Calgary Main Streets started with a review of 24 corridors throughout the City. Through public consultation and review, they have decided to start with 7 corridors. Bowness Road and 16th Avenue through Montgomery were both selected as part of the 7. An open house scheduled for September 28 will provide clarity and direction for this project. Hopefully those interested will have attended and I am certain that there will be opportunities for input and engagement as the project moves forward.

The Community Garden held a Garden Showcase with support from the Ripples Grant. The garden continues to be one of the few truly "community" gardens within the city. The majority of new community gardens rent separate garden spaces to their members. It is amazing to see the size of the vegetables grown and the true sense of community that the members share. Terrace Road school utilizes the garden as an outdoor classroom during June and September and it is a pleasure to watch the children's efforts grow to such beautiful veggies.

I encourage residents to consider activities that can build community. This summer, Ripples supported a south of 16th Avenue summer barbecue, the community garden showcase, a stampede breakfast, and a garden for Calgary Housing property south of 16th. Another block party is being organized for new families. This is a great way to get to know your neighbors!

The construction of the fence along Shaganappi Trail is planned for October. The goal is to have the fence completed prior to the intersection opening. Thanks to the planning and design team of Janice M, David B, and Rhonda Z from the Board for their collaboration, consultation, and research on this project. Through them, West Campus Trust and in particular Travis and James have listened to the suggestions and made adjustments to plans. There will be unique design elements that we hope will provide a visually appealing separation between the houses and Shaganappi Trail.

South Shaganappi Area **Strategic Planning Group September notes**

Foothills Hospital:

The temporary parking on West Campus/University District will soon be opened. This will allow for the removal and replacement of the Foothills Hospital parking structure on Lot 1.

The Cancer Centre will be hosting an open house Wed 12th of October between 5 and 7:30; location to be announced. Watch for bold signs around the community for information.

The power plant is being upgraded. The plan is for a net zero increase in noise; although there will be a temporary boiler located outside. The roof on the Special Services building is being replaced.

The 50th Anniversary was a huge success.

Market Mall announced that Home Sense and Sporting Life along with a third occupant will take over the old Target space. Sport Check is looking at expanding the store out into the parking lot which would necessitate the expansion of the underground parkade. A development permit has not yet been circulated regarding this expansion. An open house will be held at Market Mall; date to be announced.

City of Calgary: there was a request to include other departments of the City on the construction coordinating group to help mitigate the disruption to communities.

University of Calgary announce funding from the Federal Government to work on 8 projects within the University. The Master plan has been completed with the input from the advisory group. Once it has been formally approved it will be shared with the community. They are currently at 102% of enrolment targets. Congratulations to the U of C for being named one of the top 200 universities in the world!

West Campus/University District was granted Lead and D platinum awards. Brookfield and Truman Homes have been named the developers of the first phase. Construction of the town homes and condominiums will commence in the Spring of 2017. They held a signature event introducing the development plans prior to the Circle the Wagon festival September 10th.

IN & AROUND CALGARY Green Cart set to roll out

next spring

After a successful pilot that saw a 40 per cent drop in garbage and 89 per cent satisfaction amongst residents. the Green Cart Program will roll out to all single family homes beginning next spring. All communities should have the service by fall 2017. Here are the highlights:

All food, yard and pet waste is accepted in the program.

Unlimited quantity. Use paper yard waste bags for extra yard waste that doesn't fit in the cart.

Green and blue carts will be collected on the same day every week.

Black carts will be picked up once every two weeks on a separate day since most household waste can be recycled or composted.

Residents will receive everything they need to get started including the green cart, a kitchen pail for collecting food scraps inside the home; a sample of compostable bags for the kitchen pail and vard waste bags. Once service begins, households will pay \$6.50 per month. This charge reflects the savings achieved by changing black cart garbage collection from weekly to once every two weeks.

Green carts go beyond backyard composting

If you're already backyard composting, keep it up. Use your green cart for all the other materials that cannot be composted at home like meat, bones, shellfish, dairy, weeds and pet waste.

