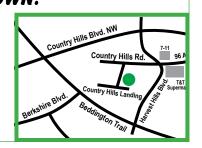

President's Message

I am Paul Clark, your new President and it's a pleasure to serve you, the Edgemont Community. First of all, I wish to thank our out-going president. Bey Johnson, for leading the past board through a challenging and lively year. She did a fine job in last month's Inside Edgemont acknowledging the contributions of past board members. The good news is that through our renewed bylaws a number of board members are returning for a second term, myself included. This will provide necessary continuity in board activity; but also provide opportunity to contribute from new board members. Your new board is up and running, having held its first formal meeting on May 23rd.

In this my first message to you, I want to share the ECA board's direction for this term. It is my belief that for an organization and its board to be productive and successful, key foundation blocks need to be in place. I am pleased to say that this building process started with the previous board and will continue strongly with your new board.

The first building block in the foundation is our mission/ mandate. This provides the reason for our existence. The next block in our foundation is our bylaws. Through the efforts of the past board and community supporters we now have a state-of-the-art set of bylaws which are already proving their worth. Next, we need to have a code of ethics and conduct in place. Late last term this was accomplished with the creation of "The ECA Way". This code will quide our behaviours both as a board and as a community. We will post the ECA Way on our website and have hard copies available. I encourage you to read this document and adopt its tenets as we have. The frame of our organization is a comprehensive and easy to navigate policy manual. This is under development as we speak. Finally, the overarching element that pulls our organization together and inspires us to achieve our full potential is a compelling vision and supporting strategy. Again, the previous board started this important work last Fall by creating ECA Vision 2021, and your new board is dedicated to powering it up. We have already set a workshop in June to continue this vital work. I'll share more of the detail in future messages.

One of the key elements in your board achieving full potential is the support of you, our community members. It is my observation is that past boards have taken on too much of the work in a direct manner, and not allowed enough time for the board to act in a true governance manner. We can change this with your help. Your new board is developing a support model to share the work of the organization. We will create an organizational structure that encourages you to be directly involved and support our efforts where your expertise and enthusiasm can contribute. We have already benefitted from the efforts of a number of community members that I call "super supporters". I plan to share more of the support model and highlight the activities of our "super supporters" in future editions of the Inside Edge.

It would be remiss of me not to highlight several activities in the community which have occurred during this reporting period. First, we had another outstanding 1 World event. Please check this edition for more details. Next, our Casino fundraising initiative held in May was successful, with organization by our retiring coordinator Cari Middleton and full support from a battery of community volunteers to make it happen. The amount raised will be known later in the Summer. On the EC Centre side, we are now benefitting from completion of our much-needed washroom renovations. These are but a few of the many great things going on in your community.

The candidates then stood for the oath of citizenship, and were granted their official certificates at last, amid surrounding applause. To conclude the ceremony, they proudly sang O

Canada as Canadian citizens for the first time, with the entire audience joining in.

The entire ceremony was conducted outdoors, with a panoramic view of the Rocky Mountains acting as a backdrop. All of the new citizens we had a chance to meet agreed the view was breathtaking. "I love Canada. My favorite part is the view, and (the) mountains," commented Wasif, who is originally from Pakistan. "The ceremony was amazing. Edgemont is great. Today gave me an amazing feeling." Jayza, another new citizen agreed: "It feels great to be a part of Canada. It's overwhelming. I love the view, and the nature of Canada," she told us. For other new Canadians, the speeches resonated with them the most. Kelvin Z. left China and arrived in Canada over four years ago. He's learned a lot about Canada, and has fallen in love with our great country. "I've been here a long time. I love it. I'm enjoying my new life. It is safe, with beautiful, nice people. I liked the speech today. Now I want to volunteer, and contribute to beautiful Canada."

It was heartwarming to see Edgemont and the surrounding community come together to welcome and congratulate the new citizens. With this year being the 150th anniversary of the Canadian confederation, we are once again reminded of how exceedingly fortunate we are to live in such a wonderful country, with access to so many resources. We in Edgemont have the privilege of a safe, caring community where everyone is welcomed with open arms. 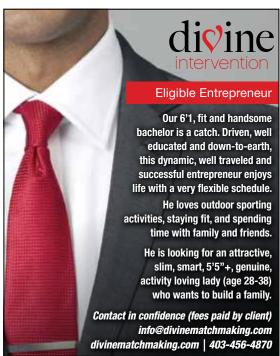

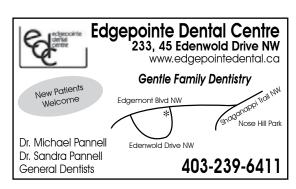

A stylized maple leaf designed by a 19-year-old student has been selected as the official logo of Canada's 150th anniversary celebration in 2017.

