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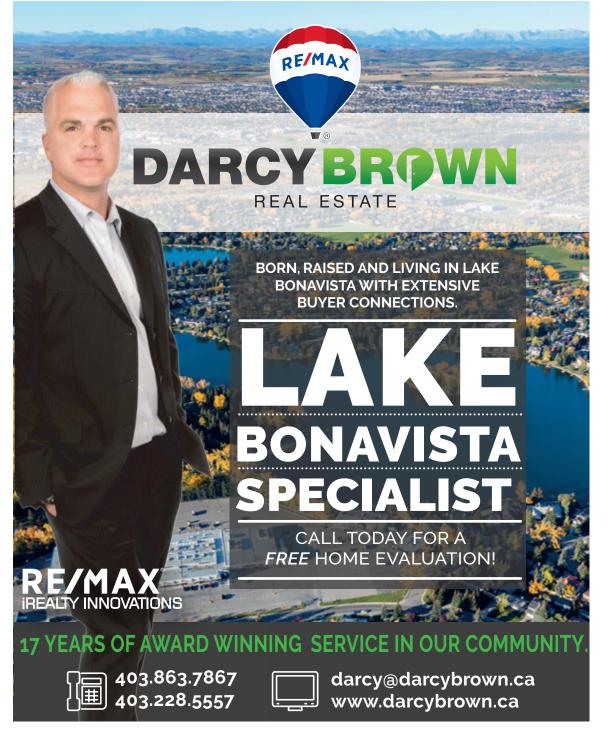

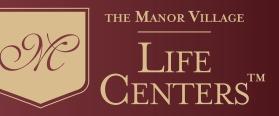

### Here Comes The Sun (Screen)

Ah, the lazy, hazy days of summer. The sun shines brightly—and strongly. When it does, these tips will make your time in the sun safer.

Check the UV index, which measures sun strength. You can be sunburned in as little as 15 minutes. When the UV index is between 3 and 8, everyone, especially kids, needs sunscreen. If it's above 8, these tips will reduce your risk of sunburn as well as heat rash, heat stroke and, over time, skin cancer.

### Safety tips

- Cover up: Wear wide-brimmed hats, UV-blocking sunglasses and thin light-coloured clothing
- Limit the rays: Take frequent breaks in the shade or indoors
- Apply and re-apply sunscreen: Put it on every two hours (at least). Match the sun protective factor (SPF) to the UV index and your skin's sensitivity to sunlight. Babies have thin skin and can burn easily. Keep them out of the sun. Use an SPF 30 lip balm on your lips.
- Stay hydrated: Bring lots of water with you when spending time outside, and drink often, before you're thirsty
- Car safety: Never leave your child or pet alone in a car. Your car can heat up quickly, even on days that do not seem very warm.

Try to stay out of the sun between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m., when the sun's rays are strongest and the UV Index is at its highest.

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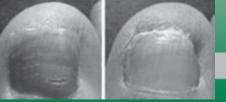
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## Small Acts of Citizenship

## What Is Natural Movement?



You can hire someone to mow your lawn, do your taxes, clean your home, cook your meals walk your dog, care for your children. The truth is, if you have the resources you can outsource almost anything. One thing you cannot outsource though is moving your body.

Our bodies require movement to function well but in our modern culture we have become so sedentary we have lost the ability to move in some important ways. For example, a squat is a natural human movement that is a resting position in many cultures but is lost to most westerners due to years of sitting in chairs. Another movement that is unavailable to many of us is the ability to hang from a bar or tree branch anymore. The most obvious one is that many people, even very fit people, are awkward getting up and down from the floor.



So why is this important?

Fitness is much more than body weight or age; it includes mobility, agility, flexibility, strength and a whole lot more. If you can squat properly that means your hips, knees and ankles are in pretty good shape. If you keep these joints happy everyone wins. If you can avoid replacement surgery, you should. The thing is, most people do this movement badly. Getting assessed in your squat is highly recommended.

If you can lift your arms over your head without pain keep doing it! We make cupboards and shelfs 'convenient' so we no longer have to reach but you should keep trying to if you can. Grip strength is also an important indicator of health so gentle progressive hanging is one way to keep shoulders happy.

Getting up and down from the floor is the real indicator of all four things mentioned earlier, mobility, agility, flexibility and strength. Mobility for your hips and knees. Agility, how are you getting up and getting down? Can you do it with no hands? Are you flexible enough to sit on the floor for a little while? Are you strong enough to do all those previous things and also spend some time there moving around and becoming more comfortable?

