2016 Civic Census Results Who are we?



Results of the 2016 civic census are in and despite these turbulent times, our community has remained remarkably stable since the 2012 census in terms of population (HHBH is home to just under 3,000 people) and the kinds of dwelling units

(about 1,100, mostly single-family).

What may raise an eyebrow is our demographics. The largest single age group in HHBH, making up about 20% of our population, are people 75 years of age and older. Add in those 65 to 74 years old and seniors make up 30% of our community, compared to the city as a whole, where 6.44 % are 65 – 74 years of age, and 4.17% 75 or older. Just down the hill in West Hillhurst, people over 65 make up less than 10% of the population (9.3%).

That means our community has the benefit of tremendous life experience and wisdom, and also that we may need to consider how to connect our large population of seniors with their peers and with younger folks who can help maintain those single-family yards.

Your community association is interested in your ideas about how to make HHBH an even better place to live. For example, should we:

Consider programs and policies to enable our older neighbours to age in place comfortably?

Develop more social opportunities for seniors with similar interests?

Compile a resource list of young people interested in doing yard work and maintenance, similar to our baby-sitter list?

Match older and younger residents in our community for mutual companionship and support?

Happy New Year!

A new year is an opportunity to share our plans and dreams for the upcoming twelve months. So at this time, I would like to share with you what 2017 may hold in store for our community.

The biggest dream is to finally realize the goal of improving our community facility by building an addition. As many of you know, shortly after we moved into our current building in 2002, an architect was hired to design a large addition. These plans have been tucked away for over a decade and subsequent community association boards have been saving money from revenues and casinos. Members have been discussing how the design could be improved and waiting for our neighbouring library and North Hill Centre mall owners to come through with their promises of renovations so that we could work with them to have an integrated design that would best serve our community.

After several extensions given to us by the Alberta Gaming and Liquor Commission for future use of the proceeds we received from their casinos, we received a letter last October advising us that we would lose over \$200,000 and possibly be removed from their list of charities if we did not submit a plan for the expenditure of their funds along with a time line. Suddenly, all our waiting for future collaboration with other interested parties was pressured into action.

Our response included a proposal to build a 3000 square foot addition that will be a multipurpose area. This new space will be versatile so that it can be partitioned when needed and suitable for a variety of uses such as meeting rooms, athletic studios, and banquets. Casino funds and our sizable savings from general revenues over the years will fund the project. The time line for this project is estimated to be approximately 2 years.

As well, our board has contacted Councillor Druh Farrell and she has been sympathetic with our sudden call to action by facilitating a meeting with the city's public library department and mall owner. We still hope that our project will fit into an integrated design even if it is done in stages rather than all at once. And we hope that you will contribute with your ideas and support so that we can create a design and renovation that will be worth the long wait! We will be asking for your input.

A much smaller project this year is to update our community association's bylaws. They are outdated in some areas and inaccurate in others. Change requires a special general meeting with 21 days notice so please watch for further information and an invitation to attend this event.

I hope that you are looking forward to your own plans and dreams for 2017 and I wish you health and happiness.

IS IT HARD TO READ THIS?

The leading cause of vision loss among people over 65 is an eye condition called age-related macular degeneration, or AMD. AMD affects central or detail vision, while peripheral vision remains good – that means a person with AMD may not be able to recognize faces, read a newspaper or drive, but can often get down the street safely without the use of a white cane.

The CNIB reports that seniors with vision loss are three times more likely than those with good vision to experience clinical depression. There is evidence that depression

is connected to a lack of personal support, loss of independence and lack of information about how to keep doing the things they love despite vision loss.

However, with the right support, information and strategies, there is no need to stop enjoying your hobbies or lose independence due to vision loss. Here are a few tips and tricks from a community member with MD:

Can't see the "walk/don't walk" light at intersections?

Turn around. It's much easier to see what's on the traffic light on the corner where you're standing!

Don't have enough hands to shop and read labels with a magnifier at the same time?

Consider wearing a pendant magnifier around your neck that you can pick up with one hand and drop again without losing it.

Trouble with transit?

If you can't read the route name or number on an approaching bus, ask someone else waiting at the bus stop or train platform, or confirm with the driver when you get on.

Not sure if you got to the stop in time? Call Tele-Ride ((403) 974-4000) for real-time information on when the next bus will arrive. You'll need the four-digit number from the bus stop sign. Can't see it? If you have a smartphone, take a picture of the sign and enlarge it until you can read the numbers.

Take advantage of Calgary Transit's interactive trip planner - it will not only give you options and times to get you to your destination, but will also email the directions to you. You can print them or access the email on your phone in order to help the bus driver help you get off at the right stop.

Miss reading?

There's no need to miss out on the great consolation of reading. The Calgary Public Library has a great selection of both large-print and audio (talking) books to borrow for



Make Sure You're Heard

As your Member of Parliament for Calgary Confederation, it is my job to represent you in Ottawa.

To effectively represent you I use a variety of methods to gauge your input on a number of issues.

I read your letters, your emails and canvass homes in the riding by going door-to-door.

These interactions allow me to know what issues you feel are the most important, how you want to be represented and get critical feedback on issues of the day.

