





SAFE & SOUND

Backyard Play Safety

With summer approaching, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) would like to encourage parents and caregivers to ensure their backyard play areas are made safe for children. Although direct supervision is the best method to reduce the chance of injury, ensure your play equipment in your yard is in good repair and is suitable for the age and skill of the children using it. Check play equipment often; replace or repair any worn or broken parts. Set up play equipment over top a nine-inch layer of shock-absorbing material, which extends six feet out in all directions from the play area.

Water Hazards

- Drowning contributes to unintentional injury-related death among children ages one to four;
- Children can drown in just a few centimetres of water if it covers their mouth and nose;
- Ensure all backyard swimming pools are fenced. The fence must be at least 1.8 metres(*)
- high and have a self-latching, self-closing, lockable gate.

Lawn and Garden Tools

- Keep young children away from outdoor power equipment;
- Serious burns may result from touching hot engine surfaces;
- Ensure that all sharp tools, fuel, chemicals, and other hazardous substances are stored in a secure, locked area. A simple latch may not be sufficient.

Insect Bites and Stings

- Minimize the risk of attracting insects by not wearing strong perfumes or scented lotions;
- Avoid wearing brightly coloured clothing outdoors; Consider destroying or
- relocating hives and nests situated near your home;To avoid injury through inadvertently stepping on a
- stinging insect always wear footwear outdoors; • If your child has received an 'EpiPen, Junior' prescrip-
- in your child has received an epireri, sumor prescription from your physician (for anaphylactic reactions only) ensure they understand when and how to use it;
 If your child experiences a severe reaction to an insect sting, or other environmental cause, seek medical attention, or call 9-1-1.



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

9 Ideas on How to Have Peace of Mind

5. Be Proud

You will gain a greater sense of peace of mind simply by having the confidence to be yourself in any situation.




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How Much Do Water Leaks Really Cost?




When it comes to residential and household leaks, toilets, faucets and outdoor irrigation are the most common culprits, although any water using device can eventually leak. The average Calgarian uses approximately 7 m³ every month. 1 m³ = 1,000 litres 7 m³ = 7,000 litres

Water is measured in cubic metres (m³).

For 2018 each cubic metre costs \$3.15*

Leaks can range in size. A chain caught under a toilet flapper can waste 3 m³/month. A leak this size could increase your bill by \$9.45 each month. If the water level in the toilet tank is too high and overflowing into the overflow tube or the flapper is completely lifted it can waste up to 1,200 m³/month. A leak this size could increase your bill by \$3,780.48 each month.**





In the case of a leaky faucet, the size and cost of leaks can range as well. One drop per second can waste 2.5 m³/month. A leak this size could increase your bill by \$7.87 each month. A small stream of water can waste 15 m³/month. A leak this size could increase your bill by \$47.26 each month.



A steady flow of water accidentally left running can waste 360 m³/ month. A leak this size could increase your bill by \$1,134.14 each month. *** Use your water meter to check for leaks. In Calgary most water meters are installed inside the house where the water pipe enters your home. This is usually in the basement, near your main water shut-off valve.

 Turn off all taps and water appliances (dishwashers, washing machines) in your home.
 Watch the flow register on the face of the meter. The register could look like a gear (round or triangular, black or red) or a needle depending on the model of meter you have.

3. If it keeps turning, you have a leak somewhere in your house.

4. Check all water using devices, such as your taps, humidifier, hot water heater and water softener for leaks.

TAKE ON WELLNESS



A child's foundation for good mental health is built early in life through his experiences, including his relationships with his parents, family, caregivers, teachers and other children.

These relationships are essential to his development and help him build resiliency—the ability to bounce back from setbacks and cope with life's ups and downs. Resiliency is built by certain skills such as problem solving, empathy and emotional regulation, which is the ability to show emotions in ways that won't hurt oneself or others.

A child with resiliency is able to react confidently, positively and adapt well to change when he hits bumps and potholes on the road of life. Resilience is also a buffer against the harmful effects of adverse childhood experiences.

