


The dawning of Saturday saw our Booster Club hosting their famous flap jack and sausage breakfasts to over 500 hungry people.

The Red Crossbill

The Red Crossbill is a stocky finch with a heavy head and a short, notched tail. Males are reddish-scarlet or reddish-yellow except for their dark wings and tail while females are olive-grey to greenish yellow with plain dark wings. This songbird is common in the mountain and foothills regions of Alberta year round and it is considered a global species. The Red Crossbill's range is hard to define and its population is hard to monitor because their movements are irregular and based on food availability.

#### **Fun Facts:**

- The tips of its large bill are crossed; an adaptation for removing seeds from tight closed cones.
- The Red Crossbill's biting muscles are stronger than the muscles to open the bill so it places the tips of its slightly open bill under a cone scale and then bites down.
- You can spot this songbird by their undulating (wavelike) flight, which is even noticeable when they are flying at great heights
- · Red Crossbills are considered irregular breeders because they can breed whenever and wherever they can find a large crop of cones, even during the winter
- Because of this irregular breeding, the timeframes for the Red Crossbill's lifecycle varies more than most North American songbirds. For example, juveniles hatched during the summer molt only once (between late summer and late autumn) whereas juveniles hatched from late winter to early spring molt twice (about three and a half months after hatching and again during the main summer molt period).
- Because of their dependence on food supply, Red Crossbills may occupy an area in huge numbers and then disappear for long periods of time (this behaviour can sometimes be called 'irruptive')
- These birds can often be heard but rarely do they make

themselves visible

• Red Crossbills will come to feeders to eat niger and small seeds but the best way to tempt this elusive bird is to allow them to take sunflower seeds directly from the sunflower heads.

### SCOUTS

#### The Next Chapter

The 58th Boy Scouts continued to grow. By 1957 the Scout and Cubs group had already started to outgrow their Scout Halls and had taken it upon themselves, with support from the Community Association, to enlarge the West Wing of the Community Hall.

In 1965 there were 143 Cubs and 58 Scouts. At this point the Scout meetings were divided between using the Scout Hall and the Community Hall because there too many to fit in the Scout Hall alone.

It is believed that, to celebrate Alberta's 100th year commemoration in 1967, the Boys Scouts project for that year was to create and install concrete blocks in the shape of a maple leaf. They also erected the flag poles that you see today on the west side of the building. Every year since, the 58th Thorncliffe Scout group leads the flag raising celebration initiating the beginning of Winterfest. There was, also, a time capsule buried there. It has since be unearthed.

In 1973 the Community center needed some change rooms for the outdoor hockey rink. They approached the Boy Scouts groups and asked if they could take possession of their Scout Hall buildings. In return, the Community offered suitable accommodation in the basement of the new community centre. It spanned an area of 1050 square feet and included the area now known as the Greenview room, the Scout Room and 3 adjacent storage rooms. This would be the new home for the 58th Thorncliffe Scouts for many years.

- Many cities have banned one-use plastic bags; a single plastic bag can take 1,000 years to degrade. Use a reusable shopping bag; there are many tutorials for making your own out of everyday items too.
- 3. Put gum on your "plastics-to-give-up" list. Chewing gum is made of synthetic rubber—otherwise known as plastic. Ew!
- 4. Purchase products in boxes instead of plastic bottles and containers. Cardboard is less taxing to degrade and recycle.
- Buy in bulk. Fill up your reusable bag or container and save money while you save yourself recycling duty.
- Reuse containers for storing leftovers, knickknacks, kitchen ingredients, small toys and shopping in bulk.
- 7. Carry your reusable bottle or mug with you and use for your beverages on the go.
- 8. Bring your own container for takeout or your restaurant doggy-bag. Many places use Styrofoam, let

- them know you don't want it beforehand. There are great stainless steel alternatives available.
- 9. Instead of using a plastic lighter, stock up on matches or use a refillable metal lighter.
- If you avoid frozen food, you'll avoid far more plastics as well, and, as a bonus, you'll eat less processed foods.
- 11. Avoid using disposable plastic-ware at home and request that restaurants not pack it in your takeout.
- 12. Often if you shop at a smaller market or a farmers' market vendors will allow you to reuse containers for berries and tomatoes and such. Ask!
- 13. Diapers are one of the worst offenders when it comes to plastic waste. The EPA estimates that 7.6 billion pounds of disposable diapers are discarded in the US every year. Use cloth diapers; there are many cloth diaper services available to clean up after baby.
- 14. Make fresh juices or eat fruit instead of buying bottled juices. It's better for you as well.
- 15. Making your own cleaning products is surprisingly simple, effective and thrifty. It can be as simple as lemon juice and white vinegar. Kid friendly, too!
- 16. Pack your lunch in reusable containers and bags, and avoid products that are single serving.
- 17. Use a razor with replaceable blades instead of disposable, there are fun companies that you can pay a flat fee to who will send you replacements every month.



