

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BEFRIENDING THE BEES IN OUR GARDENS

June Tip

"The best place to your store water is in the soil." Kath Smyth

If you do nothing else this month, be sure to check the mulch around your plants and see that you have enough!

By now most people are hopefully aware of the growing movement aimed at protecting bee populations. Bees are an essential part of our ecosystem with their work contributing to a significant portion of the food we eat, but many of the world's bees are now threatened through the use of pesticides. In some areas of China, for example, the native bee populations have died off completely, resulting in farmers resorting to hand pollination which, studies suggest, produces lower yields.

As gardeners, we know that bees are our friends. They help give us succulent cherries and giant zucchini and ask very little in return, so we really should be doing all we can to help them.

1. Plant flowers

Bees don't set out with a plan to pollinate for you, it just happens as they are out feeding on nectar and pollen, so the more flowers you have out to attract them, the more work they will do for you. With that in mind you want to be sure to plant a variety of flowering plants that have different bloom times so that you are attracting bees throughout the season. Bees cannot see all colours, for example red flowers look black to them, so they are attracted to lighter colours like whites, yellows, blues, and purples, and flowers that are heavily scented.

Calgary Garden Coach suggests the following plants as being particularly attractive to the bees:

ANNUALS

Borage and cosmos.

PERENNIALS

Salvia, veronica spicata, hyssop (agastache foeniculum), sunflowers, liatris spicata, bee balm (monarda), black-eyed

susans (rudbeckia hirta), goldenrod (solidago rigida), honeysuckle, echinacea, catmint (nepeta), sedums, clover.

2. Beware of pesticides

In a 2014 CBC article by Aleksandra Sagan it was said that "A panel of independent scientists, operating as the Task Force on Systemic Pesticides, found the pesticides neonicotinoids and fipronilare harming the environment, posing a similar threat as DDT did in the 1960s." The article went on to say that these harmful nerve agents were found in at least 40% of the current pesticides on the market. More recent articles suggest that large chain stores like Lowes have made promises to phase out sales of these types of products by 2019.

As gardeners and consumers, it is important to look for these chemicals in any products you buy and if possible avoid using commercial pesticides altogether. Many gardeners swear by natural solutions to infestations such as neem oil, a mix of canola oil and Ivory dish soap, or diatomaceous earth, depending on the problem. Prevention is also key. Look for plants that look weak and cut back or remove them before they become problematic. Seaweed can be used as mulch or a spray which is full of beneficial minerals for your soil and deters slugs. Clear away debris or anything that might provide a home or breeding ground for unwanted insects. Rotate plants if possible or at least intersperse your plants as bugs are often choosy and only like certain ones. You could also look up companion planting as some plants are natural deterrents to the bugs that like another plant.

3. Watch for hidden dangers

Unfortunately, sometimes, even when you think you are doing the right thing, you are inadvertently introducing harmful pesticides to your garden. That lovely beebalm you bought may have been coated in harmful pesticides before you bought it. You put it in your garden and when the bees feed on it they might sicken and die when you were trying to help save them. As people are becoming more and more aware of this stores like Home Depot are now requiring their growers to indicate on the label if plants have been treated with neonicotinoids so ask about that when buying your plants and look at labels closely. If you are worried



about some of the older plants in your garden that may have been treated with this either as a seed or as a plant, know that the flowers will only be potentially harmful for the first year or two after exposure. With new plants it is suggested to pinch off new flowers as they bloom for the first season if you suspect or know pesticides have been used. This would mean a delay in seeing the splendor of your plant for a year, but if it helps protect the bees your blooms will be better for it in the coming ones.

"WHY YOU SHOULD THANK A TEACHER"

In a few short weeks school will be over for this year, as summer holidays loom on the horizon. EMS: Window and Balconv Safetv

With the return of warmer weather, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) would like to remind parents and caregivers of an often-overlooked hazard in the home - access to open windows. Every year, paramedics respond to emergencies where a child has fallen from an open window, often from the second floor. These can be avoided by following simple safety measures. Take the time to assess potential hazards in your home before a preventable fall occurs.

Windows and screens

• Prevent access to windows by moving furniture such as cribs, beds, stools, and change tables out from under them:

• Keep drapery cords out of childrens' reach. Wrap excess cord around cleats, or tie-downs to avoid a choking hazard:

 Remember: screens are not safety devices. They are designed to keep bugs out, not to keep children in.

Balconies

• Do not underestimate a child's ability to climb. Furniture and other items stored on balconies and decks can be used to climb resulting in falls over the railing; • Ensure that your balcony railings are not more than 10 cm (4 inch) apart. This will eliminate access between the vertical bars of a balcony, or deck.

Further prevention tips

- Toddlers & preschoolers are at highest risk of falling from a window or balcony, but it may happen at any age;
- · Direct supervision of children is the single most effective way to prevent falls from windows and balconies;
- Install safety devices which limit the distance in which a window be can open to a maximum of 10cm (4 inches);
- Ensure the safety device can be released quickly so the window can be used for escape in case of emergency.

Yard Improvements

Greetings Neighbours and Lake Chaparral Residents!