"Our mental health depends on our relationships with other people from the very beginning," says Dr. Carole-Anne Hapchyn, an infant psychiatrist in Edmonton and

a clinical professor of psychiatry and pediatrics at the University of Alberta.

"When you are resilient, you've got more in the bank to cope," she says. It's like a scale, with the positive things in a child's life going to one side of the scale and the negative going to the other side. Resilience is the movable tipping point that gives a child the ability to have positive experiences outweigh the negative.

One of the best ways to build up the positive side of the scale is through serve and return interactions. The key to this back-and-forth communication is watching for and responding to children's cues, Hapchyn says. "Be sensitive and observant to what children are trying to tell you."

Serve and return helps build a strong relationship between an adult and child, creating an emotional bond that gives that child the strength, trust and security he needs.

I want to buy a new build home from the builder, but I don't want to work with the builder's representative. I want to work with my own agent, is that allowed? Will it cost me more money?

Yes, you're allowed to work with your own agent. The builder's representative is representing the builder's interests, and your real estate professional will represent your interests in negotiations with the seller (builder).

RECA always recommends having your own representation when buying a property, whether it's a new build, resale, a condo, or even a commercial or rural property. While builders can't stop you from having your own representation, it is possible you'll come across one that wants to deal with you, as the buyer, directly. If that's the case, your real estate professional can offer you advice and guidance behind the scenes, but they won't be dealing directly with the builder or the builder's representative.

When you hire a real estate professional to represent you, you're required to enter into a written service agreement. The written service agreement sets out the roles and responsibilities of your real estate professional, and your obligations to that individual. It also sets out how your real estate professional will be paid.

Typically, buyer's representatives are paid through a portion of the commission the seller pays. Some builders, however, do not offer commission to buyer's agents. If this is the case, your real estate representative won't be paid in the usual manner.

Your agreement may contain a clause that sets out if your real estate professional will not receive a portion


of commission from the seller's agent's commission, you will owe compensation to your agent upon completion of your purchase. This compensation could end up being an out of pocket expense for you.

You may come across builders that have programs to pay commissions to real estate professionals who introduce a buyer to the builder, but this is not the same as having representation from a real estate professional throughout the process. In these cases, the builder is willing to pay commission to a real estate professional who introduces you—but then the builder expects to deal directly with you as the buyer, and you may not have the benefit of advice from your real estate professional.

RECA recommends carefully reviewing the fee portion of your written agreement before signing it.

If there is no mention of how your real estate representative will be paid in the event the seller or seller's brokerage is not offering commission to a buyer's representative, you need to talk about it with your real estate professional. If you have concerns about a possible out of pocket expense in terms of compensation for your real state representative, get that out in the open at the beginning.

Fire Pit Regulations Help Create Good Neighbour Relationships

When you ask Calgarians what they love about this city, the answer is often "the people." While most of us do our best to be good neighbours, sometimes we need a little guidance to do the right thing. That's where the Community Standards Bylaw comes in.

Did you know the Community Standards Bylaw lays out the requirements for using backyard wood-burning fire pits? The regulations for fire pits include:

- Using a mesh screen or spark guard to reduce the spread of embers and sparks.
- Extinguishing the flame by midnight on weekdays and 1 a.m. on weekends.
- Restricting the height of the flame to one metre.
- Building a fire pit within maximum size limits.
- · Listing materials that cannot be burned.
- Ensuring the fire pit is at least two metres from other structures and is not under a tree or overhanging branches.
- Ensuring you have a means of extinguishing the fire on hand and that you put it out before leaving it unattended.

The bylaw includes fines for unsafe fires and burning prohibited materials, so it pays to understand the bylaw.

Be Yard Smart

A beautiful yard and conserving water go hand-in-hand.

During the summer, your water use can jump by 50 per cent because of outdoor watering activities. This increased demand places a strain on our rivers and treatment plants. Save water, money and time by adopting a few simple water-saving tips.

