Bylaws for Helping to Be a Better Neighbour

Since we are coming into spring, I thought we should cover community cleanliness issues:

Composting: Under the Community Standards Bylaw, you must ensure composting piles or composting containers are maintained so they do not create offensive odours or attract pests. Fines for violations range between \$50 and \$100

Drainage: The Drainage Bylaw, the Wastewater Bylaw and Community Standards Bylaw all outline rules for drainage to ensure nothing inappropriate ends up in our rivers. For information on fines, search for the Bylaws Related to Drainage page. It is an offence to allow any prohibited material into the Storm Drainage System. Examples of prohibited materials include soil, waste, animal waste, fecal matter, cooking oils, greases, gasoline, motor oil, transmission fluids, solvents, paint, cement, sawdust, yard waste, pesticides, biomedical waste, hazardous waste, soaps, odorous materials, detergents and water from hot tubs.

Vehicles must be washed at a car wash and not on a road, an alley or a driveway. Drain hot tubs and swimming pools directly into the wastewater drain located in the basement of your residence.

Downspouts and eaves troughs must not terminate within 2 metres of a surface drainage facility (unless located in a side yard) or a street, which includes alleys and lanes.

It is a requirement to keep surface drainage facilities on private property (known as "Overland Drainage Rightof-Way" (ODRW) including swales and catch basins/ drains) clear of any soil, silt, yard waste or any other matter that may obstruct, restrict or prevent the flow of water. Buildings or structures cannot be constructed or placed on or over the surface drainage facility. If a fence must be built over the facility, there must be at least 6 inches (15 cm) of clearance between the facility and the bottom of the fence.

The use of any storm drainage for activities such as construction or irrigation purposes is prohibited without the written consent of the Director of Resources.

Fines for violations of these regulations range between \$75 and \$3,000 for the first offence.

Grass and herbaceous plants: Under the Community Standards Bylaw, private property owners must ensure that grasses and herbaceous plants do not exceed 15 cm (six inches) in height. Fines for violations range between \$100 and \$300. Property owners are also responsible for caring for and maintaining the area adjacent to their property (i.e. boulevards) up to the middle of the alley and the street.

Cat and Dog Bylaws in Calgary



City of Calgary bylaws: for helping to be a better neighbour.

Most of the concerns we hear about are pet-related.

Cats: Under the Responsible Pet Ownership Bylaw, cat owners must ensure their cats:

- Have a City of Calgary license.
- Remain on the owner's property.
- Do not disturb the peace by howling or crying.
- Do not damage others' property.
- Do not scatter garbage.
- Do not chase, threaten, or attack a person or an animal.

Fines range from \$25 to \$1,500.

Dogs: Under the Responsible Pet Ownership Bylaw, dog owners must ensure their dogs:

- All dogs must have and wear a City of Calgary licence as soon as they reach three months of age.
- All dogs must be on-leash at all times, unless posted signs indicate otherwise, or on property where the owner of the dog has the right of occupation.
- Dogs may not be left unattended while tethered.
- Dogs may only be transported in the back of a truck if the dog is in a fully enclosed trailer, a truck bed covered with a topper, contained in a ventilated kennel that is secured to the truck bed, or securely tethered and not standing on bare metal.
- Dog owners must ensure that they bring along a suitable means to pick up feces.
- Dog owners must pick up all feces produces by their dog both on and off their property.
- Dogs must be under control in designated offleash areas. This means they must be in sight of their owners and respond to sight or sound commands.

Fines for failing to comply with the Responsible Pet Ownership Bylaw range from \$25 to \$1,500.

As a dog owner, you must ensure your dog does not:

- Bite anyone
- Injure anyone
- Chase, threaten or attack a person or animal
- Bark, howl or disturb anyone
- Cause damage to property or animals
- Scatter garbage

Dogs are not allowed in:

- School grounds
- Playgrounds
- Sports fields
- Golf courses
- Cemeteries
- Wading or swimming areas

While on a pathway, your dog must:

- Be on a leash no longer than two metres
- Remain on the right-hand side of the pathway
- Not interfere with or obstruct other users
- You may not cycle, skateboard or in-line skate with a dog on a leash while on a pathway.

Learn more about your Calgary Catholic School District **Board of Trustees!**

On March 13th, the Calgary Catholic School District (CCSD) Board of Trustees approved our 2020-2023 Three-Year Capital Plan. It will be submitted to Alberta Education in advance of the May 31 deadline. CCSD has ten items on our first-year list of priorities. They include:

- 9 new elementary or elementary/junior high schools
- 3 innovative new high schools, including one Extended Learning Centre
- 1 junior/senior high school addition/enhancement in Airdrie
- 11 major modernization requests

These priorities are assessed annually and re-evaluated frequently, which allows CCSD to respond to emerging trends. At CCSD, we anticipate continued enrollment and plan for growth through the lens of innovation, flexibility and sustainability. Currently, we are managing an overall district utilization rate of 86.1 per cent, and in some areas, our utilization rate exceeds 100 per cent, well above the provincial benchmark of 85 per cent.

As the only jurisdiction in Alberta that has metro, urban and rural populations, CCSD is unique in the complexity of its infrastructure and we must ensure that these needs are addressed. As a corporate board, we are charged with ensuring that every decision we make with respect to infrastructure is evaluated through the lens of what is best for our 57,000 students. We see each of these projects as critical, and we recognize the urgency in meeting our capital needs for our families we need our schools where our students live.

As has always been the case, your Board of Trustees will continue to inform, engage and strategically advocate for families. We value our relationship with the provincial government and will continue to work closely with Alberta Education to address these important infrastructure needs.