Why we need to keep food and yard waste out of landfills

It may be hard to believe, but more than half of residential garbage is food and yard waste. Composting this material is the right thing to do. When food and yard waste is buried in the landfill it releases methane, a greenhouse gas that is 25 times stronger than carbon dioxide. By using the green carts we reduce dependence on our landfills, reduce greenhouse gas and turn food and vard waste into nutrient-rich compost. 





Lost in Translation

The difficult transition between games and cinema

The 1993 film adaptation of *Super Mario Bros.* set an uncomfortable precedent for video game franchises looking to make the jump onto the silver screen. Critically panned and tanking hard at the box office, the film's sole redeeming quality is the minor cult status it has achieved amongst the gaming community, lending credibility to the saying "so bad, it's good." Even when cinema adaptations of game franchises prove financially successful, as was the case with 2010's *Prince of Persia: The Sands of Time*, the films typically receive only lukewarm reviews at best, and fail to win the hearts of gamers who love the source material.

So wherein lies the problem? Movies like *The Avengers* and *The Lord of the Rings* have demonstrated that successful film adaptations of comic books and literature are possible, so why not video games? Doubtless some would argue that video games lack the narrative depth and complexity of these other mediums, and perhaps *that* is the reason for the long procession of unsuccessful cinematic attempts. If for no other reason than for the sake of discussion, however, I would argue that perhaps the problem rests with writers, and their failure to understand (or appreciate) their source material.

Take, for example, the film series *Resident Evil*. Like the survival horror games of the same name, the fictional setting of Raccoon City features heavily into the plot of the first few installments. Certain characters like Jill Valentine and Claire Redfield make appearances, and the main characters are frequently thrown into conflict against the Umbrella Corporation. However, aside from a few surface similarities, the game series and the films have nothing in common: those characters that do make an appearance share little with their virtual counterparts aside from their names, events rarely sync up between the two mediums, and generally speak-

ing, and only the most half-hearted attempt is made to justify the shared title. Indeed, the main character of the films, Alice, does not even appear in the game series, nor do her assortment of poorly-explained psychic powers. (And don't even get me started on the matter of her clones).

Adapting one medium to another is not a simple task: most would argue there has yet to be a good Fantastic Four film. As such, there is no secret recipe to ending the cycle of bad video game movies. However, I think that a franchise with the right narrative draw, combined with a team that cares about the source material and executives willing to give them the necessary creative leeway would be a step in the right direction.



Put Your Stamp on the Process

Times have changed since the first letter was sent in Canada in 1693. The postal service provided by Canada Post is no longer as dominant in our daily lives as it used to be. With cell phones, email, texting, paperless billing, e-transfers and courier services, Canada Post has seen its role in our daily lives diminishing annually since 2006. At the same time, an average of 169,000 new addresses are added each year to the existing 15.8 million existing addresses.

With more places to deliver mail each year and less mail being sent, this has had a dramatic effect on revenues and costs. Canadians need to take a good look at our postal system and figure out a way to make it both sustainable and affordable. It is a vicious circle - stamp costs increase to cover growing operating costs which, in turn, results in less mail being sent and revenue dropping even further.

However, we still have a critical need for a national postal system as many Canadians and businesses rely on it for many reasons. Last year alone, Canada Post delivered almost nine billion items to every corner of Canada.

The time has come for Canadians to look at the future of our postal system to ensure it is both sustainable and affordable for everyone. A review of Canada Post is now underway and you can participate.

Canadians are being asked to contribute their comments, concerns and, most importantly, their ideas on how we can achieve these goals. For example, the most common idea I have heard so far is the suggestion to make mail delivery every second business day. This would save money and the impact on the environment. Canadians are known for being a resourceful and creative bunch and I am sure there are many more ideas to come.

An independent Task Force is currently gathering facts and developing options for consideration. Next, a Parliamentary Committee will consult Canadians on the options and make recommendations to the Government on the future of Canada Post.