- Watch your weather forecast to determine if you should water or not. Adjust your watering schedule accordingly and skip watering when it has rained or is forecast to rain.
- The best time to water is early in the morning. Avoid watering in the heat of the day (10 a.m. to 3 p.m.).
- An easy way to water in the morning is to add a timer to your sprinkler or set your irrigation system.
- Capture rain water in a rain barrel and use it on your trees, shrubs and flower beds.
- Use the right watering tool for the job. Keep water low and slow to ensure water reaches the plant roots and does not just evaporate.
- Reduce mowing and watering by keeping your lawn at least two or three inches high. Taller grass shades the soil, so it requires less water and stays healthier.

ATVs: Be as Safe as Possible

It's Child Safety Week and Alberta Health Services (AHS) is reminding all Albertans to make all-terrain vehicle (ATV) safety a priority this week and every week.

ATVs pose significant risk to all users and particularly children less than 16 years of age, who have not yet developed to the point of having the strength, skills or judgment needed to operate an ATV. Over a one-year period ending April 1, 2017, 78 children were seen in Alberta's two pediatric emergency departments due to ATV-related injuries; 31 required hospital admission and one died.

To protect children less than 16 years of age, parents and caregivers are advised to ensure these children do not drive or ride in an ATV. This includes ATVs marketed as 'child-sized'. Albertans 16 years of age and older are urged to take the following precautions to ensure their ATV excursions are as safe as possible:

• Get trained: Before you hit the trails, get formal hands-on training from a recognized/trained ATV instructor. Don't be shy about refreshing your training seasonally.

Wear the gear: Always wear a helmet. As of May 15, 2017, CSAcompliant helmets must be worn by OHV users when riding on public land, but a helmet worn every ride can save your life. From 2002 to 2013, 41 per cent of quad-rider deaths in Alberta were due to head injuries. In 80 per cent of these head injury deaths, the quad riders were not wearing a helmet. In addition to a helmet, always wear a jacket, long pants, goggles, boots and gloves.

Look first: Be sure you're aware of the weather forecast, fire outlook/potential, and any hazards (geographical, animal or human) or risks that the trail(s) could pose. Ensure your ATV is equipped with an appropriate head lamp.
 Buckle up: Be sure you're fastened in properly and that all gear and equipment (including your ATV re-

straints) are in proper working condition before you hit the trails. • **Drive sober:** Don't drink or do drugs before or while operating an ATV: 55 per cent of those who died in ATV crashes between 2002 and 2013 tested positive for alcohol.

• Seek help: Before you head out on the trail, let others know where you're going and when they should expect you back. This helps your loved ones know when to call for help if you've been gone too long. Take a cellphone or working radio with you, as well as a first aid-kit.

Are you shopping for a new home or looking to renew or refinance your mortgage this year? The Canadian government brought in new rules on mortgage lending in January, and there are some things you need to know.

What has changed?

The new rules are designed to protect Canadians from taking on bigger mortgages than they can afford in a time of historically low interest rates. They require homebuyers to meet a new minimum qualifying rate, or "stress test," for insured mortgages. The test tries to predict whether borrowers can keep up with mortgage payments, at their current salary levels, if interest rates were to rise.

The new qualifying rate is the Bank of Canada's five-year benchmark (currently 5.14%). Borrowers who are able to make a down payment of 20% or less must qualify at this rate, subject to final approval by their mortgage lender. Borrowers who can put down 20% or more must qualify at 5.14% or the lender's contract rate plus 2.0%, whichever is greater.

What does this mean for Canadians who want to get, renew or refinance a mortgage this year?

First-time homebuying

No doubt, the new rules will have the biggest impact on people who are house hunting for the first time in 2018. They'll be facing a 20% decrease in affordability. To pass the stress test, they may have to set their sights on a less expensive home. Or they may need to save up for a bigger down payment.

