

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The Visioning Plan

Articles contained in previous editions of the PBP MAT-TERS newsletters have discussed plans for a PBP community Visioning Plan. The Plan will outline what we are prepared to accept in the way of future redevelopment and civic planning within our community. The Visioning process includes discussion, debate and ultimately consensus for changes, based on the new Municipal Development Plan, Calgary Transportation Plan, and Land Use Plan , as ratified by the City of Calgary. A PBP community vision will provide the City with our ideas, concepts and our vision of PBP community over the next 10-40 years. In order to achieve this plan, your Community Association needs your participation, involvement and feedback for creation of this important and strategic reference document.

So (briefly), what is a Visioning Plan?

Community visioning is a process, which results in a product – **The Vision Plan**. The process is undertaken by a Community Team, or Committee, comprised of community members. The committee arranges and provides residents with opportunities for expressions of what they deem valuable in and about their community. The process of generating the vision involves discussion, debate, with consensus on what they would like to retain, preserve, or change in the community, over the next 10 to 40 years. The product of these discussions and agreement is the vision plan or statement. This statement outlines the values, ideas and expectations of residents for the future of their community.

Subjects that may be addressed in **The Visioning Plan**, include:



- Social Well-being: The Vision for an inclusive, integrated and secure community
- Parks, Recreation and Community Safety: The Vision for an active, healthy and safe community.
- Arts and Culture: The Vision for a culturally vibrant community
- Transportation and public safety: The Community Vision for safe transport and mobility options
- Growth: The community Vision for shaping sustainable growth
- Environment: The community Vision for a "green" community
- Economy: The Vision for an innovative, entrepreneurial and business-friendly community

Our Visioning Plan will provide the City of Calgary and future developers with our guidelines for planning decisions and changes within the PBP community. Note that such changes are required to be consistent with current planning regulations (ie.) the Municipal Development Plan (MDP), the Calgary Transportation Plan (CTP) and Land Use Bylaw (LUB). Zoning changes are already in effect. Transportation infrastructure to accommodate the BRT along 14th Street route is currently in construction. And plans for commercial-residential redevelopment of Glenmore Landing are underway and expected to be released in the near future. Time is of the essence.


Next month we will outline our plans for implementing the Visioning process.





RESIDENT PERSPECTIVES

This month, I decided to look at unicorns because they just feel spring-y. My research taught me two things: unicorns are one of the oldest depicted mythological creatures, and Europeans liked to write descriptions of rhinoceroses, but no one ever bothered to draw pictures to go with them. Which makes the journey of how we got from rhinoceros to glittering white, horned horses a bit of a disjointed mess. I'll do my best.

Let's get some unicorn basics out of the way: as we understand them today, unicorns are white horse-like creatures with a long, pointed horn protruding from their foreheads, sometimes with cloven hooves or a lion-like tail. Unicorns are untameable, strong, proud and haughty, and would rather die than be captured. They can only be calmed and captured by a virgin. Their horns are made out of a substance called alicorn which is believed to have magical medicinal properties, such as being able to nullify poisons and cure diseases. Some "official" measurements state a unicorn's horn is between 1 cubit and 1.5 cubits (roughly 50 to 70 cm). You know unicorns are old when we're measuring things in cubits!

We also need to talk about the monoceros, which was a creature that was conceptually related to the unicorn but was not a unicorn. At the same time, the term monoceros was used interchangeably with the term unicorn. (Which doesn't complicate things at all.) And like the unicorn, a lot of descriptions of them seem to bear a closer resemblance to rhinoceroses.

Let's talk about some of those descriptions, shall we? The oldest recorded writing describing a unicorn was in Indica, written by Greek physician and historian Ctesias the Cnidian. He described them like "wild asses" (probably specifically the onegar, an Asiatic animal closely resembling a donkey) with a horn that is red, white, and black. In his book, Natural History, Pliny the Elder described a monoceros having the head of a stag, body like a horse's, the feet of an elephant, and the tail of a boar. He also said it made a deep bellowing noise and has a black horn. There is record that Marco Polo claimed to have seen a unicorn, saying they are smaller than elephants with heads like a wild boar, feet like an elephant's, rough hair like a buffalo, and a big black horn. He described them wallowing in mud and called them ugly. (Rude.) He also expressed disappointment that they were nothing like the way Europeans imagined them.

Every instance just seems to me as someone trying to describe a rhinoceros, but after the world's oldest game of telephone, we somehow ended up with our modern rendition of the unicorn.

But let's not forget about the virgins! What's up with that? Well, in the Middle Ages and the Renaissance, a book called Physiologus had an elaborate allegory about a unicorn, which represented the Incarnation of Christ, laying its head on the lap of a maiden, which represented the Virgin Mary. It seems from here that the idea that a unicorn can only be captured by a virgin originates from. From there, there have been many pieces of both religious and secular art showing the hunt of the unicorn. It is sometimes depicted wearing a collar with a broken chain. The unicorn is very popular in heraldry as well.

