RKHCA BOARD Message

We had the opportunity a few nights ago to hear amongst a number of speakers, both the Mayer, His Worship Naheed Nenshi, and our Member of Parliament, the Honourable Kent Hehr, Minister of Veterans Affairs, speak on the impact of service, commitment, caring and community. Mr. Hehr was thanked for representing Calgary Centre, to which he politely replied "thank you," but don't forget I represent all Canadians and especially veterans who have served our country". Mr. Nenshi was wearing his cheery green "3" button that he always wears, the very visible reminder of '3 Things for Calgary' which is a call to action to each of us as Calgarians (paraphrased from http://www.3thingsforcalgary.ca/):

- 1. Think about 3 Things you can do to make Calgary better. These things could be for your street, your neighbourhood or for the entire city.
- 2. Do your 3 Things every action you take to make Calgary better makes a difference.
- 3. Encourage (at least) 3 more people to do 3 Things for Calgary.

Guess what? Your community association would be thrilled to have or be at least one (if not more) of your 3 things! There are lots of things to be done through the association, including board leadership roles, directorships, events planning and execution, and behind the scenes activities. Come to the AGM, please and get involved!

Here's some examples of '3 things' your current community engagement team accomplished this year (so far): Marda Gras, on a beautiful day in August, we handed out sunglasses and popsicles to everyone who stopped by to say 'Hi'; Halloween and Easter parties which were very well attended, as well as the WinterFest/Chili Cook Off. In the Fall, the Face to Face Fridays turned out to be a great chance for community members to get a monthly update on the happenings in the RKH community and we are hoping to continue this event again next year. Timbits soccer is another sell-out.

Then while the Development Committee has been less active with fewer development permit applications for their consideration, it has spent an enormous amount of time and effort regarding the ML33 project on 33rd

Avenue, the proposed changes to allow secondary suites on smaller properties, and also participation on the Crowchild Trail redevelopment, 20th Street bike lane and SW BRT transit initiatives. Looking forward, the reroofing and installation of solar panels on the Hall are about to start.

Winter was so warm and short our volunteer ice-makers barely got a chance to show off their talents, but otherwise the Community Hall and Skate Shack are in good shape and well used. By the time you read this, the community gardens will be well sprouted, another "3" brought to the community by willing volunteers.

So, we are looking forward to seeing you at the AGM (June 15, 2016, 7pm, Community Hall), which will be preceded by an update on Crowchild Trail planning, and consider volunteering to ensure the Association continues into the future, especially for leadership/executive positions. Lastly – a final reminder of the casino in July; your community needs assistance with this, our main capital fund raising effort. Casino revenues keep the community hall in good condition and pay the equipment costs for the rink. Just a few hours of your time would go a long way. 

ADDITIONAL NOTES

- \$100 Booking Fee required to hold a booking reservation. Cancellations permitted with no penalty up to 30 days prior to the event. Booking Fee will be forfeited if cancellation received less than 30 days prior to the event and a new renter cannot be found.
- Rent and damage deposit required 14 days in advance of the event.

For more information call Stacey & Ksenia @ 403-249-8385 or email info@richmondknobhill.ca Over the past year the RKHCA Development Committee has been chaired by Doug Roberts along with current members Dennis Cant, Joan Faulk, Nancy Miller and Dana Hill, and we have recently been joined by our newest member Shamir Charania. Although the Calgary real estate market cooled off somewhat over the past year, the Committee has remained quite busy reviewing and commenting on the many permit applications that have been circulated to the Committee for redevelopment projects in our community, with the objective of trying to ensure that redevelopment activities that take place in our community are respectful of the neighbouring properties and residents, and of the community as a whole.