First-time buyers who aren't able to pass the stress test could also apply for a mortgage with a secondary lender who doesn't come under the rules because they're not

backed by mortgage insurance. In the end, they could get their dream home but at a higher interest rate and more risk.

Mortgage renewals

Homeowners who need to renew their mortgage this year will not have to take the stress test if they stay with their current lender. But they may not be able to switch to a better rate if they aren't able to pass the test with a different financial institution.

Mortgage refinancing

Homeowners who want to refinance their mortgage (to pay for renovations, for example) will have to qualify for the new loan at the benchmark rate or their current contractual mortgage rate plus 2.0%, whichever is greater. If they're already close to their borrowing limit, they may have to settle for a smaller loan.



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The Scoop on Skunks

Skunks have a bad reputation for their smelly spray, but they should be recognized as champion pest controllers! Skunks tend to prey on rodents and insects that can cause significant damage to the average home. When left alone, skunks are rarely recognized in a neighbourhood and will happily live under the radar, foraging and hunting for food once the sun goes down. Conflicts can occur however, when a skunk is startled or attacked (often by roaming cats and dogs). When a skunk becomes defensive, it will stomp its feet, raise its trail, and finally (if worse comes to worst) release its anal glands and spray a foul discharge onto its attacker.

Did you know?

Skunks are nocturnal omnivores whose diet can consist of anything from insects and rodents to fruits and leaves
A skunk's vision is quite poor, so although they mostly keep to themselves, they are easy to startle. Curious cats and dogs that are off-leash are most likely to come upon skunks and cause them to spray

Skunks breed in February and March; the female will dig out a den to house her litter and kits are born in May
Skunks can spray their anal glands secretions several times over very long distances before the gland is emptied. It can take over a week before the gland is refilled and ready to be used again
Skunks are not aggressive and give warnings before spraying. Skunks will raise their tails, stop their feet and turn their tail toward you before resorting to spraying. If you see any of these behaviours stop and slowly back away.

Skunks don't deserve their bad reputation; it is easy to co-exist with these helpful and fastidious animals.

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Monthly Update

Stephanie wants to keep you updated on some of the work she has been doing on your behalf. In addition to meeting with stakeholders and attending Committee meetings on Environment, Status of Women, Health and Public Accounts, she has represented the Official Opposition at several events recently, including the Opening of the 107 Order of the Eastern Star Grand Chapter Session, where support was announced for a number of worthy Albertan charities.

At the end of May, Stephanie and her colleagues addressed the mishandling of the Kinder Morgan pipeline by the Liberal government which will cost Canadians billions of dollars.

Supporting The Energy Industry

Although Justin Trudeau may say he supports Alberta's energy industry, his actions show otherwise. We saw the mismanagement of the TransMountain Pipeline and he also put forward the legislation, C-69, which blocks pipeline construction. This bill creates additional regulatory hurdles and removes the certainty, predictability and clarity needed for the viability of major energy projects in Canada. The House of Commons Environment Committee recently studied the new bill. Although the Official Opposition brought forward witnesses to show how damaging this legislation will be for Canada, the Liberal government refuses to reconsider Bill C-69. Without pipelines, there is no access to new markets, putting the losses for Canada at hundreds of billions of dollars.

Status Of Women Update

As a member of the Standing Committee for the Status of Women, Stephanie has been participating in related studies on the policies, programs, and legislation.

The most recent studies are the Economic Security of Women and Indigenous Women in the Correctional System.

The former intends to identify the problems affecting women's income, possible tools to strengthen women's economy security, and ways to increase women's entry participation, retention and representation in leadership and high-paying positions. The findings and recommendations from this study will be released shortly.

Committee Members took on the latter study as, while indigenous women represent only 3.8 per cent of the population, 37% of women in Canadian prisons are indigenous. Stephanie and her colleagues called on experts to help determine why, and how the federal government can assist in breaking the cycle of incarceration. The final report will be available at http://www. ourcommons.ca/Committees/en/FEWO in the coming weeks.
