

HIGHLAND PARK PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



I can't even believe that the title of this message is 2016! Time is truly flying by. I am very, very pleased to report a number of developments in Highland Park Community Association. As of today (January 10, 2016) I can report that we successfully obtained a Community Facility Enhance-

ment Program Grant from the Province of Alberta. This will contribute to nearly half of the costs associated with the ongoing renovation and restoration of our Lower North Hall. This news could not come at a better time as we are currently faced with additional costs associated with the upgrade of our HVAC system in this space. This has been an uphill journey, and I have learned a lot from the restoration work... the difference between a Building Permit and a Development Permit!

So- the other great news that I have to report is that the Board of Directors of both the Edgemont Preschool and the HPCA have agreed to merge into 1 organization. The Preschool will become a program operated by the Highland Park Community Association. While the road to this outcome was challenging and I was greatly disappointed

that we were not able to open up and run the preschool at the Hall this past fall I am heartened to see some committed parents and families here in the Community that really want to see this program get up and running. Their persistence has paid off and we will see a licensed program at the Hall in fall of 2016. The Board will continue to work through the logistics of absorbing the Preschool. Registration for Highland Park Preschool for the fall of 2016 is now open!! Open houses will begin in middle February or early March-I look forward to meeting more parents and families.

The Preschool will run mornings only. Children can participate up to 5 days per week! We are maintaining the co-op approach to this preschool. This keeps costs down, and allows parents to be more actively involved in their children's program. I give a very warm welcome to the parents who are standing by the program- and I look forward to meeting all the new parents and families that will register for fall of 2016. Keep your eyes open for more information in the coming months.

HIGHLAND PARK PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

Planning Committee: Highland Park Planning Committee meetings are scheduled for the first Monday of the month at the community hall. If you are interested please contact Paul Engler.

Development and Planning Initiatives Updates

In the previous of month there were four development permits for Highland Park (DP2015-4895, DP2015-5074, DP2015-5097, DP2015-5135) and one subdivision request (SB2015-0400).

The subdivision request would see #4007 2nd Street NW divided from a single 22.86 meter (75 feet) lot divided into three 7.62 meters (25 feet) lots.

From the development permits, the only item of concern was DP2015-5097 located at #119 - 41 Ave NW. This location is zoned as MC-1 and the developer has applied to put in a six unit development at this location. The community has provided feedback to the city expressing concerns about the scale of this development and ongoing parking issues at this location.

This six unit development is new to Highland Park and represents a change to the normal semi-detached development that has become common within the community over the last several years. With other lots zoned as MC-1 within the community we are anticipating seeing more of this type of development in the future, spurred on by the desire to increase density near the future Green Line.

Parking and Traffic

As part of the concern about the increasing housing density within the neighbourhood and its impact on parking and traffic, Deb Heap has reached out to Councillor Chu to discuss bringing a Parking Permit Zone to Highland Park. Councillor Chu has indicated that he is supportive of this.

The Planning and Development Committee is anticipating circulating a survey to capture issues relating to parking and traffic within the neighbourhood, and hopefully help strengthen our case to bring in a Parking Permit Zone. As always any issues with parking and traffic can be sent to the City via 311.

Councillor Chu will also be hosting a Pedestrian Safety Town Hall for Ward 4, on February 10th, 6:30PM - 8:30PM at the Salvation Army Berkshire Citadel Church, 222 Sandarc Drive NW.

Golf Course Golf Course (LOC2014-0190)

It appears that things are starting to move again on the redevelopment of the Highland Park Golf Course. The City is meeting with the developer on January 18th and 19th to work out land use by-laws for the Direct Control (DC) districts. Once the zoning issues have been worked between The City and the developer there is potential for another round of community presentations. The HPCA will send out notification about any further community consultation with respect to the golf course development.

