

PRESIDENT'S

This has been a bit of an exciting time for Montgomery!

In case you missed it, Calgary Real Estate News (CREB) had an article on March 30, 2016 titled The Next Best Thing written by Kathleen Renne. Within the article, Montgomery was touted as one of the communities considered to be the next big thing (Renfrew, Mount Pleasant, and Sunalta were the other communities noted). Within this article, the walk-ability, infill development, vibrant street scenes, the BRZ, and merchants and restaurateurs were noted as positive attributes within Montgomery. Additionally, it was noted that the accessibility to Alberta Children's Hospital, Foothills Medical Centre, SAIT, and the University of Calgary Campus put Montgomery on the cusp of becoming a "hot spot". Montgomery was noted to be "well-suited to families" with amenities families want.

April 13, 2016 the Calgary Herald published an article "How one community in Calgary's 'doughnut of decline' is managing its rebirth" by Tom Babin. This was part three of a three part series looking into the declining population of communities surrounding the inner city. In the article, Mr. Babin noted that Montgomery's population has grown nearly 15% since 2010 and the community has a new sense of "vibrancy". He reported on the importance of good design and the importance of staying involved to help ensure high standards.

I know that the turn-around in Montgomery comes in large part to the Area Redevelopment Plan and the ongoing work of the Planning Committee. We are very fortunate to have an intelligent and committed group of volunteers to review and comment on the development in the area.

When this is published, we will have the roof and make up air projects at the community centre substantially completed. Carbon Constructors Inc. has been great to work with and I want to send a shout out to their professionalism in completing the project. I would also like to thank Reinbold Engineering Group who oversaw the project. The City of Calgary under the Capital Conservation Grant and the Provincial Government through the Community Facility Enhancement Grant were the major sponsors of the project. It will be wonderful to have our kitchen up and running in a safe manner again! Janine and David have done an amazing job at keeping the community centre operating during the construction.

PLANNING REPORT

The Planning Committee recently reviewed the following **Development Permits:**

The first is for a Contextual single detached home and garage at 4627 21 Ave NW - the proposal is for a new bungalow designed in a very contemporary style (DP2016-0681) that fits with the scale of the existing adjacent bungalows. The second is for a restaurant, Shawarma Palace, proposed for 4640 Bowness Road NW. We're definitely excited to see a new restaurant move into our community.

West Campus Developments is moving forward with getting the intersection built that allows exiting from the University District onto Shaganappi Trail. Their timeline is to have it completed towards the end of this summer. Currently, drivers can enter into that part of campus from Shagannapi, but there is no exit at this point. Our concerns revolve around potential glare from headlights shining into houses across Shagannapi at the top of Mackay Road. Because of this, a computer generated mapping was carried out to determine how far car headlights would throw light. They looked at headlights aimed at several different angles. The results showed that no light-spill reached the houses. We also wanted to ensure that headlight glare was controlled. To this end, they are proposing a visual barrier to be located along the line of trees. The plan is to have a paved path with two openings through the visual barrier, one at or near the current opening where people have cut a hole in the chain link fence, and the other across from Montalban Drive. The intent is to have the two access points link up with nearby road intersections.



"Here There Be Dragons; Part Two"

A Personal Recounting of Dungeons and Dragons

In last month's instalment, I briefly examined some of the role-playing elements present in Dungeons and Dragons in an attempt to dispel some of the fears and misconceptions surrounding the infamous tabletop game. This month, I would like to share some of my personal experiences with the game, in an attempt to demonstrate that Dungeons and Dragons is only as menacing and serious as the players wish it to be.

It takes all kinds to make a world, and the fictional world of Dungeons and Dragons is no exception. Parties undertaking grand guests - like trying to locate a farmer's missing pig - are usually as diverse as the players who dreamt them up, to the point where the dungeon master is sometimes required to step in to keep things civil. Indeed, even in my limited time playing the game, I encountered characters with unusual motivations, such as wanting to engage in cannibalism against an entire village despite being woefully outclassed by the town guards. Such hopeless and outlandish ambitions usually come off as comedic, as opposed to frightening.

