

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



Memorial Park Library Library, Arts and Culture Hub in the Beltline

Calgary Public Library is excited to be transforming programs and services at Memorial Park Library to better meet the needs of the Beltline community. In 2015, we engaged in extensive public consultations with local residents, businesses, and stakeholders and we analyzed the changing demographics of the community. Our internal statistics show Memorial Park Library has the lowest use pattern among our 18 community libraries, despite a densely-populated service area. The message we heard loud and clear was that Memorial Park Library needed to change, and we saw that as an opportunity to pilot test new concepts for the library system in anticipation of the opening of New Central Library. In this article, we'll highlight three key areas where you will experience enhanced and more relevant service from your community library.

1. Library responding to its community today

Over the last ten years, the demographics in the area have shifted. Now over 63% of Beltline residents are between the ages of 25 and 44 and fewer than 10% of residents have children. In response, we have strategically reduced the Memorial Park Library collection by removing formats either not well-used by the community (e.g. children's materials) or collections too small to provide a rich selection (e.g. music CDs), and left a considerable adult fiction and non-fiction browsing collection. Expect to see resources displayed in new ways, providing more opportunities to discover titles that resonate with members. With the Central Library so close, our robust collection of electronic resources, and our very convenient 'holds' system, we are still able to provide something for everyone. We have recently extended our open hours and added more staff to support and accommodate the active culture of Calgary's most urban community.

2. Library as community hub

We have right-sized the collection at Memorial Park in response to fewer people browsing the shelves – primarily because they have already 'browsed' online

and placed holds for what they need. As a result, we've reclaimed space that was occupied by rarely used library materials to give you, the community, more space to work, socialize, collaborate, meet, play music - you name it! Expect new, flexible furniture to arrive soon to allow you to more effectively collaborate in the spaces, some of which you can book online and use free of charge. We also introduced Chromebook laptops to offer greater convenience for working and connecting anywhere in the library. Stay tuned for new programs and opportunities to engage in dialogue around issues facing the community.

3. Library as arts and culture space

During our consultations, we heard that people want library services, as well as a vibrant arts and culture hub at Memorial Park Library. We've partnered with Wordfest to activate the top floor of Memorial Park, bringing exciting events and programs to the space, even when the library itself is closed. We have exhibits coming into the main floor lobby space, beginning with Humainologie's *Under an Umbrella We Met: Indigenous Youth Voices*. Join us for the exhibit launch on June 5 at 5:00 pm to meet the youth featured. Have you tried out the new Create Space yet? Every two months this space will feature a new participatory community experience for you to play and connect with other community members. Memorial Park Library will also be home to the Sun Life Financial Musical Instrument Lending Library, which launches on June 1, along with a suite of new musical programs and services.

We are always looking to connect more with our communities and hear their perspectives. Please join us at 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, June 13 at Memorial Park Library for a discussion with Calgary Public Library's CEO Bill Ptacek about the recent and upcoming changes. 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Come Celebrate Canada's 150th Birthday with Us

in a CBMCA hour of story, drama, music, fun and birthday cake

You will find us at Elbow Drive and 4 Street along the river, on the Historic Promenade, just North East of Mission Bridge

"Like water everywhere, it's a taker and a giver" - *Caney Fork River* by W.P. Bennett

We will all move along with our storytellers and musicians, following the historic plaque story of the Elbow River for two blocks (from 1 to 4 St. SW), where we will have a Canada 150 birthday party.

Daryl Kootenay's First Nations drumbeat will echo the Elbow River's lifeblood for generations of First Nations people. This was before waves of outside people began arriving to transform the river into what it has become today – our home and community. Local musicians Dianne, Peter, Steve & Helen of Horizon Ridge band will continue to echo the continuation of life along the Elbow River, drawing people to settle along its banks. This story will unfold through local residents' stories. Besides its bounties, the Elbow River gave us devastating floods, even before the 2013 flood. The Promenade itself is a flood survivor!

You will find yourself on a two-block, delightful Historic Promenade walk/bikeway. Here, you can enter a historic Calgary community, know nothing about it and leave knowing its history from First Nations residents through early settlement to modern development. From the self-guiding walk brochure, you will see that this Historic Promenade is now part of a four-block Historic Stroll from Mission Bridge to Scollen Bridge. An urban treatment of a formerly rundown riverbank, and the result of a huge \$1.2 million investment and a five+ year undertaking, we are very proud of this community achievement. The two-block Historic Promenade project was initiated by CBMCA in 2005, proposed to the City and implemented over five years, in partnership with many City departments, following extensive

public engagement with businesses and residents, and community fundraising to the tune of \$90,000. We will always be grateful to each of our supporters – check them out on Promenade lampposts and bricks. This project was made possible through incredible support from the Calgary Foundation, a tireless supporter of grassroots community-building projects, which has been involved from inception until the present. Since its 2010 completion, we've been unable to promote and celebrate the Promenade as it deserves, mainly due to the devastating effects of the 2013 flood, and constant condominium construction. We had originally tried to continue the path along the river around the bend (part of the riverbank does have a four-metre easement, intended for this purpose). However, various complications are making this impossible for now.

