs of the community, The City of Calgary will be expanding the cemetery into the south-west corner of the site (bordered by 10 St. NW and 32 Ave. NW), currently used as an off-leash area. As part of this work, it will extend the fencing that surrounds the cemetery site and is preparing a planting plan that will screen the site from view.

Work is scheduled to begin in June/July 2018. There will be a short period of construction traffic, and increased noise as the fencing and trees are installed and some ground work is completed. As a cemetery, the site will be permanently protected from further development.

### **Information Session**

The City is hosting an information session about the cemetery expansion on May 9, from 6-8 p.m. at the Highwood Community Hall (16 Harlow Avenue NW). All are welcome to drop in and learn more.

### **Relocation of the Off-Leash Area**

The City would like to try to provide a new or improved alternative off-leash area nearby. It is working on identifying other suitable spaces in the area and will be holding community engagement in June to seek input on which alternative could work best. More details will follow as they are confirmed.

Karen Gummo, a Storyteller & Visual Artist, launched a picture book "LadyBird Fly" which she wrote and illustrated. The story began with a family adventure on Nose Hill. She developed the tale through workshops with storytelling mentors. Then, she created the visual images, partly from a residency that she did at the Kid's Creative Museum and from many trips up to her favourite Hill.

I was recently interviewed by a reporter for the CREB Now newspaper and website. The article is "An Uphill Battle: How Calgarians banded together to protect nature and create Nose Hill Park". The Local Council of Women and the Calgary Field Naturalists' Society were proponents for a public park on Nose Hill and a development proposal was refused by the City in 1972. However, it took some time for the City and the Province to purchase the land. Meanwhile, Citizens for Nose Hill petitioned against rezoning what remained privately-owned. The environmental movement of the early 1970s was the zeitgeist or spirit of the age and we are truly indebted to the park founders for their legacy to future generations.

The Responsible Pet Ownership Bylaw does not allow livestock grazing within city limits, unless approved by the Land Use Bylaw. There is a City Council-approved exemption for the City to use targeted grazing for integrated pest management purposes on City-owned land. Since 2016 and 2017, Confluence Park, and Ralph Klein Park have been the selected sites.

In July 2017, City Council approved a change to the Parks and Pathway bylaw to expand areas for alternative land management tools, such as livestock. The intent was to add target grazing as a permitted use to remove invasive species (weeds) from City parks. After a two-year pilot project, it was determined that the cost of using goats was less per hectare than spraying herbicides.

A tender was posted on the City Portal for experienced livestock managers / professional shepherds. Providing services to a population of 1.2 million is a \$1.5 billion annual business for The City of Calgary, which contracts thousands of local, national, and international suppliers each year.



## ROSEMONT PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

After nurturing our beautiful ice rinks through what seemed like mountains of snow, the warm rays of spring took out the rink on March 13, much to the delight of the last group of Shinny players, who were able to play some good old boot road hockey while perfecting their splash shots! Thanks to our great coaches Grant Parks and his daughter Daniella for another fantastic year of Shinny. Mother Nature cooperated this year, with the group being able to run continuously since Jan. 9th. Another big thankyou to Jean Blackstock for organizing everything and everyone and all the parents for helping out.

And another giant thanks to the famous Rosemont Ice Guys, for their great and dedicated work in making the BEST OUTDOOR Ice in Calgary...The Guys put down 39 coats on the upper and 47 on the lower rinks. The group had to shovel an average of three times a week all through February and moved tonnes of snow. The snowbanks along the rinks were a record 5ft. high. A testament onto how good the ice was this year when a young woman was practicing her figure skating on the lower rink one morning. Thanks to Kurt, Craig, Jeff, Ian, Kris, Williem, Bill, Mark, Claire, Grant, Adrian, John, Austin, Andrew P., Glenn, Andy, Ryan, Keith, Jamie and our most senior member, Buddy. It takes many hands to make something like the rinks happen, and I would especially like to thank Kurt Westergard for his outstanding work in organizing the group, his enthusiasm and helping the Community in so many different ways.







The Rosemont Community is further indebted to Kurt for some emergency repairs we had to conduct at the Hall this past month. The power to the Hall suddenly went out the third Thursday in February. With temperatures

hovering around -25, Kurt and his electrician worked all night to locate and repair the problem, which turned out to be a very serious short in the meter connecting the hall to the ENMAX power pole. Power to the Hall was restored shortly after midnight, with the installation of a brand new electric panel. Rosemont thanks Brad from Triohm Electrical Services and Kurt for coming to the rescue.



The City sent out an interesting announcement in mid-March that they were intending to close the off-leash area by the cemetery. Please see the official announcement in this newsletter.

For those of you not involved in the last round of the cemetery folks trying to close the dog park, there is documentation that someone in Cambrian has stating that the current dog park area was guaranteed in lieu of the Cambrian residents donating previous land grabs by the cemetery. From the tone of this announcement, the parks folks have considered this a "fait de complete"! I would highly advise all concerned residents to email your city councillor and attend the meeting on May 9... Most concerning is the City's faint-hearted concern: "The City would like to try to provide a new or improved alternative off-leash area nearby." To me, beginning the work to take over the space before they have offered up a viable alternative means the deal is done as far as the City is concerned. I will lay out odds that they will tell us to use the existing off-leashing west of 14th Street paralleling John Laurie, whether you like it or not.. Please show up at the meeting if you are concerned...

