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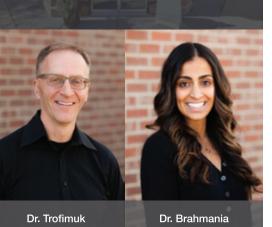

The list of babysitter's names will not be published in our community journal or on our website. It will be provided to interested families upon request once active membership status is confirmed.

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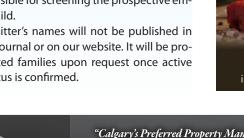
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South Calgary Outdoor Pool Opens June 18th!

The Status of Emergency Preparedness in Calgary

Floods, snowstorms, fires, power outages, telecommunication failures — these are just some of the natural, technological and human-induced events that Calgary needs to be prepared for, according to the recent Status of Emergency Preparedness report from the Calgary Emergency Management Agency (CEMA)

A quarter of Albertans report having three or more 'precautionary' measures in place to support their own preparedness. "We've seen an increase of almost 10% in the number of families with 72-hour kits," says Tom Sampson, Chief of CEMA, noting the growth. "While this is improving, there is still work to be done to ensure citizens understand the risks and take some responsibility for their own preparedness."

The best ways individuals and families can prepare:

Know the risks. Flooding is most common May-15 to July-15 but can occur at any time of year. Be informed about current conditions. When weather watches or warnings are in place, be prepared for severe weather such as flooding, lightning, tornadoes, or winter storms. For more information visit Alberta Emergency Alert (**emergencyalert.alberta.ca**)

Make a plan. Know how to reach your family members if you are not with them when an emergency or disaster strikes.

Get a kit. Ensure you have a 72-hour kit stocked and ready to go that contains supplies to support you and your family for the first 72 hours of an emergency or disaster.

Calgary.ca/cema provides great resources for individuals, families and businesses to learn what they can do to prepare.

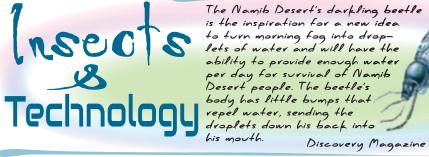

William Reid School Grounds Update

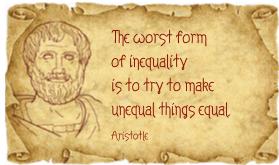
A group of parents is spearheading an initiative to improve the outdoor space around William Reid School at 1216-36 Avenue SW.

Have you ever planned to exercise before breakfast and then you don't make it out? Have you ever looked at YouTube and said 'just one more funny animal video"? Have you ever said "I am a busy person and these *important* house chores need to be done"?

I have said this to myself lots!

Exercise can be hard and making it part of the modern western lifestyle is hard. We are encouraged not to move and to think we can have the easy route to health. Exercise needs investment like our retirement. One deposit occasionally will not lead to a comfortable lifestyle when we are 70. And even worse if we do not exercise, we may not get those precious golden years.

These are my tips for exercising:

- 1. Getting out there is better than the couch. 1 km is better than 0 km. That 1 km means you have won the exercise game. Life happens and if you have just worked a 12 hour day then that 1 km may be all your body can manage. Feel good that you have got out and done that 1km. The next day might be 1.5 km. Action is better than inaction.

- 4. Be gentle with yourself. Your body is a precious organ; if one type of exercise hurts, find one that suits your body type.
- 5. Make you a priority. That email/text message is not that important that you will forgo investing in yourself. Exercising is a mind body investment, and you are worth it.

Community Crop Garden Society is a non-profit volunteer driven gardening society. We have three pesticide-free garden sites in central and southwest Calgary totaling 126 rental garden beds.

Our three garden sites are:

South Calgary Garden – 3130 - 16th Street SW There are 46 garden plots, a large perennial garden and a small orchard of dwarf apple and pear trees.

Currie Booster Garden – 3410 - 16th Street SW This garden has 36 garden plots. There are gooseberry and haskap bushes as well as a large rhubarb patch.

Alternative High School Garden 5003 - 20th Street SW

The 44 garden plots are laid out in a circular pattern. In 2010, we took over the already established Alternative High Garden from the Calgary Alternative Support Service.

