





HOME GARDENING WITH BARBARA



Planting Spring Bulbs

plant them in pots in the house about 6 weeks before stalks and can be most charming in pots on the patio. last frost date (June 1 in Calgary, plus or minus 2 weeks, depending upon Mother Nature's whimsy each year) or directly into the garden a week or two before that unreliable date. If you are a thrifty gardener, you will bring these bulbs inside (basement or heated garage) before they freeze in the fall, to be stored for enjoyment the next year. If that isn't your thing, treat them as annuals and buy new each year.

from tiny Mignons to enormous Giants (think "Dinner Plate"). They start at white and continue all through the The first two are best treated as annuals in our climate, warm shades of yellow, red, orange, and so on. Breeders but you can store tubers for next year. have been successful in producing extravagant varieties that look like a crazy painter has been at work on each bloom. The taller ones will need staking as they become top heavy later in the summer and I don't need to tell you what our July storms can do. Smaller bushier ones need nothing more than sunshine and lots of water (dahlias are thirsty). Native to Mexico, the dahlia is not a true bulb, but has a tuberous root which multiplies and grows through the summer. You must dig this up before it has a chance to freeze, dry it, and store in sand, vermiculite or peat moss over the winter.

As I write this in February for your reading pleasure in Gladiola corms may be planted directly into the garden March, I think ahead to preparation for spring, even or started indoors a few weeks early. The second most though our gardens are still snow covered. If you have popular cut flower (second only to roses) they belong empty spaces in your flower garden or large pots wait- at the back of the flower bed where their tall spikes can ing for something showy, why not consider tender be appreciated over their neighbours. Begonias have a roundish tuber, and present a dramatic display of colour for weeks and weeks, most effective in pots and hanging displays. If you are buying them for the first time, be aware that size really does matter with begonia tubers, the bigger ones producing the most numerous and voluptuous blooms. This is one plant that doesn't need full sun to be happy and will produce a lovely display on a partially shaded deck or Dahlias offer a dazzling range of size and colour ranging patio. Note: begonias come with fibrous roots, rhizomes and tubers, so be sure you know what you are buying.

> Canna and Calla Lilies are also becoming more popular in our gardens as newer hybrids are developed. These are often grown to spectacular effect in large pots, shared with lower growing annuals. Like all the others in this article, the rhizomes should be dug up and stored over the winter, as they are also native to the tropics.

> If you are looking for some new and dramatic colour in your garden, check out spring bulbs. Some are already in the garden centres.


could not showcase all of the ideas we've been working on but what follows is a selection of the stops that we chose to highlight along the walk.

14 Street Crosswalks

The stretch of 14 st through Bankview is currently missing crosswalks. By that we mean, marked crossing are don't exist at many of the cross streets between Bankview and Mount Royal. Animating Abandoned Spaces

Bankview Histories: THE BANKVIEW FOOD STORE

1830, 17 Street, S.W. (demolished)

Almost from its very inception Bankview has been host to numerous small business enterprises, including food services, mostly concentrated along its perimeters on both 14 Street and 17 Avenue. Very few, however, have ever been located internally within the Community itself, and of these only two have been primarily grocery and confectionery, as opposed to variety, outlets. This historic general store was the second, and is now the only survivor of the two*, although it may have undergone major structural renovation during a period of vacancy in the early 1920s.

The business was first opened here about 1911 by Albert Herbert DeMara, who lived in the flat above. DeMara stayed about four or five years and the place has been known since his departure by many names during its long career of service to local residents. Its most notable proprietors have included Edward T. "Eddie" Waddell (who called it "Waddell's Grocery"), James Grant, Herbert J. Wiggins, Mrs. Bessie Worsnop, Edward and Eileen McIntvre (as "McIntvre's Grocery"). Derek and Bernadette Leigh, Bill and Tilly Reder ("B and T Grocery"), and Yen and Yuen Seto ("Seto's").

