

HIGHLAND PARK GOLF COURSE REDEVELOPMENT **OPEN HOUSE**

MONDAY MARCH 14th at 7PM HIGHLAND PARK **COMMUNITY CENTRE**

Some time has passed since the initial engagement sessions were conducted in the community and the proposed development has evolved from what most of you would have envisioned.

The revised application could go to the Calgary Planning Commission as early as April 21st, which would mean a public hearing on the application June 13th. These dates could be pushed back, but likely not significantly, so it is important residents attend the open house to familiarize themselves with the finalized application.

The addition of an LRT line up Centre Street has increased the city's expectation for density along this corridor. Though the exact location of the station is undetermined, the development, will be within a ten minute walk to a future station and subject to the City's Transit Oriented Development (TOD) policies. Centre Street is identified as an Urban Corridor (Main Street) in the Municipal Development Plan and requires a higher level of intensity and mixed use to locate there. The C-Cor land use district proposed for the land adjacent to Centre Street would provide for this.

The Community Association recognizes the city encourages a minimum density to support the LRT line along Centre and the developer requires a minimum density to support the cost of redevelopment. Our position is the best development would encourage consolidated open park space, sensitive transitions with existing residential development and retention of mature trees. Disruption of the natural site would be minimized (limited stripping and filling) and the pathway through the site would connect to existing pathway systems in a way that facilitates safe pedestrian passage. Green space would be maximized, physically accessible and visually open to the rest of the community. Guidelines and controls would ensure the land use districts defined built form as part of the land use bylaw approval.

The community association was not satisfied with building heights and configurations in the original application or with the proposed modifications to the site with regard to tree removal and fill. The developer's amendments in response to the city's detailed team review did not satisfy any of our concerns. It is the Community's understanding from the city, the developer's latest proposals have moved from the previous Direct Control District submissions, with lower building heights and better definitions. As of the newsletter deadline, the formal amendments have not been submitted to the city (developer is targeting March 1), so the community association has not seen the proposed revisions, and cannot say if the changes are consistent with the comments we have made on the previous application. We will review them as soon as they are submitted and will advise the residents of our position at that time (likely the open house).

Green Line Update

The planning for the Green Line North is now underway. Funding for this project has been received from the Federal and Municipal levels of government, providing \$3 billion of the \$4.5 billion estimated cost. The only level of government to not yet commit to financing is the provincial government. The provincial government has received a funding request from the City of Calgary and are anticipating a response within the next several months. Depending on how much funding is received, the plan is for the Green Line to be built out in parallel in the North and the South. If full funding is not received the Green Line will be limited in length running from Beddington to Shepard, with extensions to further outlying communities done at a later time. Development of the Green Line is planned to start in parallel in the North and South directions, originating downtown.

The City is moving fast on the planning and development of the Green Line, the Information Sessions were conducted during the month of February. The next round

of consultation will be Station Area Workshops which should occur in March/April/May. These will be much more intensive workshops focusing on input from the public primarily around the connection to the LRT stations via different transport modes such as Walk, Bike, and Bus. As the dates for these sessions are made available they will be communicated to the community members.

All stations are going to be covered, however the final locations of the stations has not been determined, the locations communicated to this point are just for reference and could be shifted several blocks in the design depending on the input from the workshops. It will be May or June before many of the details as to final alignment of the Green Line will be known.

The proposal as it currently stands would see the train running down the middle of Centre Street. The City's preference is to reduce the Centre Street to one lane North and South bound between the 64th Ave and the city center. The City does not want to incur extra costs for land acquisition, and should cause less disruption to the business located along Centre Street.

Due to the rapid timeline for public consultation on the Green Line are, we are not always given sufficient lead time to get the dates and locations into the newsletter. Any dates for public consultations will be posted to the Highland Park website at www. highlandparkcommunity.ca/.

Need a hand to prepare your tax return?

Once again, the Highland Park Community Association will be offering an income tax service to individuals and families who have low income and a simple tax situation.

As a general guideline, low income individuals would earn up to \$30,000 per year and couples would earn up to \$40,000 per year. Any interest income must be less than \$1,000.

Not eligible for this service are individuals who have self-employment income, business or rental income and expenses, capital gains or losses, employment expenses, or have filed for bankruptcy.

The service will be offered between March 1 and April 30. Appointments to meet with a volunteer can be arranged by emailing hpcacvitp@gmail.com or by phoning 403-276-6969.

You should note that the volunteers providing this service are not employees or volunteers of the Canada Revenue Agency.



I hope this newsletter finds you well. It's been a busy few weeks for the Government of Alberta, so I've got a few news items to share with you.