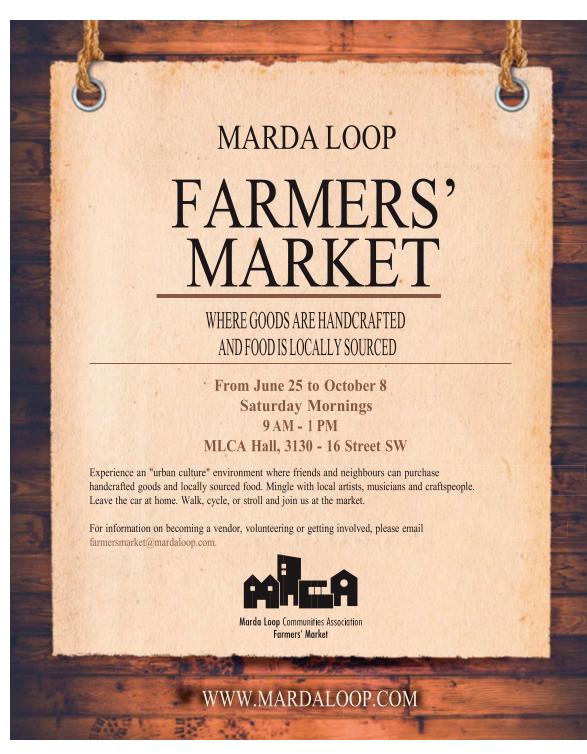

Spring Construction Update from **CSPACE King** Edward

Conversion of historic classrooms to artist studios, buried foundation wall demolition, heritage chimney reconstruction, and window restoration - these are all happening right now at cSPACE King Edward as we move towards Phase I opening in November. While we are still a few weeks from announcing our upcoming roster of tenants, we hope that this construction update continues to fuel your excitement about the unique community space that the former King Edward School will become!

After a hundred-plus-years of service, the historic chimney is being dismantled and reinstated to the opposite



corner of the school due to the new mechanical requirements of the updated building. Each brick has been documented before being removed from its original location and will be reconstructed in the same way during roof repairs in the coming weeks.

Work has begun to restore windows in classrooms that were previously covered over by the Calgary Board of Education, letting beautiful natural light back into the spaces for incoming artists, non-profits, and community users. Up in the attic studio spaces, plywood backed walls have been installed to support the creative practices of painters, photographers, printmakers, sculpture and jewelry artists, illustrators and more. New skylights will be added to each studio, providing a wash of light throughout these unique creation spaces. We will be announcing our full tenant roster of artists and non-profits in a few weeks!

Along the west side of King Edward, the unearthing and demolition of a buried remnant of the 1912 foundation is complete. A structural failure necessitated the demolition of the former west wing in 1978, but the historic foundation still remained just under the surface. Demolition is making way for construction to begin on our contemporary glass and steel west wing, housing a two-story studio theatre, co-working space, and various meeting rooms and event spaces. We are hoping that taking advantage of the views of downtown and the mountains from the 4th floor deck will make this a much sought-after event, conference and meeting place! Construction for the contemporary west wing phase is expected to begin this summer.

AROUND TOWN Floods, Woodlands and Bridges

After eight decades without a major flood, extreme rains in 2013 resulted in the highest recorded flows along the Bow and Elbow Rivers. This flood mobilized previously stable gravels and other alluvial sediments resulting in the transformation, expansion and/or creation of gravel bars and islands. These newly-formed surfaces provide an opportunity for the progressive colonization and succession of new riparian plant communities.

Although beneficial to the ecological health of this previously static system, newly establishing woodlands on gravel bars could pose a flood hazard. Woodland development at some locations might impede river flows and elevate overbank flooding and erosion during future floods. To investigate this prospect, the University of Lethbridge was tasked with analyzing and projecting post flood vegetation colonization along the Bow River as part of the Calgary Rivers Morphology Project*. Using these predictions areas of concern for future potential river impediment were identified.

Although the study was limited to the Bow River in Calgary, flooding of the Elbow River at Mission Bridge in 2013 provides an example of where riparian woodlands forming around bridges can present a problem. Constructed in 1914 and 1915, the Mission Bridge spanned a small sparsely vegetated island. Over the years the island has become a woodland including balsam poplars. During the 2013 flood, these trees collected debris and formed a barrier that greatly reduced the capacity of the middle spans of the bridge to convey floodwaters. While overbank flooding at this location was inevitable given the volume of water, it is likely that the woodland at Mission Bridge elevated flooding.

Riparian areas along rivers and streams in Calgary present a natural environment for people to enjoy within an urban setting. Preserving these areas is important. However, when vegetation begins to negatively impact infrastructure it might be necessary to control its development and thus avoid problems such as the flooding that occurred at Mission Bridge. *Calgary Rivers Morphology Project, sponsored by the City of Calgary, and Alberta Environment and Parks Watershed Resiliency and Restoration Program

Calgary Community Standards—River Safety Tips

Your safety and the safety of others should always be top of mind. Rafters, boaters and paddlers need to be aware of water levels, temperature, current speed, cloudy water conditions, and river hazards including bridge abutments, trees and other large debris in the water that can catch, trap or overturn vessels.

Being impaired while on the water is never tolerated, nor is the transport or consumption of alcohol.

Always be prepared

Your safety is your responsibility. All river passengers must wear a life jacket or personal floatation device (PFDs) on the water. Make sure it fits well and is fastened properly. All river vessels must also have a sounding device such as a whistle, and a buoyant heaving line (throw-bag) no less than 15 metres long.