Of course, players are forced to contend with more than the alleged sanity of their companions. As with any game dealing with dice, there is an element of chance in D&D that is sometimes more daunting than any enemy the dungeon master can throw at the party. Indeed,

there were several occasions when my proud and stubborn warrior was subjected to my subpar rolling skills, managing to slip off a set of stairs and severely injure himself when attempting to open a trapdoor. Further, anyone who has played the turn-based strategy game XCOM can attest to the comedy of repeatedly missing an opponent standing just in front of you, and that feeling is not diminished in Dungeons and Dragons.

Despite the frightening reputation the game has garnered for itself over the years, the truth is that Dungeons and Dragons is just that: a game. It is subject to the same foibles as any other game, and the experience is largely defined by the personalities of those who play it. True, given the right circumstances, it can become a negative experience, just as riots can sour soccer or hockey games. However, under the right circumstances, D&D can be as silly and ridiculous as the people playing it.

The South Shaganappi Area Strategic Planning Group is a group of community representatives and stakeholders that meet on a monthly basis to inform and respond to a number of institutional and infrastructure development projects in the area.

The Calgary Cancer Project continues to move forward with project planning and procurement activities. The design phase for the renovations to the Bone Marrow Transplant Unit has begun and a construction management consultant contract is in the process of being awarded. Updates are available at www.infrastructure. alberta.ca/Calgarycancercentre.htm.

The Foothills Medical Centre has issued a tender call for the construction of the design of the new parking structure to replace Lot 1, as well as for the expansion of Lot 8A. Construction for Lot 8A is scheduled for May 2016 through to September 2016. It is anticipated that there will not be any road closures during the construction.

The City of Calgary is currently reviewing a redevelopment of the 16th Avenue and 29th Street NW intersection. Construction is anticipated to begin in June of 2016 with completion scheduled for November 2016. This will include a traffic circle at the intersection of Unwin Road and Uxbridge Drive NW at the Stadium Shopping Centre. The intersection will remain open during construction.

The University of Calgary will be celebrating its 50th Anniversary with events planned throughout the year. A detailed list of events, dates and locations can be found at www.ucalgarycelebrates.ca/events. The Taylor Institute for Teaching and Learning opened its doors on April 18. The stakeholder engagement process for the campus' Long Range Development Plan has been completed. The public will have an opportunity to provide their feedback at two scheduled open houses. More information on the dates and locations are available by visiting www.ucalgary.ca/campusforward.

The University District will begin Phase II of its stripping and grading. The work is scheduled to take place from mid April 2016 to June 2016. This will involve final cutting and filling as well as loaming and seeding of the site.

Construction **Notice**

East Bowmont Natural Environment Park Project

Introduction

The City has started construction of the East Bowmont Natural Environment Park. Phase one involves the construction of stormwater ponds in East Bowmont Park. Work will begin in November 2015 and is expected to be complete in winter 2017.

Construction impacts

Traffic

The access road to the construction site is located at the intersection of Home Road and 32 AV NW. Flag persons will be onsite to ensure heavy construction traffic can safely enter and exit the site. There will be an increase in construction traffic along Home Road NW. Beginning in late November a heavy volume of trucks will be removing fill from the site. This excess fill cannot be utilized onsite. The trucking will take place between 8 am and 5pm, Monday to Saturday for approximately five weeks.

Safety

The work sites will be fenced off and restricted to construction personnel. For your safety, please do not enter the fenced-off construction area.

Noise/Dust

We recognize that construction creates additional dust and noise. We ask for your patience as we work to minimize the impact to neighbouring residents. The contractor adheres to The City's Community Standards Bylaw, for hours of operation, material storage and construction best practices, including dust mitigation.

A New Festival in BowMont!

BBQ on the Bow is happy to announce that it will be moving to the Montgomery Community Centre September 3 and 4, 2016. In its 24th year, BBQ on the Bow is Canada's oldest Kansas City Barbeque Society (KCBS) sanctioned festival.