### **Illegal Encampments**

A message from the Federation of Calgary Communities Building Safe Communities Program

Illegal encampments are complicated social issues involving people camping on ground they do not own or have authorization to do so by owners of the property. These illegal encampments can usually be found in wooded areas, parks, bodies of water and can be abandoned or still in use. When illegal encampments are abandoned it can cost on average \$4,000 to clean

up the site. If you find an illegal encampment in your neighbourhood call the City at 3-1-1.

Before it can be cleaned up and removed the Calgary Police Service (CPS) must place a 72 hour trespass notice before clearing out the area. It's recommended that residents wait for CPS or Bylaw Officers to dispose of the encampment properly.

#### **Additional Resource:**

The Alpha House, an agency that serves vulnerable populations in Calgary, the agency has an Encampment Team that helps individuals who need relocation and provides support for those setting up illegal encampments with legal accommodations.



# **EMS: Yielding to Emergency Vehicles**

Time is the enemy in any emergency. For everyone's safety it is important for motorists to understand how to correctly yield right of way to emergency vehicles with lights and siren activated. You can help EMS, police, and fire get to the scene quickly and safely by following these rules of the road.

### When an emergency vehicle approaches with lights and siren activated:

- If you're in the middle of an intersection when an emergency vehicle approaches with lights and siren activated, safely clear the intersection.
- On a one or two lane road, motorists should move to the right side of the road, slow down, and then stop. Remember to signal.
- On a road with three or more lanes, motorists should move to the nearest side of the road and stop. If driving in the centre lane, move to the right side of the road and stop. Remember to signal.
- Come to a complete stop and wait for the emergency vehicle to pass. Shoulder check for more emergency vehicles (there is often more than one!) before re-entering traffic flow. Remember to signal.
- Emergency vehicles might use any available road space to maneuver. This could include the shoulders or left hand turning lanes in order to pass other traffic.

#### When operating a vehicle:

- Drive attentively and defensively at all times. Be cognizant to sirens and be prepared to yield the right of way.
- It is Alberta law for motorists to slow down to at least 60 km/hour (unless a lower speed is posted) when driving past a stopped emergency vehicle. This includes EMS, police, fire, and tow trucks with their lights activated.
- Do not break the rules of the road in order to give right of way to an emergency vehicle. This could include proceeding through a red light or making an illegal turn. Actions such as these jeopardize all motorists in the area.
- Drivers must place their full attention on the roadway and toward the safe operation of their vehicle at all times. The fine for distracted driving in Alberta is \$287.00.
- Always leave plenty of space between your vehicle and an emergency vehicle should it be required to stop suddenly.





Our annual general meeting is on Wed. Nov. 16 at Triwood Community Centre NW and the public portion begins at 7: 30 p.m. Our guest speaker John McFaul will offer a power point of Nose Hill Flora with an introduction to the City BiodiverCity 10-year strategic plan. John was appointed by City Council as a member of the Biodiversity Advisory Committee and is a professional naturalist, who has been leading nature walks and hikes for 30 years. From 1986-2003, he worked for City of Calgary Parks as a naturalist for the Inglewood Bird Sanctuary. He received the Loran L. Goulden Award from the Federation of Alberta Naturalists. John is a professional interpreter with the Interpretive Guides Association. For more details you can go to our website at www.fonhs.org.

Calgary has been called "Sandstone City" because it is a key component of many heritage buildings, including the old City Hall. Rather than importing the material, City Council approved a notice of motion to reintroduce mining within the city lim-

its, at Edworthy Park and/or the former John A. Lewis Quarry site. A scoping study will return to City Council about the feasibility of reactivating small-scale quarrying sites.