Now that spring is officially here, I know that in our household, my wife and I turn our thoughts to outside yard and property improvement projects. I suspect that we are not alone in this.

Did you know that if you live in Lake Chaparral you have restrictive covenants and architectural guidelines on your properties? I know that most new residents do, as you would have reviewed those covenants and architectural controls with your lawyers when completing the property purchase agreements. But for some longer-term residents you may not recall as it's been some time since moving into the neighbourhood.

These covenants make Lake Chaparral a wonderful place to live and include, most familiar to you, the requirement to pay a yearly fee to maintain the lake property, common property grounds that includes entrance features (the Chaparral Signs) and some other areas of

the community. If you are curious as to what areas belong to the Residents' Association, check in at the lake office.

Many of the other items in the covenants are similar to the City of Calgary By-Laws around residential properties, but are a little more stringent with the eye to maintaining Lake Chaparral as a premier community in Calgary. Fences would be a good example of this. In Calgary, you are not allowed to have your fence fall into disrepair, the same bylaw also applies to Chaparral. What our covenant adds is that the fence must be the same colour and type as was originally put up by the developer Genstar. For most of us this makes no difference as we didn't have developer supplied fences. For those of us who have a beige perimeter fence (wood or stucco), a corner feature fence, a fence with stone pillars or a chain link fence next to green space, this means we cannot change the fence type or colour. It also means the burden of maintaining that fence is on us as the home owner whose property it is on.

There are a number of other items covered in the covenants that include swales, garden sheds, and clothes lines to name a few. To add some complexity to this not always well understood topic, Genstar had slightly different covenants applied to each phase of development in Chaparral. If you no longer have a copy of your covenant, it may not match a neighbour's depending on what phase each of your homes was in. The best way to find out what your specific covenant contains is to find your original document or visit the lake office where the staff have copies of all the covenants available.

When you are contemplating an improvement project for your property, please remember to check your covenant as well as the applicable City of Calgary By-Laws before you begin your project. It's much easier to remain compliant than it is to have to "fix" something you've already built or changed. Again, please contact the lake office with any questions around covenants on your properties. Have a great spring and summer seasn.

FOR ARTS' SAKE

Why Art Matters

Many of us enjoy the experience of seeing a live show, be it music, dance, or theatre. We leave these experiences feeling more inspired, more creative, and more at peace with the world around us.

But in the grand scheme of things, does art really matter? Does it really have a powerful impact on our lives, on our health, on our community, and on our society?

We have solid research on the impact of the arts on the economy. In the *Arts Impact Alberta 2014* study, the Alberta Foundation for the Arts (AFA) found that "the total output of the sector is roughly \$347 million". Additionally, the not-for-profit arts organizations that Alberta Foundation for the Arts funded provided approximately 700 full-time and 2,700 part-time positions with the majority (85%) of Albertans reporting that the attend at least one arts event per year.

It seems the arts do improve our society. But what about us, personally? A recent study from The University of Western Australia has found that "participating in the arts for just two hours a week can improve mental health and wellbeing". Participants surveyed were asked how they felt after the experience, and the respondents used descriptors like "optimistic", "useful", "relaxed", and "good about myself". One of the study's co-authors concluded: "arts engagement increases people's happiness, confidence, and self-esteem, while reducing stress and social isolation".

Fortunately for us, Calgary is a great city to get out and experience art, whether it is in a gallery, on a stage, at a festival or even taking an art class. For a good overview of the breadth of arts and culture in Calgary, visit lifeincalgary.ca/todo/arts-culture

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RESIDENT PERSPECTIVES



One of my favorite things about Calgary is the animals in my yard. Calgarians encounter wildlife daily. I yield to deer weekly while driving. I've named the skunk living under our front porch "Fifi la Peuw". There's bats and owls in my backyard, and I cut walks short when coyotes are stalking my dogs in off leash areas. With spring comes the robins and the rest of the migratory birds, as well all the species that hibernate reappear. Then the babies appear.... Calgary is a city immersed in parklands and forests. Unfortunately, this often puts wildlife in conflict with the human inhabitants.

Good Samaritans are the bane of all baby animals. My staff and I spend hours on the phone arguing with wellintentioned determined people desperate to save the baby hare, fawn, or fledgling alone and uninjured. Does leave fawns for long periods of time, but are usually within hearing distance. Fawns and baby hares are naturally camouflaged and have no scent. Mother hares feed babies incredibly rich milk returning to feed them typically only at dusk and dawn. Baby hares run around within a day of birth. If you find a baby hare in a precarious position like on a road just tuck them somewhere safe nearby and walk away. Animals adapt behaviors to decrease the chance of predators finding their young. Respect this wisdom.

Many people incorrectly think a baby removed from the area cannot be returned. With a few species, a touch means rejection by the parents, but often if we can convince people to quickly put the baby back, parent animals will resume their duties.

Fledgling birds on the ground are in the precarious position between leaving the nest and flying. This doesn't

occur instantaneously. The parent birds will follow the fledgling and feed it on the ground while it learns to fly. If flight school is in your backyard, keep children and pets away. If the baby is still a helpless nestling and fell out of the nest too early, return the bird to the nest. If the nest has fallen, secure an open container with drainage holes and the fallen nest inside back in the tree. Most baby birds, squirrels, and hares die of infection when people attempt to hand-raise them, not to mention missing out on life lessons from their parents. A wild animal's best chance of survival is with its parents, NOT you.