It became the Bankview Food Store when Liu Lirong took over in the late 1980s, which title it has retained ever since, (although known still more familiarly and popularly to neighbourhood children as the "Big Blue Store" or the "7-Up Store", the latter moniker stemming from a sign it has customarily sported). In 1995 it was much refurbished and restored by new owners Brendan and Gwen O'Toole, recent arrivals from Ireland, who quickly settled into the Community, making their home, like so many of their predecessors, on the premises.

From DeMara to the O'Tooles, many of these successive owners and operators occupied the space above, and later the attachment at the rear, as living quarters. Those who did not usually rented out the apartment (or in later years, apartments) to one or more tenants whilst living elsewhere. Over its nine-decade-plus history, more than a dozen other persons have therefore resided here as well, although the upper floor has also at times remained vacant.

Steeped in folklore, the shop across the years has become a recognisable fixture, a symbol and landmark which has even been immortalised from time to time in paintings by artists attracted to its unique ambiance. The high "Boomtown Front" style of facade, declining progressively lower in height as it recedes further back, is typical of this type of establishment from the era in question and was designed to promote the illusion of a taller, more spacious structure.

Here is how the program works:


- purchase a \$25 saddle library card from BikeBike

- Simple!



I just spent \$50,000 to finish my basement with high-end finishings. Now, I'm listing my house for sale, and my real estate representative says she can't include the basement square footage in the total size. Why not?

You developed your basement and it's beautiful. You're sure any potential buyer would agree that it looks great, and is definitely livable space. But, your real estate professional is correct, the square footage of your basement cannot be included in the size of your home for listing purposes.

In Alberta, real estate professionals are required to follow the Residential Measurement Standard (RMS) when listing a residential property for sale. The RMS contains nine principles that enable real estate professionals, as well as buyers and sellers, to determine and compare the size of residential properties. The RMS sets out the specific parts of a residential property that can be included in its size for listing purposes.

Above grade levels are the levels of a residence that are entirely above grade. Below grade levels are the floor levels of a residence that are partly or fully below grade. If any portion of a level is below grade, the entire level is considered below grade. Below grade spaces include lower levels and basements. The RMS size of a property is, essentially, the sum of its above grade levels. Below grade levels are not included in the RMS area.

Without the RMS in place, there would be little consistency in how real estate professionals, and their sellers, measure and describe their property. Some may want to include their basement (unfinished or not), some may include an enclosed sunroom, while others may include the space created by a bow or bay window.

The RMS provides a consistent means of measuring, and describing, residential property size in Alberta.

Sellers, and their real estate representatives, are welcome to include additional measurement information in their listings, but the primary size listed in the listing must be the size according to the RMS.

Sellers need to remember that size isn't the only factor that will affect a property's list or selling price. Other factors include location, condition, quality of finishing, layout, and even type of ownership. You may not be able to include the square footage of your basement in the total square footage of your home, but the features of your home will set it apart from other properties. Size matters, but it's not the only thing that matters.

File your tax return to get the carbon levy rebate



Albertans who file their 2015 tax return and meet income criteria will start receiving the carbon levy rebate in January 2017.

If you are a single Albertan whose net income is below \$47,500 or a couple or family whose net income is below \$95,000, you will receive a full rebate. The rebate begins to phase out above these amounts, but singles earning less than \$51,250 and a family with two children earning less than \$101,500 will receive a partial rebate.

In 2017, the full rebate will be \$200 for singles, \$300 for couples and \$360 for a couple with two children (\$30 per child up to a maximum of four children). Rebates will provide upfront, timely support to lower- and middle-income Albertans to help manage increased costs associated with the carbon levy.



If you take some simple steps to reduce household emissions, such as shortening shower time, using a programmable thermostat, carpooling or not idling your vehicle, you will be helping to reduce Alberta's greenhouse gas emissions while ensuring you make the most of your rebate.

If you haven't already, be sure to file your 2015 tax return as soon as possible to help ensure that you receive your carbon levy rebate in early January 2017. For more details visit alberta.ca/climate-carbon-pricing.aspx.



