The school hopes that these monthly blitzes will help to promote "good driving" behaviour and alleviate some of the traffic congestion during school bell times.

REVITALIZING OUR **PLAYGROUNDS**

MRU Systematic Data Observations

As part of the Hidden Valley Community Association's playgrounds revitalization project, summer students from Mount Royal University's research department will be performing systematic data observations of all 16 playgrounds in Hidden Valley/Hanson Ranch.

Starting in early May till the beginning of August, a team of MRU students will be collecting data on how often our playgrounds are being used. This data will include types of physical activity, social interaction, types of play, gender, age, special needs and of course weather. These observations will take place at varying times of the day (e.g. lunch time, after school hours and evenings).

A technical report will be provided to the HVCA at the end of September. This information will help the HVCA determine what playgrounds are being used the most and what type of playgrounds need to exist in our community.

This is a huge step in determining how our community should revitalize our playgrounds and just one of the many things the HVCA is committed to working towards. People with Great Community Spirit Needed

If you are familiar with the Hidden Valley Community Association, you will know it is run completely by volunteers who give of their time and energy on behalf of the residents of Hidden Valley and Hansen Ranch.

We have some important roles that we've been unable to fill for more than 9 months. An example of how this impacts the community was when we found ourselves without a Sports Director. This, and cost factors, resulted in cancellation of the Winter Indoor Soccer program.

Note: We are all volunteers called Directors to ensure we follow Not-For-Profit guidelines.

At this point in time we still need help in the following areas:

- Events Director / Coordinator: This position requires someone to plan community events, order equipment such as bouncy castles, hayrides, food etc. Most of the current Board have experience and are always willing to guide.
- Communications Director: This involves collecting information to put on our website, on Facebook and in the monthly Newsletter. This does not involve a lot of time but whatever time you can spare would be welcome.



- Membership Director: This involves devising methods of increasing community involvement by devising ways to increase our membership. Also, to attend community or local events where potential members might be in attendance.
- Schools Liaison Director: Attend meetings at one of or all our schools to ensure the Association is involved in their discussions and to offer our assistance where needed.
- Fundraising Director: Take over our fundraising initiatives such as contacting local businesses for sponsorship, obtaining income from rink board adverts, and any other great ideas you have.
- Sports Director: To work with Soccer Tech to ensure a quality outdoor soccer program is executed smoothly. To ensure other sports programs, for children and for adults, are implemented e.g. hockey, basketball, baseball.

Benefits of Walking:

As a physiotherapist, people will often ask me "what is the best type of exercise"? My answer is simple, one that you will do! Some like to see just how far they can push their bodies and how fast they can go, while others prefer a gentler, kinder way to get their exercise. Walking is one of the easiest forms of physical fitness and I rarely meet clients who are unable to participate in this activity.

Walking is a low-cost sport; a good pair of shoes and some cleared trails to walk on are the minimum requirement. Additionally, almost everyone can do it. Walking is great for those with long standing hip, knee, or ankle joint problems. The low impact will rarely cause further injury to these areas. It is also great for those just starting back into to exercises who may not have the fitness for other activities.

What's next?

Set realistic goals and start slowly: It is always better to feel like your first walk was easy and you could do more the next time than to feel exhausted and discouraged on Day 1.

Equipment: The most important piece of equipment from

an injury point of view, is footwear - proper footwear with adequate arch support and traction is required. It is also nice to have outerwear for all types of weather conditions especially living in Calgary. If you are very new to exercise, have poor balance, or plan to walk hills, a set of walking poles can help with balance as well as encourage core engagement while walking.

Warm up and cool down: Get your muscles warmed up before you hit the trails with some gentle movements and light stretches. Repeat a similar program at the end. As your muscles cool down, you want to gently stretch them to ensure you maintain flexibility. Be careful not to overstretch - this is when injury can occur.

Find a walking companion or group: studies show that working out with a partner or group leads to higher rates of success and compliance and it is often just more fun!

Don't forget to check out our website at www.fonhs. org for all the information you will need about Plants in Bloom for the May Flower Count, during the last week of May (25-31). This is an annual event, when volunteers survey their favourite natural areas and provide valuable data on the distribution of flowering plants in Alberta. Conduct a fun "trek and check" through your favourite natural space. Expertise in wildflower identification is valuable, but not mandatory. Use our alphabetical flower list, which has space to record how far in bloom the flowers are.

Urban ecology and biodiversity are free and family friendly, in backyards, gardens, schoolyards, local parks, and community green spaces. At any time, citizen scientists can find nature, take photos of their finds, and share their observations by iNaturalist.ca. The app is free, enables identification, and operates all over the world now.

