

# Happy 110<sup>th</sup> Birthday **Killarney Glengarry**

In this series we've talked about the boom years at the turn of the twentieth century and the dark days of World War I. The twenties brought hope, flapper dresses, short hair and shorter skirts for women when the 'Roaring Twenties' were in full swing. Life was good with wealth and excess until that fateful day on Black Thursday, October 29, 1929 when the stock market collapsed. This was the New York Stock Exchange's most serious blow since its inception on March 8, 1817.

It affected all the western nations for the next 10 years as the Great Depression. It was hell for everyone. The Canadian Prairies turned into a 'dust bowl' as the



finest virgin top soil on the planet blew away on wretched winds up to a 100 kms/hr and reduced visibility to 1 metre (3.3' or less).



Monthly 'relief rates' varied from \$60/ month in Calgary to \$19/month in Halifax for a family of five. Hopelessness stuck to the backs throats on a dusty

day. Worn out farm equipment was half buried along fence lines covered with mountains of tumbleweed. Anyone who could get a crop off faced collapsed prices.

In Killarnev the teams baseball and the Booster Club kept people's spirits The up. and Glengarry Killarney Ratepayers Association (the forerunner to



the Killarney Glengarry Community Association) did all

they could to help each other through the dark days of the Dirty Thirties. People fed each other at their backdoors - people worked hard to not let anyone go hungry - neighbours were crucial to helping each other survive.

And then something happened - it was subtle - no one realized what was really happening. Hitler's ideas were being heard. At first, no one could believe their ears and then when it became obvious what was happening to the Jews, Western Leaders had to make serious choices about going to war. Suddenly there was an energy that people could feel in their bones - the world was at risk - people coalesced around the idea that 'the western way of life needed to be defended'. Young men guickly signed up to go to war. People who were rejected because of health issues or those who were designated as needed for 'food production' felt left out.

It was a time of great opportunity for women, Belle Watt (1906 - 2002) who lived at 2404 - 26 St SW for many years told me that in 1939 she had five children, her husband was gone by then and she got a job as a crane operator. She loved the job - she could do it very well and the money went a long way to support her family. Women doing men's jobs were called Rosie the Riveters and they took their jobs very seriously. They worked darned hard and loved the opportunities.

But then in 1945 when the men came home from war, the women, who ran the country in their absence, were sent home so that men could have their



me, most of the men who served in Europe were emotionally shattered after horrific mental and physical experiences. Governments were very anxious that these, mostly, young men would resettle by falling in love, get married, build a home and raise a family - essentially to make a normal Canadian life. To get them started, fifty foot lots in Glengarry and Killarney sold for \$45.00 and not the \$1,250 asking price in 1913.

Suddenly the sleepy communities of Glengarry and Killarney were a hive of activity. Houses were built as pay cheques allowed. Building materials were bought on paydays, then stashed and used from pay cheque to pay cheque. Basements became homes and first floors were added over time making bedrooms as more babies came along. Kitchens upstairs were added last.

To complete the community, the streetcar was built along 17 Ave down 29 St and back downtown. New schools were built and the Community Hall, which was the old St Matthew's Church which was moved to its present location in 1914 was expanded to accommodate the growing neighbourhood.

Glengarry and Killarney have been in transition for more than a century. 2016 marks our 110th anniversary - imagine that! We are only guardians of the land for successive generations - we inherited it from those who came before us.

Drink a toast to Killarney and Glengarry for their patience and resilience 110 years ago and thank the people who planted our urban forest that we love today. Thank you City of Calgary and Killarney and Glengarry pioneers!

# **Backyard Play Safety**

With summer approaching, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) would like to encourage parents and caregivers to ensure their backyard play areas are made safe for children. Although direct supervision is the best method to reduce the chance of injury, ensure your play equipment in your yard is in good repair and is suitable for the age and skill of the children using it. Check play equipment often; replace or repair any worn or broken parts. Set up play equipment over top a nine inch layer of shock-absorbing material such as sand, wood chips, or pea gravel which extends six feet out in all directions from the play area.

### Water hazards

- Drowning contributes to unintentional injury-related death among children ages one to four;
- Children can drown in just a few centimetres of water if it covers their mouth and nose;

• Ensure all backyard swimming pools are fenced. The fence must be at least 1.8 metres (\*) high and have a self-latching, self-closing, lockable gate. (\*Alberta Building Code)

### Lawn and garden tools

Keep young children away from outdoor power equipment;
Serious burns may result from touching hot engine surfaces;

• Ensure that all sharp tools, fuel, chemicals, and other hazardous substances are stored in a secure, locked area. A simple latch may not be sufficient.

### Insect bites and stings

• Minimize the risk of attracting insects by not wearing strong perfumes or scented lotions;

Avoid wearing brightly coloured clothing outdoors;
Consider destroying or relocating hives and nests situated near your home;

• To avoid injury through inadvertently stepping on a stinging insect always wear footwear outdoors;

If your child has received an 'EpiPen, Junior' prescription from your physician (for anaphylactic reactions only) ensure they understand when and how to use it;
If your child experiences a severe reaction to an insect sting, or other environmental cause, seek medical attention, or call 9-1-1.





### Youth Employment

In late April I read an article on the CBC's website speaking to the plight of students in Calgary trying to find summer work. I printed this article to share with the different members of my staff and fellow MPs on Parliament Hill. Let me tell you why.

That first job for a student or youth entering the workforce establishes valuable skillsets and experience, and in some cases are the beginnings of a career. This first chance builds confidence and makes a strong impact on their ability to serve their communities and build the society that we all share and enjoy. Providing these opportunities for success is one of our most important responsibilities.

First of all, investing in youth jobs and opportunities is part of our plan to help the middle class and those seeking to join it. Our investments from Budget 2016 will help support young Canadians, including vulnerable youth, Indigenous Canadians, immigrants, youth with disabilities, single parents, those who have not completed high school and others.

We will help create thousands of new green jobs, more summer employment, participation in the Skills Link program and employment in the heritage sector.

We've **doubled** the Canada Summer Jobs Program (from 35,000 jobs to 70,000 for 2016, 2017, and 2018). This program invests in local nonprofits, local government, and small businesses to hire youth over the summer months. Places like the Trinity Foundation, Kerby Centre and the YWCA receive grants for hiring these students. This program has a proven track record - employing some 330,000 students since its inception - and supporting local organizations in their work in the community.

This is part of our \$105 million commitment over five years, starting in 2016–17, and \$25 million per year thereafter in support for youth service.

Further to this, our government has created the Prime Minister's Youth Advisory Council to provide advice on key issues such as employment and education, building stronger communities as well as climate change and clean growth. Oftentimes I've found the best policies and ideas come from those you're seeking to help, and this is one part of this listening to those in our communities.

These are investments in Canada's future: we're going to help our youth find jobs and get the best start possible to their careers.
