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

PLANNING REPORT

NEW PERMITS

The Planning Committee reviewed the following Development Permit Applications over the past few weeks:

DP2019-1019: New Single Detached Dwelling with rear attached garage located at 5023 22 AV NW

DP2019-1060: Relaxation for a Pergola (Accessory Building) located at 4618 15 AV NW

DP2019-0528 New Single Detached Dwelling with new Basement Suite at 5020 20 AV NW

Lot Coverage

The maximum allowable lot coverage for an R-C1 or R-C2 property, ie, properties that allow for single detached or semi-detached dwellings, is 45% of the area of the lot. This is the cumulative coverage of all buildings on that parcel (typically the house and garage). It doesn't include small accessory buildings that together add up to an area less than 10m² (107 square feet).

Among other things, having a maximum lot coverage ensures there is enough green space available for permeability and ground water penetration.

Over the past number of years, the Planning Committee has reviewed a number of residential projects where developers have pushed the lot coverage to the max. We've seen developments that show 44.9% or even 45% coverage. Applicants are reminded that it's easy to miscalculate this number and our committee does not readily support relaxations to lot coverage.

For the homeowner this means that the future flexibility and enjoyment of the property can be severely limited.

If the lot coverage is maxed out right at the beginning there is no longer the option to add a greenhouse to the garage, add additional sheds, build an extension to the house, or expand a rear deck. The house is unable to accommodate and adjust to changing lifestyles.

SOUTH SHAGANAPPI AREA STRATEGIC PLANNING GROUP

The South Shaganappi Area Strategic Planning Group is a group of community representatives and stakeholders that meet on a monthly basis to inform and respond to a number of institutional and infrastructure development projects in the area.

Cadillac Fairview provided an update on two of its major projects. The Keg is on schedule to open this fall. Construction of the Landmark Theatre has begun. Anticipated completion date is December 2019.

West Campus Development Trust announced that University Avenue is now closed to vehicular traffic east of 39th Street to Collegiate Blvd. This closure will be in place until September 2019 to accommodate the installation of underground utilities and infrastructure for the Central Park.

Parkdale Community Association has launched a Go Fund Me campaign to raise \$165,000 for a new outdoor rink and social area. The new rink will be fully accessible for sledge hockey, the first one in Western Canada.

Good Neighbour Practices

The City of Calgary has issued the "Good Neighbour Practices Reference Guide". Here you will find an excerpt from the quide each month.

Fire pits must be constructed of non-combustible material, such as brick or stone, and set upon or built into the bare ground or placed on non-combustible material. Fire pits must be situated at least two metres from any building, fence or wooden structure and not located under any trees or branches.

Only clean, dry firewood can be burned. Materials like painted/treated lumber, yard waste, tires, plastic and animal parts are strictly prohibited.

The open flame from a fire pit must not exceed one metre in height and width so that fire embers, sparks or dense smoke do not endanger anyone or cause a nuisance to neighbouring properties. Fires must be attended to at all times, and citizens must have a means to extinguish the fire on hand at all times. Fires are prohibited between the hours of 1 a.m. and 10 a.m.

Repeat offences or severe infractions of these regulations may result in fire pits being banned on a premises.

The Fire Chief can declare a complete fire ban at any time.

Don't forget to check out our website at www.fonhs. org for all the information you will need about Plants in Bloom for the May Flower Count, during the last week of May (25-31). This is an annual event, when volunteers survey their favourite natural areas and provide valuable data on the distribution of flowering plants in Alberta. Conduct a fun "trek and check" through your favourite natural space. Expertise in wildflower identification is valuable, but not mandatory. Use our alphabetical flower list, which has space to record how far in bloom the flowers are.

Urban ecology and biodiversity are free and family friendly, in backyards, gardens, schoolyards, local parks, and community green spaces. At any time, citizen scientists can find nature, take photos of their finds, and share their observations by iNaturalist.ca. The app is free, enables identification, and operates all over the world now.

The Calgary City Nature Challenge involves taking photos of plants and animals (26-29 April) and then identifying them (30 April-5 May). Winners are announced 6 May (www.calgarynatureyyc.ca). Calgary, Halifax, and Richmond, B.C. are only 3 of the over 160 cities worldwide to compete for the most observations, number of species, and participants (www.citychallenge.org). Started in 2016 with 2 cities, the City Nature Challenge went national, in 2017, and, in 2018 with 68 cities, became an international event!

The new City Parks and Pathways Bylaw states: "natural area" is a park or portion of park space where the primary role is the protection of an undisturbed (or relatively undisturbed) area of land with characteristics of a natural or native plant community. The Director, Calgary Parks, may close or restrict the use of any park (or portion of a park) to protect endangered or at-risk species; to preserve vegetation required for wildlife; and to rehabilitate a natural area.

To disturb wildlife in a park (\$200-\$300), to disturb or damage park vegetation (\$200-\$300), and to remove park vegetation (\$150-\$250) are only a few of the minimum and specified fines for offences.

RESIDENT PERSPECTIVES

This month, I decided to look at unicorns because they just feel spring-y. My research taught me two things: unicorns are one of the oldest depicted mythological creatures, and Europeans liked to write descriptions of rhinoceroses, but no one ever bothered to draw pictures to go with them. Which makes the journey of how we got from rhinoceros to glittering white, horned horses a bit of a disjointed mess. I'll do my best.

