Working together we'll continue to make Bankview an incredible place to live and work.



A message from the Federation of Calgary Communities



Floods, Woodlands & Bridges

After eight decades without a major flood, extreme rains in 2013 resulted in the highest recorded flows along the Bow and Elbow Rivers. This flood mobilized previously stable gravels and other alluvial sediments resulting in the transformation, expansion and/or creation of gravel bars and islands. These newly-formed surfaces provide an opportunity for the progressive colonization and succession of new riparian plant communities.

Although beneficial to the ecological health of this previously static system, newly establishing woodlands on gravel bars could pose a flood hazard. Woodland development at some locations might impede river flows and elevate overbank flooding and erosion during future floods. To investigate this prospect, the University of Lethbridge was tasked with analyzing and projecting post flood vegetation colonization along the Bow River as part of the Calgary Rivers Morphology Project*. Using these predictions areas of concern for future potential river impediment were identified.

Although the study was limited to the Bow River in Calgary, flooding of the Elbow River at Mission Bridge in 2013 provides an example of where riparian woodlands forming around bridges can present a problem. Constructed in 1914 and 1915, the Mission Bridge spanned a small sparsely vegetated island. Over the years the island has become a woodland including balsam poplars. During the 2013 flood, these trees collected debris and formed a barrier that greatly reduced the capacity of the middle spans of the bridge to convey floodwaters. While overbank flooding at this location was inevitable given the volume of water, it is likely that the woodland at Mission Bridge elevated flooding.


Riparian areas along rivers and streams in Calgary present a natural environment for people to enjoy within

an urban setting. Preserving these areas is important. However, when vegetation begins to negatively impact infrastructure it might be necessary to control its development and thus avoid problems such as the flooding that occurred at Mission Bridge.

Calgary Community Standards River Safety Tips

Your safety and the safety of others should always be top of mind. Rafters, boaters and paddlers need to be aware of water levels, temperature, current speed, cloudy water conditions, and river hazards including bridge abutments, trees and other large debris in the water that can catch, trap or overturn vessels.

Being impaired while on the water is never tolerated, nor is the transport or consumption of alcohol.

Always be prepared

Your safety is your responsibility. All river passengers must wear a life jacket or personal floatation device (PFDs) on the water. Make sure it fits well and is fastened properly. All river vessels must also have a sounding device such as a whistle, and a buoyant heaving line (throw-bag) no less than 15 metres long.

Always tell someone where you are going and when you expect to return. Arrange drop off and pick up points before you enter on the river. Leave emergency contact phone numbers with someone who can report that you are overdue.

Be aware of river conditions

Although our City rivers may appear calm in some areas, this isn't always the case. The City has tools and resources available to help Calgarians check river conditions before you begin your trip. If river flows are high, especially after a major rainfall, postpone your trip until the flows have returned to safer levels. Keep in mind that flows can change quickly.

EMS: Backvard Play Safety

With summer approaching, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) would like to encourage parents and caregivers to ensure their backyard play areas are made safe for children. Although direct supervision is the best method to reduce the chance of injury, ensure your play equipment in your yard is in good repair and is suitable for the age and skill of the children using it. Check play equipment often; replace or repair any worn or broken parts. Set up play equipment over top a nine inch layer of shock-absorbing material such as sand, wood chips, or pea gravel which extends six feet out in all directions from the play area.

Water hazards


- Drowning contributes to unintentional injury-related death among children ages one to four;
- Children can drown in just a few centimetres of water if it covers their mouth and nose;
- Ensure all backyard swimming pools are fenced. The fence must be at least 1.8 metres (*) high and have a self-latching, self-closing, lockable gate. (*Alberta **Building Code**)

Lawn and garden tools

- · Keep young children away from outdoor power equipment;
- · Serious burns may result from touching hot engine surfaces;
- Ensure that all sharp tools, fuel, chemicals, and other hazardous substances are stored in a secure, locked area. A simple latch may not be sufficient.

Insect bites and stings

- Minimize the risk of attracting insects by not wearing strong perfumes or scented lotions;
- Avoid wearing brightly coloured clothing outdoors;
- Consider destroying or relocating hives and nests situated near your home;
- To avoid injury through inadvertently stepping on a stinging insect always wear footwear outdoors;
- If your child has received an 'EpiPen, Junior' prescription from your physician (for anaphylactic reactions only) ensure they understand when and how to use it;
- If your child experiences a severe reaction to an insect sting, or other environmental cause, seek medical attention, or call 9-1-1.

The scoop on dog poop

With 150 public off-leash areas and over 100,000 dogs in our city, it's clear Calgarians love their canine companions. What isn't to love is the stinky situation left behind when owners don't pick up after their pets.

Cleaning up your dog's waste helps keep our yards, parks and off-leash areas safe and healthy, and is part of being a responsible pet owner.