The Rosemont Community Association has received a number of complaints of near-misses while students and pedestrians have attempted to cross 14th Street at Roseview Drive NW. As everyone is aware, this crosswalk is at a very precarious location at the top of the hill at Roseview Drive. Motorists heading south have no visual notice of someone in the crosswalk until they near the crest of the hill.

The old standard crosswalk warning lights are so high, they are above the driver's field of vision, and are often blurred out by the sun during daylight hours. We have received a couple of suggestions to help with the situation.

The first is to install the new, lower flashing lights common in newer communities. This would include placing an additional warning set of lights somewhere between the cross-walk and the Northmount Drive and 14th Street intersection.

A second option would be to move the crosswalk down closer to the intersection of Rosevale Drive NW and 14th Street, which puts the crosswalk directly across from the stairs leading down to St. Margaret's.

Anyone with similar concerns should call 311 and complain, as well as sending in their complaint to their councilor.

The always riotous Rosemont Wine Snob party will be held on Saturday, April 21. The theme for this year is outstanding wines from eastern Canada. The Highlander's sommelier will be skillfully guiding us through a very interesting assortment of wines matched perfectly with cheeses from the Springbank cheese company. Tickets are available on-line in advance of the event at www. rosemontcommunity.com.

Tickets this year will be \$35/community members (\$40 for non-members) and will be available from any member of the Rosemont Community Association, booking on the Rosemont website or by calling and leaving a message on the Hall line at 689-6533. # **City Crews Ready for Spring Street Sweeping Program** Spring is just around the corner! That means the City's street cleaning crews are coming to our neighbourhoods to remove debris and gravel off the roads.

Street sweeping removes the sanding material and debris that has accumulated on our roads and along major sidewalks and boulevards during the winter months. The program, which improves safety and mobility for Calgary motorists, cyclists and pedestrians, kicks off at the beginning of April. But you might see crews out there working hard beforehand, pre-sweeping along major roads and boulevards.

This year, street sweeping will wrap-up in June. In order to make this happen, crews will be sweeping streets on a compressed schedule, working 7 days per week.

### Keeping Calgary Clean is a Collaborative Effort

We are asking all Calgarians to help us make the city beautiful and roads safe by removing vehicles and carts from the street when you see road-sweeping signs in your community.

## **Diversifying Alberta's Economy**

Natural resources belong to all Albertans, and the government has a responsibility to ensure that Albertans get the best value for resources we own. That's why the Alberta government is building on its strengths by leveraging billions of dollars in new private-sector investment to create thousands of jobs in a diversified energy industry. This is an important step towards securing Alberta's future and getting off the boom-and-bust rollercoaster.

In late February, Premier Rachel Notley announced that support for full-scale commercialization of partial-upgrading technologies will be among the government's next steps toward energy diversification. Partial upgrading increases the value of Alberta's bitumen, creating a higher value for the product that can be shipped to more refineries around the world. This builds on our existing strengths, which include a skilled workforce and world-class petrochemical industry.

The government will provide support for partial upgrading over eight years beginning in 2019-20, which will include loan guarantees and some grants. This will spur construction of two to five partial upgrading facilities, representing up to \$5 billion in private investment, 4,000 jobs during construction and 200 full-time jobs during operation.

According to studies, the impact of partial upgrading could be worth up to \$22 billion in GDP growth for Alberta over 20 years—adding jobs, infrastructure and investment throughout our province.

### The Silence Is Deafening

As I sat in the House of Commons listening to the Finance Minister brag about this latest federal budget, we received a 369-page book that contained the fine print.

At this moment, aside from looking at the major themes and announcements, every Member of Parliament guickly flipped through the pages to see how the latest budget will address specific and urgent needs in their communities.

I searched high and low and not once did the budget mention Calgary. Then I searched for Edmonton and again found no references. Alberta's two major cities did not get mentioned a single time in 369 pages. (Toronto is referenced 11 times and Vancouver 8 times. Ontario was mentioned 37 times. Ouebec - 33 times and Alberta – 9 times.)

While it is true the budget contains measures that will have some impact in Calgary, we will not be getting specific or targeted help to address urgent local needs like flood infrastructure and high unemployment levels.

When the current government was elected in 2015, the Calgary unemployment rate was 7% which was the same as the national average. Since then, the national rate has dropped to 5.9% while Calgary's rate climbed as high as 10.2% and currently sits at 7.5%. When Calgary's rate is 27% higher than the national rate, that needs specific attention and we did not see any.

Our Mayor said he was "happy to hear" that tax revenue from marijuana sales will be coming to Calgary to help cover the costs of enforcement, but accurately pointed out that we will still be short funding to deal with urgent matters like the opioid crisis and affordable housing.

This is all so disappointing because the federal government is spending far more than it can afford, but it is spending money on the wrong things. We are passing on a legacy of debt to future generations with nothing to show for it.
