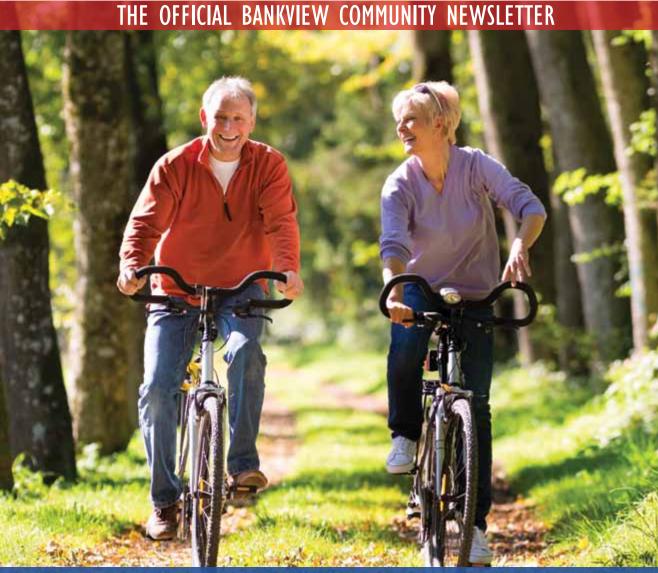
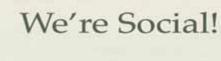

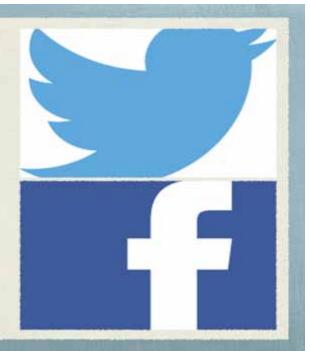

The Course of the Elbow River

Ever wonder where the water in our Elbow River comes from and where it goes? A new map developed by Canadian Geographic Education and the Lake Winnipeg Foundation under the OPEN Water Program answers that question.

The meandering Elbow River is just 120 km long but is part of the vast, million square kilometer, Lake Winnipeg watershed that spans 4 provinces and 4 states. The river and its valley was formed toward the end of the last ice age, some 12,000 years ago.

The source of the Elbow River is the Rae Glacier, so named for Dr. John Rae, a Scottish explorer hired by the Hudson Bay Company to survey 2500 km of arctic coast. In 1847 Rae discovered the fate of the Franklin Expedition, and it was Rae, not Franklin, that found the final link to the North West passage. In 1864 Rae's last main survey was for a route for a telegraph line through the Rockies.

About 600 meters downslope from the glacier, sits the pristine Elbow Lake in the upper Elbow Valley below Elpoca Mountain. Here the Elbow River watershed is 40 km wide, narrowing to 5 km past the Glenmore Dam and just 1 km where it empties into the Bow. The glacier is retreating at a rate of 6 meters per year, but the river is fed by snow melt and storm water; sometimes extreme, like we saw in 2013.

The Elbow's water joins with the Bow River at Fort Calgary, then the Bow joins the Oldman River from the south, just west of Medicine Hat, forming the South Saskatchewan River. The South and North Saskatchewan Rivers merge near St. Albert, Saskatchewan, ultimately flowing into the north eastern region of Lake Winnipeg.

So untreated water moving over inner-city Calgary roads and properties, can reach Lake Winnipeg, more than 1,800 kilometres away, in as little as two to three weeks. After that it moves north, ultimately mixing with the salt water of Hudson Bay.

Lake Winnipeg is the 10th largest freshwater lake in the world. Threatened by the waste of millions of people, agriculture and industry in the watershed, symptoms of the lake's ill heath are toxic algae blooms, invasive species, impacts on the fishery, beach closures, drinking water advisories and so on. Hands-on citizen science and education initiatives like this new map, supplement research and efforts to clean up the lake.

Calgary Humane Society **Dental Care**

Happy August! We hope you are enjoying a great summer with your two and four-legged family! At Calgary Humane Society we are enjoying a busy season of summer camps. Our annual August adoption event is also just around the corner and we hope you will all come out to celebrate with

For many families, summer includes a trip to the dentist to take care of everyone's pearly whites. Dental care is vital for humans, but did you know that pets need dental care too? Each and every year we see dozens of animals at the shelter suffering from dental problems, problems that can result in health issues for the pet and legal problems for the people! Failing to provide dental care to your pet is considered a form of neglect under the Alberta Animal Protection Act and bad teeth can cause unnecessary pain for Fido. Interested in learning more about dental care for your pet? Read on!