Scam alert -

fraudsters pose as Canada **Revenue Agency**

Nearly every day, the Calgary Police Service receives reports of scammers posing as agents of the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) or Immigration Canada (IC). Unfortunately, scammers have obtained thousands of dollars from several unsuspecting victims. So how does the scam work and how can you protect yourself?

The CRA scam, and many similar ones, usually follows the same pattern. Victims are contacted via phone by people pretending to be a CRA or IC employee. The fraudsters claim that the victim owes back taxes and that they need to pay money to correct the issue, or they will be arrested or deported. Sometimes, the scammers have valid personal information about victims and their families, such as names and birthdays, to try to legitimize the fraudulent claim.

The scammers can become very aggressive and may begin to threaten victims. Victims are then told to send money through a wire service or to purchase prepaid credit cards or gift cards. Once the money is gone, it is nearly impossible to trace.

You can help protect yourself from phone and email scams by following these tips:

- Do not feel pressure to respond to a request until you have a chance to verify the story.
- Never transfer money, or give out credit card or other financial information, until you can verify the person's identity and the story, and determine whether it is legitimate.
- The CRA will not ask for payment via prepaid credit cards or wire transfer.
- Some scammers are using a technique called spoofing where the caller ID looks like the call is legitimately coming from the CRA or IC. Hang up and look up published numbers for the agency in the phone book or online and call them directly to confirm the legitimacy of the caller's story before you take any action. Do not call numbers provided to you by the person who called you.

- Don't believe what you see. Business logos, websites and email addresses can easily be duplicated to look legitimate.
- Watch for poor grammar and spelling.
- Hover your mouse over links to check their true destination. If the URL doesn't match the link, or seems suspicious, don't click on it.
- Be wary of unexpected emails that contain links or attachments from unknown senders.
- Update your computer's anti-virus software.
- Ignore calls for immediate action or messages that create a sense of urgency.
- Beware of phishing emails posing as the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) requesting personal information, or links within an email re-directing to a fraudulent website that appears to represent the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA). The CRA does not email Canadians and request personal information.
- Never provide personal information such as SIN, bank account information or credit card numbers.

Beavers in Calgary

Beavers play an important ecological role in our city. They can create ponds and wetlands that provide habitat for other wildlife, and can help reduce the effects of minor floods and droughts.

With no natural predators in the city, beaver populations can quickly grow to be unsustainable. They also present some challenges in an urban environment, including damage to trees, infrastructure and property.

The City tries to strike a balance between health of the surrounding areas and the wellbeing of the beavers. In riverside parks we take steps to reduce beaver damage, including wiring trees, planting species that beavers don't like to eat, and placing under-dam drains to control water levels. Trapping of beavers is only conducted after all other options have been considered.

The City will be holding a volunteer tree wiring event in Edworthy Park on Saturday, May 14. This is a chance for you to help protect trees in the park. For more details and to register, please visit Calgary.ca/parks or contact 311.

EMS: Window & Balcony Safety

With the return of warmer weather, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) would like to remind parents and caregivers of an often overlooked hazard in the home - access to open windows. Every year, paramedics respond to emergencies where a child has fallen from an open window, often from the second floor. These can be avoided by following simple safety measures. Take the time to assess potential hazards in your home before a preventable fall occurs.

Windows and screens

- Prevent access to windows by moving furniture such as cribs, beds, stools, and change tables out from under
- Keep drapery cords out of children's reach. Wrap excess cord around cleats, or tie-downs to avoid a choking hazard:
- Remember: screens are not safety devices. They are designed to keep bugs out, not to keep children in.

Balconies

- Do not underestimate a child's ability to climb. Furniture and other items stored on balconies and decks can be used to climb resulting in falls over the railing;
- Ensure that your balcony railings are not more than 10 cm (4 inch) apart. This will eliminate access between the vertical bars of a balcony, or deck.