Let's get some unicorn basics out of the way: as we understand them today, unicorns are white horse-like creatures with a long, pointed horn protruding from their foreheads, sometimes with cloven hooves or a lion-like tail. Unicorns are untameable, strong, proud and haughty, and would rather die than be captured. They can only be calmed and captured by a virgin. Their horns are made out of a substance called alicorn which is believed to have magical medicinal properties, such as being able to nullify poisons and cure diseases. Some "official" measurements state a unicorn's horn is between 1 cubit and 1.5 cubits (roughly 50 to 70 cm). You know unicorns are old when we're measuring things in cubits!

We also need to talk about the monoceros, which was a creature that was conceptually related to the unicorn but was not a unicorn. At the same time, the term monoceros was used interchangeably with the term unicorn. (Which doesn't complicate things at all.) And like the unicorn, a lot of descriptions of them seem to bear a closer resemblance to rhinoceroses.

Let's talk about some of those descriptions, shall we? The oldest recorded writing describing a unicorn was in Indica, written by Greek physician and historian Ctesias the

Cnidian. He described them like "wild asses" (probably specifically the onegar, an Asiatic animal closely resembling a donkey) with a horn that is red, white, and black. In his book, Natural History, Pliny the Elder described a monoceros having the head of a stag, body like a horse's, the feet of an elephant, and the tail of a boar. He also said it made a deep bellowing noise and has a black horn. There is record that Marco Polo claimed to have seen a unicorn, saying they are smaller than elephants with heads like a wild boar, feet like an elephant's, rough hair like a buffalo, and a big black horn. He described them wallowing in mud and called them ugly. (Rude.) He also expressed disappointment that they were nothing like the way Europeans imagined them.

Every instance just seems to me as someone trying to describe a rhinoceros, but after the world's oldest game of telephone, we somehow ended up with our modern rendition of the unicorn.

But let's not forget about the virgins! What's up with that? Well, in the Middle Ages and the Renaissance, a book called Physiologus had an elaborate allegory about a unicorn, which represented the Incarnation of Christ, laying its head on the lap of a maiden, which represented the Virgin Mary. It seems from here that the idea that a unicorn can only be captured by a virgin originates from. From there, there have been many pieces of both religious and secular art showing the hunt of the unicorn. It is sometimes depicted wearing a collar with a broken chain. The unicorn is very popular in heraldry as well.

Now you have a brief overview of unicorns. There's a lot I didn't get to cover, so stay tuned for next month's article where I'll talk specifically about the unicorn's horn.



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Just Words

I remember in school when a bully was confronted by a teacher after being caught picking on a fellow student. The bully said, "I'm not hurting anyone, they are just words."

What we witnessed during the recent election campaign and what we see on the internet every day is far worse than anything that I ever heard that bully say.

Words are as powerful as any weapon, as useful as any tool and their consequences can last a lifetime.

Over time I have noticed, and so have many others, that hateful, intolerant and offensive language has grown in usage and proliferation on the internet, social media and even in daily conversation.

As I said in the House of Commons ahead of Remembrance Day, "Tens of thousands of Canadians fought hate. They gave their lives to put down those who sought to reshape human existence through hate. They gave their future so that we could have one. There could be no greater dishonour to their memory and their sacrifices than for us to give up on the fight against hate. Yes, we have the freedom to speak our mind in Canada, but that freedom was found in the fight against hate. Let us not forget that."

This type of hate and intolerance exists throughout the political spectrum. Each justifying their own abhorrent behaviour against the behaviour of those they are in disagreement with. Two wrongs do not make a right.

As a society, it is time we take a stand against this type of behaviour. It is toxic and can have many lasting, unintended and deadly consequences. History is littered with examples of what happens when hate and intolerance are allowed to grow within a peaceful society. Eventually that society ceases to exist. Let's not follow those dark paths of history.

When I spoke about hate crimes in Parliament I said, "If you are not part of the solution, you are part of the problem." Please do something and take a stand against hate and intolerance in your own way.

We can no longer stand by ignoring the hate and intolerance of others while trying to simply dismiss their actions as "just words".



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Bees

A good news story! City employees working on a roadside naturalization pilot in Canyon Meadows discovered a bumble bee species on Environment Canada's endangered list: The Gypsy Cuckoo Bumblebee (Bombus bohemicus). Reported endangered in 2014, the Gypsy Cuckoo Bee is large, fuzzy, and once had a geographic range across Canada.

The Gypsy Cuckoo bee is a parasitic bee that hijacks other bee hives. The decline of this species shows that other bee species are also in decline.

There are many factors leading to a decline in native bee and butterfly populations worldwide. Two of the biggest are the use of pesticides and loss of habitat. In an age of environmental instability, we need a fundamental cultural shift. The City of Calgary developed a 10-year Biodiversity Strategic Plan "to foster more resilient, biologically diverse open spaces and neighbourhoods." As a result, several naturalization projects are underway that include large plantings of native plants and flowers to support our pollinators and promote biodiversity.

Calgarians can also do their part. If we want more bees and butterflies, we need more flowers of every shape and size—tall flowers, short flowers, early bloomers, late bloomers, perennials and annuals, and every colour in the rainbow. Grow more native plants. Make flower beds bigger and lawns smaller. Add clover to grass seed. Plant flowering trees and shrubs. Make a bee-bath for hot, dry days. Leave the leaves on flowerbeds over the winter and pick them up later in the spring. Stop using pesticides.

If you live in an apartment, even a tiny patio with a few pots of flowers can help sustain life and be part of a network of nourishment across the city that provide for bumble bees.

Every little bit helps! It is important that we do all we can to protect bumblebees and other pollinators. They are vital to our ecosystems.


