RKHCA BOARD MESSAGE

A short update from your Board this month. Reminders of TimBits soccer (might not be any space left by now!), registering for a garden plot (ditto!) and official notice of the Annual General Meeting to be held on June 15, 2016 at 7pm. Before the meeting we are expecting the City of Calgary Crowchild Trail Study engagement team to be on hand to explain and answer questions about the planning for the upgrades to Crowchild, so come for **6pm**. As this is written, the Phase 3 Concept Identification open houses are in full swing and there is a vast quantity of material posted to the web site at calgary.ca/crowchild. By June the process will be in Phase 4, Concept Evaluation wherein we expect to see fewer proposed realignments and expansion ideas in more detail. These changes to Crowchild will not occur for a number of years, but will affect our community and our commutes, so please take the time to get informed and provide feedback.

On that note, the Board will be setting up a new working committee on mobility. Many community associations have traffic committees, RKH would like to see effort and engagement on a broader mandate, to include all modes - walking, cycling and transit, as well as vehicles. We think four to five interested and committed individuals will be required. Prior knowledge or expertise in transportation of all kinds would be valuable, but assistance and guidance will be available. There are a number of on-going initiatives of interest - the 20th Street bike lanes, the SW BRT, traffic calming, etc. Volunteers for this committee should contact info@richmondknobhill.ca or come to the AGM. The committee chair will be a director position on the Board.

And speaking of the Board, as always, we are looking for volunteers for leadership positions. These include the board executive (president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer) and up to six directors. While the current Board continues to review what should be done and by whom, for RKH Director roles will include mobility, engagement, events and activities, development, facilities and others. These are all leadership roles which may include the opportunity to represent the community with elected officials and other organizations. These are excellent opportunities for personal growth and volunteer time for professional development requirements. Challenging and interesting too. Let your interest be known to board-secretary@richmondknobhill.ca or come to the AGM.

Lastly – the casino is soon and your community needs assistance with this, our main capital fund raising effort. Casino revenues keep the community hall in good condition and pay the equipment costs for the rink. Just a few hours of your time would go a long way. 



DEVELOPMENT

Did You Get Your Trees?

All new or recent infills in Richmond/Knob Hill should have trees in their vards -- either existing trees that were preserved and protected by the developer during the construction process, or new trees planted by the developer after construction was finished, or a combination of the two. Generally speaking, any infill on a 25ft wide parcel should have at least one tree in the front yard and 1 tree in the rear yard, and any newly planted:

- 1. One deciduous tree should have had, at the time of planting, a caliper size (ie. trunk diameter) of at least 50mm (2in); and
- 2. Two coniferous trees should have had, at the time of planting, a height of at least 2m (6.6ft), and infills on wider parcels should have three or more such trees.

It is critically important to our community that all trees that are supposed to be retained or planted are in fact retained or planted. Trees provide numerous benefits, including energy conservation through natural summer cooling and shelter from winter winds, storm water capture/purification, air purification, oxygen production, traffic calming, stress reduction, etc., and our community has lost a significant number of its trees over the past few years as a result of redevelopment activities and extreme weather events. Unfortunately, although City development inspectors are quite good at making sure that new infill developments are constructed in accordance with their approved plans and most other applicable requirements, they don't always make sure that the required trees are present.

If you are living in or near a new or recent infill that doesn't appear to have at least this number and size of trees, please contact the City's 3-1-1 call centre so that someone can check it out and make sure that any missing trees are planted. Alternatively, if you bought a new infill from the builder, please follow up with the builder to make sure that the required trees are planted. Your assistance in helping to "retree" our community is most appreciated!

Get Ready To Line Dance **At Stampede** 2016!




The Line Dance Stampede is starting a new line dance instruction session March 9, 2016.



Community Cleanups: Save Yourself a Trip to the Landfill

Calgary Community Standards (formerly Animal & Bylaw Services) in partnership with Waste & Recycling Services and your community association is pleased to offer another year of Community Clean-ups for FREE of charge to Calgarians. A Community Clean-up is a day scheduled at your community centre where you can bring your household items that may not fit in your black, brown or blue carts like furniture or old fencing or items that fill up your carts too quickly or just an accumulation of items that are ready for the landfill. If you live in a multi-unit housing complex, we welcome you to bring your waste and recycling items to this event especially if it is closer than the designated community recycling depots.

