# October Fire Prevention Week. October 9-15<sup>th</sup>

Your Calgary Fire Department wants you to make time to ensure that your family is safe from fires.

Don't wait, check the date!

If a fire occurs in your home, we, as firefighters know firsthand that only a WORKING smoke alarm can alert you. Smoke alarms that are older than 10 years old may not work when you need them most, so check the date on the unit, if it is older than 10 years old, replace it!

If there is no date, and it appears to be older than 10 years old, replace it.(even if it is hard wired)

Other simple reminders:

- check every detector monthly by pushing the test button
- change the battery annually (some now have ten year batteries)
- you need to be able to hear the beep when you sleep
- you should have a smoke alarm on every level of your home
- many smoke alarms will "chirp" when the battery is low or when the alarm has reached its lifespan

If the alarm does go off, your family can initiate your home escape plan. For additional information on escape plans, visit Calgary.ca/CSPS/Fire

# Why Beaver Scouts are SO important to the Scouting System

When most people think of Scouts, they think of young teenagers hiking through a forest or up a mountain, some may think of bottle drives or selling popcorn/apples and some may even picture a bunch of boy scouts planting trees.

I can't blame you, these days, it seems I spend a lot of time planning or doing anyone of those things and more with our scout troop.

However, I have to say that the most important section of any scout program are the beaver scouts, aged 6 – 8, that seem to be full of energy and usually running around crazily and typically screaming and having fun.

I wouldn't say they embody the scouting program per say, but they are the foundation of all the other programs.

Sure the scouts do things that the cub scouts look up to and strive to do and the cub scouts do the same with the beaver scouts. It pushes them to want to move forward and into the next section of scouting. It gives them motivation to challenge themselves and see if they can do what the bigger kids do. That progression is what keeps the scouting movement alive and thriving.

Really though, beaver scouts is where it usually all starts for the kids and the leaders. What starts as a 6 year old child and a parent looking for something to do together on a weeknight, can easily turn into 12 years or more in a program together, growing, experiencing and enjoying time together and sometimes apart.

Those 6 year old Beaver Scouts, that usually drive the older scouts crazy, are like the seeds of Scouting. They start off learning simple skills, go on tours of fire halls, sleep over at museums and play lots of games, but that is the stuff that scouting is built on. The simple skills of maybe tying a shoe leads into a 13 year old scout lashing together logs and large branches to form a makeshift shelter to sleep in in the middle of January. The

tour of the fire hall is only the first step into stepping forward to help people in times need. That sleepover in Drumheller at Tyrell may be the first step in a long journey that can easily lead to a week long hike through the mountains with all the gear a scout needs on their back. Those games are more than just fun, they are instrumental in teaching the scouts rules, fair play, fun and team building. All the skills you might need in a giant game of Capture the Flag with many different scouts.

Beaver Scouts are the ones that are eager and excited to go on that bottle drive to raise funds for the group. They are the ones smiling when you open the door at 9am on a Saturday asking for Bottles. They are the kids that everyone says look so cute in their uniforms all standing in a sort of crooked line or better yet a straight horseshoe.

I see them like that as well, but I also see in them the Scouts I currently lead, some of them I have been leading since they were 6 years old and in Beavers. I see the potential they have, the eagerness and passion they show in the simplest of things and the future of our scouting program.

Many parents and potential leaders shy away from leading a beaver group and I can truly understand their trepidation, but It is the perfect opportunity to impart in them some life lessons, compassion, wisdom, outdoor enthusiasm and countless other traits. At the age of 6 they are usually just starting to learn what interests them and I have to be a bit selfish and would love all of them to develop a keen interest in the outdoors. They are learning more and more how to work and play with others, what is acceptable behavior and what is not.

When I look at the health of our scouting group, I don't look at all the adventures of Scouts have done, I don't look at what kind of camps the cub scouts have gone on, I look at how much fun the beaver scouts are having and it truly doesn't even matter what they are actually doing. It is a lot easier to get a child to continue in a program if they enjoy it, instead of convincing them of all the fun they might have if they continue.

As a scout troop, we try to implement linking activities with our older scouts and the younger scouts. A senior scout showing a few beaver scouts or cub scouts how to tie a few simple knots has a much larger impact than any adult standing in front of some kids trying to show them the same knots. Our leadership team really tries at every opportunity to show that to our scouts.

As a scout leader, it is in our troops best interest to nurture, help, guide, lead and value all the beaver scouts, in our scout group or in other groups for they are the backbone of the Scouting Program.



