The goal of this program is to help older adults maintain physical function, mobility, strength and balance. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Hello to Everyone.

At the Community's Annual Meeting on January 17, a new Board of Directors was approved. That change allowed me to become President, Philip Schuman became Vice-President, Joan Byers returned to her duties as Board Secretary. We are interviewing for the position of Treasurer and may have the position filled by the next report in April's Bulletin.

I am glad to represent Braeside within Calgary as a great community for us to have our homes. Within the community, we have a stable population and a good mixture of multi-family and single family residences. At the Community Centre, we have a popular and full child care facility. There is a full size hockey rink and a second recreational rink. Within Braeside, we have two medium size shopping centres where we can access a major drug store, two major banks, many choices of eating away from home, and many other services. Please support them as you can. Our access to transit is good using main routes 79 and 80 providing connections to the LRT. Outside our boundaries, we can access two major parks at Fish Creek and Glenmore Reservoir. The Co-op Shopping Centre serves us well for groceries, a third bank, and medical services. The Southland Leisure Centre offers many recreational opportunities.

Your Board has found that we need to keep our community better informed of City planning within our community that can affect us. Examples of applications range from home based business to secondary suites. To accomplish this, I have invited a community member to become our Director of Planning to gather civic information and communicate to all of us. Close by in Oakridge a change is happening at the Co-Op Centre and you can read this at http://oakridgecrossingyyc.ca/.

We encourage you to use the City's 311 service if you have any concerns about residents and business not following community standards. A present example is a lack of snow removal on sidewalks. To find what is meant by community standards, Google 'Calgary Community Standards'.

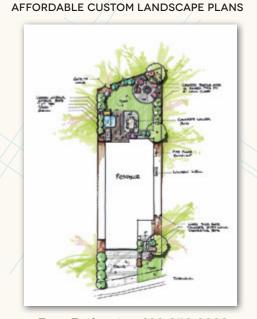

IN & AROUND

EMS – Burns and Scalds

Alberta Health Services, EMS continue to respond to emergencies each year where a young child has sustained severe burns or scalds. These incidents often occur inside the child's own home. Common causes include a child accidentally tipping hot liquids onto themselves, touching hot surfaces (stoves), or making contact with electrical outlets. Fortunately, incidents such as these can be avoided by taking preventative measures.

Degrees of burn

- 1°: Affects only the top layers of the skin; appears red like a sun burn; discomfort is generally tolerable;
- 2°: Deeper and much more painful than 1°burns; broken skin or blisters commonly develop;
- 3°: Severe: the deepest layers of skin and tissue are injured; may appear charred or leathery.

First Aid for burns

- Skin may continue to burn if not aggressively cooled. Immediately douse burns with large amounts of cold water.
- Cover the burn with a sterile dressing, or at least clean material to protect infection:
- Over the counter medications may be used for pain. Adhere to directions given on the label;
- Seek further medical attention, as required.

Prevention of burns

- · Check the temperature of your hot water tank. Temperatures as high as 60°C / 140°F will scald a child in just seconds;
- Use placemats instead of tablecloths. Tablecloths can be yanked downward causing hot drinks, or food to spill on a child;
- Turn pot handles to the back of the stove and ensure cords from kettles, slow cookers, and other electrical appliances cannot be reached;
- · Avoid picking up a child while holding any hot liquids;
- Ensure electrical outlets are made secure by installing commercially available safety devices which prohibit
- Keep children away from areas where appliances are in use (kettles, irons, hot stoves).

If you require immediate medical attention, call 9-1-1

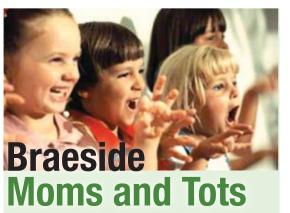

Is Our Investment in Daylight a Rip-off?

Daylight saving time is a bit of a contentious topic in some circles. It is always a bit of a pain to reset the stove or coffee maker and if you have kids it's a new bedtime routine struggle all over again, twice a year. Likely no one has avoided a schedule mix-up or a tardy appearance due to this bi-annual occurrence, but the advent of the smart phone and other smart home technologies, which change the hour difference automatically, has perhaps alleviated many of those spring and autumn woes for the most part.

On its face the purpose of daylight saving time (DST) is to give us more light and time in the day to get things done; human beings tend to operate better during daylight hours and certainly many appreciate the opportunity to take in a little more vitamin D, particularly during our long Canadian winters. But the origins of DST are actually a little more pragmatic than simply avoiding seasonal affective disorder.

Benjamin Franklin first suggested the concept in 1748 and found it was met with little enthusiasm at the time. but a couple hundred years later, during WWI, the concept was popularized among Germans to save precious coal during that age of austerity. The concept guickly caught on and made it to some Canadian cities as early as 1916, though there has never been a consensus on whether the practice is useful or not, and Saskatchewan has never been on board.

The ever-efficient Germans introduced DST to reduce fuel cost. The gain or loss, respectively, of that hour was intended to lower use of artificial lighting and heating in the evening, but it's debatable how much was saved, as more was often needed in the morning anyway. A little over a century later the reports of heart attacks, road related accidents, and even spikes in suicide rates following DST have not made much of an argument for the century-old tradition, and the amount of light many Canadians see the next day can be negligible.

