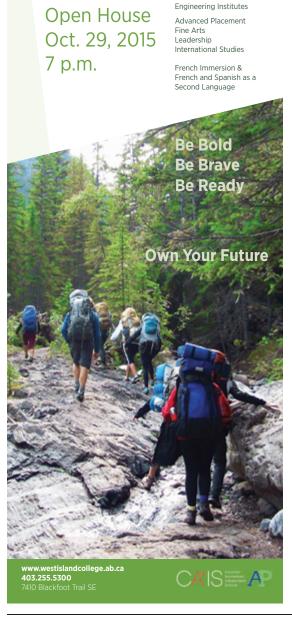

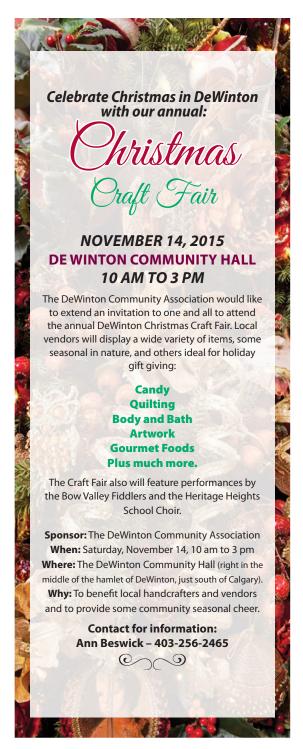


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# **Book Club**

# **NO SECRETS** TO INVESTMENT **SUCCESS**

Many people look for the "secrets" to investment success. Is it timing the market just right? Is it finding those hot stocks or getting in on the "ground floor" of the next big thing? Actually, these types of moves have little relevance to the vast majority of investors — even the most successful ones. So let's take a look at some steps you can take that can be effective in helping you work toward your financial goals.

It's time in the market...not market timing. Some investors think they can succeed at "market timing" buying when the price is low and selling when the price is high. And this would indeed be a good strategy if they could predict highs and

lows. No one can accurately forecast these peaks and valleys, though. So, instead of ducking in and out of the market in a vain attempt to catch the highs and lows, simply stay invested. The more time you spend in the market, the lesser the impact you're likely to feel from short-term price swings. And if you're always invested, you'll always be in a position to benefit from the next market rally.

It's "buy and hold" — not "buy and sell." Even if you aren't trying to time the market, you may be tempted to buy and sell frequently as you look for new and better opportunities. Yet, this constant buying and selling can be costly. Frequent trading, with all the additions and subtractions from your portfolio, can make it hard for you to follow a consistent, unified investment strategy. You're better off purchasing quality investments and holding them for the long term, until either your needs change or the investments themselves no longer possess the same attributes they did when you purchased them.

It's building a strong foundation — not getting in on the "ground floor." Many people regret not being one of the initial investors of a company that has done spectacularly well. But most new companies don't achieve anywhere near that level of success. So, instead of looking for the next big thing on the "ground floor," try to build a strong "foundation" consisting of a mix of quality investments suitable for your risk tolerance, goals and time horizon. This type of investing may not sound glamorous, but a strong foundation is better equipped than a possibly shaky ground floor to withstand the shifting winds of market forces.

It's cool-headed thinking - not chasing "hot stocks" -If you browse the internet or watch one of the investment shows on cable television, you are bound to read or hear about "hot" stocks. But by the time the news reaches you, these stocks may already be cooling off. Even more importantly, they might not be right for your needs in the first place. Instead of chasing after hot stocks, which, by their nature, carry a strong emotional component (namely, the desire for quick, big gains), try to coolly and dispassionately analyze your situation to determine which investments are really most appropriate for your goals.

There really aren't any shortcuts to reaching your desired financial destination. But by taking the slow and steady path, you can work toward getting there.

## **EMS: Halloween Safety**

The members of Calgary's Halloween Partners for Safety: Calgary's Child Magazine, AHS EMS, Calgary Police, Fire, PSC (9-1-1), Bylaw, Transit, and Shaw Communications would like to remind parents and trick-or-treaters of some Halloween safety tips, as October 31st approaches. Partners for Safety vehicles will be out patrolling communities on Halloween night to provide a visible safety resource for parents and trick-or-treaters.

