The Henry Update – Message from Brookfield

If you have recently walked by the site, you will have noticed that the walls for the first building were poured last week and the construction team is diligently getting ready for backfill. There are a few items that need to be done before backfill (damp-proofing, shallow servicing of the homes, etc.) and these things will be done by the end of April.

The backfill crews may start fairly early in the mornings. They will wait until at least 7:00am, but they are eager to start their days as soon as the noise bylaw permits. A good side to them starting early is that they are typically finished each day before suppertime (We encourage all workers on the site to have some work/life balance and to spend time with their families in the evening).

We have had great success with sales over the last months and this has triggered the scheduled start of the next building. The second building to be built will be in the North-West corner (directly across from Maureen). The excavation of the foundation for this building is scheduled for April 20th. This may take to the end of the week and will be very similar to the noise and traffic level that you saw with the excavation of the first building.

Thank you all for your patience with this process. And as always, if you should happen to see anything on site (fence blown down, starting too early, or staying too late for examples) please feel free to contact me at any of the numbers found below in my e-mail signature. Thanks for watching out for us. And thanks for being great neighbours.

South Shaganappi Area Strategic Planning Group (SSASPG) Inter-Community project update

FMC – Foothills Medical Centre (Foothills Hospital) AHS – Alberta Health Services University District – official name for the development on the east side of Shaganappi Trail between 16th Ave and Bowness Rd. Formerly called West Campus DP - Development Permit CA – Community Association

City of Calgary – Crowchild Trail Study panels are on line and ready to review and provide feedback. The South Shaganappi public workshop was held on April 9th, results and feedback will be forthcoming. The Northwest Hub study is proceeding slower than expected and an update expected at the next SSASPG meeting.

FMC Calgary Cancer Centre Project – Construction start is scheduled for late 2017 on Lot 7 (NE corner) with work ongoing to 2023 and opening in 2024. 160 inpatient beds, outpatient clinic, research facilities, radiation treatment. Currently working on project technical requirements and stakeholder engagement starting late April or early May.

FMC Parking Lot 8A Development – Construction is scheduled for May 2016. Construction traffic will utilize the 37th street interchange and park in Lot 8A. No road closures are planned. Construction best practices for noise and dust control will be followed.

FMC Temporary Parking lot on University District Lands – Construction from July 2016 to Sept 2016.

FMC Power Plant upgrading – 2 turbo generators require overhauls. This will take place over the summer and will not require a temporary standby unit while the overhauls are being performed.

FMC Lot 1 redevelopment – Demolition from Sept 2016 to Dec 2016. Underground services from Dec 2016 to May 2017. Phase 1 Construction to start in May 2017.

FMC Bone Marrow Transplant Clinic – Immediate up-

grades are required. The upgrades are internal and will occur in the Special Services Building.

Stadium Shopping Centre redevelopment - Detailed Team Review on the DP has been received. A land use amendment on the C-C2 zoning will be required to accommodate landscaping and parking relaxations associated with the layout and mixed use of the site. The required parking assignments in the bylaw assume that each site/use is independent and does not factor the overlap associated with mixed use sites. Proposed changes are in alignment with the Area Redevelopment Plan. The application is planned to go to the Calgary Planning Commission May 19 and to council for a public hearing on July 4. Demolition and site grading would be planned from March 2017 to May 2017, piling and excavation June 2017 to Sept 2018, with parkade construction starting December 2017.

16th Avenue and 29 Street intersection redevelopment – includes dual turn lanes and traffic circle on Unwin Drive. Construction planned from June to November 2016, all current lanes are expected to be kept open during construction.

Brentwood Care Center – Phase 3 Ground breaking will be on April 15th.

University District – Grading April to June 2016. Phase 1: deep utilities June to July 2016; Shallow Utilities August 2016; surface improvements Aug to Oct 2016; offsite North and South pond upgrades to be determined with tendering. Two land use amendments are in progress and deal with allowing the temporary parking lot for FMC and modifications to the allowable grocery store size.