Do all pets need dental care?

If your pet has teeth then dental care is an important contributor to overall health! Dogs, cats, rabbits, guinea pigs and even small critters like hamsters and gerbils should have their pearly white inspected regularly as a part of an overall health check-up by their veterinarian.

What are some of the common pet dental procedures?

For dogs and cats the most common dental need is tartar removal and tooth cleaning, much like what you would have done at your own dentist. Extractions are another common dental procedure in pets. Just like humans, cats and dogs can suffer from cavities and gingivitis and if these problems continue unchecked the teeth will need to be removed.

Rabbits and rodents have more complex dental needs. These critters have teeth that grow continuously for their entire lives. Most of the time your rabbit or rodent will do a great job of wearing down their teeth by chewing and eating rough foods, but sometimes they need a bit of help. An exotics veterinarian will regularly check your pets teeth and can trim or file the teeth if necessary.

What is the cost of dental care for pets?

Just as with humans, the cost for dental care for your pet will depend on the condition of your pet's teeth and the pricing your vet sets for each procedure. We recommend booking a consultation with your vet to discuss your pet's specific dental needs.

What can I do at home to keep my pet's teeth healthy?

Providing an appropriate diet and opportunities for chewing is an important part of maintaining dental health in all animals. Choose toys that are the right size for your pet and made specifically for chewing as some items (like tennis balls) can damage your pet's teeth if chewed.

For additional suggestions we recommend speaking with your pet's vet. Your vet is familiar with your pet's

specific needs and will be able to help you develop an oral care plan.

Can I use human toothpaste for my pets?

Human toothpaste should never be used for pets as it contains some ingredients that can be harmful if swallowed by your pet. If your vet has recommended brushing your pet's teeth, you should invest in a good quality pet toothpaste.

What are the main benefits of dental care?

Providing good quality dental care is an important part of health and wellness for pets. Investing in routine dental care sets your pet up for a long and healthy life, and it will also keep Fido's breath smelling great on those long summer car trips!

Healthy Eating at the Right Price!

The Good Food Box Program in Bankview

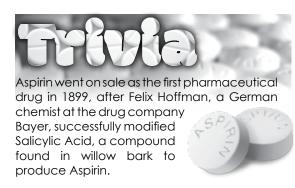
Each month the Bankview Community Association is pleased to work with our partners at the Calgary Housing Authority's Villa Blanca and our community social worker, to host a community depot for the Community Kitchen's Good Food Box (GFB) program.

What is the Good Food Box you ask? The Good Food Box is a convenient way to access top-quality, fresh food that is affordable, fosters community development, and promotes healthy eating.

As a Community Kitchen Program of Calgary program, the GFB gives all residents of Bankview an opportunity to purchase fresh fruits and vegetables at a very low cost. The program provides sustainable access to nutritious food.

Each month, the Bankview CA hosts an order evening from 6 - 8 p.m. at Villa Blanca (1451 - 21 Avenue SW), the site of our community depot. There, you can order your box - CASH ONLY for the time being - and then the following week, the boxes are delivered.

When you place an order, we take your contact information and provide you a receipt used to claim your box on delivery. Customers pay \$25, \$30, or \$35 for a box, depending on the size that best meets their needs. Every box contains the same mixture of food, though the contents change with each delivery.



Box Options

Small box: \$25 (20 - 25lbs*) Medium box: \$30 (30 - 35lbs*) Large box: \$35 (40 - 45lbs*)

*These weights are an approximate. Weight varies depending on produce size and density.

The GFB operates by buying fresh top quality produce directly from farmers and from wholesale clubs. The food is bought in bulk and dropped off at the Community Kitchen warehouse where volunteers then divide up the produce into portions. Once the boxes are put together, the Bankview Community Association volunteers host the depot where you order and pick up your box each month. Rest assured that every month the boxes contain the maximum produce possible in them for the price!

Here in Bankview, we're pleased to provide this great opportunity for access to accessible produce as everyone - no matter your income level - deserves to eat healthy without breaking your budget!

