



COMMUNITY PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

The Hillhurst Sunnyside Planning Committee ("HSPC") fulfils an important function in the City of Calgary's planning and development process. It provides a local perspective and feedback to the City, developers and to the decision-makers at Calgary City Council on important matters in the neighbourhood. Redevelopment in the community is guided by the policies contained in the Hillhurst Sunnyside Area Redevelopment Plan or "ARP" which is available on calgary.ca/ hillhurstsunnyside.

Community residents (whether you rent or own your home) can come out and meet your neighbours and learn more by attending our monthly meetings! HSPC meets on the second Tuesday of every month here at the HSCA (1320 5 Ave NW) from 7-9pm. Guests and/or potential volunteers are welcome. Our next meeting will take place on June 14th, 2016.

321-331 9A Street NW (Minto Communities)

This is an application for a 9 storey (26 metre) building containing 103 units on the west side of 9A Street; the same height as the Pixel/Lido buildings just a block south of the site. This project will replace 6 vacant single family homes. The land use (or rezoning) application will be heard at Calgary Planning Commission and Council in the near future. The HSCA has a copy of the plans for the Development Permit application, which is under review at the City; the DP is now separate and dependent on the approval of the Land Use Amendment.

1134-1160 Memorial Drive NW (Anthem Properties)

As pictured in last month's Voice article, this project envisions a medium-density mid-rise building which is separated into two wings. This project will replace 13 single family homes on the west side of the Kensington Riverside Inn. It will contain 93 units at a height of 16 metres and five floors with the top floor set back. The at-grade units contain individual entrances, patios and landscaping which will help integrate this building into the neighbourhood. Anthem Properties has website available at www.1100memorialdrive.com. This project is currently under review at the City of Calgary; plans are available for public viewing at the HSCA.

1020 2 Ave NW (Currently ContainR)

This is a City-owned parcel located on a triangular lot bounded by the C-Train tracks, 2nd Ave and 9th St. This lot has been slated for an affordable and mixed-market housing development. The City of Calgary held public engagement sessions this past winter asking residents what they would like to see on the site in addition to the building. While there are no new updates at the moment, you can still contact Susan.Sanderson@calgary. ca for more information. Keep on a look out for future engagement sessions where you can provide your input on the design of the new building!

802 2 Ave NW (Sunnyside Grocery)

This is a development proposal on the Sunnyside Grocery site right across the street from Sunnyside School. There is an active land use and Development Permit, which is still under review at the City of Calgary. At the time of writing, planning committee members are reviewing the rezoning and DP application and the comments received at the recent development open house. The plans are available at the HSCA for public viewing during office hours. Please visit the applicant's website for updates at facebook.com/sunnysidegrocery.

Hillhurst Sunnyside Community Amenity Fund

As of April 11, City Council has approved of the ARP amendment to create the HSCAF (replacing the Hillhurst Sunnyside Parks Improvement Fund for Bow to Bluff, which was fully funded by Council's Enmax Legacy Fund). The contribution rate for development within the Transit Oriented Development study area remains at \$17.85 per square metre above the "base" density. The draft Terms of Reference for the administration of this fund is being discussed prior to its approval at City Council this month (June 2016). Kensington Public Realm Improvement Project

The City of Calgary has started construction on improvements to the pedestrian experience in the Kensington shopping area. The project spans Kensington Road (from 10 St to 14 St) and 10 Street (between Memorial Dr to 5 Ave). Work includes replacement of sidewalks, street trees, new lighting and street furniture. More information including an up-to-date construction schedule will be posted on calgary.ca/kensington or you can call 311 for information.

Fifth Avenue NW Bike Lanes

The construction of the bike lanes is expected to start in May. The City will be installing new bike lanes and curb extensions on 5 Ave between 10 St and 14 St, which will connect to the existing bike network on 10 St and where 5 Ave becomes 6 Ave past 14 St NW. The City is also removing on-street parking from the north side and moved to the south side of 5 Ave, east of the HSCA. Alberta Guide Dog

magine being able to transform someone's life! This is what a professionally trained Guide Dog or Autism Support Dog can do for someone who is blind or visually impaired or for a child with moderate to severe autism.

