Do you know the signs and symptoms of a heart attack and what to do if someone experiences these? Knowing can make the difference between life and death.

Recognizing and responding immediately to the warning signs of a potential heart attack can significantly improve survival and recovery. February is Heart Month - take the time to be heart safe and learn how you can reduce your risk.

What to do when seconds count

- Call 9-1-1 immediately. Early treatment can greatly reduce heart damage and make the difference of life and death.
- Treatment starts the moment EMS arrives. Paramedics can provide oxygen, start an intravenous and perform an electrocardiogram (ECG).
- Paramedics can also administer important medications in the early minutes of a heart attack to lessen heart damage.
- During transport, EMS will also share information with the hospital so definitive treatment can begin immediately on arrival.
- Take a CPR/AED (automated external defibrillator) course. Training is widely available from many reputable organizations. It's easy, inexpensive, and only takes a few hours.

PEANUT BUTTER CUP COOKIES

These little morsels make a perfect match, especially for chocolate and peanut butter lovers!

½ cup margarine or butter

½ cup granulated sugar

½ cup packed light brown sugar

½ cup creamy peanut butter

1 large egg

½ teaspoon vanilla

1 1/4 cups all purpose flour

³/₄ teaspoon baking soda

1/4 teaspoon salt

24 miniature peanut butter cups

Beat butter, sugars and peanut butter together until smooth and creamy. Mix in the egg and vanilla, and then add the flour, soda, and salt.

Spoon 1-inch mounds into mini muffin tins, and bake for 8-10 minutes @ $350^{\circ}F$.

While the cookie mixture is baking, remove the wrappers from 24 mini peanut butter cups.

Remove muffin tins from oven and immediately press a peanut butter cup into the centre of the dough until only the top shows.

Cool on a wire rack until easy to handle, and carefully remove from the muffin tins.

"Classified" Cookie Information

Cookies are classified according to how they are formed. Following are a few categories:

- Bar cookies consist of batter or other ingredients that are pressed into a pan and cut into cookie-sized pieces after baking.
- Drop cookies are made from a soft dough that is dropped by a teaspoonful onto a baking sheet. As the cookies bake, they spread and flatten out.
- Molded cookies are made from a stiffer dough that is usually molded into balls or various shapes by hand before baking.
- Pressed cookies are made from a soft dough that is extruded from a cookie press into various shapes before baking.
- Refrigerator cookies are made from a stiff dough that is refrigerated to become even stiffer. It is typically shaped into a cylinder or log, and then sliced into round cookies before baking.
- Rolled cookies are made from a very stiff dough that is rolled out and cut into shapes with a cookie cutter.

It's when the snow and ice melt in the spring, raising the water level, that **Spirit Island** actually becomes an island in Maligne Lake, Jasper National Park. An icon of the Canadian Rockies the island floats in the midst of turquoise, glacial water.

With no road or trail access, the island is accessible only by tour boats or non-motorized watercraft.

There is a 90-minute narrated cruise that departs every hour, allowing visitors time to enjoy a short walk to the viewpoint overlooking the mountain-rimmed shores of Maligne Lake. The scenery is stunning, with breathtaking views of the mountains, glaciers, and wildlife.

Spirit Island became one of the most famous photographs in the world in the 1930s, when an amateur photographer entered it into a Kodak photography competition, winning first prize, of having the photo enlarged to billboard size and hung in Grand Central Station, New York. For years, Spirit Island was viewed by literally millions of commuters each day.

The origin of the name of the island is shrouded in ancient Indian myth which tells of two lovers from warring tribes meeting in secret every week. When the girl's father learned of the meetings, he demanded she be cast out of the tribe and her lover killed, or that she never see him again. Choosing not to see her lover from the opposing tribe anymore, legend has it that the young man continued to return to the island, hoping to meet the young woman again some day. Eventually, he died on the island, where his spirit now resides.

Age of Entry and Student Success

The School Act requires that children be in school if they are six years of age by September 1st, and many enter if they turn six before December 31st. Some school districts allow to February 28th - resulting in students as young as 51/2 years old entering grade one.

Children begin school a year later, at the age of seven, in Finland - which has emerged as the top achieving country on international standardized tests.

A report from the Council of Education Ministers' for Canada, finds Finland's students aged seven to 14 attend school for approximately 5400 hours. Alberta students are in school for approximately 3000 hours more, or, by the time the international tests are taken at age 15, an additional 55% hours in school.

A good month for a child to be born is (the first) January of the year entering grade one. Birth month is indicated by student achievement on grade three Provincial Achievement Tests demonstrating a consistent decline for every month that a child is younger.

By the end of grade nine, approximately one in seven Alberta students has been retained for at least one grade. Many more struggling students have been pushed through because of social promotion practices ending up in lower stream courses in senior high. Student retentions are fairly constant for children born in January through May, but escalate to almost one in three being retained for those 51/2 years of age at the time of entry - or born in (the second) February.





SEEING THROUGH FACADES

Though I've lived all across North America, it is during this time of year that, no matter where I am, the restless drum beat of Carnival beckons me back home to New Orleans. This might be surprising to many of you who had no idea of the festivities presently gearing up deep down south, and/or you may be scratching your head as to why a middle aged minister might still feel drawn to such an event. Though I cannot hope to give an exhaustive description of my reasoning for something so rooted in my DNA in this short article, I feel compelled to attempt to capture at least one strand of the deep seated draw Mardi Gras has on me.

Generally speaking, carnival time is defined by a flood of delicious food, great music, and extravagant revelry. While each of these are components of the celebration, I would take this opportunity to focus on a custom that I feel is often misunderstood, and so sadly, is seldom attempted by tourists. I am writing specifically about masquerading. Doubtless, I have just lost a few of you to visions of "scary" Halloween costumes, or of the silly, or sexy (which are actually often the silliest) costumes you've seen on some TV show, but this is not what I am writing about. No, the type of costuming that I am uplifting can have a profound, and life long impact on a person when worn in the rarified atmosphere of the New Orleans French Quarter on Mardi Gras Day. An epiphany of this sort is achieved only by one allowing the anonymity of a costume to free the "you", that is normally tied to all sorts of expectations brought on by your family, friends, job title, etc., to float away. The veneer of social cues, and constructs usually subtly imposed (race, age, economic class, etc.), need to also be

lifted from your consciousness, for behind a mask no one knows whether you are young or old, rich or poor, a butcher, a baker, or a candlestick maker, thus you no longer have the need to play any role. This mindset frees you to jettison any fear of judgment, and perceive the world in a fresh and unencumbered way, choosing to simply live in the moment. Further, all others in costume are likewise put on equal footing. As a minister, I would say that when all playing fields are leveled in this manner, one tends to see that we are all equally God's Children. Or, if you prefer, for my friends of a more secular, and anthropological inclination to see that, purged of the divisive nature of our egos and the clutter of cultural pretense, we are all just animals with thumbs.

Predictably, and often entertainingly, many use this opportunity as a means to express frivolous impulses, which is fine, as it too is part of the season. But, I would argue it is not in these sophomoric exhibitions that one finds the real reward of masquerading. Rather, the real reward is found in the utterly joyous exchanges afforded to those who seize the opportunity to engage others with an honesty, and reverence, not normally available. To me, this is why costuming is the heart of Mardi Gras.

Unfortunately, this year I will not be taking my annual pilgrimage to the Big Easy. But, on Mardi Gras Day (February 21st), I would invite you to keep in mind the paradoxical lesson I have tried to share, namely, that putting on a mask once a year, can make one more aware of the one we put on everyday.

If you are headed down to Mardi Gras, I would be happy to offer a native's guide of the city, and celebration.
