




#### **Keep the Oakridge Community Centre smoke-free**

# Oakridge Co-op Tom Brook **Redevelopment Athletic Park Project**

Oakridge Community Members,

As many of you are aware the Oakridge Calgary CO-OP (CO-OP) is getting a makeover. We have been approached by the developer and CO-OP and have a had chance to review the proposed plans and consider them to be thoughtful to our community's needs.

As with past issues, we believe that the road to a healthy and cohesive community comes from working together on these types of issues in order to ensure as small of a negative impact to our community as possible. In fact, In many cases these developments become opportunities for our community to grow.

With that in mind, we encourage community members to provide their feedback on the proposed plans. We will compile those suggestions and send them to the city, the developers and CO-OP.

We have already highlighted issues that we think may cause problems down the road and delivered them to the city as well as the developer.

Those issues are:

- Being mindful of traffic at the intersection of 24th street and Oakmoor Drive, SW.
- Ensure no shadowing on the residences around the proposed development.
- Keeping access open for residents during construction.

We have received positive responses to our concerns and believe that our relationship with CO-OP and the developers to be a good one.

The project will also add additional parking to the north side of Southland Leisure Centre.

I saw a house for sale, and I want to check it out – will I have to sign a contract to get a real estate professional to show me the house?

The short answer is no. If you see a house for sale and you simply want a real estate professional to show you that house, you're not required to sign a contract.

Simply viewing a home with a real estate professional doesn't trigger a regulatory requirement to sign a contract with that real estate professional. However, if you start sharing confidential information such as your motivation for buying or your financial qualification, the real estate professional has a responsibility to clarify your working relationship, at which point they are going to provide you with some documents to review.

In the process of clarifying your working relationship, the first document a real estate professional should present to you is the Consumer Relationships Guide. The Consumer Relationships Guide is a mandatory document for real estate professionals when they begin working with a buyer or seller of residential real estate. It explains the different types of working relationships between real estate professionals and consumers.

The Consumer Relationships Guide is not a contract. It does not commit you to a specific ongoing working relationship with your real estate professional, but it is an essential information piece for consumers to understand what working with a licensed real estate professional entails. Among other things, it discusses responsibilities and obligations.

The Consumer Relationships Guide contains an acknowledgement that consumers have to sign indicating they've read the Guide, understand it, and have been provided with an opportunity to ask the real estate professional questions about it. Consumers need to review and sign the Guide before entering into any contract with a real estate professional.

Some real estate professionals may actually present the Consumer Relationships Guide and request that you sign the acknowledgement even before showing you a single property, but that specific practice is not a requirement.





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In 1900, to counter the so-called "side-hunt," wherein groups of gunners would compete in seeing which could kill the most wildlife on Boxing Day, American ornithologist Frank Chapman, instead, asked birders across North America to head out on Christmas Day to count the birds in their home towns and submit the results as the first "Christmas Bird Census." His suggestion has evolved into one of the world's largest citizen science projects in the world, and a holiday tradition during the Christmas season for well over 50,000 birders in the Americas each year.

The Christmas Bird Count (CBC), as it is now called, is conducted in over 2,400 localities across Canada, the United States, Latin America, and the Caribbean. These bird observations, collected during one-day field counts within defined circular areas, have been amassed into a huge database that reflects the distribution and numbers of winter birds over time.

Each Christmas Bird Count (CBC) is now conducted within a standardized circle with a radius of 7.5 mi (12 km). About 370 Canadian CBCs are reported to Bird Studies Canada and many hundreds of others are conducted, reported only to their provincial naturalists' organization. In all, some 15,000 to 22,000 people participate across Canada.

This year the Calgary CBC took place on Sunday December 18<sup>th</sup> under a mostly sunny sky and a balmy temperature of 3C. S2G+ joined Gus Yaki and 6 other individuals. Of the 32 territories in Calgary our area included Mount Royal, Elbow Park, Stanley Park, Parkhill, Erlton, and Rideau/Roxboro. Nineteen bird and 4 mammal species were counted plus 3 animal tracks observed.

**Overall number of species recorded in Calgary:** 61 (four below the 20-year average)

**Individual birds counted In Calgary**: 39,249 (significantly below the average of 50,000)

**Highest count species:** Mallards (10,676) and Canada Geese (9,315) led the way, followed by House Sparrows, Black-billed Magpies and Black-capped Chickadees.

**Biggest drop in sightings:** Bohemian Waxwings at 1,650 and a 90% decrease in the number of House Finches

**Returnees:** a Golden Eagle not counted since 1987 and 3 Sharp-tailed Grouse which were first seen since 1997. Both the eagle and the grouse were found on Tsuu T'ina lands.

**Other uncommon birds**: Ring-necked Duck, Pied-billed Grebe and Ring-billed Gull (one of each).

Final results will be posted on the Audubon database by mid-January 2017. Next year's count will be on Sunday December 17, 2017. Mark your calendars!