The multi-coloured logo featuring diamond shapes of various sizes topped over 300 entries considered in the federal government's student-only national logo design competition. Ariana Cuvin, a University of Western Ontario Business and Digital Arts student, said the four largest diamonds are means to represent the four provinces that formed Confederation in 1867. The remaining smaller diamonds represent the remaining provinces and territories that later join the country. "The repeated shape is meant to create a sense of unity and the 13 shapes formed the leaf represents our togetherness as a country", Cuvin writes.

"In the coloured iteration, the centre found diamonds are similar in colour. From left to right, similar colours are used in a row to show the provinces and territories that joined Canada in the same year. The multi-coloured iteration gives a feeling of diversity while the red one shows pride and unity."

To better understand wildlife in Calgary, a wildlife monitoring program will start this year. To monitor wildlife, motion-activated cameras will be installed in 11 City parks, including Nose Hill Park and one provincial park, to take pictures of wildlife in those areas. The information from this monitoring program will be used to make better decisions when planning parks and other City spaces. See more at www.calgary.ca.

Once there is a database of images to classify, residents will be asked to help classify them using a platform called Zooniverse. This is a citizen science web portal owned and operated by the international Citizen Science Alliance. It is home to some of the internet's largest, most popular, and most successful citizen science projects; and will allow volunteers to participate in crowd sourced scientific research. More details will be shared when the program moves into that phase. Some of the questions to be explored over the next few years include:

Who calls Calgary home? While we can't directly measure populations with the data from our cameras, we can get a sense of what wildlife call Calgary home.

Where are they? Finding out where certain species are most likely to spend time allows us to target conservation and management efforts.

How do species live with each other? This program will help understand how species in Calgary might compete with one another, engage in predator-prey dynamics, or avoid one other. By evaluating the camera images, we begin to better understand the Calgary urban ecosystem, including how all the species interact.

How can humans and wildlife co-exist in a city? It is known that people change the way wildlife behave - some animals adapt well to humans, some are indifferent, and others avoid us. The camera data will allow a better understand of our impact on wildlife.

Please note: The City does not conduct gopher control in natural environment parks in Calgary. The Alberta government is responsible for wildlife management. The City of Calgary provides information as a public service.

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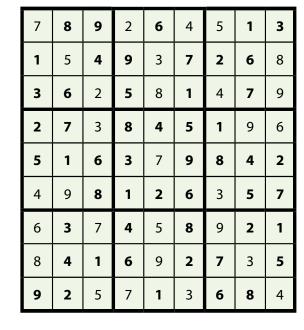

Helping Your Children with Social and **Emotional Skills for Kindergarten**

Age 5 is a "big" age as these kids are getting ready for school! Now we have to focus on getting ready for Kindergarten and learning new skills.

Emotional regulation is a crucial skill for kids to learn. They are beginning to learn to have a clearer sense of self. They learn about rules and values that tell them how to behave at school and in the community. They are forming relationships with teachers, peers and other adults. Learning how to manage their emotions when they can't have their way is important as they are learning to take turns and be nice to someone else when they win.

Talk to your child about "telling" and "tattling". This aids with teaching the child about rules about how to behave and how to handle situations when the rules are broken.

Telling is when a child reports a problem to the teacher or parent. It's essential to teach a child to "tell" and try to solve the problem. Three steps to teach "telling":

- 1. Use "I statements": I am having a problem with Jimmy.
- 2. Name the problem: The problem is I'm not getting my
- 3. Say what you need: I need some help with this problem.

Tattling is when we place blame on someone else and doesn't solve the problem. Instead tattling asks a parent or teacher to find fault and/or punish the other person.

Another great way to help emotional regulation is to name the feeling. Each feeling has a name such as happy, sad, etc. If needed, you can give each feeling a colour (happy is yellow) or you can make/print out pictures to help associate the feeling with the name. Expand vocabulary and use names such as pleased, delighted, upset, anxious, etc.
