




Well, we survived the torrential rainfall of Stampede and are enjoying some warm summer days. We had visitors this year for Stampede and our 5 year old nephew suggested to his mom that the next time they come to visit it should be during summer!

The Community Association provided space for an open house regarding the placement of a cell tower within our lease property. The suggestion that the tower be placed in the northwest corner of the lot was for a number of reasons including access for service vehicles. The tower would generate an annual income for the Community Association of \$30,000.00 per year for five years to be renegotiated for five year terms for 20 years. The money raised can then be put into the community centre activities and events. There is a prescribed engagement process that will be followed and we encourage input from community members.

We are also in the process of securing an artist to paint the sea-can behind the community association. Watch for opportunities for input and participation in this project.

The planning committee continues to be busy. Mainstreets hosted an invitation meeting to let communities along the 24 corridor sites know the next steps. From the 24 corridors, a selection will be made to start focusing on specific areas. They heard clearly from all communities that infrastructure needs to be improved to attract development. We will keep you informed as to where both 16th Avenue and Bowness Road fall within their plan.

The Planning Committee has reviewed just one Development Permit over the past several weeks: DP2016-2642 4620 16 Avenue NW Addition: Medical Clinic, Office, Change of Use.

Vision Zero

There's an interesting road safety initiative that started in Sweden and has spread through-out Europe and now into to Canada and the rest of North America: it's called Vision Zero - where no one should be killed or seriously injured within the road traffic system.

Back in 1997, the Swedes were concerned that road traffic injuries were one of the leading causes of death and the number was reaching unacceptable levels at seven deaths per 100,000 people. They took a holistic approach to solving the problem which involved changing the mindset of how we look at traffic fatalities.

Humans are fallible; we make mistakes, we have an innate fear of heights but we have no real sense of velocity, we're not perfect drivers. All of this is taken into account in the design of the road infrastructure. Everyone uses the roads - from kids to seniors, from bikes to delivery trucks. No deaths within the road traffic system are acceptable, and road safety does not have to compromise mobility.

Here's a crucial statistic: if you're hit by a vehicle travelling at 50 km/hr, there's about a 20% chance that you'll survive; if you're hit by one travelling at 30 km/hr, the probability is greater than 90% that you'll survive.

The number of traffic fatalities in Sweden dropped dramatically from seven to less than three per 100,000 people over a period of several years. Canada's traffic fatality count is around 5.2 fatalities per 100,000 which is about the middle of the pack compared to other parts of the world.

North America and Europe are very different in terms of car culture; we're very car-focused in our community and city designs. Europe has more of a balance amongst road users. However, the goal of reducing road safety fatalities is not an unrealistic one nor is it too expensive to aim for these kinds of results.

Edmonton is the first major city in Canada to adopt this policy and is already seeing reductions in the number of fatalities and major injuries. This kind of program will take time. And it requires significant support and buy-in from the citizens, planners, industry, and educators.

The Best Defence is to Take Offense

Challenging Societal Precepts Through Art

In a society where chumming the proverbial waters of the internet in hopes of offending others is a real and common enough occurrence, one might think that the phrase "I'm offended by this" would be so overused as to fade into the background noise of social media. In reality, artists across a variety of mediums - be they video game developers, filmmakers or artists - are frequently pressured into backpedaling when their material encroaches on territory that some people may consider offensive.

While I openly admit to preferring the black-and-white morality of The Lord of the Rings to the somewhat ambiguous setting of Game of Thrones, I nevertheless believe that asking artists to forego any sort of offensive or potentially uncomfortable material is a wasted opportunity. If art is seen as a tool through which we explore our natures and our beliefs, then the most meaningful discussions are brought about when a work challenges our perceptions and forces us to ask the question of "why" something offends us.

The video game series Grand Theft Auto (GTA), perhaps one of the most infamous and controversial franchises in the medium, is an excellent example of this. In GTA, players are tasked with a variety of criminal activities, ranging from drug running and bank heists to outright murder. As a result, the games have frequently been the focus of groups arguing that video games cause an increase in the violent tendencies of those who play them.

But what about films like Goodfellas and Scarface? What about television shows like The Sopranos? None of the activities being performed in the GTA games is considered too horrific to be re-enacted in these mediums, and it is much rarer to see these films and shows being accused of driving their viewers to murderous rampages. Thus, the basis of our discussion is opened: why are video games considered more dangerous than other mediums depicting the same sort of content? Why do we find this sort of material objectionable in a fictional

A New Festival in BowMont!

BBQ on the Bow is happy to announce that it will be moving to the Montgomery Community Centre September 3 and 4, 2016. In its 24th year, BBQ on the Bow is Canada's oldest Kansas City Barbeque Society (KCBS) sanctioned festival.

The event is open to the public and together with the BBQ competition, features a Kid's Que competition, food demo, beer garden and live local music, among other activities. BBQ will be available for purchase from onsite vendors.

Saturday's events will include a Chef's Choice category, where the cooks can hand in anything from lamb to salmon or any other meat of their choice, and use any garnish. Green Cart set to roll out next spring

After a successful pilot that saw a 40 per cent drop in garbage and 89 per cent satisfaction amongst residents. the Green Cart Program will roll out to all single family homes beginning next spring. All communities should have the service by fall 2017. Here are the highlights:

All food, yard and pet waste is accepted in the program.

Unlimited quantity. Use paper yard waste bags for extra yard waste that doesn't fit in the cart.

Green and blue carts will be collected on the same day every week.

Black carts will be picked up once every two weeks on a separate day since most household waste can be recycled or composted.

Residents will receive everything they need to get started including the green cart, a kitchen pail for collecting food scraps inside the home; a sample of compostable bags for the kitchen pail and vard waste bags. Once service begins, households will pay \$6.50 per month. This charge reflects the savings achieved by changing black cart garbage collection from weekly to once every two weeks.

Green carts go beyond backyard composting

If you're already backyard composting, keep it up. Use your green cart for all the other materials that cannot be composted at home like meat, bones, shellfish, dairy, weeds and pet waste.

Why we need to keep food and yard waste out of landfills

It may be hard to believe, but more than half of residential garbage is food and yard waste. Composting this material is the right thing to do. When food and yard waste is buried in the landfill it releases methane, a greenhouse gas that is 25 times stronger than carbon dioxide. By using the green carts we reduce dependence on our landfills, reduce greenhouse gas and turn food and vard waste into nutrient-rich compost.



Your bus route may be changing this fall



Changes are coming to the following northwest and inner city bus routes on September 5, 2016: Routes 8, 9, 10, 22/122, 37/137, 43/143, 145, 404, 405, 407, 412 and 419.

Calgary Transit has completed a major review of these bus routes and is excited to share the results with customers. Earlier this year new bus route proposals were shared online and at open houses, and feedback was collected from thousands of transit users and community stakeholders. Public input was incorporated as much as possible in designing the new bus routes.

The new routes are simple and direct, and many of them have upgraded service levels, meaning that buses come more frequently and/or run longer on evenings and weekends. Additionally, service has been increased or improved to major locations such as Foothills Hospital, The University of Calgary and shopping centres.
