


Coach Pitch Baseball Anyone?

Where Did The Potty "Go"?

You may have noticed by now that there is no longer a porta potty located at the Hut. At the January 23rd Community Association meeting, it was decided to have it removed.

We understand that it is a nice convenience but we are not required by the city to have facilities on site unless there is an event such as the Family Winter Festival or the spring sports wrap up party.

Just one porta potty costs us \$178 a month or \$2136 a year! This equal to 71 memberships just to put things into perspective...

Unfortunately, we had not one but TWO incidents of vandalism in which our porta potty was lit on fire. It costs another \$974 to replace and this was not the first or second time we have had to pay for a replacement. This brings us to \$4082 paid out during this fiscal year, equal to 136 memberships!

Is this really how you want your memberships dollars spent?

We are also aware of various "unsavoury" activities that tend to happen around the hut and are working hard to get the city of Calgary to install lighting in the parking lot. Having the porta potty on site, offers these folks yet another place to go about their business be it drug use or whatever.

We hope that our residents and visitors understand the tough position we have been put in and the reasons why we've made this decision. Of course, we always welcome your feedback and will continue to discuss this matter in the months ahead.

HVCA OUTDOOR SOCCER REGISTRATION IS OPEN! REGISTRATION CLOSES MARCH 31

It's that time of year again...time to register for HVCA's outdoor soccer program. We took a little extra time to get things up and running this year (thank you for your patience) but we are showing good numbers for the season already!

HVCA will be running programs for U4 (3 years old by May 1, 2017), U6 (Born 2011, 2012), U8 (Born 2009, 2010) and U10 (Born 2007, 2008) players this season.

The season will run from April 24 until June 16 (dates subject to change).

The U4 and U6 programs, sponsored by Timbits will be playing on the fields behind Valley Creek School on Mondays and Wednesdays from 6:30–7:20 pm. Timbit players will each receive a t-shirt which is theirs to keep. Good running shoes are mandatory and shin pads are highly recommended.

U8 teams will not be registered in CMSA this year in order to keep our costs down. U8 players will receive a jersey which will not need to be returned at the end of the season. Please make sure your player has good running shoes or soccer cleats and shin pads. Games and practices will be held on the fields beside St. Elizabeth Seton on Mondays and Wednesdays from 7:00-8:00 pm.

U10 teams will be registered with the Inter Community House League (ICHL) which will play against other community teams on various fields in the NW. ICHL is a boy's league but girls are welcome to play on the team. Our U10 players will receive shorts, socks and a jersey to keep. Good running shoes or cleats and shin pads are mandatory at this age. Days and times are TBD.

As we have struggled to secure enough registrations in recent years to provide teams for U12 and older players, we will not be running programs for those age groups. We encourage U12 and U14 players to register with Northern Hills Community Association (NHCA). NCHA has offered to try to put all Hidden Valley players on the same team(s). The NHCA website is www.northernhills.ab.ca.

Please visit www.hiddenhut.org to register your players for our spring soccer program.

As always, our programs are 100% volunteer run so register early to get your choice of volunteer position. Positions will be removed from the list as they are filled. Volunteer roles and descriptions can be found on the outdoor soccer page on our website.

When registration closes, our volunteers kick into high gear getting teams and coaches sorted out, putting together equipment bags, ordering t-shirts and jerseys and planning schedules to set up a successful soccer season. Late registrants can put a huge strain on our volunteers (your friends and neighbors) as we plan everything by the numbers we receive at the end of March. Please make sure you register before the deadline of March 31.

Please note that a community membership is required to participate in HVCA sports programs. There are many benefits to registering for community soccer:

•Children play on teams with friends and classmates; each participant can request to be on a team with up to two friends

·Your children play close to home

•You can get to know your neighbors

News from the **Friends of Nose Hill**

We are often contacted by individuals concerned about loss of green space, such as linear parks, golf courses, and other connectors used as wildlife routes. People need the outdoors for healthy lifestyles. In a recent media interview, I was asked to describe what Nose Hill means to the quality of life in North Calgary. In addition to hiking, walking, and cycling, I thought of wildlife sighting and plant studies, especially in the spring. However, there are butterfly enthusiasts too. Nose Hill has been the subject of photography, for decades, and there are paintings of the park in different seasons.

The Citizens for Nose Hill was an early preservationist group. Two other Calgary parks (which had been recognized as property of City-wide significance) were recently re-designated as municipal historical resources, under Section 26 of the Alberta Historical Resources Act. The aim is to protect each site in perpetuity, since they are eligible for provincial grant funds, in order to support on-going conservation.