### **Halloween Safety**

The members of Calgary's Halloween *Partners for Safety:* Calgary's Child Magazine, EMS, Calgary Police, Fire, 9-1-1, Bylaw, Transit, and Shaw Communications would like to remind parents and trick-or-treaters of some Halloween safety tips, as October 31<sup>st</sup> approaches. *Partners for Safety* vehicles will be out patrolling communities on Halloween night to provide a visible safety resource for parents and trick-or-treaters.

### **Trick-or-Treaters**

- Remember: all regular pedestrian rules still apply. Be sure to cross the road at marked crosswalks, or well-lit corners only. It is safest to work your way up one side of the street, and then cross once to the other side.
- Stay away from houses that are not well lit. Do not accept rides from strangers, or enter any home you feel is unsafe.
- Let your parents know where you are going to be at all times (route) and advise them if you will be late returning.

### Costumes

- All costume accessories, such as sticks, rods, or wands, should be soft and flexible, with no sharp edges.
- Consider using hypoallergenic make-up kits instead of masks that may impair breathing, or vision.
- Be sure costumes are loose enough to be worn over warm clothing, but not so long that they become a tripping hazard. Costumes should not be longer than your child's ankles.
- Ensure your child is wearing adequate foot wear that takes into consideration weather conditions and walking.
- Consider sending your children with a flashlight for additional safety and increased visibility.
- When purchasing, or making costumes, look for materials and accessories that are labeled flame-resistant.
- Choose bright colored costumes that are highly visible.
   Adding reflective tape to costumes further increases visibility.

### **Parents**

- Be certain that young trick-or-treaters are accompanied by an adult. Older children should stay in groups.
- Advise children not to eat anything until they return home. Dispose of any items that appear to have been tampered with, or that are not properly wrapped.
- Pre-determine boundaries to trick-or-treat within and establish a firm time to return home.

New Rink New Season!!! What better time to enroll a child in the HVCA Hockey Program than now. In the first season with our new and improved rink, it should be awesome.

Depending on when the newsletter gets to your mail-box, it may or may not be October 15th and Hockey Registration for youth in the HVCA Hockey Program may already be open. In the meantime, here is a bit of information about our hockey program.

### WHAT IS HVCA HOCKEY??

It is a kids community hockey league, (6 to 14 years old in two or three different groups), non competitive, mostly for fun and also skill building. Boys and Girls are both welcome to play. We play Wednesday nights and Saturday mornings.

It typically runs from mid December to mid February, weather dependent with (hopefully) an indoor 1 day tournament type deal in late January or Early February.

We do not keep any stats or scores and will usually mix up the teams to keep it even and fun. We will typically group the kids by skill levels and size to ensure a well rounded program for all participants.

It is all run by volunteers, not trained coaches, but parents that want to come out and help the kids. We are always looking for more volunteers (Hint, Hint) especially someone to step up and help run the program, I will be there to help and mentor as needed.

### WHY HVCA HOCKEY?

- -Low cost.
- -Easy times.

- -Same time's week in and week out.
- -Close to home.
- -A good way to get the kids out skating and get them some pointers to help their skating.

### WHAT DO THE KIDS NEED?

Once they are registered to play, they will need the following to play.


-Properly fitting Helmet. No helmet, no play!! Keep in mind we are playing outside and will only cancel if it is colder than -20, so it is a good idea to have a helmet that can fit a thin toque or balaclava under it.

- -Skates, preferably comfortable.
- -I recommend a mouth guard, Tooth repair isn't cheap
- -A hockey stick, figure out if your child is a left handed shooter or right handed shooter.
- -As much decent hockey equipment as you can afford. The better protected they are, the more fun it is. Don't go crazy though! Start with shoulder pads, shin guards, hockey gloves elbow pads, hockey pants, jock strap, hockey socks, then go from there.
- -Water bottle
- -Thin gloves to keep hands warm under hockey gloves \*\*We are currently working on getting each child a named jersey to keep during and after the season, any help advice or contacts would be greatly appreciated.\*\*

There are a few decent second hand stores for equipment around, check them out for good deals.

**REMEMBER**, this league is about fun and furthering skills, we aren't aiming to create any NHL stars, but we do try and give them some fundamentals and a good time

# The Brown Creeper By J.G. Turner Photo credit: David Mitchell

This tree-climbing bird has a tiny, slim body that is well camouflaged with brown streaks on its back, white under parts, a yellowish bar across the wing and a buff stripe over the eye. The Brown Creeper—also known as the Tree-Creeper—is a permanent Alberta resident found in parkland, mountain and boreal forests at many elevations. These creepers are found in mixed woods but seem to prefer coniferous areas for their breeding grounds; however, in the winter, they move to more varied environments and are easier to find in deciduous woodlands.