Try it out! These are the movements we need to keep doing to be natural humans in a modern culture.

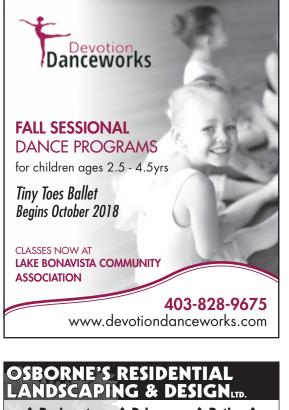

Summers in Canada are earmarked for outdoor fun, such as swimming, boating and other water-related activities. As pleasurable as water can be, it has some serious risks. Here's how you and your family can reduce them.

### **Pool safety:**

- Teach your child to swim. Always closely supervise children when they're in and near water.
- Have adequate barriers around backyard pools to keep everyone safe and secure.

### Open water safety:

- Teach children to swim parallel to shore if caught in a water current.
- Never allow children to swim in a lake if an adult is not present; be within arms' reach at all times.
- Never let small children swim in rivers or other fastmoving water.

### **Boating safety:**

- Life jackets are mandatory for all children and adults in Alberta while on a boat.
- Blow-up water rafts, mattresses or other devices are not safe replacements for a life jacket.
- Make sure your life-jackets are the right sizes for you and your children.

### Diving safety:

- Diving headfirst into the water is not safe for children or adults without proper training and confirming water depths.
- Enter backyard pools, lakes and other bodies of water with unknown depths gradually and feet-first.

## **Rosé for Every Guest**

In the warm lazy evenings this summer, consider breaking away from your go-to white wine spritzer or cold beer and try a refreshing glass of dry rosé.

Words like sweet and feminine may come to mind when you hear the word rosé, but a look past the White Zinfandels and the fatbottomed bottles of Mateus will lead you to dozens of excellent options available throughout the city.

The process that creates the delicate pink colour in a rosé involves leaving the wine on the skins of the grapes for a shorter time that would be necessary to produce a red. As a result of this lighter treatment, the wine has less tannin – a terrific benefit for the wine drinker who normally stays away from reds because of the tannin. Rosés are rarely oaked, so again, if you don't care for heavy oak flavours, rosé could be a great choice.

Rosé may be produced from nearly any red wine grape but those with less colour and more acid such as Grenache, Cinsault, Sangiovese and Pinot Noir grapes are most commonly used.

Visit your neighbourhood wine shop and ask for a dry rosé. I recommend **Whispering Angel** (\$30). It has crisp summery flavours of strawberry and raspberry, mouth-watering acidity and an amazingly long, dry finish. This wine is a perfect pairing for shellfish. It is produced by Chateau d'Esclans along with two other rosés worth mentioning: **The Palm**, (\$20) and **Garrus** (\$100), considered one of the best rosés in the world.

Want something a little bolder with more bite? The **Beaurevoir Tavel** by Marc Chapoutier is a full-bodied rosé with a hint of spice that will knock your socks off (\$25).



## What are the benefits of a community association membership?

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### **BOOK REVIEW WITH BARBARA**

## The Hidden Life of Trees

Have you ever found yourself, while reading a book, exclaim "How interesting" and "Imagine that! I had no idea" and "Wow! That is very cool"? This has been my experience with The Hidden Life of Trees by Peter Wohlleben. Wohlleben has been a forest manager in Germany for much of his life, and his observation of trees there led to the writing of this book. These are not the trees we see in our back yards and city parks. They are in true forests, more or less undisturbed by man. Europe has been populated by humans for many hundreds of years, so large expanses of old growth unlogged forest are rare, but some do exist. What he tells us about how trees communicate with each other through their roots and even the air is fascinating. His favourite trees are the beech and oak, native to his country, but he also speaks about various conifers as well as other deciduous species in Europe and North America. Under these trees, beneath the forest floor, is a network of fungi and mycelium, among other organisms, that live because of the trees. And the trees thrive because of this "wood wide web" and the benefits they provide each other.

