PLANNING REPORT

New Permits

Here are the Development Permits that the Planning Committee has reviewed over the past several weeks: DP2015-5242 at 4708 Montalban Drive NW (New Single Family Dwelling): DP2016-1582 #2 5111 Bowness Road NW Change of Use and Parking relaxation requested; DP2016-1801 Accessory Residential Building (Garage) - Building Coverage (Relaxation requested).

Spot Re-zoning

Just a reminder that the Montgomery ARP (Area Redevelopment Plan) does not support spot re-zoning. Spot re-zoning is sometimes done to change the density of the property in order to get more units on it. For example, it would be exceedingly difficult to change the zoning of your property from R-C1 to R-C2. If you were in a DC (Direct Control) zone within an R-C1 area, you might be able to change your zoning to R-C1 but not R-C2, because that would be an increase in density.

Before you do any upgrades on your property check with the City to find out what permits are required and how you can go about your proposed redevelopment. And flip through the ARP to see what the specific guidelines are for our community.




Everyone is welcome at the community









Imagine if you will, gentle reader, a young man showing up for work, punctual as always, yet clearly distracted by something. His coworkers express their concern, knowing him well enough to recognize that he's distraught. And so this young man reveals that a beloved character in the game he's playing has gone to the dark side, and he finds his thoughts deviating from work more than usual.

The resulting looks of disgust say more than words ever will. How can a person grow emotionally attached to a collection of pixels on a screen? The answer is that this is exactly what game developers are aiming to achieve.

More than ever, those who design video games are aiming to recreate the experience of actually knowing somebody: highly detailed graphics and high-quality voice acting present us with characters we can almost imagine coexisting with us in the real world. What's more, with advances in programming, these characters are no longer limited to the same monotonous reactions each time you play a game. Instead, they react to what you, or people in their world, do. Offer help to a distressed settler in Fallout 4, and Preston Garvey will express his approval. Feast on the hearts of your fallen enemies, and his reaction is somewhat less enthusiastic.

Besides being presented with more believable, interactive characters in games, we also find ourselves living in a culture where becoming attached to people we know only from the other side of a screen is commonplace. How many of us have online friends or acquaintances that we have never met in person, or that we know solely through Facebook? Or how many of us keep tabs on our family and loved ones through text messages - again, communicating solely through electronic means? With the proliferation of instant deposit and online shopping, even our money has become an insubstantial concept: numbers that we track on a computer screen, rather than thick (or very, very slim) rolls of physical money we hoard beneath our mattresses.

I am not making the argument that video game characters are real people. But in a society where we so readily make the connection between a presence on a screen and the physical human being they represent - and when fictional characters are designed to be as realistic as possible - is it so outrageous that some people grow attached to these characters?

Stampede Taxi Stands

Stampede taxi stands are designated areas near Stampede Park where taxis will be lined-up to wait for customers. Two temporary taxi stands will operate at all hours during Stampede. These stands are located at the South and North entrances of Stampede Park. The taxi stand located at the North entrance of Stampede Park will provide priority service to people with accessibility needs as this entrance provides the most direct route to enter into the park.

Late Night Temporary Taxi Stands

A New Festival in BowMont!

BBQ on the Bow is happy to announce that it will be moving to the Montgomery Community Centre September 3 and 4, 2016. In its 24th year, BBQ on the Bow is Canada's oldest Kansas City Barbeque Society (KCBS) sanctioned festival.

The event is open to the public and together with the BBQ competition, features a Kid's Que competition, food demo, beer garden and live local music, among other activities. BBQ will be available for purchase from onsite vendors.

Saturday's events will include a Chef's Choice category, where the cooks can hand in anything from lamb to salmon or any other meat of their choice, and use any garnish. These creative offerings are truly outstanding. The Kid's Que is open to kids 15 and under (with adult supervision – but no help). The kids compete in two categories: pork chops and hot dogs.

Sunday is the main competition featuring teams from across Canada and the United States. Each team competes in four categories: chicken, pork ribs, pork shoulder, and beef brisket. All categories over the weekend are judged by a team of KCBS certified judges. The winning team, also known as the Grand Champion, will go on to compete at the Kansas City Royal BBQ Competition Invitational and will be entered into a draw to compete at the Jack Daniels competition. Previous winners of BBQ on the Bow have gone on to do very well at these prestigious events.

The South Shaganappi Area Strategic Planning Group is a group of community representatives and stakeholders that meet on a monthly basis to inform and respond to a number of institutional and infrastructure development projects in the area.

