

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

HAPPY NEW YEAR EVERYONE!

Welcome 2017!

I must say that the Christmas Lights were fantastic here in Queensland this year. I hope you were able to walk or drive around to see all of them. It was so nice to see the sparkle coming from the houses even though the times have been rough for most of 2016. Thank you everyone for giving us the opportunity to see the joy radiate in our community. It gave us a boost to help ring in the new year of 2017.

I would also like to thank all of the wonderful volunteers who came forward in 2016 to keep our community active. We have had some struggles last year and hopefully this will be a terrific 2017 for us. Please remember WE ARE ALL VOLUNTEERS and without our volunteers, we can't have programs for everyone.

If you have been reading my previous President's Messages, you may have tuned in to the fact that we have needed HELP in so many areas.

Just before the fall, it was brought to our attention that due to very low and no rental increases over quite a number of years as well as the huge increases in all of our operating expenses, the community center was quickly going into debt.

We acquired a financial advisor to assist us in creating a positive budget to help us get on the right financial track for 2017. This created our Financial Planning Committee consisting of myself, our treasurer, our secretary and a past president. I am pleased to say that with everyone's help with revaluating the income and how to make rental increases comfortable, we have a great budget for this year. That was a very hard and stressful time for all of us on the committee. All I can say is thank you to all of my committee members and I know all of our hard work will pay off.

I have met with all of our renters and they are in agreement with the new rates. They are all willing to work with us to keep this community center open and alive.

Here are our new rates for the 2017 year.

- Use of the Gym \$50.00 per hour
- Use of the Boardroom \$25.00 per hour

- Use of the Jenson room \$25.00 per hour
- Use of the Lions room \$25.00 per hour
- Private functions and Weddings \$500.00 flat rate with a \$200.00 damage deposit
- Children's Parties \$150.00 plus \$100.00 cleaning fee
- For the rink there will be some charges for special bookings and they will be determined during this month and posted in the community center office.

We are very positive for having more daytime activities in the months ahead. The Pickle Ball group is really going strong. It is still happening on Wednesday afternoons from 1:00 p.m. – 2:30 p.m. and it is for adults of all ages. Come and join us for mild exercise, plenty of laughs and loads of fun. We have 3 courts set up each time. There will be a small drop in fee starting this month to help pay for the use of the gym. A night time group can be created if we get enough interest for it. Please phone the community office if you are interested.

SENIORS! I have been mentioning this for a number of months. If you would like a daytime seniors program organized then we can get that up and running. I do need help with the organizing or even giving me some suggestions as what you would like. Please phone me at 403 271-2176.

Did you know that we have an ART INSTRUCTOR for children's classes? It is on every Wednesday after school in the afternoon. Contact Linda at the community center, 403 271-2176 so she can pass your name on to the instructor. I have seen some of the art work being done and it is awesome.

I attended their wreath making class in December and came home with a beautiful homemade wreath which I have still hanging on my front door. Sessions will be held indoors at the Environmental Learning Centre in Shannon Terrace from 7-8pm.



First Quarter (waxing) January 5

Moonlight is strong, encouraging leaf growth. It is a good time for planting, especially two days before the full moon. Take cuttings from plants you wish to propagate. Fertilize as close to the full moon as possible.

January 12 Full Moon (waning)

As the moon wanes, the energy is drawing down. Strong gravitational pull but moonlight is decreasing putting energy into the roots.

January 19 Last Quarter (waning)

Decreased gravitational pull and moonlight. A resting period. Take cuttings from plants you wish to propagate. Dry herbs, flowers and fruit. If you want to control growth or encourage rooting, perform the necessary activities during the waning moon.

January 27 New Moon (waxing)

Increasing moonlight, lunar gravity pulls water up encouraging plant growth and proliferation. Grafting, transplanting, re-potting, and watering. Gather herbs used for essential oils. Oil content is more concentrated at this time.



Hello Ward 14.

I hope you had a chance to spend some quality time with friends and family over the holiday season. 2017 will bring new opportunities along with new challenges, as the future tends to do. First, though, I would like to speak about cleaning up after last year.

Christmas Tree Recycling

This is a VERY important update. Like many, City landfills have seen a significant drop in revenue because of the economic situation that we find ourselves in. Calgary's Waste & Recycling Services has had to adapt by implementing with cost-cutting measures to bring its budget back in line.

For one thing, landfills will move to four-day per week operations (and I am happy to announce that Council has frozen the tipping fee rate for 2017). Off days will be staggered so that there is always a place to take waste. But the VERY important point is another cost-cutting measure. There will be no door-to-door Christmas tree collection this year. You will be able to drop off your tree at one of 15 designated locations between December 26 and January 31 instead. Not collecting trees door-todoor will save about \$100,000.

Customer Review Period - 2017 Property and **Business Tax Assessments**

This is another important tidbit, but it isn't much different than previous years. Only the dates have changed. On January 5, the City will mail the 2017 property and business assessment notices. What you need to do is review it—carefully. Make sure your details are accurate and the assessed value is a fair reflection of the value of your property as of July 1, 2016. If you have any questions contact Assessment at 403-268-2888 during the Customer Review Period which runs from January 5 to March 6. The Customer Review Period is your only chance to make a case that your assessment is incorrect, so don't take it for granted. It will have a big impact on the property tax bill you get in spring.

The City has some very helpful online tools to help you decide if you think your assessment is fair. I strongly suggest checking them out. They will be at calgary.ca/ assessment, but you will also need a City myID account (calgary.ca/myid). You will find all the information you need to get started with all of it in the assessment notice you receive after January 5.



PRAYER PLANT

(marantaceae leuconeura erythroneura) Origin: Brazil

In the evening the leaves stand up facing each other, like praying hands, and lay flat during the day.

This is one of my favourite house plants! I love a plant that has something special about it – and this one certainly does.

HOW DOES A PRAY PLANT PRAY

Circadian rhythm, the change in light from day to night, triggers water to move in and out of the plant cells causing them to fold up at night, hence the name, Prayer Plant.

The most popular are the colourful marantaceae leuconeura erythroneura (Herring bone, Red-nerve plant, Red-veined prayer plant) with its burgundy veined leaves (pictured above), and the green m. leuconeura kerchoviana (Rabbit track).

These plants don't like the cold – so a windowsill in the winter may cause the edges of the leaves to brown. Browning of the leaf edges may also indicate low humidity.

Maranta loves humidity but not wet soil – make sure that your tropical potting mixture has some vermiculite or perlite in it for good drainage.

Feed it every 2 weeks with a 10-10-5 plant food.

Moderate lighting; no direct sunlight for this beauty; otherwise you will notice the color fading from the leaves.

As a matter of fact, most vibrant and colourful foliage does not need direct sunlight at all; rather, pale foliage and variegated houseplants require brighter or direct sunlight to produce photosynthesis.

The secret to success with the Prayer Plant is high humidity.

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




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