Now you have a brief overview of unicorns. There's a lot I didn't get to cover, so stay tuned for next month's article where I'll talk specifically about the unicorn's horn.

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

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Southwest Calgary Ring Road: Planning for the 2019 construction season

Over the past winter, KGL has focused on reviewing its schedule to refine timelines for the upcoming construction season and out to the end of the project. The majority of efforts in 2019 will be on completing structures, as well as grading, paving and opening traffic realignments that will make new areas available for construction. Drivers should expect significant traffic realignments along the Highway 8 / Glenmore Trail, 37 Street and Highway 22X corridors and should plan their commutes accordingly.

Display boards from the recent public information sessions, including updated alignment and traffic impact maps, are available on the project website at www.SW-CRRproject.com. There are also some recent aerial photos from the end of January.

While on the website, make sure to check out the Employment Opportunities page. KGL is planning to hire approximately 500 craft employees and another 100 supervisory / office personnel this summer. Our subcontractors will also be hiring craft personnel.

HIGHWAY 8 / GLENMORE TRAIL CORRIDOR

- Multiple realignments of traffic on Highway 8 onto new road starting in summer
- Remove exiting portions of Highway 8 / Glenmore Trail and start upgrades
- · Haul truck and equipment traffic / speed reductions
- Drilling piling for sign bases along corridor

Lott Creek Boulevard / Clearwater Drive

· Realign traffic on Highway 8 onto new road in summer

101 Street S.W.

- Access to 101 Street south of Highway 8 will be permanently closed in spring
 - o Becomes a gated emergency access point
 - o Local residents will use Discovery Ridge Boulevard to access Highway 8
- Realign traffic on Highway 8 onto the new road and bridge in summer

85 Street S.W.

• Temporary closures at the intersection of 85 Street and Lower Springbank Road for upgrades in fall

69 Street S.W.

- Realign traffic on Highway 8 onto new road in summer
- o The intersection and traffic signals will also shift to the south to match the road alignment

Sarcee Trail S.W.

- There will be ongoing pile driving for bridges
- Realign traffic on Highway 8 south of Westhills Mall
 in spring
- Realign traffic through portions of the Sarcee Trail Interchange in fall
- o Also results in a relocation of the haul road intersection with Highway 8
- Additional pile driving is expected at Westhills Way in fall

45 Street S.W.

• Realign traffic on Glenmore Trail onto new road in fall o Results in the permanent closure of 45 Street at Glenmore Trail

37 Street S.W.

- Lane reductions on 37 Street north of Glenmore Trail in spring (down to one lane in each direction for 2019) o Potential for volume delays
- Glenmore Trail will be realigned under the new bridge in summer
- Additional work will take place at the roundabout in Lakeview in summer and fall

o Expect traffic pattern changes

- The westbound Glenmore Trail on/off ramps will be realigned in fall
- o A traffic signal will be installed at the temporary intersection

Elbow River Valley

- Traffic on Weaselhead Road will be realigned around construction activities
- Completion of bridges and stormwater ponds

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The Unimposing House Finch

The House Finch (*Haemorhous mexicanus*), a *passerine* (a song bird), is found year-round across the southern part of western Canada, and throughout the United States and Mexico. Their range in Alberta is expanding northward.

It is a medium-sized finch (about the size of a House Sparrow) with a brown-streaked back and wing, and narrow dark stripes on its whitish under parts. The male's head, throat and rump are generally a pink-red. The female is easily mistaken for a female House Sparrow. Its tail is relatively dark brown, long and squared. The bill is short and thick, cone shaped, an obvious seed-eating bill. They eat seeds from plants, as well as buds, leaves and fruits. They can feed and drink while hovering!

This little songbird is very adaptable in terms of where it will live; including finding a home in deserts, grasslands, orchards, open woods, towns, cities and rural properties such as ranches. It will make its compact little woven nest in a bush, tree, natural cavity or building. They form breeding pairs and lay 6 to 8 eggs (lavender with black spots).

Fun Facts:

- The male House Finch colouring can range from deep red to golden yellow, depending on what its diet was during moulting!
- When it flies it makes several fast wingbeats then has a brief period when it pulls its wings pulled in against its sides.
- This bird's song is a warbling one, with notes ending with "zeee".
- One can find House Finches hanging out with a group of House Sparrows, alone or in pairs.
- A group of House Finches are called a "development" of finches.
- If you want to attract these little birds to your backyard feeder, try tempting them with nyger or millet seed and shelled sunflower seeds.