University of Calgary – Bermuda shorts day is April 13th, check stops will be in place for the event. The Engineering building expansion will be complete in July and the new infill building will open for the start of the fall semester. Renovations to select areas of the existing building and new infill will continue into the fall. Taylor teaching and learning institute is complete and commissioned (hoping to achieve LEED Silver or Gold). The Long Range Development Plan has had two open houses with over 280 attendees in total. A summary of the feedback should be available on-line in early April. The 50th Anniversary celebrations are set to begin on

April 29, with celebrations throughout the year. The university is ramping up the community outreach program with focus on neighbor day and stampede. Any community association hosted events focusing on these events are encouraged to reach out to the U of C to participate, complement or enhance the event. The congress of the Humanities will kick off on May 28 and run for one week. One of the focus sessions is called Energizing Cities and the role of the Community Associations on June 2. Information can be found on congress2016.ca and the "campus forward" section of the university website.

Market Mall expansion - 25,000 Sq ft Sport Check expansion and relocation to the former Target space. The development permit has been submitted and awaiting approval. An Open House with Varsity Community received positive feedback.

Vecova – Service delivery model is complete. A previous building study indicated the building is not in good shape but will be reviewed again with the new service delivery model.

Ward 1 – Councillor Ward Sutherland is hosting a number of sessions (coffee chats) open to the public to present the community report card.

Ward 7 – Councillor Druh Farrell hosted an information session to garner support for the new development levy being proposed in council. The proposal focused on developer levy's for their respective share of associated supporting infrastructure costs (Water, Sewer and Roads) on new developments. The province sets a cap on how much a developer can be charged, currently the City charges less than this cap. For example, where does the City come up with \$700 million for a new water treatment plant? A feature of the proposal is to allocate some of the levy funding back into the community affected by the development. Rollin Stanley presented examples of how additional development space can be leveraged to motivate heritage building preservation and other desired amenities. Questions from the attending community associations focused on how the communities are to be involved in determining the community enhancements.


Montgomery CA – the 16th Avenue Beautification (west of Home Rd and includes left turn onto home Rd) project has been delayed to 2017. A new traffic study will be done in the area. There were several concerns

from the community with regard to a bike lane planned on Home road going up the steep hill (north) with driveways, busses, and constricted width posing major hazards to cyclists. The community has completed installing a \$250 k make up air unit in their community building (grant and City funding).

Varsity CA – The Groves of Varsity in Crowchild Square is moving slowly – the first consultation with the community on this project was in 2000. Varsity is predominantly RC-1 and they have had two applications for secondary suites. The new Tangerine Bank in Brentwood will be a shipping container building.

University Heights CA – Westmount Charter received a 15 year approval for charter renewal. Soccer enrollment is 125. The CA is expressing challenges with the proposed parking relaxations on the Stadium Site. Comments can be found at www.uhcacalgary.org . University Heights does not have a community building and partners with community organizations such as the school or church for their community activities.

St Andrews Heights CA – Partnered with University Heights to get the required soccer numbers in some age groups. They have started business planning with the City to look at managing the high demand on volunteer resources to maintain and manage a community building. 95% of St Andrews rentals are by outside groups. The community board is looking at how to get more community uses and how to manage the cost of aging infrastructure. There are 4 CA's in the City that are walking away from their buildings because of the difficulty to maintain.





Gardening by the phases of the moon

May 6 New Moon (waxing)

Increasing moonlight, lunar gravity pulls water up encouraging plant growth and proliferation. Grafting, transplanting, re-potting, and watering. Gather herbs used for essential oils. Oil content is more concentrated at this time.

May 13 First Quarter (waxing)

Moonlight is strong, encouraging leaf growth. It is a good time for planting, especially two days before the full moon. Take cuttings from plants you wish to propagate. Fertilize as close to the full moon as possible.

May 21 Full Moon (waning)

As the moon wanes, the energy is drawing down. Strong gravitational pull but moonlight is decreasing putting energy into the roots.

