**RELOCATION OF MIDNAPORE HOUSEHOLD  
HAZARDOUS WASTE DROFF-OFF**

Due to construction of the interchange along 162 Avenue and Sun Valley Blvd. S.E. the household hazardous waste drop-off at Midnapore Fire Station 26 has been

relocated effective March 1, 2016 to: Evergreen Fire Station 37 at 2511 Eversyde Avenue S.W. seven days a week, from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. The Midnapore household hazardous waste drop-off will remain closed until early 2018. 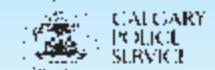

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# Lovely Lawns

Hello Neighbours!

Did you know that that Calgary's climate is considered a semi-arid desert? No, you won't find any camels or sand dunes, and we get a little too cold in the winter for many mirages, but our limited annual precipitation falls within the range of a semi-arid desert. Perhaps that is why a lush green lawn seems so elusive for some of us!

So, what does this mean? Well it means that unless you are going to rip up your lawn and grow a bunch of cacti, you need to learn how to water. Sounds simple, everyone in this area knows they need to water their yards and gardens, but do you know how to water properly? Most people tend to water too much or too little, both of which are hard on your plants (and possibly your bank account) in the long run. To help your green thumbs flourish, we have put together a few hints to help you make the most of our precious water.

## Lawns

The City of Calgary says that a healthy lawn needs one inch of water per week and should be watered early in the day to allow the water to soak in before it evaporates in the heat. Ok, but how often do you water? How do you know you have an inch? What if the lawn isn't healthy to start off with?

First, lawns should only be watered once or twice a week. Watering a little every day doesn't encourage the roots to sink very deep into the soil, which is what you need if you want your grass to be hearty and able to withstand dry periods. It takes about 30 to 40 minutes to get to the one inch mark, but to know for sure you can use a rain gage or an upside down frisbee.

Of course, if your lawn isn't healthy to start with, it may need more than just an inch. For a few weeks, be sure to water at least twice a week, giving it 1 1/2 to 2 inches in total. After a few weeks you should be able to cut down to just 1 inch.

## Trees

Just like your lawn, young trees will be healthier in the long run if they are watered less frequently, in larger amounts. Deeper roots allow your tree to get the maximum amount of moisture from the soil. In my yard, I use a five gallon bucket with a few holes poked near the base to make sure my trees get the right amount of water, and to ensure that water actually soaks in without just running all over the place. All I do is place the bucket close to the base of the tree, ensuring that the holes are placed so that the water flows in the right direction, then fill the bucket and allow the water to slowly flow out over the base of the tree. Young trees only need to be watered every 10 days or so, so I just move the bucket to a new tree every day. Eventually, once the trees are more established, I probably won't need to water at all.

## Flowers

Again, flowers aren't that different from everything else so far (are you noticing a trend?). Check the soil and blooms every few days and if they seem dry, give them a good soak. If possible, try to avoid the blooms and

try to water in the morning when it is less humid. This helps to prevent root or leaf rot by allowing the water to quickly dry off the plant itself. Container plantings may need water more often as the hot sun can dry them out more quickly.

Keep in mind that, contrary to what I implied earlier, there are flowering plants that need little to no water in addition to our seasonal rainfall, so it is possible to get away without watering at all. The city of Calgary has a number of publications on this topic and can recommend a number of low water plants for your yard, that do well in our Calgary climate.

## Vegetables

As you may have already guessed, many vegetables are no different than everything else. Water as needed, not every day. A couple of good ways to check if the garden needs to be watered is to go straight to the soil. One idea is to take a slender trowel and dig about an inch down. If the water is still moist, you are good for another day or two. If it is dry, water. Another method is to take a handful of dirt and squeeze it in your fist. If it stays together like a lump of clay and you haven't watered that day, it is probably too wet and needs to dry out a bit. If it maintains its shape for a moment and then crumbles apart, you are good today, but check back tomorrow. If the soil won't stick together at all and seems powdery, water immediately!

