

Watch for details of our annual general meeting and other news on our website at www.fonhs.org. You can go to www.engage.calgary.ca/parksbylaw to learn about the results of a public survey. For Fall 2018: the Updated Parks and Pathway Bylaw draft was presented to Council for approval. As part of the Bylaw review, there were information and ideas from reports, 3-1-1 calls, and best practices from other cities. Public engagement is now closed. A citizen science initiative has been launched on the volunteer research website Zooniverse to enlist the help of Calgarians to "crowdsource" the identification of images. www.zooniverse.org/projects/calgary -captured/calgary-captured.

A Walk Leader on Nose Hill was Shelley Alexander, a Professor at University of Calgary and an international expert in wild canid ecology (coyotes and wolves). She is an adept wildlife tracker, who has studied human-coyote interactions, and uses satellite images for mapping in conservation. The Walk Duration was 1.5 hours and areas of Interest were Urbanism and Environment.

Beginning at the Many Owls Valley Parking lot (at Brisebois Drive) on Nose Hill, the walkers ascended the gentle slopes of this native grassland ecosystem; to the top where they had a vantage of the Calgary cityscape and the undulating foothills parklands spanning west to the Rocky Mountain Front. Here they could view the world from the perspective of a coyote and understand the challenges they face living in this urban to wild slope.

Continuing the walk of the trail circuit, they watched for signs of coyote (tracks/scat); discussed local research methods and findings; shared fun facts about urban coyotes; and learned tips to help them live together and co-flourish. Dogs and children were welcome. This walk route was partly paved, partly grass/packed, and gravel trail. The Meeting Place and Finish Point was: Many Owls Valley Parking Lot - North of the Intersection of John Laurie Blyd. and Brisebois Drive. NW.







CAMBRIAN HEIGHTS PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

On September 14, the City Planning Department informed community residents that Calgary Parks had withdrawn their Re-Designation Application DL2018-0062 converting the Community's existing Reserve (S-SPR) Park land bounded by 10th Street and 32nd Avenue into S-CRI (Special Purpose - City and Regional Infrastructure) classification thereby allowing an expansion of the Queen's Park Cemetery ("QPC") onto these lands. These lands are currently being used as a Dog Park and have been part of the Community since its inception in 1956. We wish to thank all those residents who filled objections and/or attended the two Open Houses sponsored by the City to express their opposition. We also wish to thank Councillor Chu for his help and Calgary Parks for responding to this overwhelming opposition by withdrawing their Application

The Fall Cleanup organized by Gary Wilson and his band of volunteers shown below was once again a success. It took place in the Community Hall parking lot on Sunday September 9th. Thanks to all the volunteers and those residents who disposed of excess metal, appliances, electronics and general yard and garage/household waste. We also thank everyone for their household and clothing donations to the Diabetes Association.

At the writing of this message we are also looking forward to our Asado and Open Mike Event on September 22. Asado is a Latin American term for a social gathering involving open fire and fresh grilled food. I trust the weather will cooperate and our residents will support this family affair.

In October, we will be hosting our annual Halloween Dance on October 27th at the Community Hall. Details may be found on our website. There will be pizza, a DJ, best costume and other fun activities. This is always a popular family event and I urge you to come early to participate.

We also encourage all residents to take advantage of the early evening programs at the Community Hall. We have yoga every Wednesday evening from 7-8, Jazzercise Monday & Wednesday 5:45-6:45, Fun & Fitness Tuesday (check website for times) and Piloxing Thursday 6:30-7:30

Construction has been completed on our Hall kitchen and outside-access ladder. We will now be apply-

Recent discussions at City Council towards lowering the residential speed limits off main transit routes to 30 kmph may impact this situation.

Alberta's Economic Recovery Continues

Increased exports, wholesale trade, manufacturing and earnings all point to an ongoing and broad-based economic recovery. Our government continues to advocate for pipelines to get our energy exports to market. Despite some setbacks on this front, Alberta's economic recovery continues.

