

Our Community Association board has had another busy year and as the new president of such an active and vibrant group of people, I have had to navigate a steep learning curve. Thank you to all who have helped me in this important and sometimes daunting leadership role!

I encourage you to read the directors' reports about their many accomplishments and activities this past year. They will give you details about the many projects and activities that your board has been involved with over the last 12 months. I will now mention some of the highlights as well as thoughts on future endeavours for our community association.

First - the fun stuff! Our board voted unanimously last December to provide funds for maintenance of the outdoor rinks at Green Park. Thanks goes to Lucas Ramage for buying a snow blower and to his crew of neighbours for using it to keep the ice cleaned off. As well, our board was very happy to pay for several ice cleaning sessions to maintain the surface. The rinks were well used and enjoyed by residents of all ages and we have budgeted funds to continue maintenance again this winter!

Expenditures to also improve the enjoyment of our community facility included the purchase of a new scoreboard for the gym and, as you may have noticed at our meeting, a new outside entrance sign, and new flooring for rooms, hallways and washrooms. Thank you to Gunter Sammet for the scoreboard project and to Kathleen Staniland for applying successfully for a grant to pay for 75% of the flooring project and for supervising its installation.

Our board is trying to communicate with our residents more efficiently and effectively. Over the last year our Communication Director, Liz Stewart, has worked hard to improve and maintain our HH-BH.ca website, work with Great News Publishing to improve our newsletter, The Beacon, and set up Twitter and Face Book accounts. Thank you to Liz and her helpers for these important steps forward in engaging and communicating with residents.

Less fun but necessary was the hand-over of our community run kindergarten to the Calgary Board of Education at Briar Hill Elementary School. It was very unfortunate that our ability as volunteers to administer the program was no longer adequate, and regrettable that the change had to happen quickly due to unforeseen circumstances. The hours of work and worry that were involved were too numerous to count. I owe our board's Education Directors, Jill Letal and JIII Hadland a huge thank you, and I thank everyone both on and off the board who supported us during this difficult project.

One worry is the decreased revenue that we have received from gym rentals. We depend on this source of income to pay for a big part of our operating budget. Some regular renters have moved to their own new facilities or other venues and we haven't replaced them, leaving the gym empty more often. And some of the decrease may be due to our hurting local economy. Increasing facility rental must be a priority in the coming year.

And now a look into the year ahead:

Our casino funds have been carefully saved over many years with plans to use them to help finance a renovation or expansion to our facility. The Alberta Gaming and Liquor Commission (AGLC) stipulates that their proceeds must be spent within a specific time period. We have been allowed to extend this period in the past but were recently told that our board must submit definite plans and a time frame in order to keep these funds. With that in mind, we have started preliminary work on a project outline which we must submit by November 24. This will be an exciting project and we look forward to receiving input from residents as it progresses!

Our cooperative play school has been an important program in our community for many years and is administered through a parent council who is ultimately accountable to our board. One priority this year is to improve our governance and strengthen our board's ties with the play school through more direct supervision of its administration. This will also improve our community association's support for the parents who volunteer.

One smaller but important project is to update our community association's bylaws. As many of you know, quorum is rarely met at our AGM's and the reality of small turn outs needs to be addressed. As well, communication has changed over the years and we no longer only rely on Canada Post and The Beacon to advertise meetings. Other articles also need to be updated and reviewed in terms of their legality and legitimacy. I hope that this will be done at a special meeting in the new year.

We are a small community with a big heart! I have been honoured to serve you and I thank you for your support in so many ways. Please know that you are always welcome to attend our meetings or communicate with board members individually, and that we value your input and participation in our community association.

2016 Civic Census Results Who are we?



Results of the 2016 civic census are in and despite these turbulent times, our community has remained remarkably stable since the 2012 census in terms of population (HHBH is home to just under 3,000 people) and the kinds of dwelling units

(about 1,100, mostly single-family).