Giving People a Voice in **Mental Health** Research

The Mental Health Commission of Canada reports that in a given year, one in five people in Canada experiences a mental health problem or illness. In Alberta, that's more than 675,000 people.

Researchers and clinicians in the province recognize the need to learn more about mental health, but realize most research topics are chosen by the researcher, not the people living with mental illness. A new study partly funded by Alberta Innovates (previously Alberta Innovates – Health Solutions) is changing that. This fall, the Alberta Depression Research Priority Setting Project surveyed people who have experienced depression, as well as their clinicians and caregivers, to pinpoint gaps in current research.

"Someone with lived experience will likely have a different perspective than someone doing the research," explains Robbie Babins-Wagner, PhD, a professor at the University of Calgary Faculty of Social Work and a member of the project's advisory group.

Researchers are analyzing the survey answers to better understand the needs of people who experience depression. And what they find will shape research to help meet their needs. "This will allow the voice of people living with and caring for mental illness to influence research projects," adds Babins-Wagner.

Internal and external parasites can infect our pets in Calgary, but traditionally because of Calgary's elevation, dry climate, and extreme winters the risks of infection were low. This is changing with our changing weather; Calgary had incredibly mild winters in 2014-15 and 2015-16, and we've had some uncharacteristically wet summers. It's time to review your pet's annual anti-parasitic regime. The absolute minimum recommended by veterinary professional associations is an annual fecal examination, but this is adequate only for a strictly indoor pet. It is also imperative you examine your pet's lifestyle and travel plans to determine his or her individual needs. Remember recommendations last year may not be the same this year and a few of the parasites invading our region can have devastating consequences to your pet's human.

As far as external parasites go fleas are a rarity in Calgary appearing mostly on pets travelling here from other regions, but the number of cases of lice and ticks is increasing. Ticks are usually seen April to October in Alberta, but studies reveal ticks can become active seeking a host at 4 degrees centigrade. All ticks received by veterinarians are submitted to Alberta Tick Surveillance project to determine species and if they are carrying secondary diseases, such as Lyme disease. Lyme disease is carried by the black-legged tick. That tick is rare in Alberta but may be carried in by a migratory bird. I recently saw a tick carrying Lyme disease on a dog that had travelled out of province. Dogs running through fields and around water bodies are most at risk. Dogs rarely become clinically ill if the Lyme disease or Borrelia burgdorferia pathogen is in the tick; but if the tick moves onto a human host, Lyme disease can be life-altering to the person acquiring it. Lyme disease is considered endemic to parts of B.C. and east of Winnipeg. Previously our clinic recommended tick and

louse protection if lifestyle and travel dictated it. We now recommend preventative products for external parasites for all dogs and cats that go outdoors starting in March.

Heartworm disease is not yet in mosquito populations in Alberta, but provincial and national bodies monitor the situation to keep veterinarians informed. As with tick and louse prevention, monthly protection is easier than finding out what areas have the parasite if you travel with your pet. All outdoor pets should be routinely protected against internal parasites now. Veterinary clinics see roundworm, tapeworm, and hookworm on a regular basis in their patients. Every annual examination of your pet should include a discussion of the risk level of your pet.

West Nile Virus is in Alberta mosquito populations but dogs and cats do not tend to become clinically ill. This disease affects birds, horses and people. Use repellents during mosquito season.

A type of microscopic tapeworm known as Echinococcus multilocularis has invaded the coyote populations around Edmonton and Calgary and in Nose Hill Park. The lifecycle of this tapeworm carries it between the wild carnivores, such as fox and covotes, and the rodent populations. If a dog or cat picked up this parasite from a rodent they ingested, they may show no symptoms. A person inadvertently contracting this parasite from a pet is an atypical host and the alveolar form of infection in humans which can be difficult to diagnose and serious. Calgary has seen a case of a dog that frequented Nose Hill Park that ate the feces of covotes. This dog developed a massive lifethreatening hydatid cyst on its liver from the tapeworm. The mass on the liver cannot be differentiated from a liver tumor without advanced diagnostics. Regularly deworm any pet known to catch rodents or eat the feces of other canids. Praziguantel is the most effective and not in most of the preventative products give routinely to pets.

