




PRESIDENT'S **MESSAGE**

In December, we learned that the Green Line North LRT would emerge from a tunnel on Centre Street at 24th Avenue North. Because this could negatively impact our businesses along Centre Street, we shared the following thoughts at the Standing Policy Committee meeting on Transportation and Transit.

"This September our community association's planning committee and residents had the opportunity to walk through Tuxedo Park with Rollin Stanley. When we were on Centre Street and 17 Avenue North talking about the Green Line tunnelling under 16th Avenue and emerging in Tuxedo Park around 23 Avenue, he mentioned that transit that transitions from below around to at arade creates a dead zone for the community where the transition takes place.

"We'd therefore like to express a concern today that all five options just discussed produce this result for Tuxedo Park.

"Our attendance at the LRT in an Urban Environment: Lessons from Portland, Seattle, and Vancouver presented by Councillor Druh Farrell, further strengthened our curiosity about the LRT going under 16th Avenue because it showed how a low floor LRT at grade can be an opportunity for us to unite the west and east sides of our community and create a vibrant corridor the full length of our community from 16 Avenue to 32 Avenue.

"We'd therefore like to understand if there is enough flexibility within these five options to explore the possibility of the Green Line being at grade at 16th Avenue and instead have the traffic on 16th Avenue tunnel under the LRT. We don't know if it is the right solution for Centre Street. We'd just like to ensure that it has been fully explored."

These comments proved effective because they started a conversation amongst the Councillors about the potential creation of dead zones all along the line.



North Central LRT and Tuxedo Park!

Progress on the North Central LRT (which is commonly being referred to now as the GreenLine) is moving very rapidly. It is very important that each and every Tuxedo resident gets involved, gets informed and gets their voice heard. Although it is early in the planning process, the City has been unable to provide us with much detail on what stations will look like and how it will affect our neighbourhood. If we don't get involved and make our voices heard, then we will be ignored and the focus will be on moving residents as quickly as possible through our neighbourhood to and from downtown. Have you considered the following?

- How will your bus transit service be affected by the LRT?
- Will you be able to easily walk, bike, and drive around your neighbourhood after the LRT is built?
- If the LRT is underground in Crescent heights where

will the three lanes of northbound cars go when they get to Tuxedo where the LRT reduces the northbound lane to one lane?


- How will the reduction of four lanes of Centre St traffic to two lanes affect our neighbourhood?
- How will rezoning along Centre St and around the proposed stations at 16th and 28th Avenue affect you?
- How can we work with the City to encourage the type of re-development along Centre St that we want as part of the LRT project?

The City will be conducting many information session in 2016 - I encourage everyone to get out and to get to know the City representatives and to express your concerns and to ask questions. 

We can preserve nature and foster biodiversity for future generations, by staying on designated pathways and trails in our parks, in addition to respecting wildlife habitat and their migration patterns. The long-range plans are to monitor and manage invasive species (weeds); reduce habitat fragmentation; and link important habitat areas in the city and region.

The city-wide Biodversity committee has met and a website with agenda and minutes is in the works. In the meantime, digital versions of the 10-year strategic plan can be found on the City's biodiversity page at: www. calgary.ca/biodiversity.

Many of Calgary's existing open space sites, such as Nose Hill, Union Cemetery, Reader Rock Garden, Riley Park, Fort Calgary, and Inglewood Bird Sanctuary are in the category of Cultural landscapes. A major challenge is determining which method is most appropriate for the resource, with a view toward protection, preservation or conservation, and restoration.

Cultural resource projects may include some or all of the followina:

- Protection: measures needed to guard against further damage or deterioration;
- Preservation: ongoing maintenance activities that preserve the historic appearance or features of the landscape:
- Restoration: the removal of later additions and the recreation of missing elements

Of the 800 kms of city-wide pathways, City Council approved snow clearing for up to 350 kms. Generally, City Parks crews are to clear snow on pathways within 24 hours and on sidewalks adjacent to parks within 72 hours. Re: concerns about pathways in natural parks not being cleared, some trails/pathways are best used only in non-winter months. Due to the steepness of the slope or site conditions, there may be safety concerns for potential pathway users and crews.

Environmentally Significant Areas (ESAs) are land with conservation value.

This applies to the river valley system, the urban forest, and natural environment parks. The land includes escarpments, natural grasslands, woodlots, and native pasture but also pertains to wetlands, natural bodies of water, and riparian corridors (along the river margins and banks).