Wohlleben tells of the social life of trees, where they live in communities of parents and children, sheltering the little ones, nurturing the sick and struggling, helping one another throughout the seasons. When you comprehend that the natural life of these trees is 400 years and more, you must stretch your perspective when thinking what a youngster, an adolescent, and an adult is. A 150-year-old tree may be just entering its adolescence in some environments. While every species is intent on living and flourishing, they also support one another in many ways we are only just beginning to understand.

The flow of water and sugar within the tree, just under the bark in the cambium layer, is clearly explained. Photosynthesis through the leaves (and needles in the conifers) is essential during the spring and summer as the tree makes food for growth and stores it in preparation for winter. In his estimation, each tree in the forest will reproduce itself and make exactly one new tree in its lifetime. Think of the seeds the maple produces, or our poplars with their June fluff. Each of those little pieces of fluff contains a seed, and some of them will land in a place where they will germinate, and start a new tree growing. So why only one descendent? Because many animals browse, roots get too wet and rot, not enough light prevents the baby from thriving, or a bird makes a hole for a nest one year and for whatever reason, fungus and bacteria move in and the tree is doomed. It may take years to die but die it will. Then there are insect predators that can wipe out an entire forest until something like a fire stops their progress. When a tree dies, a whole new story commences as it heads off on the path to humus on the forest floor many years in the future, having nourished a myriad of critters and life forms on its way. Fascinating.

I like the author's way with words as he speaks of the trees as children, parents, elders, neighbours and street kids. Each species has its own character and a healthy forest has room for many different characters. This book is not a quick read, but a thoughtful and interesting one and the language is not difficult, despite having been translated from the original German. Not once did I find myself thinking "I wish this guy had had a better editor" as is the case with some of the novels I have read lately. It is no surprise that it remains a New York Times best-seller.

### CALGARY WILDLIFE



Richardson's ground squirrels are known by many names in Alberta, including gopher and prairie dog. Richardson's ground squirrels are a keystone species in Alberta and are prey for many other species including predatory birds, mammals, and reptiles. These Albertan natives spend a good portion of their lives underground in elaborate burrow systems.

These rodents are true hibernators, holing up underground for up to 7 months without food or water. To do this they eat large quantities of food during the spring and summer to develop a fat reserve; once they go into hibernation their heart and respiration rates drop dramatically, allowing them to conserve energy. Males go into hibernation by the end of July while female and juveniles go into hibernation in August.

### Richardson's ground squirrels live in groups of related female kin

- The female raises her litter alone without help from her mate and kin
- Richardson ground squirrels have a lookout that alerts to danger
- Only 10-20% of young males will reach adulthood in contrast to 40-50% of young females

## **Play Soccer** for Health, Wellness – and Fun

Soccer has been dubbed "the world's sport" for a reason. A recent survey by FIFA, soccer's international governing body, found it's a pastime shared by 265 million players around the globe. That's about four per cent of the world's population.

This summer many of them will watch the FIFA (Fédération Internationale de Football Association) World Cup in Russia. And they'll take to streets, parking lots, empty spaces, backyards and beaches to play the game.

One of the great things about soccer is you don't need to break the bank to play it. "Soccer is inexpensive if you want it to be. It could be as simple as two kids in a park with a ball, having fun, or better still, playing with their parents," says John Clubb, the Alberta Soccer Association's manager of Grassroots Development.

For children under six, it's about gaining the fundamentals of physical literacy: running and kicking. From seven to nine, it's about ball mastery: foot dribbling the ball while running and weaving through opponents. Most of all, it's about fun!

Children focus on developing their own skills and that gives them a chance to explore parts of the game. "So let them be and encourage them to have fun with the ball," Clubb says. "At 10 to 12 years old, they are old enough to be introduced to team play and passing the ball."

Whatever your or your children's age and ability, playing some form of soccer can add to physical, social and emotional health and wellness.

Players can reduce the risk of injury by warming up before playing and by wearing protective equipment, such as shin guards. Christina Loitz, a health promotion facilitator with Alberta Health Services, says soccer helps brain function, coordination, balance, gross motor skills and stress reduction.

"It can also help children build confidence, social skills, leadership, creativity, and a lifelong enjoyment of being physically active," she says.

I did all of my homework before buying a condominium, and I think I bought a good one. Now I'm here—and I want to make sure it remains a positive experience. What can I do?

You're right to want to keep the condominium you're in a positive experience; not only is that better for you as an owner, but it will also help your resale value.

When you bought the condominium, you likely received a number of documents to review—this should have included the corporation's bylaws, a budget, a reserve fund study, and a reserve fund plan.