The city planning staff will not support the land use application in its current form. They are generally in agreement with the community regarding the changes they would like to see to the application before it will receive their endorsement. They are continuing to work with the developer to make changes to the application, including the concerns voiced by the community. We have also met with the developer to directly voice our concerns and they have assured us they will do their best to address any of our outstanding concerns.

The Community continues to encourage the developer to:

Incorporate green space that is accessible to the existing residents.

Minimize the impact to the site and the trees.

Provide more clarity around the expected built form, ensuring the transition between the development and the existing residents is sensitive and includes appropriate buf-

Ensure effective and safe connection of the pathway to existing pathway systems provide enhancements within the community outside of the proposed development.

Further public consultation will be occurring in the New Year. Green Line

With the completion of the design for the South Leg of the Green Line now complete, The City is now turning its attention to the Northern Leg. The engagement process is starting in early February with five dates scheduled. The session covering Highland Park will be Wednesday, February 10, 6pm - 8:30pm at Mount View School, 2004 4 St NE.

There will be several additional rounds of community engagement as the designs for the North leg of the Green Line become more solidified. The entire process should take approximately one year.

Statement of Significance

Highland Park Community Planning Committee is working on a community led project to write a Statement of Significance for Highland Park. This document will summarize the neighborhood history and reference any local historical and natural characteristics which residents believe are important to preserve. It is hoped this statement will then be used as input into any City of Calgary local area plans. The document can also help facilitate discussions between planners,



developers and community residents. Perhaps you have some community stories or knowledge of Highland Park's past to share. Maybe you can tell me about any special landmarks, places or architectural elements you think are important to preserve. HIGHLAND WATCH **UPDATE**

Highland Watch is the community safety group that has committed to working together to ensure Highland Park stays as safe a neighborhood as it can be.

Gord Denison, the Calgary Police Service Community Liaison Officer assigned to Highland Park, attended the HPCA Board meeting in January. The Board had heard some concerns from area residents regarding recent crime in the neighborhood, such as incidents of house break-ins, thefts from vehicles, and stolen vehicles. The Board wanted to know what light Gord could shed on what was going on, whether crime rates were higher recently in our area, and what he suggested we could all do to try to prevent crime in our neighborhood. Below is a summary of what he said.

- Highland Park has a relatively low crime rate, which has been fairly stable over time. You can check the crime statistics, by neighborhood, for the most recent week and up to the last 6 months on the Calgary Police website: crimemap.calgarypolice.ca
- The area crime rate will often fluctuate up & down in the short-term based on which criminals are in or out of jail, as they tend to go back to their old habits once they are back on the streets, so the crime rate for that type of crime (i.e. theft from vehicles or break-ins) until they get put back in jail.
- Calgary Police are patrolling Highland Park on a frequent basis. They have been enforcing speed limits in the area (i.e. on Centre St through the playground zone at Buchanan School and on the streets around James Fowler School). They have also been keeping an eye on certain problem residences and areas where criminals tend to gather, especially at night. This has resulted in a reduction in problems with speeding and other criminal activity.

Suggestions for reducing the crime risk in our neighbourhood:

1. Know your neighbors! If you don't, you should walk over and introduce yourself, especially to the residents who live on either side of your home, the ones directly across the street, and those who live across your back alley. Get their names, house numbers, and phone numbers, and give them your contact information too. Note, you can print out a My Neighbor Card for this purpose from: https://calgarycommunities.com/my-neighbourcard/That way, if you (or they) see something out of the ordinary (like the garage door being left open when it is usually closed), you can call them to find out if you need

to call the police or not.

- 2. Know what cars should be parked on your street, i.e. what cars are owned by your neighbors. That way you can keep an eye out for cars that are out of the ordinary and that may be linked to criminal activity. You might notice an abandoned car that may actually have been stolen. You might notice people sitting in cars outside a residence for a long time that seems odd. Don't be afraid to ask them what they are doing, or to write down the license plate number and call it in to Gord or to the Police non-emergency line at 403-266-1234. If it is criminal activity, the fact that they know the neighbors are watching is often enough to scare them away.
- 3. When to call 911: If you see a crime in progress or see someone suspicious prowling around a home, call 911 and give them as much detail as you can (description of the individual, what type & color of clothing, where they are or what direction they are travelling, etc). Police will be dispatched right away.

