

PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Happy New Year! I hope you all had a Merry Christmas. The MCA Board and the Planning Committee have continued discussions with the City of Calgary on the 16th Avenue project. This came about as the result of conversations with Councillor Sutherland to address the issue of slowing down traffic and to make Montgomery the Gateway to the Rockies. As everyone is aware, with the Bowfort interchange being built, Home Road will be the first set of lights for travelers along the TransCanada Highway heading east.

The MCA Board is anticipating the response from the Open House held in November will be available to us in January. However, anecdotally and from conversations I have had, it seems that the proposal of a bike lane on Home Road has prompted a passionate debate within the community. Considering the numerous views from community residents and given that this was not part of the original study, we have requested the City remove the bike lane proposal from the 16th Avenue improvements. This will allow for an informed, balanced approach to decision making. At the time of this writing, we have not had a formal response from the City regarding this request. I encourage everyone to stay informed through social media (website, Facebook, Twitter, eNews) avenues. We will keep you updated as information is made available.

At this time, I would like to thank Councillor Sutherland. He has been involved in numerous items within the community including the above project, the community association building improvements, supporting federal grant proposals and the south Shaganappi study. I appreciate that I have been able to contact him regarding issues and concerns. He has consistently been available to assist with connecting to the City staff and to supporting the community association's requests. Working within the City staff units continues to be one of the more interesting parts of being president of the community association. I appreciate his help in navigating these systems.

Our AGM will be held in February and I hope to see many of you attend; perhaps if not for the update on community initiatives and elections, at least for the wine and cheese social to follow! See you soon.

Casting Off This Mortal Coil: The Allure of MMO's and Other Roleplaying Games

The fantasy of shirking off one life to begin another is a theme commonly explored in media. In the film The Matrix (warning: spoilers for a 16 year old movie ahead), the character Cypher betrays our leather-clad protagonists for the chance to be re-inserted into the Matrix, a virtual reality that will allow him to live out his fantasies of wealth, cars, and delicious steak. Most of us can agree that the man was a colossal jerk that more than deserved his inevitable death. His real life was a bleak, post-apocalyptic dystopia where people wore tattered rags and ate bland-looking grey paste. His end goal, if not the methods he employed to get there, was at the very least understandable.

Our reality may not appear as bleak as that of *The* Matrix. However, gridlocked, rush-hour traffic on Glenmore Trail at six o'clock in the evening has to be a close number two behind the nuclear apocalypse, so is it entirely unreasonable that some people try to escape into another "life" through video games?

MMOs, or Massively Multiplayer Online Role-Playing Games, are usually depicted in television as the refuge of socially awkward serial killers. In reality, games like World of Warcraft - or one of the hundreds of spinoffs trying to capitalize on its success - allow players to act

out their fantasies of adventure, dragon-slaying, and vanquishing the same evil wizard several times until he finally drops that damned amulet you need. Players from around the world are able to interact with one another in this environment, and this social aspect reinforces the idea of taking on another "life."

Should this sort of behaviour be condemned? Cypher murdered his colleagues to escape back into the Matrix, and aren't "the video games" a dehumanizing experience that disconnects children from reality and drives them to gruesome acts of violence? Not really. Many people who play these types of video games are well-adjusted men and women looking for a temporary escape from the mundane details of their everyday lives, in a way not dissimilar to watching television or a movie. The danger arises - as I know from personal experience when that virtual life takes over, and is focused upon to the exclusion of one's real life.

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

PLANNING REPORT


Over the past few weeks the Planning Committee has reviewed the following permits:

DP2015-4505 4731 17th Avenue NW Exterior Renovations, and Changes to Site Plan.

LOC2015-0168 208 Silver Valley BV NW Land Use Amendment and Road Closure. This application formalizes what's happening in Bowmont Park and updates the Bowmont Park Management Plan. The Park had pockets of different zoning throughout as well as unbuilt road rights of way. These sections of unused roads that were never needed by the City are the 'road closures' being referred to in the application. By redesignating the Land Uses to Special Purpose – Urban Nature (S-UN) District, the Land Use now reflects the current use of the park. The existing playgrounds and soccer fields will remain Special Purpose – School, Park & Community Reserve.