May 29 Last Quarter (waning)

Decreased gravitational pull and moonlight. A resting period. Take cuttings from plants you wish to propagate. Dry herbs, flowers and fruit. If you want to control growth or encourage rooting, perform the necessary activities during the waning moon.





International Migratory Bird Day is on May 8. Continual monitoring is required to maintain accurate, current information on their status around the world. Go to www.naturealberta.ca for Alberta birds at risk.

Ordinary people with an interest in wildlife, plants or species can help. Citizen science programs combine learning, field work, and volunteer research. Projects can be about insects, frogs and toads, birds, mammals, plants, water, and more.

There are local clubs and annual count events, such as the species count of birds during May at various locations around Alberta. The flower blooming count is the last week of May. Everyone is welcome to participate. For botany details, email svisser@ucalgary.ca.

Our Facebook group is busy reporting on wildlife sightings, identifying plants, and how early the crocus appeared on the John Laurie side, off the 64 Avenue entrance, and near the top above Charleswood Drive. Alberta Plant Watch is part of the national Canada Watch program. By reporting when certain plants bloom, volunteers contribute vital information for climate change studies. We now have almost 3 decades of information.

Go to www. plantwatch.naturealberta.ca.

Participation can be as easy as just looking for flowers in bloom and recording information about it on a data sheet and taking a picture; or go online to identify unusual or difficult plants.

Full colour photos are on our website. You can now report your observations and locations easily online. You can also use your smart phone to report data by your phone's GPS, and/or to send a photo of your plant. Please submit count results by June 30, 2016 for the May Flower Count -May 25-31.

Mark your calendars now for Nose Hill clean-ups on Saturday, June 18 and July 30 at the Edgemont parking lot (Edgemont Blvd. & Shaganappi Tr.) 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. where pick-up bags are given out to park users. Parks staff and Bylaw officers will be on hand. Individuals and groups are welcome for this PUPPY program.

You can volunteer to be a Park Interpreter for Nose Hill from June to October if you love to tell a story and have an interest in environment, natural history, local plants, and wildlife. Must be 18 years of age or older. Training provided. Call 311 or apply online at www.calgary.ca.





Behind The Custom Built Home: Life After the Flood of 2013

Ranger Homes Rebuilds Luxury Bowness Home on Concrete Columns, Well Above Predicted 1 in 100 Year Flood Level

Imagine a luxury home elevated well above the high water mark on the banks of the Bow River, sitting on ten massive concrete piles socketed deep into bedrock. Above this point, the house is constructed like most other homes. It looks like a typical, upscale house, but it has no basement so if there is a flood the water passes harmlessly underneath.

The 2013 floodwaters left many homeowners utterly defeated, but for one Bowness couple, leaving the place they had chosen as home was not an option. In the fall of 2013, the couple was forced to demolish what was left of their home and begin thinking about how to rebuild their lives. Approximately eight months after the floods, a colleague recommended custom homebuilders Ranger Homes Inc. Andy and Emily Kolaczek, the owners of Ranger Homes, welcomed the opportunity to get involved. They knew that rather than trying to manage floodwater, it would be even better to raise the revitalized structure to allow water to flow beneath without damage.

The clients proposed building a fully flood mitigated singlefamily dwelling, well above the one in 100-year flood level. They had prepared a general layout but needed a builder that could design, engineer and construct this unique home. The key to rebuilding was to minimize the potential exposure to the river, rather than to try and resist the impact the floodwater could have. Andy and Emily proposed a steel framework on concrete piles to support the living space more than 6 feet above the ground. In December 2014, construction began.

"It was interesting and challenging, and we were ideally suited to lend our skill sets as engineers, designers, and homebuilders. Andy and I wanted to come up with a home that would be everything the clients were looking for, and also provide a sustainable design that could safely withstand a future flood with minimal damage and cleanup," says Emily Kolaczek.

By September of 2015, the homeowners were settled into their stunning new home. The custom fixtures, luxury features, and innovative architecture exceeded their expectations.