Vegetables can be a bit like flowers in the fact that many don't really like to be watered from above. I am very guilty of generally just spraying my whole garden and have had reasonable success, but perhaps could have even more if I took a bit more time and used a watering can to get that water directly to the roots. However, no matter which method you choose, remember to try to stay consistent to get the best flavour from your vegetables.

There are some plants, like tomatoes, that do better with a more constant water supply, especially when fruit is forming. So they should be watered daily. My tomatoes are in planter boxes on my deck and I have noticed that a lot of my water just runs out the bottom so my plants don't do as well as they could. This year I have bought

some drip spikes that I will put on top of pop bottles full of water, then stick in the ground at the base of the plant. Hopefully this will slowly and consistently soak the roots instead of my deck, and maybe give me more tomatoes! This idea can be used for any plant that needs a lot of water deep at the roots. You don't even necessarily need the drip spikes, just cut the bottoms off of some clean pop bottles and sink them down every few feet or so, depending on the type of plants you have, and then water via the bottle, knowing that it is going straight to the roots.

Hopefully these suggestions will give you a few ideas you could use in your own yard and we can have a greener community in every sense of the word!

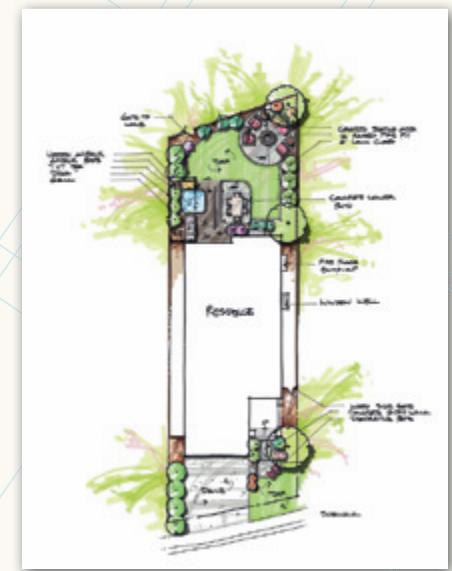

### The scoop on dog poop

With 150 public off-leash areas and over 100,000 dogs in our city, it's clear Calgarians love their canine companions. What isn't to love is the stinky situation left behind when owners don't pick up after their pets.

Cleaning up your dog's waste helps keep our yards, parks and off-leash areas safe and healthy, and is part of being a responsible pet owner.

Here are five facts you may not know about doggy doo-doo:

1. It's classified as a hazardous pollutant. It's in the same category as toxic chemicals!
2. It's crawling with E. coli and often contains roundworm larvae which, if ingested by humans or dogs, can lead to brain, eye and other organ damage.
3. It's not a good fertilizer. Its high nutrient content is toxic to lawns and will create "hot spots" causing the grass to burn and discolour.
4. It doesn't absorb into the soil, so the risk of spreading its harmful effects can linger for years!
5. It attracts mice, coyotes and other wildlife that consider it a delicious snack.

Keeping our city pet-waste free is easy, if we all do our part. Always carry pet waste bags with you when you walk your dog, and pick up and properly dispose of your pet's waste as soon as possible.