We are pleased to announce that 3 packer trucks will be provided this year (2 for waste and 1 for organic materials). Last year, 110 communities were served between April and October. Please check with your community association to see when your Community Clean-up has been booked and better yet, volunteer to help with the event which is held either on a Saturday or Sunday from 9 am - 2 pm. Your community association needs 15-20 volunteers to put on the event so your assistance is greatly appreciated. Calgary Community Standards provides funds for food and refreshments for the volunteers, advertising and promotion, gloves, garbage bags and any other items used to help Clean-up.

Please note, there are items that the City of Calgary's packer trucks will not accept:

- Tires, home appliances, paint, household chemicals, propane tanks, microwaves, car batteries, home electronics, liquids, metals and glass, railway ties.
- · Your Community Association usually enhances the event with recycling services such as electronics, metal, paper shredding and possible tire recycling and paint pickup (or you can take your cans of paint to any fire hall station).

The Community Clean-ups provide a fantastic opportunity to work with your neighbours and community associations to Clean-up your yards and homes, parks, off-leash areas and sport playfields. Thank you for your commitment to help create healthy, safe and vibrant communities.

EMS: Bicycle Helmet

Head injuries are a leading cause of serious injury and death to children riding bicycles*. Most injuries occur when a cyclist suffers a fall, strikes a stationary object, or collides with another cyclist/pedestrian. Remember – it's the law in Alberta that cyclists under the age of 18 must wear a helmet (and highly recommended for all ages). Helmets should be CSA approved and worn during recreational activities such as skateboarding, in-line skating, or cycling.

Getting informed

- · Wearing a helmet while cycling can prevent a serious injury, or even save a life;
- Brain injuries can cause permanent disability or death;
- Reduce your risk by always wearing your helmet;
- · Replace any helmet that has been involved in a crash, even if it appears undamaged.

Getting started

- Allow children to assist when buying their helmet. Cyclists who choose their own helmet are more likely to wear them:
- Start the habit early. Young children learning to ride tricycles need to wear helmets;
- Parents must lead by example always wear a helmet when cycling.

Getting the right fit

- Take the time to properly fit and adjust your helmet to ensure maximum protection in case of a crash;
- When worn properly, helmets should fit level, not tilted up, or down over the forehead;
- Helmets should feel snug, but not too tight. To test the fit, the helmet should not fall off when you shake your head from side-to-side while the straps are unfastened:
- Adjust the chin straps to form a "Y" below and slightly forward from the ears:
- Only one finger should be able to fit under the chin strap when it is fastened;
- Do not forget to use the sizing pads included with the helmet. They will help improve the overall fit, comfort and safety.

Smoking and Home Fire Safety

The place where we feel safest — at home — is where most smoking-materials structure fires, deaths, and injuries occur. Smoking materials are the leading cause of fire deaths. Every year we have over 500 fires started due to smoking materials, this is preventable and can be reduced!

Some tips to remember:

- If you smoke, smoke outside. Most deaths result from fires that started in living rooms, family rooms and bedrooms
- Keep cigarettes, lighters, matches and other smoking materials high out of the reach of children. We have found the kids to be very observant regarding "hidden" lighters.

Put It Out, Right Out!

- Use a deep, sturdy ashtray. Place it away from anything that can burn.
- DO NOT discard cigarettes in vegetation such as mulch, potted plants, landscaping,
- peat moss, dried grasses, leaves or other things that could ignite easily.
- Before you throw away butts and ashes, make sure they are out. Dousing in water or sand is the best way to do that.

Your Calgary Fire department has been called to many fires burning on the outside of homes from ignited peat moss in planters while occupants were sleeping inside.

Did you know that in addition to your Fire Department being highly trained to battle fires, that we have specialty teams that are further trained in airport rescue, structural collapse, confined space, dive rescue, high angle and hazardous material response?

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It has been over 100 days since I was appointed Minister of Veterans Affairs and Associate Minister of National Defence. Each and every day I am honoured and proud to serve those who wear—or who have worn—our nation's uniform.


We have already reduced taxes to the middle class. This will put more money in to 9 out of every 10 Canadian pockets.