If you have concerns about wild creatures in your yard call the Alberta Institute for Wildlife Conservation Hotline at 403-946-2361. They are a charitable foundation with extensive facilities designed to accept all species of wildlife. They can also give you advice to deal with unwanted wildlife sharing your home, such as skunks, raccoons, bats, squirrels, and pigeons. Check out their website; www.aiwc.ca.

Many veterinary clinics will take in wildlife brought to us by the public. At my clinic, some animals are held briefly and released, especially the drunken waxwings eating fermented berries in the fall or birds simply stunned by flying into a window. A very few animals are immediately humanely euthanized because their injuries are too severe. Most animals are checked over and transferred to AIWC which has a fleet of volunteer drivers. An information sheet is filled out for every wild animal admitted, ideally to try to eventually release it to home territory, as well as for education and funding purposes. Volunteer if you really want to learn how to help our wild neighbors.



TAKE ON WELLNESS

Hospice, one of many options for end-of-life care In Alberta, there are many options to get palliative and end of life care—your home, a hospital, a continuing care centre, or a hospice.

Hospices are places made to feel like home while giving specialized end of life care, 24/7. The care teams focus on comfort and quality of life, and can help patients and their family cope with feelings about serious illness.

In a hospice, palliative care is provided by health professionals, volunteers, and spiritual counsellors. Services include:

- managing pain
- helping with daily living activities (personal care)
 emotional, psychological and spiritual support.

Before accessing palliative care or a hospice, a health care team discusses with patients on what's important to them and where they would like to be at the time of their illness where they may either have: a life expectancy of less than 3 months; signed a form saying they do not want to be resuscitated or a need to be in a bed or chair most of the time. A patient's choice may change as an illness changes, and individuals can get palliative and end of life care at any time.

There's also a new program that's helping to bring emergency care to people who get palliative and end of life care in their homes. The EMS Assess, Treat, Refer program has Emergency Medical Services, home care clinicians, doctors, and families working together to help people stay in their homes if that's what they wish.

Fun Facts: wild areas along the full length of western North

• Despite their wide distribution, cougars are seldom spotted by humans.

- Cougars are apex predators and are excellent hunters.
- Cougars have a killing bite with sharp teeth to tear off chunks of meat and a rough tongue to clean traces of meat off their prey's bones.
- Their hind legs are longer than their front ones to give better spring to pounce of their prey, their claws are razor sharp for bringing down their prey and climbing trees and their skeletons bend easily for jumping, stretching and twisting.
- These cats have an excellent sense of smell and their large pupils help them see their prey in dim light.
- · Cougars are hunt-and-wait predators, meaning they watch their prey silently in trees or rocks and pounce when their prey is feeding.
- · Cougars hunt moose, elk, caribou and deer.
- Cougars are solitary animals unless they are with their young.
- When a female is ready to give birth, she finds a den in rock piles, caves or under a deep brush of fallen trees.
- Cougars will occasionally use human built structures such as doghouses, sheds or hunting cabins for their dens.

Cubs develop their hunting skills by hunting at their mother's side and stay with their mother until they can hunt for themselves which is typically between 13 and 24 months.



I'm on a condominium board, and we have decided to hire a professional management company. Do they need to be licensed?

ASCHI

This is one of the most common questions we get. The answer depends on what they are going to do on behalf of the Board of Directors, and how they will handle the condominium corporation's money.

Condominium managers are responsible for collecting condominium fees, arranging property maintenance (according to instructions from the condominium's Board of Directors), assisting the Board of Directors with enforcing the Bylaws, and other duties set out in the Bylaws.

The Real Estate Act does not specifically refer to condominium management, but it does say that individuals need a licence if they collect contributions, or money, for the control, management, or administration of real estate.

So, if a condominium manager is collecting condominium fees, or other such fees such as special assessments, do they need a licence?

If a condominium manager collects the money payable to the condominium corporation, deposits it directly into the condominium corporation's account, and they are not carrying out any other activities that fall under the definition of trading in real estate, they do not require a licence.

If a condominium manager deposits the money payable to the condominium corporation into the management company's account for any period of time, no matter how short, they do require a licence. As a member of a condominium Board of Directors, you and your Board will have to think about how you want your management company to collect and hold fees. If the company will hold them in its own account, they require a licence.

Licensing requirements provide some protection for consumers when a third party, for example a management company, holds consumer funds. All licensees are required to have Errors and Omissions insurance, and there is a consumer compensation fund that compensates consumers who suffer a financial loss as a result of fraud, breach of trust, or a failure to disburse or account for money held in trust. The compensation fund is only available to consumers who are working with licensed professionals on trades in real estate or deals in mortgages.

In December 2014, the Government of Alberta passed legislation that will require licensing for all condominium managers; however, the government has not announced the date on which those legislative changes will come into effect. In the meantime, the licensing requirements detailed in this article continue.