There is an update on Open Space policy for recreational and environmental park spaces. Stakeholder consultation meetings with City Parks staff and industry began in February 2015. A final draft form of impact assessment for ESAs was debated by Council in early 2016. Planning and mapping guidelines are expected and a work program completed by March 2016.

Proposed TPCA Tuxedo YYC **Bylaw Change**

The TPCA is considering two changes to the current Association Bylaws. Notice is hereby served that a vote on the proposed special resolution will take place at the TPCA Annual General Meeting (Thursday, March 10,

The first proposed change will deal with the signing authority of the Hall Manager in the running of the Tuxedo Park Hall.

The current Bylaw states:

Article X

Executive Committee

- 1. There shall be an Executive Committee comprised of: President, Past President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer 3 | Page August 8, 2005
- 2. The Executive Committee shall be the Management Committee and shall meet on the call of the Chair or authorized alternate.
- 3. The executive committee shall not have the power to independently spend more than \$200.00 (Two Hundred Dollars) without the approval of the general membership.
- 4. Signing Authority shall be any two of four.
- 5. The Seal shall be in the possession of the Secretary at all times.

The proposed change will affect item #4, which would read:

4. Signing Authority shall be any two of four. The board can choose to add the Hall Manager/Executive Directory/Administrator of TPCA to signing authority with a motion annually.

The second proposed change: To replace the one instance in the TPCA Bylaws of "chairmen" to "chairperson."

Hello Calgary-Klein!

I've spoken to many in the riding that are concerned about the effects low global oil prices are having on Alberta's businesses, workers, and families. Our reliance on a single commodity, the price over which we have no control, contributes substantially to the problem. While Alberta is and will be an energy province for years to come, our government is taking important steps to diversify our economy to increase its resiliency when faced with volatile changes in the price of our energy exports. Some of these steps include:

• The creation of the Ministry of Economic Development and Trade, led by Hon. Deron Bilous. This ministry leads economic development efforts and provides one-stop access to information and support for businesses and investors.





- Working with other provincial leaders to advance Alberta's economic and trade interests. Premier Notley met with New Brunswick Premier Brian Gallant to confirm their mutual support for the Energy East pipeline. Premier Notley also met with the Prime Minister while participating in a First Ministers' meeting and discussed how our country can best tackle climate change.
- Funding for Student Temporary Employment Program (STEP), which will provide 3,000 students with valuable work experience, as well as help small businesses and non-profits connect with a talented and motivated workforce.
- Introduced the Job Creation Incentive Program, which supports employers who create net new employment through the provision of grants.

Albertans want stable public services that are there for them when times are tough. In times like these, we need to strengthen health care, education, and social services, because taking care of each other is the Alberta way. Several steps we've taken to stabilize public services include:

- Freezing post-secondary tuition for the next two years and re-investing funding for post-secondary schools to ensure higher education is accessible and affordable for families.
- Investing in our students by hiring more teachers and support staff, as well as lowering the burden of school fees on families.
- Investing in stable, long-term funding for our public health care system, including \$120 million over two years for new long-term care spaces, \$90 million over two years to expand public home care, and \$10 million annually for mental health services and resources.

Lastly, our government has proudly set an example when it comes to diverse representation: there is gender parity in Cabinet, a near gender parity in caucus, as well as representation from the LGBTQ community by three MLAs. Our aim is to ensure Albertans from all walks of life have access to the public services they need, and to that effect we've:

- Invested \$15 million in women's shelters.
- · Launched a legal aid review to ensure fair access to justice.
- Prohibited discrimination on the basis of gender identity and expression.
- Protected those affected by domestic violence.
- Enhanced safety standards for paid farm and ranch workers.
- Offered ongoing support for Syrian refugees coming to our province.

Do you look for ways to encourage your child's enjoyment of reading? Creating a 'reading place' in your home can help!

A reading place might be in your child's bedroom, a cozy corner in the family room, a little nook under the stairs . . . or? Just remember the 3B's and you'll create a wonderfully welcoming spot:

Books

Make lots of books available. All kinds; picture books, stories, and nonfiction books about things your child is interested in (dogs, planes, machines, cake making perhaps). Encourage your child to write their name inside their books. Ownership is directly connected to higher reading scores.

Bookshelves

Have bookshelves or baskets, boxes or bags of books all over your home. Easy access means reading can happen anywhere, at anytime. In your special reading place books all around help create a colourful and welcoming environment.

Book lights

If you set your reading place up in a family room or bedroom, you can use a nearby lamp. Or, small, inexpensive lights (clip-on or flashlights) in cozy nooks make reading more of an adventure. Lights aid visibility and define a space that focuses a child on their reading.
