

## **University District Construction Update**

#### 1 CURRENT CONSTRUCTION

From August until October 2017, road closures due to construction will be underway for the following:

- McLaurin Street
- University Avenue and Children's Way (east of Smith Street)
- 39th Street Southbound lane closed, Local traffic only.

**Impacts:** Vehicles, buses, bikes and pedestrians as well as those who access Alberta Children's Hospital main entrance from Childrens Way will be impacted, please see traffic detours below.

#### Traffic Detours

Onsite signage and traffic accommodations will direct all effected parties to alternate routes.

- Alberta Children's Hospital main entrance can be accessed via 24th Avenue onto McLaurin Street.
- For traffic coming from Shaganappi Trail through University Avenue & Children's Way to the Alberta Children's Hospital main entrance please follow on-site construction signage.
- A temporary egress has been installed on University Avenue for westbound traffic to 39th
- · Access to Family Housing will be maintained

### **Pedestrian and Bike Detours**

- Those walking from 32nd Avenue please note 39th Street alternate walking route will continue to be in place.
- · A temporary pedestrian pathway has been installed from the intersection of 39th Street and University Avenue due to the McLaurin Street and University Avenue road closures.

### **2TEMPORARY BUS STOPS**

August to October, Temporary Bus Stops For those utilizing transit, please note the following impacts to Routes 31, 72/73 & 91:

• Route 31 - Stops 4106, 3495, 4629, 4037 & 7095 have been closed, and temporary stops have been setup on 24th Avenue, Smith Street, University Avenue & Shaganappi Trail. Stops 4028 & 9618 are still active.

- Route 72/73 Stops 3495, 4106, 4629 & 4037 have been closed, and temporary stops have been setup on 24th Avenue, Smith Street, University Avenue & Shaqanappi Trail. Stops 9618, 4028 & 5445 are still active.
- Route 91 Stops 9619, 8648/4106, 4629 & 4037 have been closed and temporary stops have been setup on Smith Street, University Avenue & Shaqanappi Trail. Stop 5445 is still active.

### **3 LONG-TERM UPDATE**

University District has deployed the 2017 construction program until October 2017 which will result in new and improved roads/pathways, landscaping enhancements as well as improvements to the North Pond. West Campus Development Trust will provide monthly updates on construction activity and traffic detours.

If there are any impacts to pedestrian access and bike routes, updates will be provided as necessary to ensure your safety as construction proceeds. We apologize for any inconvenience this work may cause. Thank you for your patience. Construction timelines may change, dependent upon site and weather conditions.

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
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Over the last year, there has been a significant increase in incidences of theft in Parkdale, including break-ins to vehicles, underground and above-ground garages and - in one notable instance - a vehicle stolen right off a resident's front driveway.

On August 22, we received a call from a resident who had just witnessed a break-in on 5th Avenue, in broad daylight. The Police responded within 60 seconds, and the Police helicopter responded quite quickly after that. We are unaware if the culprit has been found at this time.

Please be sure to lock your vehicles, even if you are only leaving it for a few minutes. Car theft and vandalism happens guickly and often go unreported. It is strongly recommended that you do not leave any valuables in your vehicles, including you garage door opener.

If you witness a crime in action, please call 911 immediately. If you are a victim of crime, please report the crime to Calgary Police Services, even if there is no damage to your vehicle.

If Calgary Police Services is aware of all vehicular crime in the community, they can add resources and increase in community officers. They base their resources on statistics, and if crime isn't reported, they have no evidence that there is a need for more enforcement officers.

Happy Thanksgiving to all. There will be no classes for Queen Elizabeth High School students on Monday October 9.



Over the past few years, a number of projects were done in Nose Hill Park as part of the implementation of the Nose Hill Trail and Pathway Plan. The controversial plan was approved by Council in July 2005 and construction began in 2006, with asphalt paving. Project plans are on the city website and there is a map with an update on our website.

Construction activities continue and focus on the following work:

- Building primary (gravel) trails, timber landscape stairs for problem grades, and stabilized tread (dirt - single track) trails.
- Other options are to re-vegetate trails naturally, ploughing a trail to a shallow depth, and reseeding. The length will be decided in the field, depending on the sightlines, and to the satisfaction of the City Project Manager.

One of our members said: "I hope all is in order but I was alarmed to see a backhoe parked above Charleswood and John Laurie, south of the gulley from Brisebois Drive. I hope there is no plan to pave or gravel that path along the ridge crest. We have so many paved and manicured paths already on the Hill."

Here is an answer from the Zone 3 Parks Superintendent to the Ward 4 Councillor. "The backhoe is being used to construct the formal gravel trail that is on the

attached construction drawings in a little square. It will be a designated trail replacing a worn desire line trail. The construction of the stairway and designated trails have gone as planned this year and look great."

Just a reminder: Nose Hill Park is a natural environment park, so please respect wildlife and plants. Do not pick the flowers or they will not be there for future park users and stakeholders.

In 2012, Council approved the CalgaryEATS! plan developing a field guide of wild urban edible plants in the area. Since many members of the public are already foraging in our green spaces, this project provides the opportunity to increase public education around wild harvest, while promoting safety, sustainability, and environmental protection.