The Calgary City Nature Challenge involves taking photos of plants and animals (26-29 April) and then identifying them (30 April-5 May). Winners are announced 6 May (www.calgarynatureyyc.ca). Calgary, Halifax, and Richmond, B.C. are only 3 of the over 160 cities worldwide to compete for the most observations, number of species, and participants (www.citychallenge.org). Started in 2016 with 2 cities, the City Nature Challenge went national, in 2017, and, in 2018 with 68 cities, became an international event!

The new City Parks and Pathways Bylaw states: "natural area" is a park or portion of park space where the primary role is the protection of an undisturbed (or relatively undisturbed) area of land with characteristics of a natural or native plant community. The Director, Calgary Parks, may close or restrict the use of any park (or portion of a park) to protect endangered or at-risk species; to preserve vegetation required for wildlife; and to rehabilitate a natural area.

To disturb wildlife in a park (\$200-\$300), to disturb or damage park vegetation (\$200-\$300), and to remove park vegetation (\$150-\$250) are only a few of the minimum and specified fines for offences.

Green Carts Spring into Weekly Collection Schedule

Calgarians can visit calgary.ca/collection to find out their new green cart schedule and to sign up for free reminders including phone, email and text alerts or download the free Garbage Day app to receive notifications on their smartphones.

There are no changes to blue or black cart collection.

Evict Radon: Get Your Home Tested

University of Calgary researchers are working to find solutions to Alberta's radon problem as 1 in 6 homes tested in Western Canada had dangerously high levels of radon gas. Radon emits radiation that damages your DNA that can lead to cancer and currently, radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer, but it is entirely preventable. Knowing your home's radon level is the first step to determining if you're at risk. Go to evictradon.ca to find out how you can get a test for your home.







FREEEvents SENIOR'S WEEK

There is no set age as to when a person is considered a senior in Canada. Senior discounts tend to start at age 55 but government benefits say you usually have to be between the ages of 60 and 65 in order to qualify.

According to the 2016 Census of Canada, our Hidden Valley community had a total of 2,285 seniors between the ages of 55 and 99.

June 2nd to the 8th is Alberta's Senior's Week. This is a celebration to acknowledge the contributions of seniors in our community. Hanson Ranch Wetlands Update

Background

The Hanson Ranch Wetpond was constructed in 1999 and is being redesigned. It suffered damage during high water events and has the potential to impact West Nose Creek. The new design will isolate the stormwater facility from West Nose Creek and bring the wetland closer to meeting the current design standards. Design began in Fall 2018 and construction is planned for 2020, pending regulatory approvals and funding availability.

Update

Though construction will not happen for a while, investigative site work has been taking place.

A geotechnical investigation was completed in November 2018. The geotechnical work involved drilling nine (9) boreholes and installing monitoring wells. The boreholes were used to look at ground conditions and the monitoring wells are being used to evaluate groundwater levels in the area. The consultant will continue to check the monitoring wells and measure groundwater levels periodically throughout 2019 and 2020. There are no concerns with contamination in the area and the wells are not being used to monitor water quality.

Other activity on the site may include a crew of City surveyors. They were onsite in early January 2019 to gather important information on existing conditions. They will be back in March 2019 and as needed throughout the project.

Next Steps

The next step is to confirm the design concept and submit applications for regulatory approvals (Summer 2019). Information will be provided to the community once the design concept has been confirmed.



Over the last decade, Hidden Valley and Hanson Ranch have been overlooked in terms of much needed transportation solutions to align with the lived experiences of community members. With the support and feedback of residents and the community association, we have been able to celebrate a number of big wins over the past year and a half. Securing the funding to complete the interchanges along Stoney Trail at Shaganappi and 14th Street will have a positive impact on our communities by decreasing cut-through traffic. The upgrades will also include the right turn out of Hidden Valley on to Shaganappi Trail. We will have a better idea of timeline for construction in the coming months, now that provincial approvals for design are coming in.

In an effort to address speeding on Hidden Creek Boulevard and Hidden Creek Drive, we will be installing curb extensions along Hidden Creek Boulevard at Hidden Creek Way, Hidden Creek Gardens and Hidden Creek Road. We have also been able to extend the Hidden Valley Drive line painting pilot into Hanson Ranch. This traffic calming solution reduces lane widths by painting edge lines that encourage drivers to slow down. It will also reinforce the single lane traffic nature of these roads.

Our office continues to work with City of Calgary Roads Department to address pedestrian safety and traffic congestion at Hidden Creek Drive and Beddington Trail. The goal is to find a solution that ensures our kids can safely get to their schools in Hidden Valley while keeping traffic moving so residents can get to their destinations in a timely manner. Stay tuned for updates as we work through possible options.

These important transportation upgrades are a result of a collaborative effort from community members and the City of Calgary. Our office is proud to be a conduit to ensure Hanson Ranch and Hidden Valley are finally getting the attention they deserve. We value and appreciate your perspectives as we continue with our commitment to advocate for the needs of north central Calgary.