We have become a population of people and pets that travel and move all over this continent and world. Contact your veterinarian for advice about the parasites that can infect your pets, and initiate prophylactic prevention as required. Also, be conscious of the changing weather in our own backyard increases our risk as we invite our furry family members onto the couch, into the kitchen, and onto our beds. Prevention is easy but treatment is often not as simple. Also, make sure your vet knows if you have both dogs and cats, some dog products are toxic to cats.

Looking back at Budget 2016 and forward to 2017

Our government focused on investing in the middle class and working towards a more innovative economy. By directly investing in Canadians and families we are putting our country in better stead with firmer foot forward into the future.

At the tail end of 2016 our government approved two major pipelines after consulting with Canadians, building up an environmental consensus with the carbon price, and creating the balance between the environment and industry. By doing this work we are building the framework to create long term prosperity of Alberta and all of Canada.

On the subject of building up long term prosperity for our country - my colleague in cabinet and fellow Alberta Liberal Member of Parliament, Infrastructure Minister Amarieet Sohi, is continuing his work to invest in projects like the Green Line LRT, flood mitigation projects, and more for our city. Since the 2015 election our government has invested some \$3 billion into Albertan infrastructure: more than the last five years of the previous government combined.

Looking back at Budget 2016 we went forward with three of our main platform planks. First amongst them was the Canada Child Benefit which gave simpler, taxfree, and more generous and better targeted help to families, 9 out of 10 Canadians families benefit from higher payments under our newly implemented system - and is now on the way to lifting hundreds of thousands of children out of poverty.

Our second commitment was a middle class tax cut. As one of our first acts as a government was to cut taxes for nearly 9 million Canadians by reducing the second personal income tax rate, and delivering tax relief to Albertans.

Thirdly – we created a \$2.7 billion reform package of Employment Insurance to support Albertans and Canadians during the commodity price downturn. By reducing wait-times (from two weeks to one week), and specifically work with Albertans on accessing more benefits, these changes would support those impacted by the decrease in oil prices. Some of these benefits we extended benefits up to 50 weeks for hurting Albertans, with long-tenured workers able to receive an additional 20 weeks up to a maximum of 70 weeks. Further to this - we doubled the maximum of the work-sharing agreements to 76 weeks.

Budget 2017 will be a continuation of our work as a government. We are actively seized with supporting the middle class and working towards a better future for all. More details will be available at budget.gc.ca.

contact me about the Climate Leadership Plan. As you probably are aware, putting together this plan and the carbon levy has delivered two new pipeline approvals. Prices for the basics like food and gas have not spiked as some falsely claimed. And, the plan is providing Albertans with innovative opportunities to diversify our economy while also investing in ways to help lower your power bills. A \$36 million, two-year rebate program is helping families, business, and nonprofits install rooftop solar panels. This program is expected to create 900 jobs and reduce solar installation costs by up to 30% for homes and 25% for businesses.

Making your lives more affordable is one of the key aspects of our consumer protection agenda. This work began with addressing the outrageous fees attached to payday loans last fall, and continued with the banning of door-to-door energy sales this past January. The next phase of consumer protection is a new engagement process on builder licensing. This will engage Albertans in how we can develop a builder licensing program for Alberta's residential construction and renovation industry. The goal is ultimately to give Albertans peace of mind that their home has being built to a safe standard.

Making life more affordable obviously starts with helping parents raise strong families and ensuring children have every opportunity to succeed. Alberta's new Child Benefit is helping parents and reducing child poverty, and payments for eligible families with children just went out in February. David Eggen, the Minister of Education, has also announced a new Minister's Youth Council to get feedback and ideas from students from across Alberta on education issues. If you are junior or high school student in one of Calgary Currie's fine schools, you can apply here - education.alberta.ca/myc - before 5 May 2017.