The Committee's activities over the past year have included:

- Reviewing and submitting comments to the City on over 50 permit applications and various proposed bylaw amendments
- Discussing proposed developments with applicants and neighbouring residents
- Hosting community meetings for more controversial projects
- Making submissions to the Calgary Planning Commission & City Council on land use applications & proposed bylaw amendments
- Representing the RKHCA before the Subdivision and Development Appeal Board on 6 development permit appeals
- Pushing for changes to the City's bylaws to, among other things:
- Clarify and fill loopholes in "contextual" rules, which allow new developments to proceed without community consultation
- Encourage the preservation of existing trees and the planting of more new trees
- Encourage greater use of permeable surfaces to reduce runoff
- Require redeveloped lots to be graded so as to prevent runoff from flowing onto neighbouring properties

 Reduce the extent to which windows, balconies and raised decks are allowed to overlook neighbouring back yards

One project of particular note has been the proposed ML33 development, a 5-storey, 145-unit condo to be constructed on the north side of the 2400 block of 33 Avenue SW. The ML33 project consumed a significant amount of the Committee's time and energy over the past year, and it is still in process. See last month's issue of The Review for more information on the current status of this significant project.

The Committee expects more interesting development issues to arise over the upcoming year. The ML33 project needs to be resolved -- City Council has directed City Administration to work with RKHCA and other key stakeholders to prepare a mobility plan for the Marda Loop area and to integrate the green space on the NE corner of the 33 Avenue SW/Crowchild Trail interchange with the new NB SW Transitway station -- a new bikeway is going in along 20 Street SW -- the Viscount Bennett school property might become available for redevelopment -- R-C1 and narrow R-C2 parcels may be opened up to secondary and backvard suites -- senior-friendly housing developments are needed but are not being built in our community -- and who knows what other issues might arise. If you would like to help Richmond/Knob Hill redevelop into a more vibrant, walkable, diverse and sustainable urban community, then come join the RKHCA **Development Committee!**

The latest resource Fandrich's team uses to educate Calgarians on development and building regulations is the webpage calgary. ca/homeimprovement, which allows anyone interested in doing a renovation to browse popular home renovation topics for bylaw and permit information, property and land designation, drawings and forms they will need to complete their home renovation.

"It can sometimes be difficult to understand when you need a permit and what City bylaws might impact your project - we're here to help guide you through the process," Fandrich says.

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
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Neighbour Day

Youth Employment

In late April I read an article on the CBC's website speaking to the plight of students in Calgary trying to find summer work. I printed this article to share with the different members of my staff and fellow MPs on Parliament Hill. Let me tell you why.

That first job for a student or youth entering the workforce establishes valuable skillsets and experience, and in some cases are the beginnings of a career. This first chance builds confidence and makes a strong impact on their ability to serve their communities and build the society that we all share and enjoy. Providing these opportunities for success is one of our most important responsibilities.

First of all, investing in youth jobs and opportunities is part of our plan to help the middle class and those seeking to join it. Our investments from Budget 2016 will help support young Canadians, including vulnerable youth, Indigenous Canadians, immigrants, youth with disabilities, single parents, those who have not completed high school and others.

We will help create thousands of new green jobs, more summer employment, participation in the Skills Link program and employment in the heritage sector.

We've **doubled** the Canada Summer Jobs Program (from 35,000 jobs to 70,000 for 2016, 2017, and 2018). This program invests in local non-profits, local government, and small businesses to hire youth over the summer months. Places like the Trinity Foundation, Kerby Centre and the YWCA receive grants for hiring these students. This program has a proven track record – employing some 330,000 students since its inception – and supporting local organizations in their work in the community.

This is part of our \$105 million commitment over five years, starting in 2016–17, and \$25 million per year thereafter in support for youth service.

Further to this, our government has created the Prime Minister's Youth Advisory Council to provide advice on key issues such as employment and education, building stronger communities as well as climate change and clean growth. Oftentimes I've found the best policies and ideas come from those you're seeking to help, and this is one part of this listening to those in our communities.

These are investments in Canada's future: we're going to help our youth find jobs and get the best start possible to their careers.
