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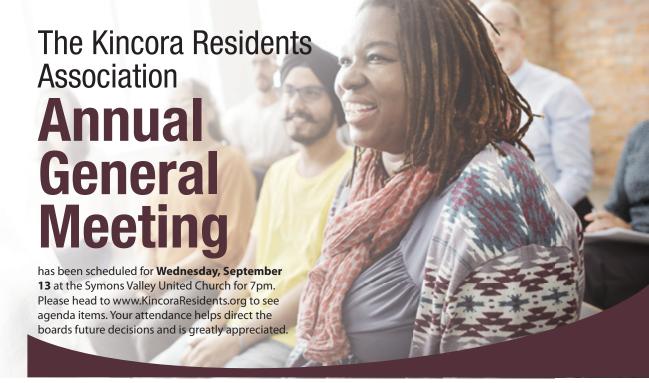
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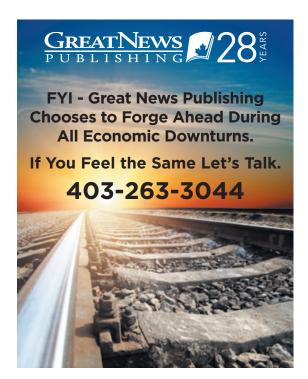

Do You Get Community Emails?

We currently communicate with you through our website, www.kincora.org. Once you create an account on our site, we have the ability for us to send an email to those that have opted-in to receive emails from us. You must opt in to receive any emails about the community. You do not have to purchase a community association membership to get emails. Registering for an account is free!

Here's how to do that:

- 1. Visit www.kincora.org
- 2. Login to your account using the login & password that was provided to you via email if we created your account for you. (It is likely login=last name, password=membership number). Or this is a login & password you created yourself after you registered on the website.
- 3. Go to Members >>> Profile >>> Email Options
- 4. Check off "I want to receive special emails sent to all members from the webmaster."

Emails are only sent when we communicate something that we believe would be of interest to you – typically this is an average of two per month. You can also control if/when you are notified of other website activities, like when news or calendar items have been added.

The Good Food Box (GFB) is a program under the Community Kitchen Program of Calgary whereby you can purchase a mix of fresh fruits and vegetables at a very low cost. We offer all Calgarians sustainable access to nutritious food to ensure that no one has to go hungry.

Box Options:

Small: \$25, 20-25lbs* of fruits & vegetables Medium: \$30, 30-35lbs* of fruits & vegetables **Large:** \$35, 40-45lbs* of fruits & vegetables

*Weights are approximate. They will vary depending on the product size and density.

How the GFB Works

The boxes are delivered once a month to Symons Valley UC. Orders can be placed by filling out a form and ensuring completed forms are dropped off at the church office (38 Kincora Rise NW) during regular office hours (M-F, 9am-3pm) in advance of the order date. Cash only payment MUST accompany all orders. Orders cannot be placed without payment.

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Need a little time to yourself? Have errands to run and taking the kids slows you down? You and your spouse could use a date night? But who can you trust with the kids?

For more than 20 years moms in NW Calgary have been swapping childcare for free! The Caring Parents Babysitting Co-op started with three moms who just wanted to get out of the house once a week and has evolved into a more formal organization while still maintaining a warm, friendly, and caring atmosphere. It's really about moms helping other moms.

"It's been a lifesaver," says Megan, one of the members of the co-op. "I'm able to volunteer at the school frequently while another mom from the co-op watches my toddler. My daughter loves going to play with the other children from the co-op."

Another co-op participant, Bev, remarked on the benefit of being a member of a community of mothers, "The best part of the co-op for me is the community. Meetings are a great time to talk about parenting and the phases kids go through. I recall specifically talking about potty training and what worked for each of us. It helps to feel I'm not alone. We're all having some struggles and, within the co-op, other moms are willing to offer help and support!" Potential members are interviewed by two current members and their home is evaluated with a view to child safety. Candidates for membership are given a copy of the group's policies and the opportunity to ask questions about the expectations of the co-op.