Take a moment and visualize the benefits these service dogs give their recipients on a day-to-day basis; increased safety, enhanced mobility, facilitated safe navigation and freedom and confidence to explore for blind/visually-impaired individuals.

For a child with autism, improved safety, positive changes in behaviour, improved social skills, more predictability in social situations, increased security and support for the child, and much more are possible. The entire family benefits. Having an Autism Support Dog means being able to do simple things the rest of us take for granted, like going to the supermarket, the mall or the park as a family. In essence, it means being able to experience childhood, instead of missing out.

Alberta Guide Dogs is a division of the registered charity British Columbia Guide Dog Services. Our mission is to meet the growing demand for professionally trained Guide Dogs and Autism Support Dogs for citizens of British Columbia and Alberta.

Although often viewed as a dog organization, BC & Alberta Guide dogs is actually an organization about people. When evaluating applicants' suitability for Guide Dog or Autism Support Dog training, we see ability rather than disability. All individual training programs are tailored to the needs of each individual, which includes domiciliary (at-home) training in the client's familiar environment.

Each puppy born through our in-house breeding program has the potential to grow up to change someone's life. While our services are provided at no cost to recipients, it takes two years and up to \$35,000 to breed, raise and train one of these furry heroes-in-themaking. We rely on the generosity of donors, as well as special events for funding.

To date, in BC and Alberta, 116 guide dogs have significantly changed the lives of their owners in a myriad of ways, including safe and enhanced mobility. Thirty-five children and their families, all of whom are living with autism, are enjoying the diverse and wide-ranging benefits of an Autism Support Dog. Demand for our services continues to rapidly grow and our goal is to graduate 220 service dog teams by the year 2020.

This group meets each Monday from about 1 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. for cards, refreshments and socializing. This free and informal drop-in group welcomes interested seniors to come out and meet with others for some socialization.

Community Assistance For Seniors

This program is committed to providing supports to seniors in HSCA and 11 other communities to help seniors remain in their homes for as long as possible or as long as they choose.

Currently the program's main supports are housekeeping, snow removal and yard work. More information is available on the website or you can call Debbie at 403 - 283 - 0554 ext 224 to learn more about these programs.

Did You Know? **DECSIONS AND PLANNING**

Making or helping to make decisions and planning for future possibilities is not something that many people want to address. We think we have lots of time, we don't want to bother our family and sometimes we don't know what to do. Sometimes the only thing we do is complete a Will that lets our family know how we want our "Estate" to be distributed between our family and friends, but this does not help with other decisions that may be made while we are still here.

Having discussions and planning for possibilities will decrease a lot of worry, concerns and what ifs. We cannot plan for every possibility but we can put some processes into place that we can adjust and adapt as things change down the road. Having plans and decisions reduce our stress levels and allow us and our families to focus on what is important at the time, caring, supporting, and being there and not worry about major decisions because the decisions have been talked about and everyone knows the wishes of the individual. We generally just need to follow the plan.

There are four areas (not including wills) that are important to have discussions about and make decisions on. Over the next couple of months I will try to give you information about each of the areas that hopefully will help you to make the planning journey a little easier. I am not an expert in these areas but I hope that the information will help start the thinking process and you will see the importance of learning more. (It is suggested that everyone over the age of 18 have these in place)

Supported Decision Making:

One of the easiest steps we can make is around supported decision making. This option supports adults who need assistance making personal and/or financial decisions. This does not mean that we give up our ability to make decisions but it provides help with complex decisions. If we are ill or don't want to go through the health care process alone, we can have up to 3 "supporters" who can attend a doctor's appointment, share our concerns and questions and help us to keep track of information that can sometimes be overwhelming

when we are facing challenges and receiving a lot of information about our situation.