In this year of Canada's 150 birthday, we are in negotiations with City Parks to extend the 'Historic Stroll' along 26 Avenue, by street signs directing walkers/bikers to the bend in the river at Mok'nstsis park, a delightful small park dedicated to First Nations people. Mok'nstsis opens onto a very popular pebble beach around the river bend, its size was enhanced by the 2013 flood. Continuing the stroll, you will emerge at Scollen Bridge on busy 25 Avenue, just west of Erlton. We hope many immediate neighbours, new to the area since 2013 will come and join us. This event is the launch of a larger campaign to put this area jewel on the map as a destination for tourists, our five local schools, and a place where many of us will bring our visitors, becoming acquainted with history under our feet, as we enjoy this historic stroll.

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

Green cart collection start dates

Green carts will be rolled out by quadrant. Once all residents in a quadrant have their carts, collection will begin.

Quadrant: Southwest

Cart delivery: June 5 - July 15

Weekly green cart collection starts: Week of July 17

Three things to do when your cart arrives:

1. Bring your cart up to your home.

Carts will be delivered to the front of your home. Bring your cart up to your home and store it in a safe place (e.g. garage, against the side of your house or back fence).

2. Look inside the green cart.

Everything you need to get started is inside the cart. This includes:

- Kitchen pail and sample compostable bags.
- Sample paper yard waste bags for extra yard waste that doesn't fit inside the cart.
- Instruction guide and collection schedule.

3. Consult your collection schedule.

The collection schedule inside your cart explains when green cart collection starts in your quadrant along with your new collection days and schedule. You can also find out your collection days and sign up for free automated reminders at calgary.ca/collection.

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



Responsible Pet Ownership in Parks

As we all enjoy being outside and spending time with our family, friends and pets; we want to ensure we are creating a safe place for all our neighbours. Knowing and adhering to the regulations in the Responsible Pet Ownership Bylaw 23M2006 helps to ensure that dogs are not being a nuisance in the community and dogs and citizens are safe.

City of Calgary would like to remind dog owners of the following:

- When off of their owner's property, dogs must be on a leash unless in a designated off-leash area.
- When in designated off-leash areas, dog owners must ensure their dog is under control, is within their sight and responds to commands.
- Parking lots adjacent to off-leash areas are on leash.
- Owners are responsible for picking up all waste produced by their dog.
- Dogs are not allowed in school grounds, playgrounds, sport fields, golf courses, cemeteries, wading and swimming areas, and other areas prohibited by signs.
- Dogs must be walked on the right-hand side of the pathway on a leash that is no more than two metres in length and must not interfere with other pathway users.
- Owners cannot cycle, in-line skate or skateboard on a pathway with a leashed dog.
- Dogs must not enter or swim in any body of water within a park except a river that runs through, or is adjacent to, a City park.
- Dogs must have and wear a City of Calgary licence when the dog is three-months-old

When we respect the bylaw, we contribute to a safer and healthier community.

Live on the Elbow River?

Interested in conserving your real estate?

Riverbanks, by nature, are fragile environments. In the winter and springtime riverbanks are subjected to the grinding forces of ice as water ebbs and flows and ice levels change. Depending on the mountain snowpack, temperatures and precipitation the Elbow River can turn into a raging muddy-coloured torrent in late spring/early summer. The energized water can collapse banks and in severe cases rip down trees and, well, we know what happened in 2013.

Steep earthen banks, banks on the outside curve of a river bend and shallow-rooted (i.e. Kentucky bluegrass) vegetated banks are most susceptible to the erosive forces of water.

If concerned about your real estate floating down the river assess the health of your stream bank.

Streambank Riparian Health Checklist (adapted from Cows & Fish – Alberta Riparian Management Society - <http://cowsandfish.org>)

1. Is 85% of your riverbank covered with vegetation of any kind?
2. Is 50% or more of the plants on the riverbank taller than knee height?
3. Are willow, dogwood and/or silverberry (wolf willow) growing along the stream edge?
4. Is there a diversity of ages among trees and shrubs on the riverbank?
5. Is Kentucky bluegrass less than 15% of the bank vegetation?

6. Are weeds (thistles, scentless chamomile, knapweed and dandelions) less than 15% of the bank vegetation?
7. Are there exposed and eroding soils or slumping banks due to recreational activities?
8. Are there no retaining walls, riprap or bank stabilizing features (i.e. man made structures)?
9. Are there wildlife sightings or fish present in the water?
10. Are plants vigorous and healthy, producing plant litter and potential foraging opportunities?