Here are five facts you may not know about doggy doo-

- 1. It's classified as a hazardous pollutant. It's in the same category as toxic chemicals!
- 2. It's crawling with E. coli and often contains roundworm larvae which, if ingested by humans or dogs, can lead to brain, eye and other organ damage.
- 3. It's not a good fertilizer. Its high nutrient content is toxic to lawns and will create "hot spots" causing the grass to burn and discolour.
- 4. It doesn't absorb into the soil, so the risk of spreading its harmful effects can linger for years!
- 5. It attracts mice, coyotes and other wildlife that consider it a delicious snack.

Keeping our city pet-waste free is easy, if we all do our part. Always carry pet waste bags with you when you walk your dog, and pick up and properly dispose of your pet's waste as soon as possible.

Property Tax Assistance Program

Property Tax Assistance Program: Help is available. The City of Calgary may provide a grant/credit of the increase in residential property taxes from 2015 to 2016.

To be eligible, the applicant must:

- Experience an increase in property taxes from 2015
- · Live in the principal residence for a minimum of one year.
- Own no other property.
- Must meet low income guidelines of the Fair Entry Program. Visit calgary.ca/FairEntry or call 311.
- Provide an acceptable proof of household income for all members 18 years of age and older. Visit calgary.ca/FairEntry or call 311.
- Apply for the grant/credit by Dec. 1, 2016. Visit calgary.ca/FairEntry or call 311.
- Even if you are not eligible for the Property Tax Assistance Program, we may be able to help you access other community resources.

Please note: Even though an application has been made to the Property Tax Assistance Program, all property taxes must be paid in full by the due date, June 30, 2016, to avoid a seven per cent penalty.



Our Daily Brett

Bankview Community

ur Daily Brett is owned by Calgary native, Brett McDermott. Brett has always loved food and planning events. During his undergrad in commerce, Brett worked part-time at restaurants and organized art shows and parties. About five years ago, Brett was engaged to build the catering arm of a local restaurant. When the restaurant had a fire, Brett decided to go out on his own. Brett started out by catering small





events and having a taco stand at summer festivals like Sled Island and Lilac Festival. He also became the private chef to a family, which ultimately led to him starting a meal delivery business, delivering nutritious meals to busy clients. A few years ago, a friend told Brett about the 14 Street Market space in Bankview and from there, the Our Daily Brett storefront concept was born.

Our Daily Brett is a boutique market and catering company located in Calgary's Bankview neighbourhood. The concept behind ODB is to provide good, honest food for people on the go. ODB focuses on grab-andgo food, including breakfast, lunch, snacks, and dinner items. For breakfast, ODB offers two types of "poached egg pots": Korean (think poached eggs, brown rice, house-made kimchi, scallion, sesame oil) and Californian (think poached eggs, brown rice, natural bacon, and avocado) as well as other grab-and-go items (such as granola pots with house-made yogurt and chia puddings with cashew cream). For lunch, ODB rotates between a variety of made-to-order sandwiches from falafel to short rib. All sandwiches are served on fresh bread baked daily by Manuel Latruwe and incorporate house-made condiments like smoked paprika ketchup

and sauerkraut. In addition to its sandwich menu, ODB has a small batch salad bar that is always stocked with flavourful, colourful salads and house-made ferments. Each afternoon from 4pm onwards, ODB stocks its grab-and-go cooler with a feature dinner for the day. The grab-and-go dinner menu is sent to newsletter subscribers weekly and is also available on at ourdailybrett.com. ODB also offers full-service catering and hosts private events around the harvest table in its market.

Youth Employment

In late April I read an article on the CBC's website speaking to the plight of students in Calgary trying to find summer work. I printed this article to share with the different members of my staff and fellow MPs on Parliament Hill. Let me tell you why.

That first job for a student or youth entering the workforce establishes valuable skillsets and experience, and in some cases are the beginnings of a career. This first chance builds confidence and makes a strong impact on their ability to serve their communities and build the society that we all share and enjoy. Providing these opportunities for success is one of our most important responsibilities.

First of all, investing in youth jobs and opportunities is part of our plan to help the middle class and those seeking to join it. Our investments from Budget 2016 will help support young Canadians, including vulnerable youth, Indigenous Canadians, immigrants, youth with disabilities, single parents, those who have not completed high school and others.

We will help create thousands of new green jobs, more summer employment, participation in the Skills Link program and employment in the heritage sector.

We've doubled the Canada Summer Jobs Program (from 35,000 jobs to 70,000 for 2016, 2017, and 2018). This program invests in local non-profits, local government, and small businesses to hire youth over the summer months. Places like the Trinity Foundation, Kerby Centre and the YWCA receive grants for hiring these students. This program has a proven track record - employing some 330,000 students since its inception – and supporting local organizations in their work in the community.

This is part of our \$105 million commitment over five years, starting in 2016–17, and \$25 million per year thereafter in support for youth

Further to this, our government has created the Prime Minister's Youth Advisory Council to provide advice on key issues such as employment and education, building stronger communities as well as climate change and clean growth.