When news of the motion was published, Nose Hill Park was named as the second site. Council was already in session. As a result I wrote a letter opposing the plan, due to public safety issues, impact on wildlife, and damage to diversity. The Ward Councillor voted against the motion and said, "No one must touch Nose Hill". There was a recommitment to preserving Nose Hill for future generations of Calgarians. The assistant to the motion mover confirmed, while there was no reference to Nose Hill Park, it is important to preserve and conserve nature across our city. Fortunately, the second site is actually in the West Creek Valley, well outside the Park.

City Hall exhibited "Calgary Goes to the Dogs: A History of Dogs and Dog Licenses. In 1885, there were only 100 dog tags; now there are 100,000. There were no leash bylaws or fenced-in backyards. We have the Responsible Pet Ownership Bylaw and there are estimated to be 150 public off-leash areas. This accounts for 20% of park spaces in Calgary (1250 hectares).

Nose Hill is a popular park for walking dogs, in part because some communities do not have their own off leash areas. The pathways on the escarpment are on-leash areas, while the multi-use plateau (top of the hill) is off-leash.

#### Crews ready for winter snowfall

Crews are keeping an eye on the forecast all winter long, preparing roads with anti-icing solution before the snow falls, and maintaining City streets as soon as snowflakes hit the ground.

We know how important it is for Calgarians to get to where they want to go safely, and winter driving can be challenging because of snow and icy conditions. Stay informed during every snowfall by following @ yyctransport on Twitter and downloading the Road Conditions App for frequent updates. See where our crews are plowing on the live map at Calgary.ca/ RoadConditions.

After each snowfall, Roads crews follow a priority clearing system called the Seven Day Plan:

- Priority 1 routes, which carry more than 20,000 vehicles per day, are cleared to bare pavement within 24 hours after the snow stops falling.
- Priority 2 routes, which carry between 5,000 and 19,000 vehicles per day, are cleared within 48 hours after snowfall has stopped.
- · Playground zones, designated hills, and residential streets on Residential roadways are cleared on Days 3-7. These roads are flat-bladed, which means snow is packed down so it is easier to drive on, and ruts are removed.

#### First Quarter (waxing) November 7

Moonlight is strong, encouraging leaf growth. It is a good time for planting, especially two days before the full moon. Take cuttings from plants you wish to propagate. Fertilize as close to the full moon as possible.

#### November 14 Full Moon (waning)

As the moon wanes, the energy is drawing down. Strong gravitational pull but moonlight is decreasing putting energy into the roots.

#### November 21 Last Quarter (waning)

Decreased gravitational pull and moonlight. A resting period. Take cuttings from plants you wish to propagate. Dry herbs, flowers and fruit. If you want to control growth or encourage rooting, perform the necessary activities during the waning moon.

#### November 29 New Moon (waxing)

Increasing moonlight, lunar gravity pulls water up encouraging plant growth and proliferation. Grafting, transplanting, re-potting, and watering. Gather herbs used for essential oils. Oil content is more concentrated at this time.

#### Hello Calgary-Klein!

Economic diversification is a key element of Alberta's economic recovery. Alberta's economy must become more resilient to changes in the international price of oil. Our government is supporting small businesses to create jobs and get Albertans back to work.

Alberta's small businesses and investors create new jobs and diversify our economy. Small businesses in Alberta have a bigger economic impact than small businesses anywhere else in Canada, and make 35 per cent of all jobs in Alberta.

As part of the Alberta Jobs Plan, our government is creating a tax credit for investments in small Alberta businesses that will support up to 4,400 new jobs over three years, and contribute up to \$500 million to the province's GDP.

The Alberta Investor Tax Credit (AITC) will offer a 30 per cent tax credit for investments in Alberta small business made between April 14, 2016 and December 31, 2019. The tax credit will be offered to investors who provide capital to Alberta small business in a variety of sectors, including:

- Research, development, and commercialization of proprietary technology, products and processes,
- Development of interactive digital media and game products,
- Post-production, visual effects, and digital animation, and
- Tourism operations like resorts, skiing facilities, amusement and recreation industries, hunting and fishing camps, and scenic and sightseeing tours.

Legislation establishing the AITC is being introduced this session. We know from similar legislation in other jurisdictions that this will provide a strong incentive for Alberta investors, increasing access to capital when and where small businesses need it most.