CULINARY FILE:

Feta Turkey Burgers with Sautéed Red Pepper and Onions

Turkey Burgers have become a family staple over the past couple of years. This recipe was originally my husband's creation that has since evolved into this quick and easy meal. Not only is this super quick but they always make for a delicious healthy meal which makes this recipe perfect for both a weeknight family meal or a weekend BBQ with friends. To make these burgers I recommend you start with your favourite fresh whole wheat bun. Follow the recipes for the feta turkey burger patties and sautéed red pepper and onion topping listed below. I find that fresh arugula adds a nice peppery flavour but any green will compliment these turkey burgers well. I love to serve these with a yummy summer salad on the side to keep it light and fresh.

Feta Turkey Burger Patties

Ingredients:
1 package of ground turkey
1/4 cup of feta cheese
1 tsp dried oregano
freshly ground pepper to taste
Directions:

1. In a medium bowl, combine all ingredients. Divide into 4 equal parts and form into patties. If time allows

- let the patties rest in the fridge for an hour prior to cooking.
- 2. Cook the patties on a medium grill. Cooking time can vary but is typically around 20 minutes. Check the internal temperature is at least 165 °F to ensure the patties are fully cooked.
- 3. Serve on a fresh bun, top with the red pepper onion topping and fresh arugula.

Sautéed Red Pepper & Onion Topping

Ingredients:

1/2 red pepper thinly sliced 1/4 white onion thinly sliced 1 tbsp. canola oil sprinkle of Montreal Steak spice

Directions:

- 1. Put red peppers, onions, canola oil and Montreal steak spice together in a pan. Cook on a medium heat until soft, around 5 minutes.
- 2. Place on top of your grilled feta turkey burger.

Enjoy these with family and friends during this fabulous barbeque season!

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In 6 Minutes Or Less

I can barely count the times when I'm walking downtown or on 17th Ave and I hear the unmistakable sirens of The Calgary Fire Department (CFD). Those sirens which are so familiar to just about any inner city resident are a constant reminder of how hard our Fire Department work. However, the CFD doesn't just deal with fires; they have made incredible strides towards making Ward 8 communities safer. There are a few major incident types that they deal with, including general public service assistance calls, hazardous conditions caused by weather, rescues, medical assists, and of course fires.

The most prominent non-fire calls that the CFD receive are medical assists, which have been of increasing importance for the CFD as they help our local EMS with calls. Surprisingly, the incident rate has gone up 27% in Ward 8 since 2011. As a result, the CFD has been piloting dedicated Medical Response Units (MRUs) throughout the city, which have made responses to medical assist calls much more effective.

One thing you may not know about the CFD is that there are important policy decisions that provide them with goals. Calgary's Action Plan 2015-2018 establishes Service Levels and Response Times Targets (SLRTT) for different types of emergencies and incidents. There are two main categories for emergencies, Effective Response Force (ERF) emergencies, and non-ERF emergencies. The difference between the two is that ERF emergencies involve structural or building fires and require a minimum of 12 firefighters and other priority resources.

For non-ERF emergencies, the goal as per the SLRTT is 90% of first responders arriving in less than 7 minutes, which the CFD easily surpassed in Ward 8. In 2015, 90% of responses happened in 6:32 or less. That's a full 28 seconds before the benchmark, and is pretty impressive considering Ward 8's density and traffic. For ERF emergencies, the goal is for a full ERF to arrive in less than 11 minutes 90% of the time. Unsurprisingly, the CFD succeeded and had 90% of responses in 10:10 or less during 2015.

The CFD is an example of when policy and implementation align to create positive outcomes for Calgarians. It's obvious that this department shows incredible dedication and creates tangible results, something that they can and should be recognized for. So, the next time that you're downtown and hear the familiar blare of a siren, know that while it might annoy you for a few seconds, our heroic firefighters are using those seconds to make a difference in every Calgarians life.

It will take some time for the changes to happen, but I for one am pleased that we are finally modernizing the way we teach our children.

Since getting elected I have spent a fair amount of time getting to know school trustees, principals, teachers and parent groups. Through these people and groups I am able to be connected with a whole assortment of unique and creative ways our schools contribute to the vibrant fabric of Calgary Currie.

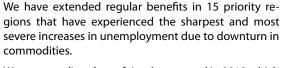