This field guide will have information on urban food foraging, such as how to identify urban edibles, places where foraging can be practiced (details still to be worked out), how to prepare wild edibles, and avoid non-palatable or poisonous look-alike species.

## **Upcoming Stormwater System Upgrade**

We would like to share information on an outfall repair project in your community.

After the June 2013 Flood, The City of Calgary inspected the Bow and Elbow Rivers, and Fish, Nose and West Nose Creeks for significant damage to outfalls and riverbanks. We identified 161 outfalls on the rivers and 53 outfalls on the creeks with damage and have prioritized them for repairs. An existing outfall (B69) in your area suffered damage. This project will repair the damaged outfall and stabilize the bank

in the immediate area of the outfall using large stones (called riprap) to protect it from further erosion. We will also remove an existing concrete intake structure from the Bow River just north of the Pumphouse Theatre.

#### What is an outfall?

Stormwater is rain or snow melt from our roofs, lawns and roadways that enters the storm drains on our streets and travels through an underground pipe system eventually draining into our rivers. The site where the stormwater flows from the pipes and into the river is called an outfall.

### **Proiect details**

• Outfall B69 is located along the south side of the Bow River north from the Pumphouse Theatre (Figure 1).

- Repairs to the outfall involve removal of debris, placing a concrete plug in a buried duct, removing damaged concrete infrastructure, rehabilitating the outfall and reclaiming and protecting the disturbed bank from future erosion.
- Construction fencing will be in place for the duration of this project.

### **Construction Impacts**

- · Access to the construction site will be from Pumphouse Road SW.
- · Construction vehicles, equipment and a small laydown area for supplies will occupy the maintained Parks area north of the Pumphouse Theatre (Figure 1) and City of Calgary snow dump area to the east. Both areas will be fenced off for construction access only.
- · Work will be performed from 7 a.m. until 9 p.m. for approximately 3 months.
- · Equipment may be stored in the parking lanes adjacent to the park, and no other impacts to traffic are expected.
- The temporary staging area and access route will be restored to original condition.
- There will be a pathway detour around the Pumphouse Theatre (Figure 2).
- Project information will be available on Calgary.ca.

## Halloween Safety

Alberta Health Services EMS would like to remind parents and trick-or-treaters of some Halloween safety tips as October 31st approaches. Take some time to review these simple tips and reminders to help ensure your Halloween is a fun and safe night for everyone.

### Trick-or-Treaters

- Remember: all regular pedestrian rules still apply. Be sure to cross the road at marked crosswalks, or well-lit corners only. It is safest to work your way up one side of the street, and then cross once to the other side.
- Stav away from houses that are not well lit. Do not accept rides from strangers, or enter any home you feel is
- · Let your parents know where you are going to be at all times (route) and advise them if you will be late returning.

#### **Parents**


- · Be certain that young trick-or-treaters are accompanied by an adult. Older children should stay in groups.
- Pre-determine boundaries to trick-or-treat within, and establish a firm time to return home.
- · Advise children not to eat anything until they return home. Dispose of any items that appear to have been tampered with, or that are not properly wrapped.

#### Costumes

- Choose bright colored costumes that are highly visible. Adding reflective tape to costumes further increases visibility.
- · Consider sending your children with a flashlight for additional safety and increased visibility.
- · When purchasing, or making costumes, look for materials and accessories that are labeled flame-resistant.
- All costume accessories, such as sticks, rods, or wands, should be soft and flexible, with no sharp edges.
- · Consider using hypoallergenic make-up kits instead of masks that may impair breathing, or vision.
- Be sure costumes are loose enough to be worn over warm clothing, but not so long that they become a tripping hazard. Costumes should not be longer than vour child's ankles.
- Ensure your child is wearing adequate foot wear that takes into consideration weather conditions and walking.

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### **Not All Corporations Are Big**

My office has been inundated with hundreds of letters from Calgarians upset with the proposed changes for private corporations. Canada's tax system should be fair and equitable for all. However, I am concerned that the Liberals' proposed tax changes will make it harder for Canadians to get many critical goods and services.

Private corporations are a popular tax arrangement for business owners, such as farmers, doctors, lawyers, engineers and other independent professionals. They limit their and their family's liability from the financial risks they undertake in their professions. They also help facilitate a savings method for those who do not have formal group pension plans. This legitimate tax structure has been in place for many decades and has proven to work well.

By incorporating, a person is able to create a separate legal entity to operate under and have their revenue, expenses and assets treated separately from their income. This makes sense as the money you pay to your dentist, for example, is not entirely their income. It is revenue that pays for staff, business expenses, insurance, rent, etc. Only after those expenses are paid does your dentist draw a salary from the corporation which is taxed the same as you and I. If they leave profit in the corporation, they do not pay tax on it now, but will pay tax on it later when they draw the income (likely in

Some are facing a three-fold increase in their tax rates and this drastic increase could drive many professionals out of their professions and many out of Canada.

I am concerned any changes will make it harder to find a family doctor and increase wait times; make local meats and produce more expensive; and discourage young Canadians from starting their own business. We know government spending is at an all-time high, but hitting key parts of our community and our economy with dramatic tax hikes is not the answer.



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