What may raise an eyebrow is our demographics. The largest single age group in HHBH, making up about 20% of our population, are people 75 years of age and older. Add in those 65 to 74 years old and seniors make up 30% of our community, compared to the city as a whole, where 6.44 % are 65 – 74 years of age, and 4.17% 75 or older. Just down the hill in West Hillhurst, people over 65 make up less than 10% of the population (9.3%).

That means our community has the benefit of tremendous life experience and wisdom, and also that we may need to consider how to connect our large population of seniors with their peers and with younger folks who can help maintain those single-family yards.

Your community association is interested in your ideas about how to make HHBH an even better place to live. For example, should we:

Consider programs and policies to enable our older neighbours to age in place comfortably?

Develop more social opportunities for seniors with similar interests?

Compile a resource list of young people interested in doing yard work and maintenance, similar to our baby-sitter list?

Match older and younger residents in our community for mutual companionship and support?

Tree Planting

ReTree YYC -Free Education Programs in Hounsfield Heights-Briar Hill

Hounsfield Heights-Briar Hill has been chosen as a Re-Tree Community in 2017! As part of the program, the City of Calgary will be planting new City trees in our community and educating community members about the proper planting and maintenance of our urban forest. Hounsfield Heights-Briar Hill will receive free tree care education programs in spring 2017. More information will be posted on our website in the early spring.

Background on ReTree YYC: ReTree YYC is a program created in response to the September 2014 late-summer snow storm causing extensive and severe damage to over 1 million trees. ReTree communities are chosen based on many factors, including the extent of the storm damage, open canopy space and community interest. By helping Calgarians plant and maintain trees on both public and private property, we hope to make the city landscape better for generations to come. You can learn more about the program at Calgary.ca/trees.

IS IT HARD TO READ THIS?

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The leading cause of vision loss among people over 65 is an eye condition called age-related macular degeneration, or AMD. AMD affects central or detail vision, while peripheral vision remains good – that means a person with AMD may not be able to recognize faces, read a newspaper or drive, but can often get down the street safely without the use of a white cane.

The CNIB reports that seniors with vision loss are three times more likely than those with good vision to experience clinical depression. There is evidence that depression

is connected to a lack of personal support, loss of independence and lack of information about how to keep doing the things they love despite vision loss.

However, with the right support, information and strategies, there is no need to stop enjoying your hobbies or lose independence due to vision loss. Here are a few tips and tricks from a community member with MD:

Can't see the "walk/don't walk" light at intersections?

Turn around. It's much easier to see what's on the traffic light on the corner where you're standing!

Don't have enough hands to shop and read labels with a magnifier at the same time?

Consider wearing a pendant magnifier around your neck that you can pick up with one hand and drop again without losing it.

Trouble with transit?

If you can't read the route name or number on an approaching bus, ask someone else waiting at the bus stop or train platform, or confirm with the driver when you get on.

Not sure if you got to the stop in time? Call Tele-Ride ((403) 974-4000) for real-time information on when the next bus will arrive. You'll need the four-digit number from the bus stop sign. Can't see it? If you have a smartphone, take a picture of the sign and enlarge it until you can read the numbers.

Take advantage of Calgary Transit's interactive trip planner – it will not only give you options and times to get you to your destination, but will also email the directions to you. You can print them or access the email on your phone in order to help the bus driver help you get off at the right stop.

Miss reading?

There's no need to miss out on the great consolation of reading. The Calgary Public Library has a great selection of both large-print and audio (talking) books to borrow for

free, and there are several good free audio book apps for smartphones as well. In addition, if you have an iPhone, its VoiceOver function will read ebooks (for example, Kindle and iBooks) to you.

 Cooking, cards, calendars and more

There are large-print recipes, knitting patterns, playing cards and calendars at the CNIB store, and CNIB staff can provide information and support to anyone experiencing vision loss, not just totally blind people – give them a call at (403) 266-8831.

This summer some residents had concerns about pet rabbits released into the wild. Would this problem be part of the City's jurisdiction, as it was in Canmore? The General Manager of Community Services reported to City Council that most of the rabbits in communities are jack rabbits, which are feral (wild) animals.

