

DIRECTOR'S REPORT COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

I would like to thank everyone in attendance this evening, and apologize for being unavailable to deliver this report in person. I would also like to thank the other members of the board who have volunteered their time to sit on the board and help manage and maintain the functionality of our Community Association. Thanks also go out to all those who volunteered to work at this year's Casino, the proceeds of which allows Meadowlark Park to continue to operate the Hall with success and fund other community projects.

This year saw many new initiatives, improvements, and changes within our Community. Amongst other things, we have streamlined the operations and rental of the hall, improved our community newsletter, and after several years in the making – successfully launched a new website. At last year's AGM, I discussed with the Quorum the growing desire by the Association to work to improve access to the community hall for Meadowlark Park residents from the side of the hall where most community residents reside – specifically to improve the park and building esthetics, provide improved community and hall signage, and allow improved pedestrian and handicap access to the Hall from the South side of the Community Hall off Meadowview Road.

A little bit about "This is My Neighbourhood" (TIMN)

This is my neighbourhood aims to transform how The City of Calgary works in neighbourhoods. Through the engagement of local residents, community associations, non-profit organizations and businesses, we'll work with you to develop a neighbourhood vision that outlines your future aspirations.

Guided by this vision, The City will work with you to create and deliver initiatives which may include small-scale infrastructure improvements, programs and services that will help your neighbourhood be an even better place to live, work and play.

TIMN began in 2015 with a group of 14 inaugural neighbourhoods. As part of the TIMN program, The City part-

likely already aware that the Hall improvement project represents the largest single area to which Casino funds will be directed over the next 12 months, and that a request for an extension for the use of these funds was granted to allow further planning and consultation during the permitting process. With the help of an active board, city liaisons, architectural firms, City of Calgary parks and roads, and the Alberta Liquor and Gaming Commission (AGLC), permits are now in place to proceed with the proposed development. I am pleased to inform tonight's quorum that we are now at a point where tendering for the work is underway, with a view to starting and completing the project over several weeks this summer.

Finally, while I have very much enjoyed my time serving on the board over the last 4 years, I am not able to seek reelection for another term. I hope that with the

help of some additional volunteers elected tonight, and with the ongoing commitment of the current board, that Meadowlark Park will continue to be one of the best communities in Calgary to live.

I thank you for the opportunity to serve our Community, and look forward to seeing you all at future community events.

Potential Meeting Schedule

Meeting 1: February – Introduction to the TIMN neighbourhood Advisory Committee/community asset mapping. COMPLETE (with the Community Association Board)! The asset map will be a 'living document' and updated as required. Meeting 2: September/October - Meet new group members and give your input into the neighbourhood vision.

Meeting 3: late November - Review the results of the community engagement, recommend a neighbourhood vision. Meeting 4: December - Neighbourhood tour to discuss potential initiatives. Meeting 5: January 2018 – Provide input on the list of potential initiatives to start the creative community initiative engagement process.

Meeting 6: March 2018 - Presentation of approved initiatives. Provide specific implementation input, if needed. Meeting 7: Once initiatives are completed/near completion - Celebration of initiatives.

Budget Town Hall Update

On April 8^{th,} I held a budget town hall. The event was attend by people from all parts of the political spectrum who provided their input on the current state of Alberta's finances. The common theme I heard at the event was that the government is on an unsustainable path and that we cannot continue to go further into debt. Our continued reliance on unpredictable resource revenues means that we will never be able to balance the budget.

Participants were presented with the question of how to increase provincial revenues in order to reduce our reliance on non-renewable resource revenue. When asked how they felt about revenue options, their preferences where ranked in the following order:

- 1. Carbon Tax fully offset by Personal and Corporate Tax reductions and innovation tax credits
- 2. PST with cuts to Personal and Corporate Tax
- 3. New user fees: Toll roads, health care premiums, etc.
- 4. PST on top of other taxes
- 5. Carbon Tax on top of existing taxes
- 6. Increase Corporate Tax
- 7. Increase Personal Tax

I also asked those in attendance to identify where felt they sat on a continuum of budget options from our current deficit path to the sustainable path to cutback path. I overwhelmingly heard people want to find savings in government spending without hurting front-line services. This includes: • Cap on non-renewable resource revenue used for core programs

- Constrain operational spending by 1%
- Public sector pay freeze

• Rethink tax system to reward individual effort and increase investment Shift to new, sustainable revenue sources to fund core programs



Justice for Albertans

When Judges are in the news condemning policies and demanding action it's typically a bad sign ("Top Alberta judges condemn trial delays, demanding Parliament acts to fill vacancies on the bench," Kaufmann, Calgary Herald, Sept. 28, 2016).

In 2016 one judge in particular – Court of Queen's Bench Chief Justice Neil Wittmann – was blunt in his assessment. Of the previous federal government's treatment of Alberta's justice system he said this:

"The previous federal government wouldn't even authorize the appointment of the number of judges that the Alberta government had, by statute, said they require. In my opinion that is constitutionally impermissible." ("Alberta judge shortage at 'breaking point,"" Grant, CBC News, Oct. 26, 2016)

In some cases a trial would have a wait time of one or two years before it was event seen by a judge. It's this undermining of a legal system by starving it of resources that underserves Albertans and Calgarians, and has ensuing costs to commerce, jobs, and justice for Canadians.

That's why in 2017 our government is creating 28 new federally-appointed judicial positions, to help address demographic pressures in regions like Alberta and ensure that Canadians have timely access to justice in



Canada – through an investment of \$55.1 million over five years and \$15.1 million per year thereafter, as well as legislative amendments.

This is in addition to the good work that provincial Justice Minister Kathleen Ganley is doing with a recently announced boost in funding, adding new judges to provincial courts, and hiring 50 new Crown prosecutors (and thirty support staff).

All Canadians – no matter their means – should have the right to a fair trial and access to a modern, efficient justice system. We are committed to ensuring that our justice system is fair, relevant and accessible to all Canadians by helping economically disadvantaged people in obtaining legal assistance and representation.

In Budget 2016, we committed to an additional \$88 million over five years for legal aid funding partnerships with the provinces and territories, and today we have announced an additional \$30 million per year in ongoing funding. These new funds will make more legal aid available for those who need it and will support new ways of delivering services. Performance measurement will also be added to make sure legal aid funding is doing what it needs to do.

Our 2015 platform was built for Alberta – by immediately working to ease El rules for those hit by the commodity downturn, investing in carbon pricing to create a consensus to approve (and to soon build) four pipelines to foreign markets, and by working with international partners to open up new markets. I take my role as the cabinet minister from Calgary seriously, in supporting veterans as Minister of Veterans' Affairs, and work every day to make sure that we can continue to build this city.