It would seem there is little in the way of reason to explain this circadian rhythm disruptor to the average person in 2017, but most Canadians will dutifully set their clocks forward on March 12th this month, like it or not.

Dear Constituents:

As we enter spring, the spring session of the 29th Legislature of Alberta opens March 02, 2017 with the Speech from the Throne at 3PM. It will be the beginning of setting new goals and direction to drive our province forward and serve the best interests of Albertans. I feel honoured and privileged to represent the exemplary constituents of Calgary-Glenmore who leave no stone unturned to demonstrate tremendous leadership and stewardship.

Coal Transition: Coal plants are a major source of air pollution, releasing pollutants like:

- cadmium
- lead
- mercurv
- nitrogen oxides
- sulphur dioxide
- This has an effect on the health of Albertans. Poor air quality has been linked to a number of health conditions, including: asthma, chronic bronchitis, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, heart disease, stroke and diabetes.
- In 2012, the Government of Canada quantified the benefits of transitioning from coal-fired generation to natural gas or carbon capture and storage. These benefits included health benefits, primarily from reduced smog exposure.
- · Alberta's action on phasing out emissions from coalfired generation by 2030 is expected to have similar benefits.
- A recently released a report in collaboration with a group of health organizations representing health professionals and patient groups – estimate benefits based on federal methodology. For more information: http://www.pembina.org/pub/out-with-coal.

The Costs of Clean Coal:

• When applied to coal-fired generation, carbon capture and storage (CCS) technology has been demonstrated to reduce carbon dioxide emissions. However, CCS applied to coal plants is rare around the world because low carbon alternatives to generate electricity are readily available and are more economic, like natural gas generation and renewable energy technologies.

- Because of the costs, a high subsidy to industry is typically required to retrofit coal units with CCS technolo-
- Alberta's Climate Leadership Plan called for zero pollution from coal-fired generating units by 2030. There are currently no CCS technologies that can achieve this goal.

Support for Communities:

- An advisory Panel on Coal Communities (APCC) has been formed - to ensure workers and community members are consulted and heard, and to understand their challenges and ideas for the long-term economic sustainability of their communities.
- The province will work with industry, along with the Government of Canada and communities, to understand options for the future, including new natural gas generation facilities, coal to gas conversions, hydroelectricity, renewable energy opportunities, and other forms of economic development.

Coal Mines

- Alberta's coal phase out only addresses emissions from coal-fired power stations, and does not contain any policy stance on coal mining within the province.
- · Any metallurgical coal mines that export their coal outside of Alberta for steel making and other purposes will be unaffected by the phase out of coal-fired emis-

Changes to Calgary's Alarm Bylaw

The Calgary Police Service and The City of Calgary have revised the current Alarm Services Bylaw, changing how officers are dispatched and introducing paid, annual alarm permitting.

As of Sunday, Jan. 1, 2017, you'll need an alarm permit in order for police to attend your location for an alarm call. Annual permitting ensures we have the most upto-date and accurate information about your location and can attend in a timely manner. Permits are \$15 for residences and \$20 for businesses, and are subject to an annual renewal. For any existing permit holders renewals will begin in July 2017. Premise owners will be contacted two months before their permit needs to be renewed and new permit holders will pay when they apply for a permit.

This spring, the false alarm penalty fee structure will also change. More than 75 per cent of alarm users only have one false alarm each year; CPS used to charge \$75 for each false alarm. With the new fee structure, the first false alarm is free. The second false alarm will be \$75, with an escalating scale for additional alarms to a maximum of \$625 for 10 or more alarms in any 12-month period. This is intended to hold alarm systems users more accountable to properly manage their systems.

Police are making these changes to reduce the amount of false alarms we respond to each day. Before initial changes to dispatch criteria were made, police were responding to approximately 45 alarm calls every day; 96 per cent of those calls were false alarms.

In May 2016, Calgary police changed the requirements so that two or more alarm zones within a location need to be activated and that at least two key holders must be called by the alarm company prior to police being dispatched. These changes alone have reduced the number of dispatched alarm calls by 54 per cent, better ensuring that police resources are available to respond to priority calls.

It is important to note that police will continue to respond to any panic, duress, or hold up alarms, confirmed criminal activity, public safety concerns, and verified alarm activations.

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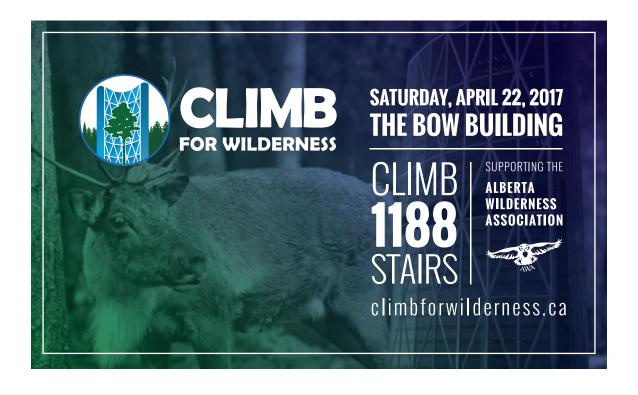