"After having to demolish our flood destroyed home, we feel a great sense of achievement and safety having taken all of the possible measures to build a fully mitigated home," explains Ranger Homes' Bowness Client. "Together with Ranger Homes, we have done all that could be done to make a home this close to the river a place that will withstand a future flood event".

Continuing to live in this location was a top priority for the homeowners. Thus, Ranger came up with a design that allows them to do so without worry. The elegant home surpassed the owners' hopes and fulfilled their dream of remaining in their neighbourhood despite living near a major river. Their custom home serves as an example of a thoughtful solution for rebuilding within the flood fringe.

Getting a tax refund? What now?

If you are claiming a tax refund this year, your next decision is what you should do with it. Here are six ways to make it benefit your financial future:

- 1. Immediately use your refund to make your 2016 Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP) contribution and you'll get the benefit of nearly an extra year of potential long-term tax-deferred growth, plus a tax deduction against your 2016 income.
- 2. Contribute to investments held in a Tax-Free Savings Account (TFSA). You will not be taxed on the income generated by these investments and you can make tax-free withdrawals for any purpose at any time.
- 3. Invest it. If your RRSP and TFSA are topped up, consider adding your refund to your non-registered investments. A tax-efficient strategy is to hold stocks and equity based mutual funds outside of an RRSP or TFSA because these types of investments are taxed using a more favourable capital gain income inclusion rate plus dividends from many Canadian corporations are eligible for the dividend tax credit.
- 4. Set up a Registered Education Savings Plan (RESP) to fund your children's future education costs. Contributions to investments within an RESP can grow taxdeferred and they may qualify for Canadian Education Savings Grants (CESG) of up to 20% of your contributions.
- 5. Pay down costly, high-interest credit debt and then pay down non-deductible debt such as your mortgage – a single prepayment could potentially save hundreds, even thousands of dollars in interest payments.
- 6. If your refund is large, consider parking that cash in a short-term investment that you can access without penalty. That way, you'll have a ready source of money for a rainy day.

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In a growing and maturing city, change is constant. Change, in the form of City-led public projects and private developments, is important to building a resilient city. The inclusion of local wisdom improves these projects to better address the hopes and needs of current and future Calgarians.

On significant projects, sufficient public consultation is considered an essential public right, as well as a key responsibility of government. Over the years, I have seen both good and bad examples of public engagement. I firmly believe that progress happens at the speed of trust.

In 2011, I introduced a motion to City Council requiring The City to improve the quality and consistency of public consultation. While some progress has been made, Council further discussed public engagement at a recent strategic planning session to learn how we can do better.

For public engagement to achieve its objectives, it is important for everyone involved to understand the rights and responsibilities associated with their roles. Organizers should start by providing notification to affected stakeholders to solicit as much feedback as possible. The terms of engagement should be established up-front. Whether the engagement is led by The City, community or developer, organizers must facilitate an open, objective and respectful dialogue where all participants feel safe to express their views. Two great examples are the Crowchild Trail Corridor Study and the Bow to Bluff project.

The organizer must outline the decision-making process, including the current status, the scope of the project, and answers to commonly asked questions: What is on the table? What decisions have already been made? What is the background of previous decisions? How will future decisions be made? Feedback should be documented, carefully considered, and included in a report back to the public. Offering this level of transparency produces credibility for the project and builds trust. Organizers should also structure engagement to fit the scope of the project. More opportunities and multiple ways to provide feedback are needed on large city-shaping projects like a new CTrain line, as compared to smaller projects like local traffic calming.

Public participants share in some important responsibilities. The first is to understand and respect the terms of engagement, as well as the subject matter. Participants also have a responsibility to listen and contribute respectfully. Intimidation at public meetings may discourage earnest participation, with disenchanted participants leaving the process. We need to ensure the quiet voices are heard too.

At Council's recent strategy session, we talked about the number of large projects on the go and the risk of consultation fatigue. City staff agreed to work on a more co-ordinated approach, combining engagement on several related projects.

It is clear to me that City Council and staff still have more work to do on improving the public engagement process, but I am confident that we can learn from our best examples to ensure all voices are heard in a respectful manner.