Alberta will be a leader when it comes to economic growth this year and next. The 2019 forecast has been revised upward to 2.7 per cent GDP growth. The number of rigs drilling in Alberta was up 6.7 per cent year-to-date. In other oil-producing provinces, the measure was down 9.7 per cent— meaning Alberta is bucking the trend.

Total revenue projections for the Province have grown by \$1.2 billion with personal income tax revenues and resource royalties recovering better than expected. Beyond pipeline capacity, Alberta is forecasting 2018 real GDP growth to be 2.7 per cent and is revising upwards its 2019 forecast from 2.5 per cent to 2.7 per cent. Many economic indicators, including exports, manufacturing, rig activity and wholesale trade, have seen notable gains this year. Corporate profits are also expected to be higher in 2018.

Meanwhile, Alberta's labour market continues to improve. Robust earnings growth has been coupled with job gains, adding to the large rebound seen in 2017.

Our government knows that it takes time for these economic indicators to be felt around the kitchen tables and in the wallets of Albertans. That's why, as our economy diversifies, we're committed to protecting the services you rely on— such as healthcare and education— while we work on getting our energy exports to new markets.

Partners for Safety patrolling on Halloween night

Halloween should be spooky - not scary. The Calgary Partners for Safety have been patrolling the streets on Halloween night for more than 20 years to keep your little ghouls and goblins safe while they trick-or-treat! From 6:00 p.m.to 8:00 p.m. on October 31, more than 600 vehicles will be on Calgary's streets providing high-visibility assistance for anyone enjoying Halloween fun.

Coordinated by *Calgary's Child Magazine*, the Partners for Safety include the Calgary Police Service, Emergency Medical Services, Calgary Fire Department, Calgary Transit, Calgary Community Standards, Calgary Public Safety Communications (911), and Global Calgary. Any child experiencing a problem can go to any one of these partners for help.

Between regular emergency calls, the Calgary Police Service and Emergency Medical Services will have units patrolling residential neighborhoods. The Calgary Fire Department will also have vehicles on patrol, and fire stations will be open as a safe place for trick-or-treaters to ask for help if they need it.

Calgary Transit's buses and CTrains are in the community day and night providing essential transit services. On Halloween, if trick-or-treaters need help, they can approach any transit vehicle they spot. Bus and CTrain operators have radios and can contact the appropriate emergency personnel if needed.

Lest We Forget

This November we will commemorate the 100 year anniversary of the end of World War I. This anniversary will make annual Remembrance ceremonies all the more poignant this year. This year, more than ever, would be an ideal time to attend a Remembrance ceremony to thank and remember those who served and those who died in defence of Canada.

Through October 1918 it became clear the Allies were in a position to defeat Hitler and the German forces and discussions to end the Great War intensified. On November 11th, 1918 an armistice ended the majority of the fighting.

Canada's efforts in the 100 days leading up to the November 11th armistice were both massive and historic.

From August 8 to November 11, 2018, we mark the 100th anniversary of the Battle of Amiens, the 100th anniversary of the Battle of Canal du Nord, and the 100th anniversary of the Liberation of Mons. More than 100,000 Canadians fought, with more than 39,000 casualties and 6,800 making the ultimate sacrifice, during this massive offensive.

We can also highlight the 30 Canadians and Newfoundlanders who received the Victoria Cross (VC) during the last three months before the Armistice. They make up nearly one-third of all VCs in our military history.

Those who served then, and now, ask a lot from their families. Their service to our country places unimaginable stresses on relationships and often takes parents away from their children for extended periods. Following hostilities, it is these families that are then left to deal with lifelong injuries to their loved ones. Not all the injuries are visible and issues like post-traumatic stress disorder mean the struggles continue long after their return. We need to recognize that in many ways their families did, and continue to, serve Canada in their own unique way.

This year also marks the 65th anniversary of the Korean War Armistice and the 10th anniversary of National Peace-keepers' Day.

By honouring these milestone anniversaries, we continue to honour the memories of those who did not return. We will always remember them. Lest we forget. cbe.ab.ca