The City does have authority over pet rabbits, under the Community Standards Bylaw, for example. Feral animals are up to the province's Animal and Wildlife Services. The Community Services Department at the City will work with Council to provide information on how to direct residents and ensure that their concerns are properly addressed.

At a council committee on Community & Protective Services, a motion was passed to propose bylaw changes in order to use livestock grazing as a land management and weed control tool on City lands in 2017.

Natural areas provide multiple ecosystem services, which are of value to city residents. For example, there is computer software to measure the urban forest in at least 3 environmental services: cleansing the air; storing carbon; and reducing storm water in the City.

So far, it was found that the average benefit per tree in Edmonton's urban forest was US \$74.73 (\$97.96 Canadian). The cost for caring for each tree is US \$18.38 (\$24.09 Canadian), resulting in a net benefit of US \$56.35 (\$73.87 Canadian).

Cities and local governments play a crucial role in the pursuit of a greener existence through efficiently integrating urban development and biodiversity management at the local level. With rapid human development and expansion, biodiversity is being lost, but there are some new urban biodiversity guidelines.

In the fall of 2016, the Mayor signed the Durban Commitment. Calgary is the 3rd Canadian city, after Edmonton and Montreal, to formally join an international program directed by Local Action for Biodiversity, for local governments from across the world to improve biodiversity planning and management. It is estimated that 90% of the world's population will live in urban areas by 2100.

By 2025, Calgary will:

• Evaluate landscapes in Calgary and set targets for conservation measures to identify, protect, and manage ecological cores and corridors.

Restore 20% of Calgary's current open space to increase biodiversity.
Identify invasive species in Calgary's open space and complete strategies for their management.

Community traffic study application process

After reviewing the information online in the Traffic Calming Policy, if you would like to apply for a community traffic study, you must complete the Traffic Issue Reporting Form, found in the appendix of the document, and submit it to Transportation Planning.

Please note that in order for the form submission to be considered complete, you will need to collect signatures from your community association, Councillor, police, and from members of your community, as a minimum level of support from the community needs to be demonstrated as outlined in Section 3.1.1 of the policy.

Books make wonderful gifts for children because they expand your child's listening power, inspire their creativity and imagination and increase their vocabulary.

Book last forever! They can be lovingly placed on book shelves or in baskets and book bags to be enjoyed over and over again. A Sensible Solution

For those who may not already know, I have been a long-time advocate of organ and tissue donation in Canada and was instrumental in creating the organ donor registry in Alberta a few years ago.

However, the reality is 4,600 Canadians are awaiting a transplant and we need to do more to find those critical matches to save more lives.

I have introduced a Private Member's Bill, Bill C-316, which proposes a very simple, very effective method to increase the size of the organ donor base in Canada. It will also help update existing databases.

I am proposing we add a line to the annual tax forms that asks Canadians if they would like to become an organ donor and if they want to have this information passed to their provincial government for addition to the existing organ donor registries. The provinces will still be maintaining their own lists and the federal government will just be supplying them with data for that purpose.

The Canada Revenue Agency already successfully shares data every day with all the provinces and territories via encrypted networks with strong and reliable privacy safeguards. In addition, the existing infrastructure would support this change with virtually no cost. CRA already shares dozens of data fields of information on every taxpayer with the provinces and territories and this would simply be one more data field.

The tax form is a way to update this information annually via a legally-binding document. It would allow for lists to remain current and relevant.

Currently, the only proactive approach used by governments is to ask for donors via the driver's licence registration process. The number of people getting drivers' licences is dropping every year.

The voluntary online method of registering is neither proactive or fully effective. Those who move from one province to another do not update their information,

especially young people who are prime donors. The tax form approach overcomes these common problems and expands the potential donors reached.

Sadly, when someone dies, the tax department is often one of the first government agencies to be notified. This too will help update provincial registries and keep them current. This makes for a more effective and responsive donation system.

I hope I can count on your support for Bill C-316.