Good news: A group of residents were able to work together with the businesses in the Highland Grocery block to have the pay phone there removed, as it had become a phone that drug dealers were using for their business. This has resulted in a major reduction in illegal drug activity in the neighborhood. From all of us, thanks!

Need a hand to prepare your tax return?

Once again, the Highland Park Community Association will be offering an income tax service to individuals and families who have low income and a simple tax situation.

As a general guideline, low income individuals would earn up to \$30,000 per year and couples would earn up to \$40,000 per year. Any interest income must be less than \$1,000.

Not eligible for this service are individuals who have self-employment income, business or rental income and expenses, capital gains or losses, employment expenses, or have filed for bankruptcy.

The service will be offered between March 1 and April 30. Appointments to meet with a volunteer can be arranged by emailing hpcacvitp@gmail.com or by phoning 403-276-6969.

You should note that the volunteers providing this service are not employees or volunteers of the Canada Revenue Agency.

Know Your City Hall

Calgary City Hall is, by definition, a public space where citizens can visit, attend Council and Committee meetings, and present on issues that matter to them. City Hall 101 aims to throw open the doors and welcome you to this important city space.

Much like an introductory course at University (hence the "101"), this afternoon workshop is an interactive welcome to vour City Hall. In just two and half hours, you will learn about the inner workings of Council and its Committees. And to help you find your voice in government, the event will explore the many ways (at City Hall, online, or in your community) that you can connect with your City, Mayor, and Councillors.

Hosted by the Mayor's Civic Engagement Committee, 3 Things for Calgary, and the City Clerk's Office, City Hall 101 starts by welcoming you and other Calgarians to Historic City Hall and the Municipal Complex.

Beyond touring these important public spaces, you will also learn from citizens like yourself about how you can present to Council or Committee. From getting your turn at the microphone or getting tips or tricks about speaking with Council, the goal of the workshop is to help you get the knowledge and confidence to connect with The City and your politicians about the issues that matter to you.

The next City Hall 101 is 4 p.m. - 6:30 p.m. on Monday, March 7, 2016. You can register at Calgary.ca/CityHall101.

Interested in doing a job that counts? The City is recruiting civic census takers now!

The City's civic census is conducted annually and that means census taker recruitment is underway. The City needs nearly 1,000 flexible workers to help with the door-to-door physical Census collection and data recording in April.

Census takers need to be able to walk in seasonable weather conditions and easily operate a tablet computer. Census takers are provided with essential training, to be completed at home online and must be available for an in-person session in March.

Applications can be downloaded online and are accepted in person, at The City of Calgary Election and Information Services office, 1103 55 Ave NE, between 8:30 a.m. - 4 p.m. Monday to Friday. In addition to completing an application form, there is a written skills assessment test that takes approximately 30 minutes to complete.

Hello Calgary-Klein!

I've spoken to many in the riding that are concerned about the effects low global oil prices are having on Alberta's businesses, workers, and families. Our reliance on a single commodity, the price over which we have no control, contributes substantially to the problem. While Alberta is and will be an energy province for years to come, our government is taking important steps to diversify our economy to increase its resiliency when faced with volatile changes in the price of our energy exports. Some of these steps include:

- Funding for Student Temporary Employment Program (STEP), which will provide 3,000 students with valuable work experience, as well as help small businesses and non-profits connect with a talented and motivated workforce.
- Introduced the Job Creation Incentive Program, which supports employers who create net new employment through the provision of grants.