### **Fun Facts:**

- The Brown Creeper got its name because it climbs (or creeps) in an upward spiral from the bottom of a tree while it forages for food. The short legs and long curved claws allow this creeper to hook into the bark.
- The Tree-Creeper uses its unique bill to probe into crevices in the bark to eat small insects and spiders.
- The male finds the materials for a nest but the female is the one that builds the nest. The male sings to the

female (a high thin trill) from nearby while the female works.

- Although the Brown Creeper may pass a Nuthatch working its way from the top of a tree to the bottom, there is no competition between these birds as the Brown Creeper can reach into spots and find food where the Nuthatch cannot reach.
- Due to their tiny size and weak call, Brown Creepers are very inconspicuous birds, so it is thought that estimates of the birds' dispersal and numbers are conservative.
- You can attract this inconspicuous little bird to a feeder by offering suet (especially if it is smeared right onto a tree trunk), peanuts and bread crusts. During the winter, they will also eat seeds.

# Halloween hazards! **Keeping your Pet Safe**

### Happy October!

It's hard to believe but Halloween is just around the corner! Soon the streets will be flooded with little ghouls and goblins looking to fill bags full of sweet treats. Halloween is a great opportunity to meet your neighbours, admire some creative costumes and, of course, enjoy the occasional mini chocolate bar!

While Halloween is a fun time for people, it can be a scary time for pets! The strange visitors, ringing doorbell and unusual costumes may cause stress or even frighten a family pet. Just as families must take safety precautions to ensure a safe and happy Halloween for children, pet owners should be mindful of safety during the festivities. To make sure Halloween is fun for the whole family, Calgary Humane Society wants to remind you of a few safety tips for your pets!

- 1. Keep candy out of reach of pets! Chocolate, artificial sweeteners and certain types of nuts are toxic to animals.
- 2. Set up a safe space! Setting up a room with your pet's favorite items in a guiet area of the house will help to block out some of the stressful aspects of the holiday.
- 3. Leave Fido at home. Including the family pet on trick or treating may seem like fun, but strange costumes and fast moving children could cause your pooch a lot of stress.
- 4. Put a sign on the door asking trick or treaters to knock, especially if your pet reacts to the doorbell!
- 5. Be cautious with your costume, especially if your pet is easily frightened. Consider setting your pet up in a safe space before getting changed into your festive duds.
- 6. If your pet is dressing up, choose a costume that does not restrict your pet's airway or movement. Keep dress-up sessions short and watch for signs that your pet is becoming annoyed with their costume. Most pets do not like costumes so if you must dress up your pet, consider snapping a few photos and removing the costume right away.

- 7. Do not allow your cats to roam. A popular myth is that cats can fall victim to foul play on Halloween. While we have not seen that occur in Calgary, roaming cats can fall victim to the increased traffic or may become lost if they are frightened by all the little ghouls and goblins collecting candy.

This year is North Haven's 50th anniversary. One of the seniors interviewed for a video said he led the committee of surrounding communities that lobbied the city for park status. As a result, we were asked for any information about Nose Hill, when it became a park.

Nose Hill Park is a natural environment park that lies in the northwest part of Calgary and is surrounded by 12 residential communities. We are often asked about its history and documents are posted on our website at www.fonhs.org. Here is an excerpt:

In 1858, Captain Palliser noted that the Blackfoot referred to Nose Hill as their wintering hills because it was a winter grazing area for the buffalo herds, since the frequent winter Chinooks kept the grass clear of snow. The area around the hill was mostly used for dairy farms, while the plane

teau was grazed. The land has been subject to speculation since before World War I. "The Great Prairie Fire of 1944" put an end to habitation on Nose Hill. Its rich supply of gravel began to be exploited in 1961, when Calgary began to grow.

The Calgary Municipal Airport was constructed in the northeast corner of the city in the late 1950's. The runways were oriented north-south and east-west. Nose Hill was on the flight path of the latter, so it was necessary for the Federal Department of Transport to impose a development ban on the area. This forced some farmers on the hill to relocate. In the late 1950's, much of the suburban sprawl occurred in the area to the east and south-east of Nose Hill. Purchasers of homes in these developments were told that they would always have the open space of Nose Hill adjacent to their communities. In 1960-61, the Calgary Winter Club proposed that they be allowed to develop a golf course on the top of the Nose Hill but this idea was rejected by the Calgary Planning Commission, because of the caveat imposed by the Department of Transport. Communities that developed later in the 1960's to the south of Nose Hill were unaware of this caveat, which was dropped when the jet replaced the propeller airplanes. Indeed, some residents nurtured the ambition to own a house on top of Nose Hill because of the fantastic view that it afforded of the city, the foothills, and the mountains.