#### **Trick-or-Treaters**

- Remember: all regular pedestrian rules still apply. Be sure to cross the road at marked cross walks, or well lit corners only. It is safest to work your way up one side of the street, and then cross once to the other side.
- Stay away from houses that are not well lit. Do not accept rides from strangers, or enter any home you feel is unsafe.
- · Let your parents know where you are going to be at all times and advise them if you will be late returning.

#### Costumes

- · Consider sending your children with a flashlight for additional safety and increased visibility.
- When purchasing, or making costumes, look for materials and accessories that are labeled flame-resistant.
- All costume accessories, such as sticks, rods, or wands, should be soft and flexible, with no sharp edges.
- · Consider using hypoallergenic make-up kits instead of masks that may impair breathing, or vision.
- Be sure costumes are loose enough to be worn over warm clothing, but not so long that they become a tripping hazard. Costumes should not be longer than your child's ankles.
- · Ensure your child is wearing adequate foot wear that takes into consideration weather conditions and walking.
- · Choose bright colored costumes that are highly visible. Adding reflective tape to costumes further increases visibility.

#### **Parents**

- Be certain that young trick-or-treaters are accompanied by an adult. Older children should stay in groups.
- · Advise children not to eat anything until they return home. Dispose of any items that appear to have been tampered with, or that are not properly wrapped.
- · Pre-determine boundaries to trick-or-treat within and establish a firm time to return home.

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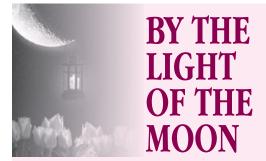
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## Gardening by the phases of the moon

#### October 4 **Last Quarter (waning)**

Decreased gravitational pull and moonlight. A resting period. Take cuttings from plants you wish to propagate. Dry herbs, flowers and fruit. If you want to control growth or encourage rooting, perform the necessary activities during the waning moon.

#### New Moon (waxing) October 12

Increasing moonlight, lunar gravity pulls water up encouraging plant growth and proliferation. Grafting, transplanting, re-potting, and watering. Gather herbs used for essential oils. Oil content is more concentrated at this time.

#### October 20 First Quarter (waxing)

Moonlight is strong, encouraging leaf growth. It is a good time for planting, especially two days before the full moon. Take cuttings from plants you wish to propagate. Fertilize as close to the full moon as possible.

#### October 27 Full Moon (waning)

As the moon wanes, the energy is drawing down. Strong gravitational pull but moonlight is decreasing putting energy into the roots.

Sanchinarro is a residential suburb on the north east edge of Madrid. The Mirador contains a wide variety of compact housing types. In contrast to the serial and rationalist repetition of the standard family unit, the housing units are grouped in small 'buildings'.

Wow! I can hardly believe that summer is all but over! Long days outside enjoying the sunshine and enjoying your garden are now being replaced by wearing sweaters on your evening walk and preparing your garden for winter.

We all know what it takes to winterize the garden - cut down the perennials, water in bushes and trees, maybe wrap our more sensitive plants with burlap for protection against the long, cold winter. But what about winterizing our homes?

Winter is a harsh season to live through, especially if your mobility is not as agile as it once was, or if you are noticing your sight is not as sharp as it once was. The autumn is the perfect time to prepare your home, and yourself, for the winter season – and here are a few tips to help you do iust that!

The main focus of all preparations is fall prevention. A fall can result in even the most healthy and fit person spending time in the hospital and then needing to move into assisted living. As we age, it is increasingly difficult to make a full recovery from a fall.

Clear off your decks and walkways so that you have a path clear of all obstructions between your car and home. Be sure that this pathway is relatively flat and void of tripping hazards. If the sidewalk blocks have moved and one edge is sticking up, call a professional to repair it so you are not at risk of tripping on it. Make sure your stairs and walkways inside are also free of objects blocking your way.

Ensure your pathways, inside and out, are adequately lit. Aging eyes require 50% more light to see the same as they did when you were young!! You do not necessarily need to install new fixtures, maybe just clean the glass cover and install a higher wattage bulb. And use this opportunity to see your kids or grandkids by asking them to stop in and help you do this!

These are just a few things to help you get ready for winter, although these tips should be followed year-round!