You may have originally hired someone to review the documents for you, but as an owner now, you want to make sure you understand what these documents are and what they mean. These are four of the most important condominium documents:

- bylaws every condominium corporation has bylaws. The bylaws outline the rules by which the Board of Directors, and individual owners, have to abide. If you don't abide by the bylaws, the Board of Directors may have the authority to fine you. Make sure you know and understand the bylaws for your condominium.
- budget each condominium corporation has an annual budget that outlines revenue (from condominium fees) and expenses (capital and operational) for the coming year. The corporation budget shows you how the Board of Directors is spending the corporation's money.
- reserve fund study this important documents in analyses the state of the common property of a condominium corporation. It assists a condominium corporation in planning future capital expenses, and ensuring the corporation will have enough money in its reserve fund. It should contain:
- an inventory of all common property that may need repair/replacement within 25 years
- information about the current condition of common property and an estimate of when each component may need repair/replacement

- estimated costs of repairing/replacing each component of the common property
- the life expectancy of each repaired/replaced component of the common property
- current amount in the reserve fund
- the recommended amount of money that should be added to the reserve fund to ensure necessary repairs/replacements occur
- reserve fund plan this is a document the Board of Directors can develop based on the results of the reserve fund study. It sets out how the Board of Directors will address the revenue and expenses required to meet the long-term capital needs of the condominium. The Reserve Fund Plan should:
- identify the capital expenses to be incurred by the condominium corporation
- outline the timetable over which these expenses will be incurred
- indicate the method of funding and the amount needed for maintaining the reserve fund

The other thing I want to emphasize is the importance of getting involved in your condominium corporation. Remember that a condominium isn't just a place to live. When you buy a condominium, you're buying into a corporation, which means joint ownership of the corporation's assets. Getting involved as a member of the Board of Directors provides you with the opportunity to affect how the corporation is run because you will be part of the decision-making process. You'll also have better access to information about the financial health of the corporation.

The warmth of August allows us to spend time in the sun, take in festivals, and stroll through Fish Creek Park.

Pipelines have been in the news over the last few months. As your MLA, and Shadow Minister for Economic Development, I have visited with many oil and gas industry leaders who are committed to innovation and environmental stewardship. They are proud Albertans who support recreational programs, not-for-profits, and family and child wellness. One company's tour left me reflecting on Alberta's resource-rich history. MEG Energy's hallways are lined with a visual history of our oil and gas development. The famous Alberta picture of the first gusher in Turner Valley on May 14, 1914 is proudly displayed along other early images of the 1950s with our indigenous population proudly working in the oil and gas industry, to modern day production and reclamation projects.

In the 1940s, our legislators understood that the natural resources belonged to all Albertans and established the precursors to current legislation such as surface vs. mineral rights and royalties. In 1949, the Alberta Legislature passed the Gas Resource Conservation Act, which allowed exports of gas to be authorized when an adequate supply of gas was assured for Alberta's energy security. In addition, Alberta understood that the Federal Government controlled pipelines that crossed provincial borders; therefore, to limit Ottawa's control, the Alberta government created a separate entity to carry gas within the province. The Alberta Gas Trunk Line (AGTL) was an internal regulated system that carried gas only within Alberta. Today AGTL is primarily operated by TransCanada.

As we struggle with the cross-border issue, we hope for TransMountain to proceed and carry Alberta oil to coastal tidewater. I am a strong advocate for pipelines across Canada, which fosters energy security, and displaces "conflict oil" imports. Building pipelines attracts investment, creates Canadian jobs, and delivers wealth and prosperity to all Canadians. ### **Make All-Terrain Travel All Good**

If you're an all-terrain vehicle (ATV) driver, it's hard to resist the allure of exploring backcountry trails during the summer. These tips will help newbies and trail veterans alike navigate the ins and outs of ATV safety.

### Age limits

Some exceptions apply, but the minimum age by law for operating off-highway vehicles is 14 years. The AHS recommended age is 16.

### Know the risks

When not used safely, ATV risks include

- Scrapes and cuts
- Strains and sprains
- Broken bones
- Dislocated joints
- Bruising
- Concussions and head injuries
  Internal injuries.

### Safety tips

• Choose an ATV that's right for your size to reduce a chance of rollover or serious injury.