Confederation Park was once known as the rough and featureless North Hill Coulee This Park was added to Calgary's inventory of evaluated historic resources, in 2010, based on the community effort to establish the park, on the centennial of Canadian Confederation. Harry Boothman, a Superintendent of Parks, and Eric Musgreave, founder of the Centennial Ravine Park Society in 1965, were influential in its 18th-century garden design. Boothman was a long-time supporter and board member of the Canadian Parks and Recreation Association. There is a bursary operated in his name.

William Reader, a garden designer, was a City Parks Superintendent from 1913 – 1942. Reader Rock Garden, established in 1914, was added to the inventory in 2007, with native plants, local materials, gardens and rock pathways. It reflects the optimism in our city's early 1900s. It was the first Legacy Park to open. (www.readerrock.com)

This bylaw protection is intended to prevent demolition but will pertain to the parks by ensuring any future changes or conservation work follow best practices in handling historical resources. The change has no impact on City operating or capital budgets.

However, the conservation of cultural landscapes can often have significant environmental benefits, as many have biodiversity being conserved as part of the landscape. In turn, their conservation contributes to biodiversity in Calgary.

There were letter of support for this designation from both the Calgary Parks Department and Calgary Heritage Authority.

Recipes of the Month



Butternut Squash and Coconut Soup

Savour this Thai-inspired soup, with a base of creamy coconut milk. 2 tsp. Canola Oil 1 small yellow onion, chopped 1 clove garlic, finely chopped 2 tsp. finely chopped fresh ginger 1 tsp. red curry paste, or more to taste 2 tsp. brown sugar ¹/₂ teaspoon sea salt 1 medium butternut squash, peeled and cut into 1 inch pcs, about 4 cups 2 cups low-sodium gluten-free chicken broth 1 (14 oz) can coconut milk 1 pound medium shrimp, peeled and deveined ¹/₄ cup chopped fresh Cilantro ¹/₄ cup shredded coconut, toasted Lime wedges Heat oil in a large soup pot over medium-high heat. Add

onion, garlic and ginger. Cook, stirring frequently, until fragrant and onion is translucent, about 5 minutes. Stir in curry paste, sugar and salt and cook 1 minute longer. Stir in squash, broth and coconut milk and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer until squash is tender. 20 – 25 minutes.

Stir in shrimp and simmer just until cooked through, about 2 minutes. Stir in cilantro, sprinkle with coconut and serve with lime wedges on the side. Enjoy.

Hot Cross Buns Recipe

Preparation: 20 minutes Cooking Time: 20 minutes Ready to Eat In: 3 hours 30 minutes

Ingredients

3/4 cup warm water (110 degrees F/45 degrees C) 3 tablespoons butter 1 tablespoon instant powdered milk 1/4 cup white sugar 3/8 teaspoon salt 1 eqq 1 egg white 3 cups all-purpose flour 1 tablespoon active dry yeast 3/4 cup dried currants 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1 egg yolk 2 tablespoons water 1/2 cup confectioners' sugar 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract 2 teaspoons milk

Directions

- 1. Put warm water, butter, skim milk powder, 1/4 cup sugar, salt, egg, egg white, flour, and yeast in bowl and mix until doughy.
- 2. Add currants and cinnamon. Leave in bowl to rise until double size.
- 3. Punch down on floured surface, cover, and let rest 10 minutes.
- 4. Shape into 12 balls and place in a greased 9 x 12 inch pan. Cover and let rise in a warm place till double, about 35-40 minutes.
- 5. Mix egg yolk and 2 tablespoons water. Brush on balls.
- 6. Bake at 375 degrees F (190 degrees C) for 20 minutes. Remove from pan immediately and cool on wire rack.

To make crosses: mix together confectioners' sugar, vanilla, and milk. Brush an X on each cooled bun.

On March 2nd, the Alberta Legislature will resume sitting after a long 12 week recess. The Lieutenant Governor will deliver this government's third throne speech. That will be followed by a budget some days later. Given the dynamics of Alberta politics these days, I expect it to be a very interesting session.

I take my role as Shadow Minister for Economic Development and Trade very seriously. As the official opposition's critic on matters relating to major industries, economic & market diversification, market access (including pipelines) and international trade, I find this position very challenging yet quite intriguing. As a proud 28-year veteran of the petroleum industry, I am convinced that not only Oil and Gas but also Petrochemicals will continue to drive a significant portion of our economy and job creation for decades to come. I also believe that diversification into other industries is a good thing, as this can only help soften the inevitable blows of the downward side of the commodity cycle.