A supporter that you trust can access personal information about your health care, work with you to think through a decision and even communicate your decision. This is a process for now and/or for the future. Having someone you trust support you when needed (for example if you are undergoing a treatment that leaves you feeling unwell) your supporter can talk to your medical team and then share information with you later when you are feeling better. Without this type of support agreement, the doctors and other care providers cannot share personal information about you or discuss information about your situation or treatment. You do not lose your ability to make decisions but your supporter can help you to make decisions, ask questions and communicate (especially if language skills are challenging for you).

There is no cost to this type of support document and you do not need a lawyer. You complete the document and you can change the supporter and who can access the information at any time. If a personal directive comes into effect than the supported decision making authorization ends.

For more information, check out the website below. There are forms on the site for setting up a supporter and for changing your supporter if necessary. You decide how people will support you. There is also a video about supported decision-making.

What are we?

containR is a pop up arts and culture hub for people of all ages – championing a 100-mile diet of creative community ideas – developed by Springboard Performance. Together with partner Hillhurst Sunnyside Community Association we brought containR to the Triangle site on the corner of 9th Street and 2nd Avenue NW.

containR is the first city permitted Art Park in Calgary and the land it sits on the first brownfield (empty lot) to be returned to community use in the city.

contain R has grown. We have more shipping containers, an open air theatre, a courtyard made of re-purposed rig mats, solar power, moveable seating, sculpture, a little library, permaculture gardens and bee keeping.

With the community we enjoyed the first Stampede Hangover picnic with Lemon Bucket Orkestra and 400 local music lovers, developed bi-weekly music and market Thursdays, presented partner events like Sled Island, Africadey and Beakerhead. We showcase stellar dance artists and embed artists residencies and community arts programming such as Springboard Performance's Front Lawn Dances (hyperlink for Front Lawn Dances: https://vimeo.com/141242448) and Body of Water performances along the Bow River. We have developed a good neighbour policy and developed policy with the city around arts placemaking on city-owned land.

Springboard Performance's artistic director, Nicole Mion, received the Mayor's Arts Champion arts placemaking award in 2015. She has been invited to Toronto, Montreal and Italy to speak about containR and arts placemaking in the community.

IN & AROUND SCHOOL

Hillhurst School

A standing ovation and a rousing round of applause to the cast and crew of **DOPPEL!** Doppel is a bizarre underground metropolis inhabited by four queens and their twinned citizens, who get an unexpected visit from two surface dwellers. These unknowing invaders are, unfortunately, without the required 'doubles', and are marched off to a murky Doppel prison. Sound intriguing? Beguiling? Darkly alluring? How about musical? For the 300 students at Hillhurst School, it was musical beyond all else. And to the eight hundred appreciative spectators of this outstanding **student opera**, it was pure magic.

This opera is the result of seven months hard work and a lot of imagination and determination. The students were the stars and the backbone of the whole production, and guiding them through were our two immensely talented and visionary music teachers, Ms. O and Ms. A. Bravo! We would also like to thank the librettist, composer, director and technical guru from Calgary Opera's Let's Create an Opera program, the program sponsor, Repsol, the Hillhurst Parent Council, and all the teachers, staff and parents who worked tirelessly on this main event. The goal of this program was to bring the entire school community together, joining voices, ideas, talents and opinions, and in this we surely succeeded.

For the third year running, our student Marathon Club is out in Riley Park for the month of May, stretching legs and lungs and attempting to cross the finish line with a marathon under their belts. The students run one to five kilometres a day, hoping to accumulate the 42.2 km and build up their endurance for long-distance running. We are cheering you on!

Also in May, our Grade 4/5 classes attended Open Minds. These week-long field courses move the classroom into the community, and expose students to curriculum through hands-on experiences. Last year our Grade Six classes were immersed in Zoo School, and this year our students will be delving into the fine arts at **The** Hub for Inspired Learning at the Arts Commons. Students will work with a variety of different writers, painters, installation and performance artists to expand the right side of their brains and take their learning to a new creative level.