Members use poker chips as a form of currency to keep the trading of babysitting time fair and easily tracked. Babysittings can take place in the children's home or the sitter's home, whichever arrangement is mutually satisfactory. Eligible families must be non-smoking, live in the limited geographic region (Kincora, Hidden Valley/ Hansen Ranch, Sandstone, MacEwan, Beddington and Panorama Hills), be willing to provide a police record check, agree to abide by the policies of the co-op, attend monthly meetings and be willing to both babysit and have their own children sat by others, during the day or evenings.

Membership is limited to 25 families. The focus for new membership is on families with very young children (under 4 years old). This unique organization is currently accepting new members and information can be found at http://nwbabysittingcoop.wix.com/ caringparents.

Get to Know Your Local Farmers' Market: Alberta Approved and Public

In Alberta, there are two different types of markets – Alberta approved farmers' markets and public markets. Both types of markets involve a gathering of vendors who sell their products directly to consumers. The difference lies in the ownership/management of the market and the privileges accorded to each type of market. One is not better than the other - they are simply different.

An Alberta approved farmers' market is one that has been approved by Alberta Agriculture and Forestry (AF) and as such meets the requirements of the program guidelines that have been approved by the Minister. These include:

- Being sponsored by a not-for-profit community group, local Chamber of Commerce, municipality or agricultural society or forming their own not-for-profit society under the Societies Act. Privately-owned markets are not eligible to operate under the banner of an Alberta approved farmers' market.
- Operate under the direction of an advisory body or board of directors. Public markets typically have forprofit ownership and there is no requirement for an advisory body or board of directors in that situation.
- 80 per cent of the vendors are Albertans who meet the "make it, bake it, grow it" criteria; the remaining 20 per cent of the vendors are selling products that complement the market mix.
- Sale of any used good or flea market products are pro-
- Must operate for no less than ten days per year and for two hours per market day.
- Have at least one vendor meeting per year.
- · Have developed a set of rules which govern the operation of the market.

- A copy of these rules must be made available to AF and all the vendors at the market.
- Adhere to the administrative requirements of the pro-
- As an approved farmers' market, it receives the following benefits:
 - All markets follow the same guidelines that set minimum standards thereby strengthening the markets across the province.
 - Approved farmers' markets are recognized as such in Part 3 of the Alberta Public Health Act Food Regulation.
 - Only Alberta approved farmers' markets can use the official mark - Sunnygirl - in their advertising and promotion and can make arrangements to use the Sunnygirl logo on highway signage.
 - Alberta approved farmers' markets can take advantage of the free promotion provided by AF.

A public market is generally one that is privately-owned and includes all types of operations, including flea markets. As a public market, each food vendor must have an individual food permit and be operating in a Health-approved facility. Most municipalities require each vendor at a public market to have a business or peddler's license, whereas often only a single license is required for the approved farmers' market because of its not-for-profit status. A public market does not receive any of the above noted benefits enjoyed by an approved farmers' market. To find more information about farmers' markets near you visit www.agric.gov.ab.ca.

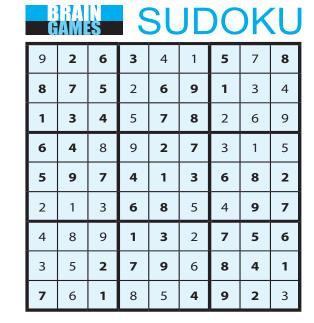

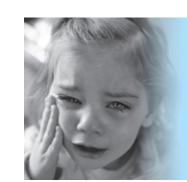
Helping animals is a great way for kids to become involved with their community! Many children feel a connection to the natural world and enjoy learning about animals of all shapes and sizes, but these interactions build more than just knowledge! Research has shown that children who spend time with animals learn enhance many social skills including:

- Empathy Empathy is considered by many psychologists to be the root of "pro-social" behavior. Pro-social behaviors are the behaviors that allow us to build relationships, maintain friendships and connect with our communities. Interacting with animals allows children to practice skills of non-verbal empathy as they try to understand how an animal is experiencing the world.
- Compassion Empathy is a foundation for understanding others, but compassion moves those feelings into action. Through acting compassionately, children learn that they can have a profound impact on the community around them and that they play a key role in "creating the world they want to live in".
- Respect When children help others they learn more about why other people (and animals) sometimes need help, and why needing help is not a bad thing. Through helping animals, children learn that even the smallest fish deserves to have good food and a safe home by virtue of being a living, thinking, feeling being.