Further prevention tips

- Children aged one to four are at highest risk of falling from a window or balcony;
- Direct supervision of children is the single most effective way to prevent falls from windows and balconies;
- Install safety devices which limit the distance in which a window be can open to a maximum of 10cm (4 inches);
- Ensure the safety device can be released quickly so the window can be used for escape in case of emergency.

How safe is your backyard fire pit?

Backyard fire pits are great places to gather and share good times in Calgary's summer months, but these great times can quickly become tragic if you aren't safe.

The City of Calgary has bylaw standards to help minimize some of the dangers of your backvard fire pit, or outdoor fireplace, wood burning oven or chimneys. The Calgary Fire Department also has a number of tips to help prevent anyone from getting hurt.

Safety tips and bylaw regulations

- Backyard fire pits should be built into the ground, on brick or stone, or in a fire-resistant container.
- Portable fire pits may be used on a deck as long as they sit on brick or stone, and not directly on your wooden deck.
- · Fire pits must be at least two metres away from your property line, house, garage, or fence.
- Fire pits must not be under any trees, branches, plants or other materials that can catch fire.
- Always have a way to put out the fire close to your fire pit. Easy options are your watering hose or a bucket of water.
- All fires in your fire pit must be kept to a reasonable size; under 1 metre high and wide. This helps ensure the fire's embers, sparks or smoke do not harm anyone or cause a nuisance to neighbouring properties.
- All fires in your fire pit must be continually supervised.
- Fires may only be burned in fire pits from 10 a.m. to 1 a.m., unless prohibited in a fire ban.

Do not burn:

- Painted, treated or lumber containing glue or resin
- Wet, or green/fresh cut wood
- Yard waste (cut grass or leaves)
- Garbage
- Rubber
- Plastic
- Furniture

Always check www.calgary.ca/firebans to ensure no fire bans are in effect, which may caution against or forbid using fire pits. Remember, you can be fined from \$500 to \$5,000 for not following Calgary's fire pit bylaws (5M2004) or the instructions of fire bans. Muskrats **Hardy Little Creatures**

The muskrat (Ondatra zibehticus) is a fairly large rodent which has adapted to life in and around water. Their name comes from their two musk (anal) scent glands, the odour used in communication, especially during breeding season. Muskrats are found in North American wetlands and waterways and are considered to be an important creature in their freshwater environments.

These animals have a round, portly body covered with rich waterproof fur made up of a short dense silky under coat and a longer, coarse glossy guard coat. Their fur covers small ears and provides buoyancy in the water. Fur colour ranges from a dark brown head to a light grey belly. Their feet are mostly hairless; the hind feet acting like paddles during swimming and described as semiwebbed, with the four longest toes of each foot having a fringe of specialized hairs along each side, giving the foot a paddle like effect in use. The front feet are used like hands to build lodges, hold food and dig burrows and channels. There are five toes on all feet but the inner toes of front feet are small so rarely show in tracks. Full grown large adults can weigh from 1 – 2 kgs (2 – 5 lbs) and are up to 60 cm (24 in) long (including the tail). Their tail is slender, flattened vertically (to act as a rudder when swimming) and covered with scaly skin to protect it from damaging easily. The muskrat has special teeth that protrude ahead of the cheeks and lips, which can close behind them, permitting the animal to chew on stems and roots under water "with its mouth closed." Its four front teeth are chisel like (two upper, two lower incisors), each up to 2 cm long, used for cutting stems and roots of plants.

Muskrats typically live in freshwater marshes, marshy areas of lakes, slow-moving streams, dugouts, ponds, and watery areas controlled by beaver dams. The water must be deep enough to not freeze to the bottom during winter, but shallow enough to allow for the growth of aquatic vegetation. Areas with good food sources such as bulrushes, cattails, pondweeds, or sedges are

Muskrat homes are compact mounds of partially dried and decayed plant material scattered among cattails, reeds or bulrushes, looking much like dead heaps of plants. If these materials are not available, muskrats dig burrows in firm banks of mossy soil or clay. They still need quick access to deep water for escape from predators and food access in the winter. Their construction of open-water canals through reeds, and floating houses of aquatic vegetation, creates habitats for many species of waterfowl and aquatic plants which could not survive among dense areas of cattail and sedges.