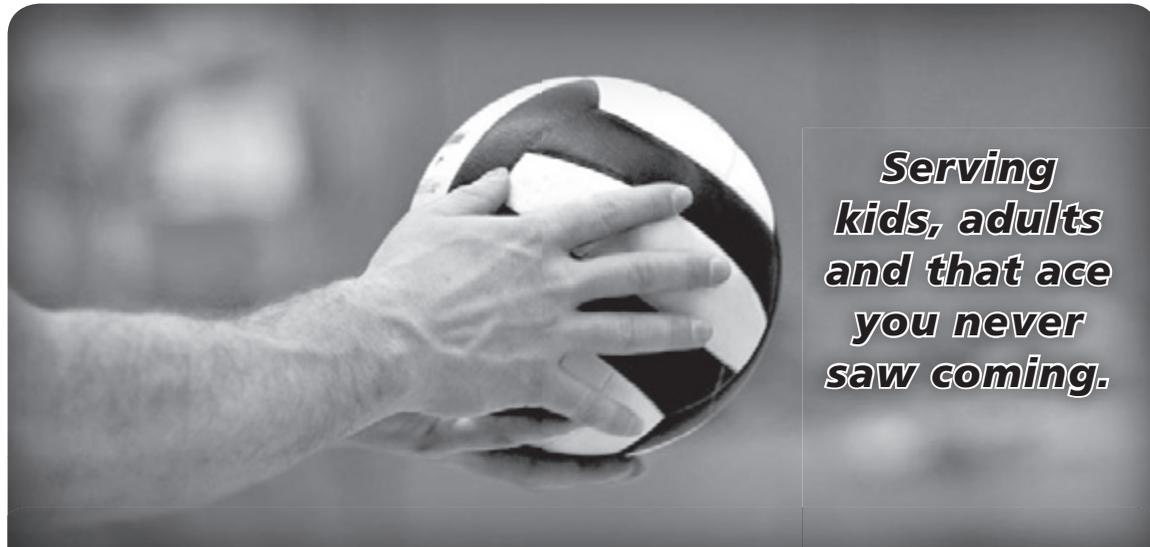

Property Tax Assistance Program: Help is available. The City of Calgary may provide a grant/credit of the increase in residential property taxes from 2015 to 2016.

To be eligible, the applicant must:

- Experience an increase in property taxes from 2015 to 2016.
- Live in the principal residence for a minimum of one year.
- Own no other property.
- Must meet low income guidelines of the Fair Entry Program. Visit [calgary.ca/FairEntry](http://calgary.ca/FairEntry) or call 311.
- Provide an acceptable proof of household income for all members 18 years of age and older. Visit [calgary.ca/FairEntry](http://calgary.ca/FairEntry) or call 311.
- Apply for the grant/credit by Dec. 1, 2016. Visit [calgary.ca/FairEntry](http://calgary.ca/FairEntry) or call 311.
- Even if you are not eligible for the Property Tax Assistance Program, we may be able to help you access other community resources.

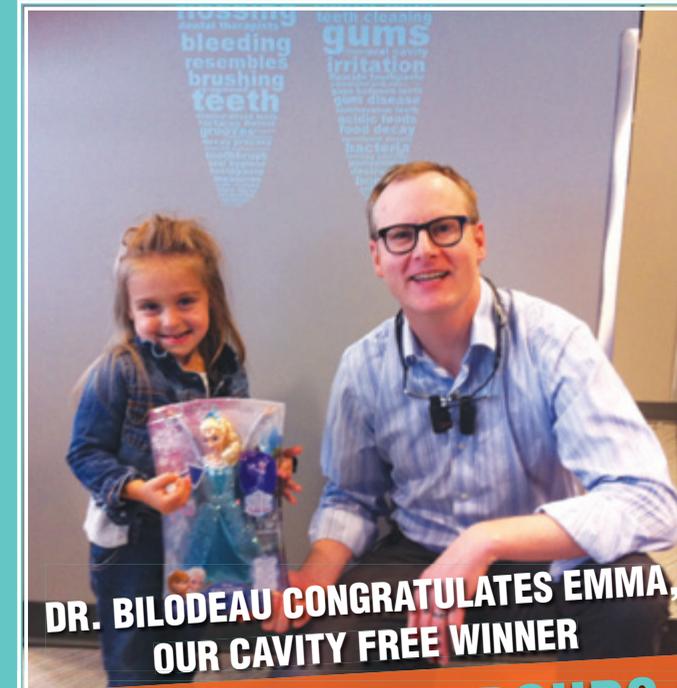
I want to briefly mention a couple of opportunities to give your input on the future of Deerfoot Trail.

You will have to keep an eye on [calgary.ca/engage](http://calgary.ca/engage) to get the fine details of the first opportunity, but in general it will be a chance to share your thoughts on what you want to see on Deerfoot. Watch for the Deerfoot Trail Corridor Study on the City's website.

The second opportunity will be focused specifically on the south section of Deerfoot. I will be at the First Alliance Church (12345 40 Street S.E.) on June 23 from 7 to 9 p.m. with area MLA Richard Gotfried, other area councillors, and other stakeholders to listen to what the citizens of Calgary's south have to say.