The SSASPG held its final meeting of the 2015/2016 year in June. It will reconvene in September. The majority of the projects will continue with various aspects of their developments over the summer months however, there were a couple of highlights to note prior to the break.

Western Securities announced that the Stadium Shopping Centre redevelopment received unanimous approval from the City of Calgary Planning Commission. It will now proceed to Council for approval on July 4, 2016.

The University District has partnered with Brookfield Residential and Truman Homes to build Phase 1 of the project. It is anticipated that the new intersection at Shaganappi Trail and West Campus Way will open in October 2016.

Water Services - Bowmont Natural Environment Park Project

Project Update – Material Hauling

Introduction

In November 2015 The City began construction of the Bowmont Natural Environment Park.

The acquisition of the former Klippert gravel pit presented a rare opportunity to protect the Bow River by incorporating green stormwater treatment as a functional element in the Bowmont Nature Environment Park.

The construction of stormwater wet ponds in the Bowmont Natural Environment Park will provide benefits to park users, local fish and wildlife, our rivers, and all Calgarians by:

- Protecting our drinking water by reducing pollutants entering our river system
- Installing improved pathways for all users
- · Beautifying the park with native trees, plant life and a number of areas users can interact with water as it flows through the park
- Increasing biodiversity
- Using a design that will minimize impacts on the existing natural environment

Traffic increases

Trucks will begin hauling excess material away from the project site beginning the week of June 6 and continuing intermittently as needed until the end of October.

- The trucks will haul from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. during weekdays and from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturdays
- During these hauling periods approximately 80-90 trucks a day will be travelling into and out of the project site via Home Road towards 16 Avenue
- A flag person will be onsite at the site entrance to ensure heavy construction traffic can safely enter and exit the site and ensure pedestrian safety by the site.
- The project webpage will be updated throughout the project to provide more details on hauling dates (calgary.ca).

Safety

The work site is fenced off and restricted to construction personnel. For your safety, please do not enter the fenced-off construction area.

There have been numerous golf balls found on the site. Please refrain from hitting balls from the slope into the job site. This is very dangerous to the workers below.

Green Cart set to roll out next spring

After a successful pilot that saw a 40 per cent drop in garbage and 89 per cent satisfaction amongst residents, the Green Cart Program will roll out to all single family homes beginning next spring. All communities should have the service by fall 2017. Here are the highlights:

All food, yard and pet waste is accepted in the program.

Unlimited quantity. Use paper yard waste bags for extra yard waste that doesn't fit in the cart.

Green and blue carts will be collected on the same day every week.

Black carts will be picked up once every two weeks on a separate day since most household waste can be recycled or composted.

Residents will receive everything they need to get started including the green cart, a kitchen pail for collecting food scraps inside the home; a sample of compostable bags for the kitchen pail and vard waste bags. Once service begins, households will pay \$6.50 per month. This charge reflects the savings achieved by changing black cart garbage collection from weekly to once every two weeks. ~cont'd on pa 15~

Our office also had the opportunity to host a Seniors' Tea in early June in celebration of Seniors Week. Thanks to everyone who joined us. It was my sincerest pleasure to host everyone in our office. I always learn so much when visiting with the seniors in our community.

Green carts go beyond backyard composting

If you're already backyard composting, keep it up. Use your green cart for all the other materials that cannot be composted at home like meat, bones, shellfish, dairy, weeds and pet waste.

Why we need to keep food and yard waste out of landfills

It may be hard to believe, but more than half of residential garbage is food and yard waste. Composting this material is the right thing to do. When food and yard waste is buried in the landfill it releases methane, a greenhouse gas that is 25 times stronger than carbon dioxide. By using the green carts we reduce dependence on our landfills, reduce greenhouse gas and turn food and yard waste into nutrient-rich compost.

Along with information on government services, we are able to provide information on Canada and Parliament and can help arrange a tour of Parliament on your next visit to Ottawa.

When someone celebrates a special anniversary, a milestone birthday, a special achievement, we can also assist in arranging congratulatory messages from Her Majesty the Queen, the Governor General, and the Prime Minister. It can take eight weeks or more to process these requests, so please plan ahead for your special occasion.

It is requested that you make an appointment before coming to the office with your concerns as this allows us to serve you better and ensure you are not required to wait an excessive amount of time. Often, we are able to assist you over the telephone without the need for an appointment too.