- Wear protective equipment such as an approved ATV helmet, eyewear and gloves.
- Wear pants, long sleeves and boots to prevent cuts and scrapes.
- Ride during daylight hours, at a safe speed, with other people around.
- Carry a first-aid kit with each vehicle.
- Don't drive while or after using alcohol or other drugs.
  Take a certification course through the Alberta Safety Council.

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### Stampede in the House of Commons

Stephanie rose in the House of Commons, on the last day of the Parliamentary sitting, to highlight the Calgary Stampede. The following is excerpted from Hansard:

"Mr Speaker, I rise today to shamelessly promote my home town and one of the greatest annual traditions in the country, the Calgary Stampede. Having joined with the Calgary Exhibition in 1912, the Stampede has weathered recessions, world wars, floods, and even a relocation to New York. However, thanks to the vision of Guy Weadick, it now attracts over one million visitors a year. Showcasing the best of our province, our western culture, and our strength as a community, the Stampede is just simply 10 days of gosh darn fun. Whether someone wants to ride the midway, watch the rodeo, take in a grandstand show, or attend one of the amazing concerts, I invite everyone on both sides of the House to come to Calgary for Stampede. YaHOO!"

### Voting Against the Carbon Tax

During an all-night voting marathon in June, Stephanie joined her colleague Rosemarie Falk, Member of Parliament for Battlefords-Lloydminster, to explain why Conservatives forced the Liberals to vote for almost 12 hours straight.

"We are here in the House of Commons at 1am because Justin Trudeau refuses to tell Canadians how much his carbon tax cover-up will cost them," said Stephanie. "Yet this affects every single aspect of our lives. Driving our children to school, to sports, heating our homes, putting food on the table—It will all cost more.

"And the tax will hit small businesses, suppliers, distributors—every sector of our economy will be affected by this Liberal carbon tax and that will be passed on to Canadians. That is why we voted all night and that is why we will continue to pressure Justin Trudeau to be honest with Canadians about how much this tax will cost them."

### **Marijuana Bill Passes**

Bill C-45, which legalizes marijuana for recreational use, passed in both the Senate and the House of Commons

this past month. On June 20th, the Prime Minister indicated that legalization will take effect on October 17th, 2018.

Stephanie spoke against C-45 twice in the House of Commons this past year, highlighting concerns from organizations such as Canadian Medical Associations and Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police.

She remains very concerned about the significant flaws in C-45 as children are still allowed to possess significant amounts of marijuana despite their higher risk for mental disorders from Cannabis use, and there is also still no reliable method for law enforcement to determine or measure impairment from cannabis. As she pointed out, unfortunately the Liberals rushed this legislation through the Parliamentary process, completely disregarding the health and safety of Canadians.

### **Accidental Poisoning**

Emergency Medical Services (EMS) would like to remind parents and caregivers of precautions to prevent accidental childhood poisonings around the home. Ingesting prescription or over-the-counter (OTC) medications is a significant cause of accidental childhood poisonings. Other causes of poisoning include ingesting or coming in contact with household items such as dishwasher tablets, mouthwash, or chemicals such as paints, solvents and cleaning products.

### **Medication Storage**

- Place all medications in locked containers and store in an area inaccessible to children;
- For easy identification, store all medications in their original packaging; do not mix multiple medications in a single bottle;
- Install child locks on all cabinets, or drawers where medications are stored.

### Safety Tips

- Child-resistant medication bottles are not child proof. They can still be opened by a child;
- Take extra precaution with medicines designed to appeal to children such as chewable vitamins or flavored cough and cold syrups;
- Promptly dispose of any medications or toxic household products no longer in use.

### Prevention

- Store household products, cleaning supplies, and cosmetics in locked cabinets or drawers;
- Install child latches on cabinets children might also access by climbing on counters or chairs;
- · Label all plants in and around your home and garden;
- Antifreeze, windshield washer fluid, and pesticides are extremely poisonous. Even small amounts of these can cause serious illness if ingested;
- Poisoning information can be obtained by calling the Poison and Drug Information Service (PADIS) at: 1-800-332-1414;
- In case of a poisoning emergency, call 9-1-1;
- Provide the name of the product ingested and, if it is safe to do so, a sample of the substance for EMS to inspect on their arrival.

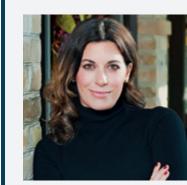
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