Another way I get input from all residents is to send mailings to your home. I use these mailings as a way to inform you of critical information as well as getting your feedback on issues before Parliament.

For example, while I supported making our national anthem gender-neutral, the response I receive via my community mailings was clear. When asked, 82% of constituents favoured keeping the existing lyrics for our national anthem. As a result, I voted in favour of keeping the existing wording as it is my job to represent you.

If you don't respond to my mailings, you may not be represented on issues before Parliament in the way you want to be. I can't encourage you enough to participate in these surveys to ensure you are heard.

Recent issues I have focused on in my mailings are unemployment, electoral reform, organ donation, seniors, carbon taxes and voting rules.

Each month, thousands of constituents are kept regularly informed through my timely email newsletter.

While thousands receive this free email, there continues to be thousands who do not because I don't have your email address. Please go to my website at www. lenwebber.ca to sign up. If you decide later that you wish to unsubscribe from my newsletter, I can remove your email at any time. In the meantime, you may be quite surprised at the useful and interesting information I pass along.

Included in that email newsletter is a poll that has proven to be one of the most popular features. Again, I would like to have your opinions on these issues.

A healthy democracy requires a good dialogue between citizens and their elected representatives. Those who do not participate in their democracy are destined to be represented by those that do. Please consider getting more involved and ensure you are heard.


For the Nose Hill Trail and Pathway plan (2004) there was a commitment of \$4.5 million from the Enmax Legacy Parks Program of the total \$6.6 million. From 2007-2012, this was for ongoing trail repairs, renewing degraded land, restoring damaged habitat, adding interpretive and orientation signs. Trail work was expected to continue for several more years. The paved pathways were intended to manage use and help protect the prairie grasslands (plants and wildlife).

There was a recent urgent item of business for City Council from a Community Services Committee report which was received for information. An update on City Parks Projects contains more information about capital funding for Nose Hill Park.

Council created the ENMAX Legacy Parks Program in 2003. The purpose was to develop new regional parks and improve existing ones, local community parks, and open spaces. A steering committee is responsible for managing the funds, including an investment plan for infrastructure, in some cases. City Council invested over \$135 million through this program. In addition, Council approved \$75 million for more projects to 2017.

Due to the economy, part of the 2016 ENMAX dividend is no longer available. So, there are shortfalls in funding for future priority projects. Some projects are already in progress and others are on hold, although design work was already done. There is no shortfall for Nose Hill, because the Legacyfunded portion is complete and the construction in north and south zones is underway and ongoing. The total amount was \$4.4 million from phases 1 and 2; the non-Legacy budget was \$1 million and total project budget is \$5.5 million. The total actual cost to date is \$4.6 million, in addition to about \$54 thousand for existing purchase orders not yet invoiced. The remaining allocations are \$800 thousand.

An action plan for Calgary will enhance the urban forest and landscape, protect the environment by encouraging public awareness, and ensure that we have access to nature. In general, parks support biodiversity: a variety in the number and types of plants and animals in a particular area, such as Nose Hill, or in the world. Our parks network and open spaces offer recreational opportunities and help to offset carbon in urban spaces.

Affordable Housing Part Two - Why, Where, and How In your October 2016 newsletter, I wrote about how increasing the affordable housing supply is one of Council's priorities. In Part Two, I will share information on why, how, and where the City builds affordable housing.

Council unanimously passed the new Affordable Housing Strategy last year and is working to find homes for over 3000 families on the Calgary Housing Company waitlist. The recently released 2016 Citizen Satisfaction Survey confirmed that Calgarians want increased investment in affordable housing: 95% of Ward 7 residents said affordable housing is very or somewhat important.

A key principle in Calgary's Municipal Development Plan is to provide a mix of housing types and prices in all communities, including affordable housing. The City has learned from experience that building affordable housing that blends into neighbourhoods works best for new residents and for communities. Happily, the days of "social housing ghettos" are behind us.

Alongside the goal of providing safe and affordable housing for Calgarians, the City focuses on designing buildings that fit in with communities. Building quality affordable homes makes these developments indistinguishable from market-priced housing and helps low-income Calgarians integrate quickly into their new neighbourhoods. Many residents are surprised to learn that from Dalhousie to Mount Pleasant to Hillhurst, almost every community in Ward 7 has welcomed affordable housing developments.

The City develops affordable housing units that are built to last over 65 years. Using slightly more expensive materials at the outset reduces long-term maintenance and utility costs. The City seeks LEED Certification and focuses on the Building Durability, Energy-Efficiency, and Tenant Health sections. These features minimize monthly operating costs, allow for maintenance dollars to be set aside in reserve, and ensure Calgarians see maximum value from our investment in affordable housing. Over the last three years the City has also reduced the cost of affordable housing from \$330,000 per unit to about \$250,000 per unit – and in many cases much lower. Most of the funding comes from the Provincial and Federal governments, with a recent commitment from Ottawa for \$2.3 billion nation-wide.

Ultimately, the City builds quality, durable, and costeffective homes that provide much-needed housing for low-income Calgarians. Our model ensures those homes integrate well into all neighbourhoods and deliver value to all Calgarians.