Are you looking for a great way for your child to become more involved in helping animals? We would love to help! While our minimum age to volunteer is 16 (for safety reasons) we have many great programs for kids of all ages!

- Attend a youth program! Children in our kids' clubs and youth programs get to participate in select animal interactions with carefully chosen animals and complete fun activities with animal loving peers!

Helping Your Children with Social and **Emotional Skills for Kindergarten**

Age 5 is a "big" age as these kids are starting Kindergarten and developing so many more skills!

Children are becoming more independent and are capable of learning the rules and behaviours for getting along with others. Adults can help build self confidence by providing clear and consistent instruction about what is expected of them. Encourage and support them as they take on more "grown up" responsibilities. Self confidence comes from caring and consistent relationships with parents, teachers and other adults that play an important role in their lives. Let the child know you love them and value his unique traits and abilities. Also having regular routines at home and school help children to anticipate and prepare for events.

At home, you can have a sharing circle. A sharing circle supports good communication and promotes respect and kindness at home. Sit in a circle and say one nice thing about the person next to you. Once you said something nice about that person, say something nice about yourself. You can do this activity once or twice a month.

Another way to build self confidence is to let a different person pick a movie or activity to do for a weekly family night. Children can make choices for the family that show their individual style.

The Calgary NW ECD Coalitions consist of three coalitions who have joined forces with parents, community members, organizations and professionals, who are all working together to better the lives of young children and their families. We work hard to support five important developmental areas for children - Social Competence, Emotional Maturity, Language & Thinking Skills, Physical Health & Well-being, and Communication Skills & General Knowledge. As our kids get back to school, please pay extra attention when driving, especially around schools and playgrounds. At our last council meeting in July, I reintroduced a motion to have administration look into requiring school buses to use their flashing lights when picking up and dropping off children. This is the norm in most other jurisdictions and can be achieved at zero cost to taxpayers because buses are already equipped with these safety features. I thank council for voting 12-1 in favour of this motion.

Another important vote in council was on the issue of an Olympic Bid Plebiscite. I supported Councillor Sean Chu's Motion for a plebiscite because I believed that a decision of this magnitude, both financially and culturally, should be made directly by Calgarians. I also believed that by October, voters could have had sufficient information to make an informed decision on this matter. Unfortunately, the majority of City Council voted against a plebiscite. As exciting as an Olympic Bid may be, I do not want to see the kind of costs downloaded on Calgary taxpayers that have been prevalent in many other cities that have hosted Olympic events.

I was pleased to open the upgraded Sarcee Trail/Stoney Trail interchange and twinned 112 Avenue. This new interchange should help to alleviate the heavy truck traffic on Shaganappi Trail and Symons Valley Road, which has been a concern to many residents along these routes. The upgraded interchange was specifically designed to better accommodate trucks by providing a new ramp for trucks traveling southbound on Sarcee Trail to eastbound Stoney Trail. These improvements will also help alleviate congestion at this interchange which will allow for better traffic flow and improved safety for all vehicles.

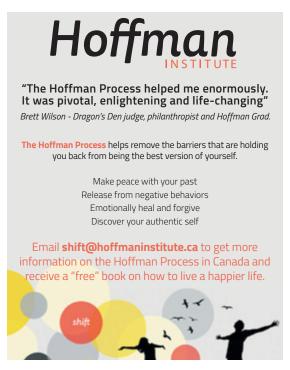