Albertans want stable public services that are there for them when times are tough. In times like these, we need to strengthen health care, education, and social services, because taking care of each other is the Alberta way. Several steps we've taken to stabilize public services include:

- Freezing post-secondary tuition for the next two years and re-investing funding for post-secondary schools to ensure higher education is accessible and affordable for families.
- · Investing in our students by hiring more teachers and support staff, as well as lowering the burden of school fees on families.

INFILL DEVELOPMENT

Are you concerned about the growing number of infills in our community?

Currently there is a precedent setting development permit application for a 3 story infill on 21 Highwood Place currently hearing objections. The developer has not met many of the cities bylaws.

We, as a community, can maintain control of this development and others in our neighbourhood and there are many ways to do it. But we must engage ourselves and have our voices heard. You may think 'it's in a different part of the neighbourhood, it doesn't affect me'. However, if we let this one proceed as planned it could very well happen right next door to you, too! Developments like these, left unchecked, run the risk of blocking views, blocking sunlight and encroaching on privacy by having windows overlooking into neighbouring homes. Many of our neighbouring communities have their controls in place to have their say and control future developments, however, Highwood has none, vet.

If you would like to see developmental controls instigated in your community, please come forth to help with this endeavor. A committee is being headed by one of your neighbours, Dean Stewart. As concerned community members of Highwood, we would like express our concerns over the proposed development at 21 Highwood Place NW.

- First and foremost, the proposed massive modern 3 story does not fit in with the current houses in the area.
- The proposed front setback is encroaching by 2.6 me-
- The proposed balcony on the front of the house is 31.9 sq. meters. Code is 10 sq. meters.
- The proposed rear deck is encroaching on setback rules by 0.3 meters.
- There is no fence height on the current plans.
- The elevations from all 4 corners on the lot are not disclosed. This doesn't give an accurate depiction of what the final height of the building will be.
- There is almost 200 sq. ft of glass coverage on the back of the proposed property that will directly look into at least 2 of the neighbors behind it.

We are certainly not discouraging redevelopment in the community, but feel that a massive modern structure of over 5000 square feet on the first half of the lot being developed which is twice the size of the biggest newly built house and 5 times the size of the existing renovated bungalows in the area. It is an eyesore that is incongruent with the needs or wants of the community.

The neighbors that are immediately behind the proposed structure will certainly lose all or most of their views, which will adversely affect their property values. Many of us have lived here for more than 15 years and purchased our properties because of the fantastic views of both downtown and the city.

Please stop this development, or drastically change it, so it better fits into the community. Highwood Place is not the street for infills dividing the large lots.



60 years of the **58th Thorncliffe Scout Group**

The Beginning

60 years ago a few parents were interested in starting a Boy Scouts Group. They were on the outskirts of town and a community was just starting to be formed. They needed a place to have their meetings but there were no buildings hold them in. One of the Thorncliffe community members happened to work at the old 'wartime' airport terminal and found out that there were some U.S.A.F shacks up for grabs for only the moving costs. The Scoutmaster asked the newly forming Thorncliffe/Greenview Community Association if they could provide ground to put these buildings on. The Community Association was very agreeable to this and the Scout Group raised the \$500 needed to get the shacks to the property. There were two buildings joined by a kitchen. That first year there were about 5 boy scouts and 2 Leaders. Registration fees were only \$1.16 cents per child.

At around the same time the newly established community of Thorncliffe/Greenview was interested in using the Scout Hall. They asked the fledging 58th Thorncliffe Boys Scouts group to rent theirs. The Scout group was instrumental in helping build the foundations of the Thorncliffe Greenview Community Association. The new Community Association used the Scout hall while a new Thorncliffe Greenview Community Center was being built. During this time the Community Association and Scout Groups Parent Association were very intertwined, the scout's and their parent's drove much of the fundraising and community awareness.

A Charter was signed on November 24, 1955 documenting that the new Thorncliffe Greenview Community Association would now be the Sponsor of 58th Thorncliffe Boys Scouts.