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The Common Redpoll
A Winter Migrant to
Alberta


The Common Redpoll is an energetic, little songbird with a flaming red cap, black throat, whitish rump and streaked back. This songbird a highly sociable, noisy, chattering bird that travels in large flocks of several hundred birds. It is one of the finch family's most northern breeders and is found circumpolar.

#### **Fun Facts:**

- You can find the Common Redpoll from April through September in the Yukon, Northwest and Nunavut Territories, and even across into Newfoundland and Labrador. The Common Redpoll migrates south into the lower Canadian provinces in late autumn.
- In Alberta, we are likely to see the Common Redpoll in the winter when they might forage as large groups in weedy fields or small tree lots.
- Sightings can be scare when there are winter food shortages in their normal wintering range. This forces them to go even farther south, a behaviour called an "irruption." Common Redpolls tend to exhibit this irruptive behaviour every second year to match the production cycle of catkins on birch and alder trees.
- The Common Redpoll's normal breeding range is on the Arctic tundra or in boreal forests. The female nests low down in dwarf willows, spruce, birch, alders, and small shrubs, where the male brings her food.
- This songbird likes the small high-energy seeds of birch and alder trees and can eat 42% of their body mass every day!
- When in a large group, the Common Redpoll often moves frantically on the ground in their search for seeds to eat.
- When it is extremely cold or food is scarce, the Common Redpoll can store some seeds temporarily in a stretchy part of their oesophagus (diverticula). They will knock seeds down, fly down to scoop them up,

- then find a sheltered and safe spot to shell and eat the seeds at their leisure.
- If you want to attract them to your yard you can plant birch trees, but we city folks are most likely to see them at a backyard feeder in the winter where they favour nyger seed offerings.



If you are growing plants indoors, there is a good chance you already have a succulent or two. Perhaps you have cactus or aloe. This category of plants has leaves or stems (and sometimes roots) that are thick and fleshy to enable the plant to store water to survive dry conditions. It is a huge family of plants that originate from many parts of the world ranging from desert to forest. All cacti are succulents, but not all succulents are cacti. Many of them flower, such as Schlumbergera/Christmas Cactus, which only flowers at Christmas if forced in a greenhouse environment. In our homes, it blooms according to hours of sunlight, typically October-November and again less vigorously in early spring. After it is finished, it should be given a rest and pruned or re-potted. I have several that are decades old who are pruned annually. They are given a light fertilizing and maybe top dressing when new growth appears, because they live in the same pot year after year.

Another popular indoor succulent is Sedum Morganianum, also known as Burro Tail or Donkey Tail. It has long rope-like stems heavily laden with plump juicy leaves that can grow up to 6 ft. long. A mature plant will be very heavy, and needs to be hung from a good hook that will support the weight. If you cannot turn it regularly, it will grow on the sunny side and need to be secured to its shelf (I find wire coat hangers useful). These plants do not tolerate transplanting, as the leaves fall off with the slightest touch, so choose your pot wisely when the plant is small. There are many different varieties with leaves from tiny to huge, and if you have outdoor sunny space that is sheltered from the wind and hail, they will enjoy living outside in the summertime. Remember, though, that they are tropical and cannot tolerate cold temperatures, so must move inside in the fall.

We all have some sort of Hen and Chicks in our gardens: small ground-hugging fleshy succulents in rosette form of the Crassulaceae family. You will often find them labelled as genus Echeveria and Sempervivum, among others. The "hen" is the main parent plant, and the "chicks" are the offsets or baby plants, which are attached by a not very sturdy stem. A good strong rain will knock the baby off, allowing it to roll down the slope and come to rest where it will put down roots and start a new colony. These are probably the most shared plants in the gardening community, as some varieties are hardy to our climate and propagate easily. There are many others that come from warmer and drier climes, such as Central and South America and Africa, that make interesting house plants because of their beautiful shapes. Plant them alone, or together in a shallow pot in a sunny window, and they will reward you with years of slow growth and the occasional bloom on a long willowy stalk. The most important thing to remember about growing succulents is that their original home is typically arid. The quickest way to kill your new succulent or cactus is to water it weekly on the same schedule as your other house plants. Root rot is deadly. During the winter season when daylight hours are short, these plants need watering only monthly, or at the most every two weeks. Soak the pot and then leave it until it is totally dry; never let it sit in a saucer of water. And do not fertilize until the days are longer and you see new growth. When repotting (some of these babies come from the nursery in very tiny pots) use either a commercial cactus medium, or regular potting medium mixed with perlite (1:2). Perlite is good for drainage; Vermiculite is like a sponge and holds water. Horticultural sand will also work. Enjoy your succulents; how many things do we have in our lives that thrive on neglect?



On January 5th of this year, the Assessment Department mailed out the 2017 Property Assessment Notices to property and business owners in Calgary. The assessment process is how property taxes are distributed among all property owners to meet The City's budget needs to pay for services all Calgarians benefit from like police, fire protection, transit, parks, recreation and more. Your property assessment provides the basis for your share of taxes, relative to all non-residential properties in Calgary. On June 27th, 2016, City Council made the decision to reduce the 2017 property tax rate increase to zero through a one-time rebate. Please note this only affects The City's portion. Your property assessment is based on your property's estimated market value on July 1st, 2016, and is used to calculate your property taxes. Your property assessment can change year to year.