An enormous thank you to all our Grandparents who participated in the Grandparent Reading Program this year, volunteering their time and love of learning to read, play games, and have meaningful conversations with our students. Your presence in our school exemplifies the spirit of community and the importance of intergenerational experiences, which are often overlooked in our busy and technological world. Thank you for being part of something so critical and rewarding. We look forward to seeing you all back in the fall!

And to our Grade Six Students, who are winding up their time here at Hillhurst School, we trust that your final grand adventure with us - Outdoor School in the Albertan wilds near Nordegg - gives you all the confidence and skills you need to move forward in your life, like compass-reading, fire-starting, edible plant identification, and mosquito-tolerance. With these newly acquired life skills, you will be able to survive anything, even junior high! A fond farewell to you all.

Upstream Forest School

From bridges, to string, to roller coasters, to pulleys to elevators. This may not seem like a natural progression, but in Forest School, it makes perfect sense.

Our youngest class, the Chickadees (aged 3-5) became interested in building bridges for the animals, and we examined the idea of wildlife corridors, a place for both animals and people to be safe. I brought a slack line so the children could experiment with what a bridge does; it wiggles, it swings, it gets tighter the closer to the anchor points you get...all things they discovered on their own through hands on learning. The next week I brought string for the children to make their own bridges and slack lines with, and soon a roller coaster was set up for the animal stuffies we have. The animals went from high to low (gravity) and certain lines could only hold stuffies of a certain size and weight. Yes, the 3 year olds are experimenting with mechanical engineer-

In order to enhance and deepen their investigation of the bridges and the string, we brought pulleys for the children to play with. They discovered that by pulling down on one rope, the other end of the rope going

through the pulley went up! A flag pole was born, then a ride for the stuffies; soon, we were talking about how elevators work with weights and pulleys. Of course, we had to make one!

We brought buckets the next week, and used a harness and climbing equipment to pull children up using the weight of the rocks in the bucket on the other side. The children were thrilled, and truly understood the concept of how elevators work! We also experimented with weight; how many rocks would lift each child? How many rocks were needed for a perfect balance of bucket and child?

Our study of bridges and simple machines has taken us many places; this is how Forest School works! Everything is hands on and begins with the children's questions and passions about what they are learning. If you have children in your life, leave a pulley and some rope in your backvard and see what creativity ensues!

The Development Levy: Next Steps

In February 2016, The City implemented new levies for development in both new and existing communities, marking a turning point in Calgary's approach to managing and paying for growth. As I shared in your March newsletter, the development levies are the outcome of The City and the development industry working together on an agreement for how to cover the full cost of growth.

So what has changed? Previously, The City covered the costs of major infrastructure upgrades like new wastewater treatment plants for greenfield development, which effectively amounted to a "sprawl subsidy". With the new agreement now in place, developers will pay for the full cost of critical municipal infrastructure.

I have been working to achieve fair development levies since before I was elected to City Council, and while the new levies are a major accomplishment, the work is not yet done. The ultimate goal is for the levy to help fund public realm and facility improvements in established neighbourhoods that are experiencing significant redevelopment.

How can the levy help? When property is redeveloped for higher density, The City collects an increase in property taxes. We call this phenomenon "uplift". The City plans to capture a portion of this uplift for reinvestment in local amenities and public realm improvements for neighbourhoods going through change.

Common examples of improvements could be upgraded sidewalks and lighting, preservation of heritage buildings, new or refurbished parks and green spaces, or renovations to recreation and community centres.

The City is just starting to research the process for identifying amounts available for community reinvestment projects. As we move into this important next phase, it is critical that we involve Calgarians. We want to tap into local knowledge to determine opportunities that can enrich your neighbourhoods. To that end, I brought together Ward 7 community associations and City staff to start thinking about what types of reinvestment they would like to see as their communities experience redevelopment. The needs and goals of each community will likely be different, and we will look to your community associations to help identify areas of improvement that matter to you.