If you answered yes to 7 or more questions it is likely that your riverbank is healthy. The tangled mass of plant roots is holding on to the soil. Above ground the vegetation is slowing the water dissipating its erosive energy. In addition, the vegetation is trapping and filtering contaminants from runoff, water quality is improved, important habitat for birds, insects, animals and fish is provided and resiliency of the riverbank to recover from floods, droughts and/or human-caused disturbance is increased.

If you answered yes to less than 5 of the questions it is likely that your streambank is in poor health and your real estate (i.e. land) might be at risk. So plant your riverbank and reap the many benefits from one single action. Your bank will thank you in so many ways.

AHS – Hospice

Hospice, one of many options for end-of-life care

In Alberta, there are many options to get palliative and end of life care—your home, a hospital, a continuing care centre, or a hospice.

Hospices are places made to feel like home while giving specialized end of life care, 24/7. The care teams focus on comfort and quality of life, and can help patients and their family cope with feelings about serious illness.

In a hospice, palliative care is provided by health professionals, volunteers, and spiritual counsellors. Services include:

- managing pain
- helping with daily living activities (personal care)
- emotional, psychological and spiritual support.

Before accessing palliative care or a hospice, a health care team discusses with patients on what's important to them and where they would like to be at the time of their illness where they may either have: a life expectancy of less than 3 months; signed a form saying they do not want to be resuscitated or a need to be in a bed or chair most of the time. A patient's choice may change as an illness changes, and individuals can get palliative and end of life care at any time.

There's also a new program that's helping to bring emergency care to people who get palliative and end of life care in their homes. The EMS Assess, Treat, Refer program has Emergency Medical Services, home care clinicians, doctors, and families working together to help people stay in their homes if that's what they wish.

The real way to build an emergency fund

It's an unsettling fact: most Canadians don't have money put away for an unexpected event. According to a 2015 survey by Pollara, 44% of Canadians have less than \$5,000 set aside for unexpected expenses, and a quarter of working Canadians are living paycheque to paycheque with no emergency cash at all.

Here's how to build an emergency fund:

How much? Ideally, your fund should equal three to six months of your take-home salary but at the very least, it should cover basic needs, like buying food and paying the household bills.

How? Build it steadily, progressively and as aggressively as your finances will allow:

- Determining how much you need in your emergency fund and how long it will take you to reach your goal using monthly contributions.
- Authorize automatic monthly payments from your chequing and/or paycheque account to your emergency fund account.
- Trim unnecessary monthly bills and put that money into your emergency fund.
- When you get a bonus or an unexpected tax refund, put some into your emergency fund and perhaps into an RRSP, and, yes, set aside a few dollars for fun.

How not to? Even if you have a line of credit, you still need an emergency fund. Drawing on a line of credit increases your debt and whatever you buy with it will cost even more because of the interest you'll pay. Don't be tempted to use that emergency fund for a vacation or another impulse purchase, it's for true emergencies only!

How to make it grow? Turn your emergency fund into an investment in a money market mutual fund or a high interest savings account.

Emergencies are a fact of life but you can cushion the effects when you're financially prepared.



Ask Charles

I'm on a condominium board, and we have decided to hire a professional management company. Do they need to be licensed?

This is one of the most common questions we get. The answer depends on what they are going to do on behalf of the Board of Directors, and how they will handle the condominium corporation's money.

Condominium managers are responsible for collecting condominium fees, arranging property maintenance (according to instructions from the condominium's Board of Directors), assisting the Board of Directors with enforcing the Bylaws, and other duties set out in the Bylaws.

The Real Estate Act does not specifically refer to condominium management, but it does say that individuals need a licence if they collect contributions, or money, for the control, management, or administration of real estate.

So, if a condominium manager is collecting condominium fees, or other such fees such as special assessments, do they need a licence?

If a condominium manager collects the money payable to the condominium corporation, deposits it directly into the condominium corporation's account, and they are not carrying out any other activities that fall under the definition of trading in real estate, they do not require a licence.

If a condominium manager deposits the money payable to the condominium corporation into the management company's account for any period of time, no matter how short, they do require a licence.

As a member of a condominium Board of Directors, you and your Board will have to think about how you want your management company to collect and hold fees. If the company will hold them in its own account, they require a licence.

Licensing requirements provide some protection for consumers when a third party, for example a management company, holds consumer funds. All licensees are required to have Errors and Omissions insurance, and there is a consumer compensation fund that compensates consumers who suffer a financial loss as a result of fraud, breach of trust, or a failure to disburse or account for money held in trust. The compensation fund is only available to consumers who are working with licensed professionals on trades in real estate or deals in mortgages.