After freeze up muskrats chew through the ice, and push up plant matter to cover the hole with a dome to make a miniature lodge, which is used as a feeding station and resting place when searching for food underwater. They can remain underwater up to 15 minutes by reducing their heart rate and relaxing their muscles when submerged, thus reducing oxygen use by their body.

What's unusual about the muskrat?

- They are more widely dispersed across North American (north to south, east to west) than any other mammal.
- They were introduced to Europe in 1905 and are now common there too.
- If normal plant food is not available, and animal food is abundant, they are known to become carnivorous (eating fish, frogs, clams)!
- Numbers decrease dramatically every 7 to 10 years. This is believed to be the result of cyclical health declines, deaths and reproductive failure.
- Muskrats appear to thrive even when harvested heavily for fur, impacted by agricultural draining of wetlands and increases in industrial activity! They can even adapt to brackish (salty) water. Hardy little creatures aren't they?

If you find an injured or orphaned muskrat, or other wild animal or bird, please contact the Calgary Wildlife Rehabilitation Society for further instructions.

Getting a tax refund? What now?

If you are claiming a tax refund this year, your next decision is what you should do with it. Here are six ways to make it benefit your financial future:

- 1. Immediately use your refund to make your 2016 Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP) contribution and you'll get the benefit of nearly an extra year of potential long-term tax-deferred growth, plus a tax deduction against your 2016 income.
- 2. Contribute to investments held in a Tax-Free Savings Account (TFSA). You will not be taxed on the income generated by these investments and you can make tax-free withdrawals for any purpose at any time.
- 3. Invest it. If your RRSP and TFSA are topped up, consider adding your refund to your non-registered investments. A tax-efficient strategy is to hold stocks and equity based mutual funds outside of an RRSP or TFSA because these types of investments are taxed using a more favourable capital gain income inclusion rate plus dividends from many Canadian corporations are eligible for the dividend tax credit.
- 4. Set up a Registered Education Savings Plan (RESP) to fund your children's future education costs. Contributions to investments within an RESP can grow taxdeferred and they may qualify for Canadian Education Savings Grants (CESG) of up to 20% of your contributions.
- 5. Pay down costly, high-interest credit debt and then pay down non-deductible debt such as your mortgage - a single prepayment could potentially save hundreds, even thousands of dollars in interest pay-
- 6. If your refund is large, consider parking that cash in a short-term investment that you can access without penalty. That way, you'll have a ready source of money for a rainy day.

Tax refunds are nice...make sure they are used to enhance your long term financial growth.

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I routinely hear from seniors on fixed incomes who are anxious about how they can pay property taxes and utilities that rise faster than their pensions. They are not alone – regular families and regular Calgarians are all facing challenging economic times. In 2018, I am proposing to freeze the wages of The City employees (including unions) to give Calgarians a 0% property tax rate. This proposal, if passed in Council and combined with large savings in operations and capital spending, would result in a corresponding freeze on property taxes (that are slated to rise by 4.7%) in 2017-18. A tax freeze on The City portion of property levies could take effect as early as 2017.

The City has not filled at least 350 vacancies, which has saved \$17 million. Contracting out services has also benefitted savings without The City seeing an increase in complaints. However, I know The City can do more. Union employees need to take into account that wage increases over the past three years (3.1% average) were higher than normal in the current environment.

The conditions to pursue a tax freeze are better than ever, given \$86 million in recent expense savings, including \$73.6 million in lower capital project costs. We are in a good, strong financial position right now. A wage freeze could also enable The City to hold off any hikes to transit or recreation fees for two years, which would save The City \$10 million.

Mathematically, a wage freeze is possible, but ultimately it depends on the will of Council.

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




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