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Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED)

Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) is being used worldwide. It enhances safety by influencing the physical design of our environment and encouraging positive social interaction. CPTED recognizes that our environment directly affects our behaviour, because we constantly respond to what is around us. These responses help us to interact safely in our communities.

How does Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design work?

An environment designed using CPTED principles reduces opportunities for criminal acts to take place and helps us to feel safer. By doing so, it improves our quality of life. CPTED uses strategies that work together to create safer communities. It complements crime prevention strategies such as locks and bars, police and security personnel.

REJOICE.

Here are a few examples:

A well-maintained home, building or community park creates a sense of guardianship and that helps deter criminals.

Community activity is important. Criminal acts can be discouraged in public spaces when we encourage activities in those spaces by residents, visitors and other legitimate users.

Natural access control guides help people enter and have a space through the placement of entrances, exits, fences, land-scaping and lighting. It can decrease opportunities for criminal activity by denying criminals access to potential targets and creating a perception of risk for would-be offenders.

Implementing CPTED

In existing communities this is best done by a CPTED practitioner who has practiced many years of crime prevention and has completed several CPTED projects. With the assistance of community leaders, crime prevention advocates and input from community members to investigate the root causes of crime, combined with CPTED will greatly help with proper implementation.

In new communities CPTED is best implemented at the development stage and continued through the design and implementation stages.


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






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


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Green Carts Spring into Weekly Collection Schedule

There are no changes to blue or black cart collection.





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

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Want a Safer Community? Get to Know Your Neighbours!

A great crime prevention tool is simply saying "hi" to your neighbours. The more interactions neighbours have with each other forms community relationships that will help increase neighbourhood safety. Here are three reasons that being neighbourly builds a safer community:

Belonging

Knowing your neighbours can increase a sense of belonging and respect. When neighbours have a relationship, neighbourly tension and community disputes can be reduced.

Be Alert!

If an emergency does arise, when you know your neighbours you can readily identify those who may have special needs, mobility issues, or those who need additional assistance.

Attitude Shift

Many neighbours watch each other but what if we change our attitude to watching out for our neighbours instead?! Watching out for your neighbours could make the difference in reducing criminal activity. When you can rely on the people who live closest to you it increases your sense of safety and prevents crime.

Street sweeping is underway so be sure to keep an eye out for parking restrictions. Additionally, the City will be continuing to work on pothole repair through the summer. If you come across one, the easiest way to report it is to snap a picture on the 311 app. With over 16,000 km of paved road, the City needs your help to know where repairs are needed. Here's what else is going on:

Rainy Season is Coming

May is typically the start of the rainy season in Calgary. Protect your home by ensuring downspout are moving water away from your home and that your eavestroughs are clean. Ward 12 communities have been built with devices that control how fast water drains into the system. During heavy rainfalls, water may pool on the road until the system can accept the extra water. These are called Trap Lows and are actually designed to act this way. If the pooled water is not causing a safety or property damage concern, only contact 311 if the water has not drained after 120 minutes.

Apply for Greenspace for Neighbour Day by May 24

Neighbour Day is on Saturday, June 15 and is an opportunity to get together with your neighbours and celebrate Calgary's strong community spirit. The City will be waiving its greenspace booking fees for approved Neighbour Day events, but you must apply before May 24! Check out calgary.ca/NeighbourDay for lots of ideas for your event and how to plan it.

Summer Events

There are a huge number of events happening in Calgary through the summer. Thinking about a renovation? Building a deck? The City will be hosting a number of free information sessions with City inspectors and bylaw experts on hand to help you get started. Check out calgary.ca/pdevents for a session near you.

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
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IN MY BOOKS



Book Review: How Will You Be Remembered? The Definitive Guide to Creating and Sharing Your Life Stories by former Calgarian - Robb Lucy

This book brings the lofty idea of legacies and their stories down to earth, showing that even seemingly small actions can have lasting effects.

How Will You Be Remembered? is a motivational manual for the boomer generation. With a journalist's talent for clarifying an often-misread subject, Robb Lucy demonstrates how legacies come in many forms and sizes, all with the aim of finding deeper significance, connection, and joy in the present while still considering the future.



The book enthusiastically re-frames the most common idea of a legacy. Wealth left behind in estate plans becomes less critical than rewarding alternatives, including recording family stories and passing down personal values, which are both achievable while one is still alive.

Emphasis on how legacies are for everyone, and not only for influential individuals, results in a call to consider unique ways to better one's community, and in some instances, the world.

Lists, brainstorming exercises, examples, and personal insights gather around a few core principles to jump start the process.

The bullet-point approach is well measured and is punctuated by apt quotations, including lyrics by Bob Dylan, proverbs from several cultures, and brief selections from famous authors that crystallize the urgency to make a difference while there is still time.

All of these enrich the topic, placing legacies and their stories within a broad context that spans history.

A section on religions, highlighting the many variations of the Golden Rule, also strengthens the view that there exists a profound human need to consider others.

Chapters provide a convincing, step-by-step guide toward self-discovery. Black-and-white illustrations of a mountaintop guru also infuse the topic with humor. One of the strongest sections offers snapshots of adults who have found their niche.

Whether engaging in a neighborhood beautification project or turning adversity into a chance to inspire others, these individuals bring the lofty idea of legacies down to earth, showing that even seemingly small actions can have lasting effects.

Another section on charities and foundations provides useful thoughts for those who prefer to create legacies in partnership with established organizations. A general overview, which purposefully leaves out detailed financial advice, is enough to point readers in the right direction.

How Will You be Remembered? presents an uplifting view of the good that can be accomplished when people turn their focus outward. Like a lively seminar, the ideas drawn here encourage and challenge, repeat and build on each other to press the belief that every voice has a singular note to add to the larger symphony.

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