#### **Residential Property Assessment**

The average home in Calgary saw an assessment decrease of 4 per cent. If your assessment decreased 4 per cent, you will pay about the same municipal taxes as last year. If your assessment decreased less than 4 per cent or increased from 2016, your municipal taxes will increase. If your assessment decreased by more than 4 per cent, you will see a decrease in your municipal taxes. Please note, the Provincial portion of the tax rate is not announced until spring, and will also have an impact on your property taxes.

#### **Non-residential Property Assessment**

The average non-residential property saw an assessment decrease of 6 per cent. If your assessment decreased 6 per cent, you will pay about the same municipal taxes as last year. If your assessment decreased less than 6 per cent or increased from 2016, your municipal taxes will increase. If your assessment decreased by more than 6 per cent, you will see a decrease in your municipal taxes. Please note that regulated assessments are not subject

to the market value standard, and assessment changes may not be reflective of the average 2017 assessment changes for non-residential properties. The Provincial portion of the tax rate will impact your property taxes. This is not announced until spring. The Business Tax Consolidation will also impact your property taxes.

#### **Business Tax Consolidation**

The City is phasing out the Business Tax through a gradual transfer of the business tax revenues to the non-residential property tax. Each year, business tax bills will go down and non-residential property tax bills will increase. The Business Tax will be eliminated in 2019. Consolidating the taxes into a single, easy to understand real estate-based assessment and tax system for non-residential property owners will make Calgary more competitive and attractive for business. Please note that Business Tax Consolidation will not impact your property/business assessment nor will it be reflected on your assessment notice. It will not increase the amount of revenues collected by The City.

#### **Customer Review Period**

The Customer Review Period is from January 5th to March 6th, 2017. If you have any questions about your assessment, please contact 403-268-2888. Changes can only be made to your 2017 Property Assessment during the Customer Review Period.

The City offers online tools to help property owners understand and review their assessment. By logging into Assessment Search at calgary.ca/assessment, you can access details on your property to check and review the accuracy of the information The City has on file, and compare your assessment with other similar properties in your area to ensure your assessment is fair and equitable. You may also conduct more in-depth assessment research and can access sales, community and property reports.

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
#### Dear Constituents:


As we enter the second month of the New Year, I am happy to mention that I am chairing the Caucus Budget Advisory Committee: it works closely with the Minister of Finance and provides assistance to the ministry to prepare the upcoming spring budget 2017. I am glad to have this leadership opportunity to provide my insight into the budget to serve Albertans' best interests.

We are working hard towards job creation in our province: with new initiatives like the Energy Efficiency Program, the Alberta Investor Tax Credit and the Capital Investment Tax Credit, the Petrochemicals Diversification Program and with capital investment in roads, hospitals and schools, you will begin to see the effects in our economy. Since August of 2016 the province has added 25,000 jobs.

- Two new facilities approved under the **Petrochemical Diversification Program.**
- These plants, for the first time in Alberta, will process propane extracted from natural gas resources into value-added plastic products that people all over the world use every day. Both plants will operate in the Edmonton area (Sturgeon County and Strathcona County).
- During construction of the Pembina/PIC petrochemical processing facility, there would be an average of 2,000 to 2,500 workers on site, with more than 150 full-time operations and head office jobs upon completion. Construction is expected to start in 2019, with the facility operating by 2021.
- The second project, by Inter Pipeline, will create 2,000 full-time equivalent jobs over the three year construction period. About 1,600 of those would be at the site and the rest would be in fabrication or module shops and engineering firms. An additional 95 full-time operations positions would be created upon project start-up. Construction is expected to start in 2017, with the facility operating in 2021.
- New wells drilled under Modernized Royalty
   Framework

- Since July, 129 new wells have been drilled in Alberta under the modernized royalty framework.
- Each new well supports 135 direct and indirect jobs and about \$4.5 million in spending.
- It was clear that the old method of confrontational politics of shouting at Ottawa and the other provinces, was not working to get Alberta better access to markets for our oil and gas products.
- We chose a different path and decided to build a plan that would protect our environment and build our energy economy. The pipeline approvals are proof that this plan worked: When Prime Minister Trudeau announced these pipeline approvals, he said, "Let me say this definitively, we could not have approved this project without the leadership of Premier Notley and Alberta's climate leadership plan."
- Starting in early 2017, **Energy Efficiency Alberta** will deliver a variety of programs and services for energy efficiency and small scale renewables.
- Free installation of residential efficiency products such as lighting, water fixtures, and heating components in homes across Alberta.
- Rebates for efficient appliances, lighting, and insulation for homes.
- Incentives for high-efficiency retrofits of lighting, heating, cooling, and hot water systems for businesses, non-profits, and institutions.