Royalty Review

The Government of Alberta recently adopted the recommendations of the Royalty Review Advisory Panel, and they will come into effect beginning in 2017. The modernized royalty system will provide a simpler, more transparent and efficient system that will promote jobs and investment activity, while increasing revenue to Albertans over time. In addition, the unprecedented level of transparency that the changes will bring about -- through reports and disclosures on prices, production, and costs, all accessible through a website-- will ensure that all citizens can monitor the new system and ensure that it meets the priorities of Albertans. The new royalty system will also reward producers who reduce drilling costs below the industry average through innovation, which over time, will grow net revenues industry-wide.

The panel listened to industry, labour, environmental groups, academics, business leaders, community leaders and thousands of Albertans who provided their input in-person and online. The new changes will ensure that Alberta's resources provide the right rewards to our partners, and the right return for Albertans for future generations.

Petrochemical Diversification Program


The Government of Alberta is taking action on the economy, helping to create jobs, attract investment and diversify the economy through the recentlylaunched Petrochemicals Diversification. By encouraging companies to invest in new facilities in Alberta by providing royalty credits, the development of new facilities could create up to 3,000 new jobs in construction as well as 1,000 jobs once operations begin. Furthermore, these facilities could attract between \$3 billion and \$5 billion in investment.

Safe and Caring Schools

At the request of Alberta school boards, Education Minister David Eggen has released a new resource to aid school boards in drafting policies to support welcoming, caring, respectful and safe schools. The document, Guidelines for Best Practices: Creating Learning Environments that Respect Diverse Sexual Orientations, Gender Expressions and Gender Identities, will assist educators as they work to accommodate their students in situations that they have not previously encountered. It has received good feedback from the Alberta Teachers' Association.

Our guidelines have identified that not all students are supported in their homes when it comes to their expressed gender identity. A 2015 Canadian Trans Youth Health Survey found that 70 per cent of respondents felt their family didn't understand them and one in three did not have an adult they could discuss their problems with. Schools can be the place where students struggling at home can feel safe. It's our legal responsibility to support them as best we can, and these quidelines help educators to do so.

Faithful Volunteers

Hopefully all Highwood residents are aware of our unique snow shovelling program which has been operating for 12 years!

Over this period we have served approximately 300 seniors and disabled people and given a first pay check, lots of healthy exercise and the opportunity to develop a positive work ethic to about 240 youth. We are the envy of many surrounding communities.

However this program depends upon the planning and volunteer efforts of two very special ladies, namely Cathy South and Joni Wright.

In September of each year their work begins as they recruit Highwood youth as shovellers and by mid October they will have introduced the youth to their nearby clients and everything is in place for the first snowfall. Joni and Cathy moniter snow shovelling for the following six months and distribute checks at the end of each month.

Their volunteer work is not completed until evaluation forms have been collected from both clients and youth at the end of May.

Cathy and Joni have made meaningful contact with our youth, their parents and our senior clients with the result being a strong intergenerational program.

Thank you Joni and Cathy for your many years of volunteer services. We commend you for a big job well done.

I have long been an advocate for managing the cost of Calgary's growth. After a decade of debate and billions of dollars added to The City's debt, City Council unanimously agreed to end the "sprawl subsidy" to ensure that growth pays for itself. I am extremely proud of this work.

Over the last year, The City worked closely with the urban and suburban development industries to establish an offsite levy to apply to all new developments. An important partnership emerged, one in which the industry agreed to become an enhanced steward of a growing City. The new rates took effect on February 1st of this year and will provide the City with a lot more financial flexibility.

As a result, levies paid by developers to The City will now cover the cost of infrastructure needed for new communities, as well as upgrades to infrastructure for established communities. Those costs have to be paid one way or another. With the new levy, the cost of necessary infrastructure is included in the purchase price, rather than hidden through property taxes or utility fees.

The key elements of the new off-site levy are:

Developers will pay for water and wastewater treatment in new and established communities city-wide;

Developer levies will cover the full cost of water distribution, wastewater collection, drainage, transportation (roads, intersections, traffic signals, bridges), and community services (libraries, police stations, fire halls) in new communities;

With this important policy established, the stage is set for the next steps. New development in established communities means real change for the residents who live there, and added wear and tear on public amenities. Increased density can also mean a dramatic increase in property tax revenue. As part of the levy discussion, The City agreed to work with the urban developers, and the communities experiencing redevelopment, to find ways to reinvest in aging infrastructure. Communities experiencing significant change will see a direct benefit, with improvements to valued amenities like parks, sidewalks, recreation centres, and libraries.

Over the next year, I will be meeting with Ward 7 communities to talk more about community improvements resulting from redevelopment.