In December 2014, the Government of Alberta passed legislation that will require licensing for all condominium managers; however, the government has not announced the date on which those legislative changes will come into effect. In the meantime, the licensing requirements detailed in this article continue.

Justice for Albertans

When Judges are in the news condemning policies and demanding action it's typically a bad sign ("Top Alberta judges condemn trial delays, demanding Parliament acts to fill vacancies on the bench," Kaufmann, Calgary Herald, Sept. 28, 2016).

In 2016 one judge in particular – Court of Queen's Bench Chief Justice Neil Wittmann – was blunt in his assessment. Of the previous federal government's treatment of Alberta's justice system he said this:

"The previous federal government wouldn't even authorize the appointment of the number of judges that the Alberta government had, by statute, said they require. In my opinion that is constitutionally impermissible." ("Alberta judge shortage at 'breaking point,'" Grant, CBC News, Oct. 26, 2016)

In some cases a trial would have a wait time of one or two years before it was even seen by a judge. It's this undermining of a legal system by starving it of resources that underserves Albertans and Calgarians, and has ensuing costs to commerce, jobs, and justice for Canadians.

That's why in 2017 our government is creating 28 new federally-appointed judicial positions, to help address demographic pressures in regions like Alberta and ensure that Canadians have timely access to justice in Canada – through an investment of \$55.1 million over five years and \$15.1 million per year thereafter, as well as legislative amendments.

This is in addition to the good work that provincial Justice Minister Kathleen Ganley is doing with a recently announced boost in funding, adding new judges to provincial courts, and hiring 50 new Crown prosecutors (and thirty support staff).


All Canadians – no matter their means – should have the right to a fair trial and access to a modern, efficient justice system. We are committed to ensuring that our justice system is fair, relevant and accessible to all Cana-

dians by helping economically disadvantaged people in obtaining legal assistance and representation.

In Budget 2016, we committed to an additional \$88 million over five years for legal aid funding partnerships with the provinces and territories, and today we have announced an additional \$30 million per year in ongoing funding. These new funds will make more legal aid available for those who need it and will support new ways of delivering services. Performance measurement will also be added to make sure legal aid funding is doing what it needs to do.

Our 2015 platform was built for Alberta – by immediately working to ease EI rules for those hit by the commodity downturn, investing in carbon pricing to create a consensus to approve (and to soon build) four pipelines to foreign markets, and by working with international partners to open up new markets. I take my role as the cabinet minister from Calgary seriously, in supporting veterans as Minister of Veterans' Affairs, and work every day to make sure that we can continue to build this city.

Making Life Affordable for Albertans

I am focused on making Alberta the best province it can be, and that includes ensuring that all Albertans have access to services that make life affordable. I have been working with my MLA colleagues to ensure everyone is supported as we surface from the recession, securing a strong and healthy future for Albertans and their families.

The foundation for a strong and healthy community starts with a childhood that supports children for future success as independent, stable and productive adults. Our government remains committed to moving forward on quality, affordable, and accessible childcare, which was a part of our platform. Twenty-two pilot Early Learning and Child Care Centres (ELCC) were launched May 1st, many of them opening throughout the summer. The ELCC is based on a maximum of \$25/day child care. Currently, child care in Alberta costs an average of \$1,000 per month, or \$50/day. ELCC Centres will create 1,296 licensed child care spaces, 119 new child care jobs, and will support 357 Albertans in entering the workforce. Five of these centres will be based in Calgary with a total of 320 spots. You may apply to register your child at <https://www.alberta.ca/early-learning-child-care-centres.aspx>. ELCC will respond to a number of gaps in the existing child care system, including affordability, diverse needs of children and flexible hours for parents.

Our government is also responding to the need of affordable housing. Calgary has an average residential housing price of almost \$500,000, with rental rates averaging around \$1,300/month. As part of the Alberta Jobs Plan's \$1.2 billion investment, government expects to renew and build more than 6,000 affordable housing units over the next five years. In March, \$5.7 million in funding was approved to support the planning of 14 affordable housing projects throughout the province. Five of these projects are in Calgary, with one just outside the Calgary-Bufferlo constituency.

A large part of ensuring living affordability is meaningful employment. In partnership with the Government of Canada, the provincial government has launched the

Employer Liaison Service pilot program in April. This service will help workers find new opportunities with employers across the province who are looking to fill highly-skilled positions. We have an exceptional pool of talented, well-trained and motivated workers in Alberta and our government is working with federal government to ensure these Calgarians are first in line for available jobs. This two-year pilot project will provide valuable insight to help us develop strategies to respond to labour challenges across various sectors and regions in Alberta.