DP2015-4218 5224 Bowness Road NW Contextual Semi-Detached. Since this permit falls under the Contextual Rules it is automatically approved by the City Planning Department. The Contextual Rules do not require new development to adhere to the Montgomery Area Redevelopment Plan (ARP). The MCA Planning Committee will be requesting that City Planners change this rule. We strongly encourage developers to work within the guidelines of the ARP. The ARP reflects the vision of all residents of Montgomery and it is a legal document.

16th Avenue and Home Road Upgrades: We also had a chance to review the City's proposal for upgrades at 16th Avenue and Home Road. This is the first intersection drivers come to when entering the City. This is



where traffic must slow down to 50km/hr. It's a wide intersection with roads at awkward angles. The City is currently looking at ways to upgrade this intersection and particularly upgrade the safety aspect of the crosswalks in this area, not just at the major intersection but also near the Dairy Queen. This is an opportunity for the crossings to be both safe and welcoming.

To that end, here are some suggestions:

- · Incorporate Dark Sky street lighting to suit a residen-
- · Incorporate banners to mark the entry to Montgom-
- Incorporate clusters of landscaping as opposed to
- · Continue the texture of sidewalks (paving stone, brick, etc) across the intersection
- · Continue the sidewalk as a raised hump where it crosses the road so that drivers are made aware of the pedestrian component (painted lines get obscured
- Use contrasting colours for the central median (or meridian) such as white concrete with red or charcoal
- Change the width of the curb; sometimes a change in our expectations makes us pay attention
- Add a strip of brick pavers along the side of the curb to mark the entrance to a residential neighbourhood
- Incorporate landscaping elements (small pebbles, stone, boulders, slabs of rock) in the median


I'll be interested to see what we come up with!

The 16th Avenue upgrades will also result in the closure of a number of entry points into various businesses. This was done to create safer corners but will also result in more parking spaces for businesses in the area.

And finally, the entry into the Montgomery Community Association parking lot will be shifted further down Home Road. No more goofy exiting onto Home Road probably a good thing.



South Shaganappi Area Strategic Planning Group

The South Shaqanappi Area Strategic Planning Group is a group of community representatives and stakeholders that meet on a monthly basis to inform and respond to a number of institutional and infrastructure development projects in the area.

To close out 2016, the group was given a presentation to introduce, and to gather stakeholder input, regarding a feasibility study for a pedestrian bridge across 16th Avenue NW in the vicinity of the Foothills Medical Centre and The Stadium Shopping Centre. Further updates will be brought to the SSASPG as the project progresses.

The Calgary Cancer Project continues with ongoing project planning and procurement activities regarding their new facility at the Foothills Medical Centre. Planning is also underway for interim renovations to the existing Bone Marrow Transplant Unit with construction anticipated to begin in late 2016.

The University of Calgary has implemented a consultation process to develop its Long Range Development Plan (LRDP). This plan is intended to guide future decisions regarding the physical planning of the main campus. Public open houses will be held early in 2016 to gather community comments and feedback.

West Campus Development, now officially named the University District, is working closely with Alberta Health Services regarding the provision of a temporary parking lot. The lot will be located to the south of the Alberta Children's Hospital. It is intended to accommodate the staff of the Foothills Medical Centre during the construction of the Calgary Cancer Project. In addition, The University District was pleased to announce the development had been named the winner of the People's Choice Award in the 2015 Mayor's Urban Design Awards. Construction Notice

East Bowmont Natural Environment Park Project

Introduction

The City has started construction of the East Bowmont Natural Environment Park. Phase one involves the construction of stormwater ponds in East Bowmont Park. Work will begin in November 2015 and is expected to be complete in winter 2017.

Traffic

The access road to the construction site is located at the intersection of Home Road and 32 AV NW. Flag persons will be onsite to ensure heavy construction traffic can safely enter and exit the site. There will be an increase in construction traffic along Home Road NW. Beginning in late November a heavy volume of trucks will be removing fill from the site. This excess fill cannot be utilized onsite. The trucking will take place between 8 am and 5pm, Monday to Saturday for approximately five weeks.

Safety

The work sites will be fenced off and restricted to construction personnel. For your safety, please do not enter the fenced-off construction area.

Noise/Dust

We recognize that construction creates additional dust and noise. We ask for your patience as we work to minimize the impact to neighbouring residents. The contractor adheres to The City's Community Standards Bylaw, for hours of operation, material storage and construction best practices, including dust mitigation.



\$3,000 for contracted services; e.g., installation assistance, educators, welding, crane, shipping, etc. pending approval.