This past January, at my own expense, I was able to meet some key government and industry leaders in India and Japan. These included numerous federal Cabinet Ministers and MPs, a state Premier (Chief Minister), Legislature Speakers, as well as Cabinet Ministers and Legislators of Andhra Pradesh and Telangana states. I also met the Canadian Trade Commissioners and Alberta's international trade representatives in Delhi, Mumbai, Hong Kong and Tokyo.

I once worked for India's largest company, Reliance Industries. I had a chance to converse with former colleagues who are now rolling out a \$20 billion 5G wireless network across India as well

as commissioning over \$30 billion in petrochemical projects.

I also met with the Executive Officer of Tirumala Tirupati Devasthanam, the most visited religious centre in the world, and discussed the opportunity to build a temple here in Calgary.

In India, the value of higher education is held in high esteem, yet seems almost unattainable for much of the population due to scarcity of funds and availability of seats in schools. Here in Alberta, many of us take it for granted that we can go to university, college or learn a trade if that's our ambition. Much work is taking place in India to give opportunities to more people to attain their educational dreams.

Indian leaders in higher education related to me that, although there are some very good schools in India, they could really use help from institutions in Alberta as they expand their programs into areas that they are not traditionally strong. I see these opportunities as a win-win, as Alberta creates new linkages into a 1.3 billion person economy, and India gains from our unique strengths and perspectives.

Japan is another promising and rich market for Alberta's energy, agriculture and forestry products.

Watch for details about my upcoming spring town hall. I am eager to share many thoughts and ideas with you about the best course of action over the next few exciting years in Alberta's development.

Hello Residents of Northern Hills,

Seniors have told us that having the choice to remain in their home for as long as they wish is vital to their sense of independence and quality of life. Home means comfort, security and a greater sense of well-being.

Did you know our government has a program that can assist seniors in staying at home for as long as possible? The Seniors Home Adaptation and Repair Program (SHARP) aims at helping seniors be self-sufficient in their homes for as long as possible, while addressing the needs and priorities of an aging population. We've chosen to take action through SHARP and offer a low-interest home equity loan, so seniors can age in their community.

The previous Special Needs Assistance (SNA) for seniors program only offered about 53,000 senior households eligibility for home repair loans. In July 2016, SHARP was introduced to service up to 145,000 senior households. With it, seniors will be eligible to access more funds for a much broader scope of work than what was available under the SNA Program, such as adaptations to enhance physical safety, mobility, independence and health. The new program also includes a grant component for low-income seniors who don't qualify for a loan.

SHARP provides a maximum home equity loan of \$40,000 per household to seniors with a qualifying income threshold (maximum \$75,000 per household). Under the program, seniors will not be required to make monthly payments as they would with traditional loans. The simple interest loan would be repaid upon the sale of the property, if the senior moves, at end of life, or earlier if the applicant chooses to do so.

Since its launch, the Alberta Government has received over 800 applications. This accounts for approximately \$5 million in loans and \$230,000 in grants. The response from our senior community shows there was a strong need for this kind of program and that we are on the right track. After all, seniors should be able to age comfortably and with dignity – close to friends and family.

The average income of single applicants is \$26,600, receiving an average loan of \$13,100. For couples, the average income is \$45,400 with an average loan of \$16,000. This program will also help to generate new work for contractors and help stimulate Alberta's economy.

March 5 First Quarter (waxing)

Moonlight is strong, encouraging leaf growth. It is a good time for planting, especially two days before the full moon. Take cuttings from plants you wish to propagate. Fertilize as close to the full moon as possible.

March 12 Full Moon (waning)

As the moon wanes, the energy is drawing down. Strong gravitational pull but moonlight is decreasing putting energy into the roots.

March 20 Last Quarter (waning)

Decreased gravitational pull and moonlight. A resting period. Take cuttings from plants you wish to propagate. Dry herbs, flowers and fruit. If you want to control growth or encourage rooting, perform the necessary activities during the waning moon.

March 27 New Moon (waxing)

Increasing moonlight, lunar gravity pulls water up encouraging plant growth and proliferation. Grafting, transplanting, re-potting, and watering. Gather herbs used for essential oils. Oil content is more concentrated at this time.





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