Always tell someone where you are going and when you expect to return. Arrange drop off and pick up points before you enter on the river. Leave emergency contact phone numbers with someone who can report that you are overdue.

Be aware of river conditions

Although our City rivers may appear calm in some areas, this isn't always the case. The City has tools and resources available to help Calgarians check river conditions before you begin your trip. If river flows are high, especially after a major rainfall, postpone your trip until the flows have returned to safer levels. Keep in mind that flows can change quickly.

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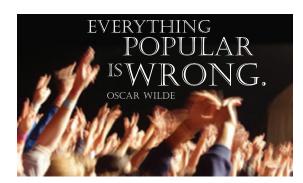

What does it mean to be flood ready? Higher river flows typically occur in Calgary from the middle of May to middle July. However flooding can strike any Calgary community in any season, often with little or no warning. Interestingly this has less to do with spring run-off from the mountains, and more to do with precipitation.

The City has plans in place that guide our response to floods of various sizes. Every event is different and actions leading up to and during a flood depend on the specifics of each event. In general, as a City, we take these actions to mitigate the impact of a flood:

- Manage the flow of water out of the Glenmore reservoir
- Close the gates on storm water outfalls to prevent river water from entering the storm system
- Deploy temporary lift stations to supplement pumping
 Deploy temporary berms, flood tubes or sandbags to critical locations.

Last month, the City of Calgary held two open houses to provide information to residents about on-going 2013 flood recovery efforts. This information is available online if you missed the session at Calgary.ca/flooding, along with resources on preparing yourself and your community in the event of a flood.

Community building in your neighbourhood! June is a busy month for Ward 11 communities. Be sure to check your Community Association for their family-friendly event listings – festivals, bike parades & Neighbour Day events – just to name a few! Community clean-ups are also underway from now until September. They are a great way to meet your neighbours, and take a burden off of your spring clean-out. See the full schedule at Calgary.ca/cleanup.

Youth Employment

In late April I read an article on the CBC's website speaking to the plight of students in Calgary trying to find summer work. I printed this article to share with the different members of my staff and fellow MPs on Parliament Hill. Let me tell you why.

That first job for a student or youth entering the workforce establishes valuable skillsets and experience, and in some cases are the beginnings of a career. This first chance builds confidence and makes a strong impact on their ability to serve their communities and build the society that we all share and enjoy. Providing these opportunities for success is one of our most important responsibilities.

First of all, investing in youth jobs and opportunities is part of our plan to help the middle class and those seeking to join it. Our investments from Budget 2016 will help support young Canadians, including vulnerable youth, Indigenous Canadians, immigrants, youth with disabilities, single parents, those who have not completed high school and others.

We will help create thousands of new green jobs, more summer employment, participation in the Skills Link program and employment in the heritage sector.

We've **doubled** the Canada Summer Jobs Program (from 35,000 jobs to 70,000 for 2016, 2017, and 2018). This program invests in local non-profits, local government, and small businesses to hire youth over the summer months. Places like the Trinity Foundation, Kerby Centre and the YWCA receive grants for hiring these students. This program has a proven track record – employing some 330,000 students since its inception – and supporting local organizations in their work in the community.

This is part of our \$105 million commitment over five years, starting in 2016–17, and \$25 million per year thereafter in support for youth service.

Further to this, our government has created the Prime Minister's Youth Advisory Council to provide advice on key issues such as employment and education, building stronger communities as well as climate change and clean growth. Oftentimes I've found the best policies and ideas come from those you're seeking to help, and this is one part of this listening to those in our communities.

These are investments in Canada's future: we're going to help our youth find jobs and get the best start possible to their careers.

A number of factors account for this city wide 56% increase from last year, including the economic downturn and increased addiction to fentanyl.

CPS encourages us to report all crimes, so they can track trends. It is through the use of these statistics that police resources are deployed. But not every incident requires we phone 9-1-1. So who should we call, and when?

Call 9-1-1 when you believe someone is in immediate danger, or you are witnessing a violent or criminal act. These types of incidents may include house break and enter, vehicle theft, or domestic violence.

The CPS non-emergency number, 403-266-1234, should be called when you believe the police should be engaged but there are no immediate threats to safety. These are lower priority calls that the police will respond to at a later time. These crimes may include phone scams, damage to property, a drug tip, or theft from a vehicle. You can also report these crimes using the CPS website at www.calgary.ca/cps and clicking on 'Report a Crime Online'.

3-1-1 Calgary is a single point of contact for City of Calgary non-emergency services. The service can be reached by dialing 3-1-1 or online at www.calgary. ca/311online. Please contact 3-1-1 to report graffiti or bylaw related concerns.
